TV Talent Show Set For Lubbock

Talent from the entire West Texas area, headlined by song writer-western singer, Slim Willet, is being lined up for an all night Telethon scheduled on KDUB-TV, Lubbock, January 31. Reason for the all-night TV party is to invite contributions to the March of Dimes.

As plans now stand, according to Jay Hicks, program director of the giant Telethon will start at 10 p. m. January 31, and continue as long as contributions keep coming in for the polio fund.

Topping the list of entertainers scheduled to appear is Slim Willet, author of the hit parade song, "Don't Let The Stars Get In Your Eyes", from Abilene. He will drive in from Abilene, after finishing his Saturday night show there, and arrive about 1:30 a. m. to appear on the public service program.

Handling the emcee duties will be Jimmy Isaacs and Ray Trent, KDUB-TV announcers. Talent thus far includes a negro minstrel, two singers from KLYN in Amarillo, a square dance exhibition with C. C. Lindsey of Lubbock calling, Bob Murphy at the organ, and several acts by air-men from Reese Air Force Base.

Highlighting the meeting will be an Amateur Talent Contest for people living within the area served by the Cooperative and not over high school age. There will be \$50 in prizes for the three top contestants, \$25 for first prize; \$15 for second prize; and \$10 for third prize. Judges will be selected from the group present who in turn will judge applause from the audience. The contestant receiving the greatest applause (according to the judges) will win first place.

Another highlight of the program will be door prizes valued at more than \$300 that will be given away. The first prize will be given at exactly 2 p. m. Only members of the Cooperative present will be eligible for a prize.

A television set will be given during the meeting.

New Cleaning Process Used Here By Lamberts

Recently, representatives of the Sta-Nu Corporation of Chicago demonstrated in the cleaning plant of Lambert Cleaners a fabric finishing process known as "STA-NU". This process is now patented after years of research and scientific experiments committed to the preservation of textile fabrics.

In demonstrating this process, the garments selected were made from every sort of fabric available at Lambert's cleaning plant. The garments selected for this demonstration were first dry-cleaned. After the cleaning operation the right side of each garment was finished on steam process common in all cleaning plants. Before the left side of the garments was finished, a mechanical device was attached to the steam line. The left side of the garments were then finished in exactly the same way as the right side, except that this time the steam used in the finishing operation contained Sta-Nu. This completed the demonstration and all garments were then exposed for inspection.

By comparison, the results shown were so outstanding, as to be almost unbelievable to any one not having seen the demonstration. The left side of each garment processed with "Sta-Nu" had the look of new fabric. The drape, sheen, texture and brilliance of color by contrast made the right side of the garment look "dull" and lifeless.

There will be 24 hens, 19 cocks to turn loose, and he hopes hunters will not shoot them, but will give them a chance to reproduce and populate the section with these beautiful birds and so furnish lots of hunting in coming years.

These 43 represent what remains of 100 baby pheasants he bought in the spring. He expects to buy 100 more baby pheasants the coming spring, to turn out next winter.

CRASH VICTIM NEPHEW OF A. S. STOVALL

Maxwell Perkins, Jr., co-pilot on a C-46 transport plane that crashed against Bear River mountain near Fish Haven, Idaho, early in the morning of Jan. 7, was a nephew of A. S. Stovall of Muleshoe. Thirty-seven Korean war veterans on their way home for discharge and three crew members lost their lives.

Perkins, who was 32, was the son of Mrs. Lois Perkins, Fort Worth, sister of Mr. Stovall. He was a veteran of World War II.

Late reports said that the salvage party has not been able to reach the scene of the wreck because of deep snows. The plane was mostly destroyed by flames following the crash.

Poll taxes are not placed on the tax statements you get at the collector's office, but must be paid separately.

INSECTICIDES and HERBICIDES

Which is the greater hazard, insects or insecticides? Alarmists are telling the American people that insecticides are greater danger. They claim, and they're getting a lot of space in the newspapers and magazines, that we're being poisoned by new chemicals.

This problem was pointed out recently by Dr. Edward F. Knippling, president of the American Association of Economic Entomologists. Dr. Knippling maintains that such fears result from cases where insecticides were

misused, with no regard for recommendations of entomologists. The toxicity hazard of any chemical is in direct proportion to how it is used, he claims.

Federal and Texas Department of Agriculture entomologists are aware that they must never underestimate their responsibility to the public in seeing that insecticides are used safely. When a new chemical is developed, they assume it is potentially hazardous to man and animal until adequate investigations prove otherwise. When tests are complete then recom-

mendations are made for the safest methods of application.

When we consider that insecticides are man and crop savers rather than man and crop killers, it calls for an entirely different outlook on the insect control chemicals. We must realize that many diseases are transmitted by insects. Millions of dollars worth of crops are destroyed yearly by other types. Effective control programs, carried out through proper use of insecticides, then, are invaluable.

But there is another phase of control work carried out by the Texas Department of Agriculture which is sometimes confused with insect elimination. This is the regulation by law of hormone-type herbicides.

Herbicides, such as 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T, are used primarily in the eradication of weeds and brush. These herbicides are NOT poisonous, although their use is controlled by Texas Herbicide Law, House Bill 593 (1951). This law is designed to protect crops which are susceptible to the chemical.

Hormone-type herbicides differ from insect poisons in that they energize a broad-leaf plant, causing it to "grow itself to death." Careless use of the chemical can cause severe damage to crops such as cotton. Because of this, permits for its use must be obtained from the department in Austin. Officials act as advisors in chemical application and also estimate the value of crops accidentally damaged for future settlement.

The worth of herbicides, like insecticides, is only as great as its effective use makes it. It can be a boon to agriculture when used properly, or a disaster when misused. Farmers who wish to take full advantage of the chemical are urged to obtain complete information on herbicides and pesticides by writing John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas.

If you are one of those who continues to defy courtesy while at the wheel you are destined, by the law of averages, to be killed or maimed in a car wreck.

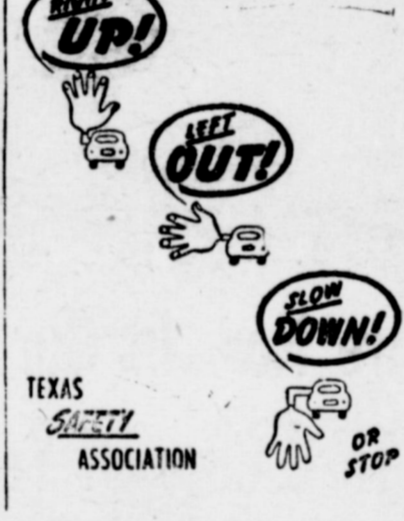

Joe is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cummings who now reside at Hereford. This whole section is proud of Joe Cummings and the record he is making at Alabama U.

Previous to moving to Muleshoe Joe had not been big enough to be a regular on the Littlefield Wildcat team, and when the family moved here from Littlefield Joe was ineligible the first year. It was a bitter disappointment to him, to his family, his school mates and coaches, and his friends, when the leg injury stopped his high school sport career.

But after graduation Joe took off for Alabama U. He was 17 and on his own, with no great high school record behind him, no friends with pull or influence, and he stayed.

Several years ago, when Alabama was at the top of the nation's football heap, playing in the Rose Bowl, Joe took a fancy

Propeller and jet planes flew from the carrier's flight deck to bomb, strafe, napalm and rocket military installations from the enemy's front lines north to the Manchurian border.
