Thomas Bloecher filed suit against Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills, alleging that conditions of the Crockett County Jail violate his civil rights. Bloecher, who is in jail under a charge of auto theft, filed suit on his own using a form distributed by the Federal Government along with instructions and location of the district where it should be filed.

400,000 persons are inmates in America's prisons? This is double the number of a decade ago.

The average time served in prison by a convicted felon is 26 months. That average might be longer if more cells were available. As it is, parole boards must release some inmates in time to make room for new ones. About 1,000 persons await death sentences in the U.S. Given the legal battles, however, few are likely to be executed soon.

About 25% of probationers and parolees are arrested for new crimes. Defenders of this figure see it as proof that rehabilitation works; critics see it as proof that the system is too lenient.

SILENCE IS GOLDEN. **BUT IS IT PRAYER?**

We all know "silence is golden." but is it prayer? New Jersey Federal District Court Judge Dickinson R. Debevoise thinks so.





ckett Consolidated Common School District No. 1, which embraces the whole of Crockett County, will be called upon to decide at an election on Tuesday, December 7, the question of issuing \$100,000 in bonds for the purpose of 'constructing, repairing and equipping public free school

"It advances the religion of some persons by mandating a period when all students and teachers must assume the traditional posture of prayer of some religious groups and during which times those who pray in that manner can do so." Where in the statute it says "a traditional posture" must be assumed escapes us.

Then, the judge continues on his logically erratic course, adding that the law inhibits the religious beliefs of those whose methods of prayer "require movement and sound.

We even checked with a Washington spokeswoman for Hare Krishna adherents, who are well known for their chanting and dancing during prayer. She replied that this is merely one form of prayer, adding that one can pray in any posture, even while conducting your day-to-day routine --- cooking, cleaning or such.

Finally, Judge Debevoise goes totally around the bend in justifying his ruling against golden silence in the public schools of New Jersey. He concludes his edict by citing threats "by students who believed the minute of silence constituted enforced prayer contrary to their own conviction." The students had threatened to disrupt classes in protest of the law.

Does the jurist believe any law should be judged constitutional or unconstitutional based on threats by those who believe in rule by disruption? Unbelievable! If there's a law you happen to dislike just threaten disruption, challenge the statute in court, and pray -- excuse us -hope to have Judge Debevoise rule on the issue

One last point: it is ironic that in most cases dealing with legislation mandating a moment of silence the judge cites the "intent" of the lawmakers in legislating the practice. You hear words like: 'This bill, while calling merely for a moment of silence to be used for any purpose religious or secular — was really enacted with a religious intent.

This is quite probably true 99-and-44-hundredths percent of the time; but isn't it remarkable that these laws are branded as violating the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution without the judge taking into consideration the intent of the authors of that amendment?

The First Amendment says: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." Any reading of the deliberations of the framers of the Bill of Rights will readily show that they never intended a religiously sterile nation. They merely wanted to end the then-prevalent oppression of certain religious sects. And it is quite clear that the New Jersey minute-of-silence law adheres to that tradition.

We're pleased to see that New Jersey lawmakers intend to appeal Judge Debevoise's ban. Judge Debevoise or no Judge Debevoise: We wish them Godspeed!

House Ethics Committee voted last week to continue to investigate the possible misuse of state funds by Houston Rep. Ron Wilson, a leader of that cham-

### **DWI** Videotape

The same Travis County grand jury which indicted Mattox has gone over the head of its county attorney to review the dismissed DWI charge of a Terrell legislator.

The grand jury requested to see the videotape taken of Rep. Gordon Arnold, Jr. when he was arrested earlier this month. Arnold was also charged with criminal mischief for kicking out the police car radio, to which he pleaded no contest.

Q: What is meant by tort law?

A: Generally speaking, tort law is that broad area of the civil law which concerns itself with a person's claim for relief typically founded upon, or arising out of, an incident caused by a violation of a standard of care or duty imposed by

Examples of claims wishes of the testator, it can founded upon tort law could include an incident for libel and slander involving intentional conduct; a motor vehicle collision, or a slip and fall while on the premises of a store; or a defective product in an unreasonably dangerous condition, to name just a few. However, just because an incident has occurred does not automatically indicate that someone has a claim founded upon tort law; rather, that occurrence should be carefully re-

viewed by an attorney. Q: If a divorced parent avoids paying child support as ordered by the Court until the children reach the age of majority, is there any way this non-paying parent can be forced to pay the money owed?

A: Yes. The Statute of Limitations on unpaid support has recently been held to be 10 years, which means that at *least* that many years of unpaid support can be ordered paid. Anyone to whom a duty of support is owed can bring the action against the nonpaying parent in the Court that last had jurisdiction






Tips For Gardeners

"Autumn to winter, winter into spring, spring into summer, summer into fall, so rolls the changing year, and so we change, motion so swift, we know not that we move." Dinah Molock Craik

It seems we are having more northers blow in than we usually do at this time. We hope to miss a severe freeze so our colorful trees, shrubs and vines will give us a beautiful fall show. The light rains we have had have been most welcome.

The gardener can now take things easier than during almost any month in the year. Once the outdoor garden is tucked away for winter, there is comparatively little to do, though planting should continue until very cold weather.

When fruit trees have dropped their leaves they may be given a first dormant spray and pruning may be started. Dormant spraying to combat scale, insects, and certain other pests and diseases may now be given attention for evergreens and other plants. Do not spray if there is danger of the temperature dropping below freezing.

Selecting the "perfect" eat, she notes. ham for your holiday dinner can require some careful label reading.

Variations in the moisture content, style, cut and brand of ham affect its price and the quality of the product you put on the table, says foods and nutrition specialist Dr. Dymple Cooksey.

But these variations are clearly stated on the label so consumers can compare features and costs, says Cooksey, a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

The first choice you have to make is between a fully cooked or a cook-before-eating ham. The two types of hams are processed for different amounts of time, but both are pre-cooked long enough to make them safe to

celebration. 'Although the number of families created by divorce and re-marriage has increased dramatically in the past decade, this doesn't necessarily mean that the family as institution is growing an weaker," says Diane T. Welch, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Exten-

sion home economist. 'Changes in families mean educational, community and church programs dealing with families have had to change too," says Welch. "Perhaps the most significant change is a greater concern with building family strengths in all types of families.' Family strengths are

thought of as a set of factors--relationship patterns, interpersonal skills, social and psychological characteristics, she explains. These factors create a sense of positive family identity, promote satisfying and fulfilling family interaction, encourage the development of family members' potential and help the family deal effectively with stress and crisis. Families can actively work

to develop these strengths especially at holidays, says Welch.

Because traditional family life is often idealized during the holidays, members of non-traditional families may feel badly about being "different," she says.

But non-traditional families should recognize that they are not alone, says the specialist: An increasing proportion of all marriages are re-marriages. As a result, 13 percent of children under 18 now live in step-families. An additional 17 percent of children live in single parentfamilies.

According to the home economist, non-traditional families can take the following steps to build family strengths during the holiday season:
