## Pipeline to contact some landowners

Some landowners in Crockett County will soon be contacted about condemnation of some of their property for Phase II of the All American Pipeline. This segment of the line will affect 16 counties in Texas, according to Billy Reagor, County Extension Agent.

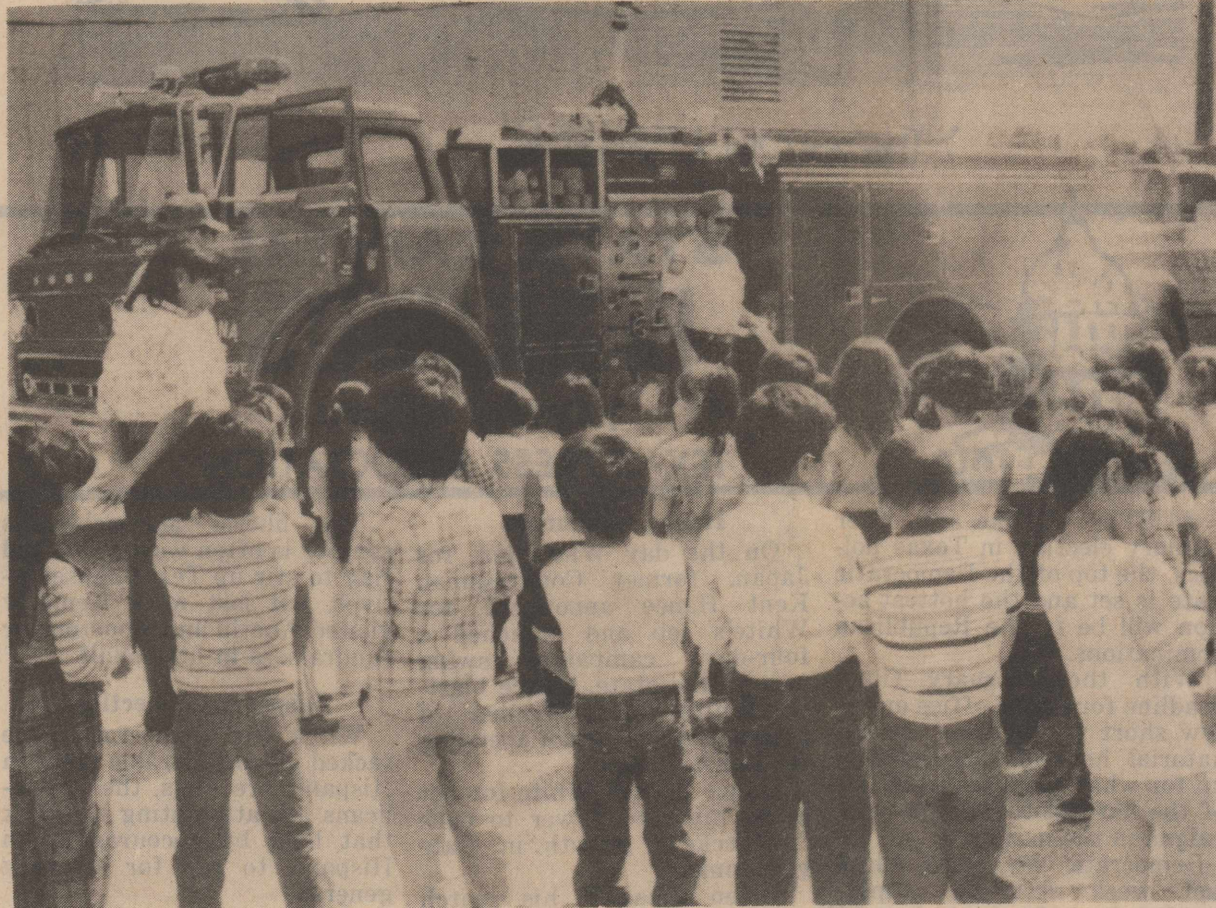
"In many instances, landowners faced with condemnation are not aware of their legal rights and fail to act in their own best interests," says Judon Fambrough, attorney and a senior lecturer with the Texas Real Estate Research Center (TRERC) at Texas A&M University. "The federal government, the state, counties, cities and utility and pipeline companies have the power of eminent domain—the authority to condemn and take possession of private property for public use."

The entity doing the taking, the condemnor, must adhere to certain restraints in the condemnation process. If the condemnation is challenged, the law requires the condemnor to establish public use and determine public necessity. In all cases, however, the landowner is entitled to due process and the receipt of just compensation.

"Due process guarantees the owner reasonable notice and an opportunity to present a defense," says Fambrough "Due process in condemnation is divided into three phases—negotiation, hearing and appeal." Condemnation begins with the condemnor negotiating with the owner in good faith to purchase the property. If the parties agree, the owner conveys the property, the purchase price is paid and the case ends.

Before accepting the initial offer, landowners should investigate prices paid for comparable easements in the area and the awards granted in previous hearings. If the offer compares favorably, the landowner may

## Court accepts low bids on county vehicles

Crockett County Commissioners purchased two one-ton trucks and a one-half ton pickup from Jim Bass Ford and a 25-ton gooseneck trailer from Aztec Trailer Sales, during the regular monthly meeting Monday. The one-ton trucks were purchased for \$10,300 each, the pickup for \$9,750, and the trailer for \$12,289.

Buttery Motor Co., Glasscock Chevrolet of Big Lake, and Iraan Motors also bid on the trucks and pickup. Others bidding on the trailer were Loadcraft, Associated Supply, Western Trailers, Tilson Godsey, and Bruton Easy Pull.

Jan Davis, adult probation officer for Crockett and Sutton Counties, requested commissioners' permission to hire a part-time secretary for this county. Miss Davis presently has a secretary in Sutton County who has helped out over here for approximately nine hours per week, but the secretary has not received compensation for travel time and receives no insurance or benefits.

Commissioners voted unanimously to hire a secretary who is both a typist and bilingual for 15 hours per week. Hour wage for the secretary will be set at \$6.80 per hour and the job will begin November 1.

Commissioners agreed Monday to allow the Civic Center to be used temporarily for the preparation of food for Meals on Wheels. An inspector from the Texas Department of Human Resources found the present facilities in violation of food safety regulations last week and gave the Meals on Wheels program until the end of October to relocate. Several options were discussed and commissioners were in total agreement that having the meals prepared at Crockett County Hospital would not be satisfactory.

Judge A. O. Fields had contacted hospital personnel to get a cost estimate and was informed that the hospital could prepare the meals with the addition of one employee for \$3.56 per meal. Ninety percent of the cost of meals is paid by the Department of Human Resources while the county picks up the remaining 10 percent. Use of the Civic Center for this purpose is subject to approval of the facilities by inspectors from the DHR.

Dr. Bill Bass representing Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital rendered a report to commissioners concerning the present hospital facility in Crockett County. He began by stating that if Crockett County needs a doctor to fill in, in the absence of the resident doctors, Shannon would be happy to send a doctor for 24-48 hours.

Dr. Bass also stated that Shannon was still very interested in operating the present health facilities as an emergency operation. He said that if Shamrock operated it, it would be a family practice clinic and emergency room facility, costing the county \$250,000 per year for Shannon's services. Dr. Bass emphasized that

the facility would be comparable to Shannon's emergency room with equipment to include a pace maker and other vital instruments for cardiac treatment.

A physician would be on duty at the health facility 10-12 hours per day and would be available for immediate response (five minute call-answer time) during the rest of the day.

Dr. Bass also presented a proposition for assuming administration of the Care Center. He stated that Shannon would only supervise the present administration which by his terms is "okay". The Center would become a Skilled Nursing Home and would be "Medicare approved" allowing nursing personnel to work with intravenous feeding tubes. The present nursing level does not allow for the use of tubes, other than catheters.

Commissioners voted unanimously Monday to allot \$4530 for 25 holiday decorations to be placed in the township during the Christmas season. Beth Boyd, chamber of commerce manager, had requested \$6,806.80 for 40 decorations, stating that the present ones had deteriorated beyond repair. Commissioners suggested that Mrs. Boyd seek donations from merchants and individuals for the remaining 15 decorations. Each decoration over 25 could be purchased for \$170 each.

The Commissioners' Court also voted Monday to amend the 1985 budget to allow more travel money for Billy Reagor and Rachel Hall. This amendment will not allow more money, but adjustments will be made within the County Extension Service budget. Reagor's travel allowance will increase \$1000 with \$500 coming from supplies and \$500 from car repairs. Mrs. Hall's will increase \$500 which will come from supplies.

The 1985 county budget allotted \$3,500 for county agent travel and \$1,500 each for supplies and car repairs. For the first eight months of this budget year \$2,759.10 had been spent from the travel account, \$498.80 from supplies and \$696.08 from car repairs. The adjustment will allow Reagor \$1,740.90 in travel allowance for the remaining four months.

Mrs. Hall's travel allowance was set at \$2,000 for 1985 and \$1,500 was set aside for her office supplies. As of the eighth month, \$1,634.43 had been spent for travel and \$371.27 for supplies. The adjustment leaves \$865.57 for the rest of the year.

Reagor cites his serving on several Extension Task Forces that require additional travel as the reason for the increase, and added that Mrs. Hall has also been required to perform more activities which required additional travel.

## Arrest clears up burglaries

Ricky D. Davis was charged with theft October 11 by the Crockett County Sheriff's Department in connection with the burglaries of several laundries and car washes in Ozona, Sonora, San Angelo and other parts of the area. Davis had been arrested this summer in connection with a jewelry theft at Baker Jewelers and had been out of jail on probation. He was arrested in New Mexico recently and Crockett County Sheriff's officers brought him back to Ozona this weekend. After Davis was returned, he confessed to having burglarized the laundries and car washes and was questioned by the Tom Green County Sheriff's office, clearing up several unsolved crimes. Bond was forfeited and the subject remains in Crockett Co. jail awaiting disposition.

October 9, Javier Galan was arrested for revocation of probation for aggravated assault. He remains in jail awaiting disposition. Also arrested Wednesday was Abel Rodriguez who was charged with revocation of probation for burglary of a motor vehicle.

Rodriguez was released October 11, when charges were dropped.

Thursday, Darryl Leon Chase was arrested on a warrant out of San Antonio for theft. He was released Monday to officers from the San Antonio Sheriff's office.

Sammy L. Crockett was arrested Friday and charged with possession of marijuana. He was released after paying a \$350 fine and being placed on probation for one year. Randall Wayne Barwick was also arrested Friday for possession of marijuana but his case was dismissed. Both subjects were charged with possession of under two ounces which is a county court misdemeanor.

David Wayne Moore was arrested for driving while intoxicated Saturday and released after paying \$350 in fines and being placed on two years probation.

Monday, Leonor Munoz was arrested and charged with public intoxication. She was released the same day after paying a \$100 fine.

## Construction underway for Circle Bar RV park

Construction is coming right along on the Recreational Vehicle Park Tom Mitchell is building across Taylor Box Road from Circle Bar Truck Corral. Mitchell said last week he expects the new, modern facility to open for business early next year.

The 96-unit park will offer all the conveniences of home away from home. There will be shower and laundry facilities, a swimming pool, a party barn, a private club and an auto museum. The auto museum, which has a capacity for ten to twelve cars, has been completed and will open in the near future.

Along with the motel, restaurant, truck bay, retail store and pit stop, the Circle Bar Racing crew is headquartered. Mitchell recently changed from the low-slung Indy racers to stock cars and has recently purchased two Grand National Thunderbirds. At present the crew is busy renovating the cars, while Mitchell is busy building the trailer to transport them.

After several seasons with the "Indy" car racing, Mitchell, a dyed-in-the-wool Ford man, decided to go the stock car route. Engines for the racers had to come from abroad, and Tom decided he had rather "Buy American," so he went the Ford route and into Grand National Stock Car racing.

The crew will leave next week for Atlanta, Ga. where they plan to do some testing before racing in a Grand National race there Nov. 3. Chet Phillip will be behind the wheel again, with his brother, Corey Phillip, as crew chief. Other members of the racing crew are David Robinette and Bryan

Berry. About the only change in the Circle Bar Racing set-up is just the different kind of car.

Phillip's best average time has been 207 mph in one of the Lola cars which has been sold to make way for the Thunderbirds.

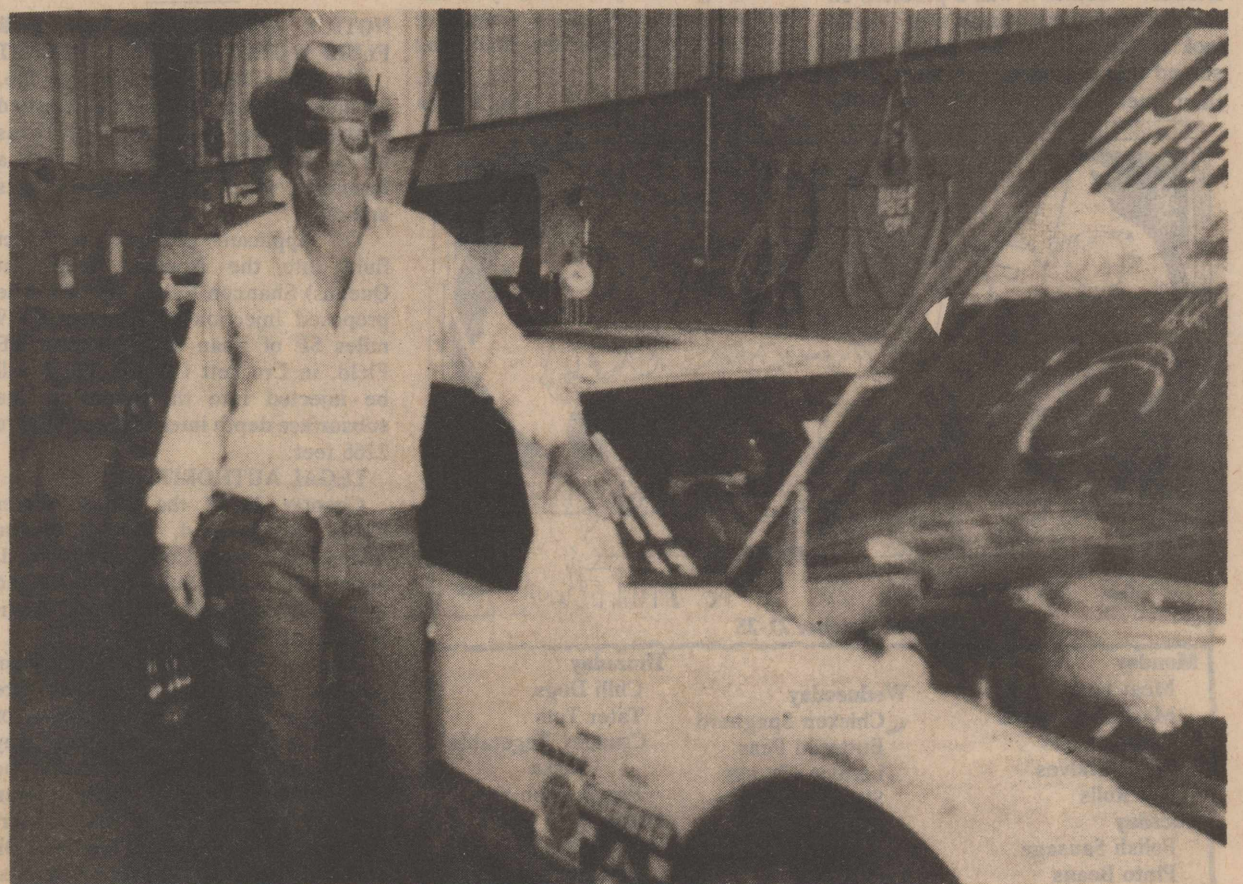
## School board holds brief meeting

The Ozona Board of Trustees completed agenda items in record time during their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, October 8.

After approving the minutes and the accounts payable, the members accepted insurance proposals from the Baggett Agency for school property and casualty insurance, automobile liability and physical damage insurance, and worker's compensation insurance.

Superintendent Garland Davis presented a proposed local school policy which allows school principals, subject to the approval of the superintendent and within State Board of Education guidelines, to shorten class periods for the purpose of conducting an abbreviated school day. The procedure would be used no more than six times per year and would allow principals more flexibility in planning staff development sessions, faculty meetings, and school activities. The policy was approved as presented.

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## Tom Loeffler Reports from Washington 'AUTOMATIC PILOT' WOULD ENSURE BALANCED BUDGET

Year after year, Congress begins the annual budget process with grandiose intentions of controlling spending and reducing our huge budget deficits. Year after year, Congress fails to realize this goal of fiscal responsibility, simply because the pressure to satisfy every special interest through the federal budget is too great.

In my opinion, the budget process of setting and meeting spending targets simply hasn't worked. Congress is making no progress toward the fiscal goal Americans have been pleading for — a balanced budget — and I believe that a new budget process, one with some teeth in it, is badly needed. If we are ever to reach a balanced budget, Congress needs some good, tough budget rules that can't be bent, broken or simply ignored, and I am supporting legislation in Congress which will do exactly that.

The balanced budget initiative I am working to enact sets out a six-year plan of gradual but firm annual deficit reductions leading to a balanced budget by the year 1991. It requires the President to submit, and the Congress to enact, spending bills which fall within the statutory limits outlined in the balanced budget initiative. If for some reason, the deficit targets are breached, automatic across-the-board spending reductions go into effect for virtually every spending program except Social Security.

These ironclad procedures will guarantee that deficit reductions of at least \$36 billion per year for six years actually occur, until the budget deficit reaches zero in 1991. The legislation in effect places Congress on automatic pilot toward a balanced budget, while leaving the decisions on specific spending cuts to Congress. If Congress fails to make the necessary spending cuts to meet the deficit target, the President must then eliminate the excess deficit by imposing additional spending cuts across-the-board. Either way, the deficit will be reduced.

The plan is so simple and makes so much sense that it has picked up some surprising supporters. Even big spending liberals like Ted Kennedy have endorsed the plan!

The liberal leadership of the House is still hanging back, weakly insisting that we need more time to assess "the impact" of this balanced budget plan. We already know its impact: it results in a balanced budget by 1991. It also deprives the liberal spenders in Congress of the opportunity to buy political support with taxpayer dollars while ignoring budget targets.

Some say the balanced budget initiative is too "radical" in scope, that it removes too much spending authority from Congress. Yes, this is a radical proposal, but many would argue that Congress should have had its credit cards taken away long ago.

In my opinion, radical surgery is our only chance to save the nation from devastating budget deficits. The current budget process is in a coma and fading fast. If we do not solve the deficit crisis — and solve it now — federal budget deficits will kill our economy and destroy our hopes for future economic growth and prosperity.

This vital legislation presents our best hope of putting the nation firmly on a path of responsible spending, and I am doing my utmost in Congress to make this plan — and the balanced budget it will bring — the law of the land.

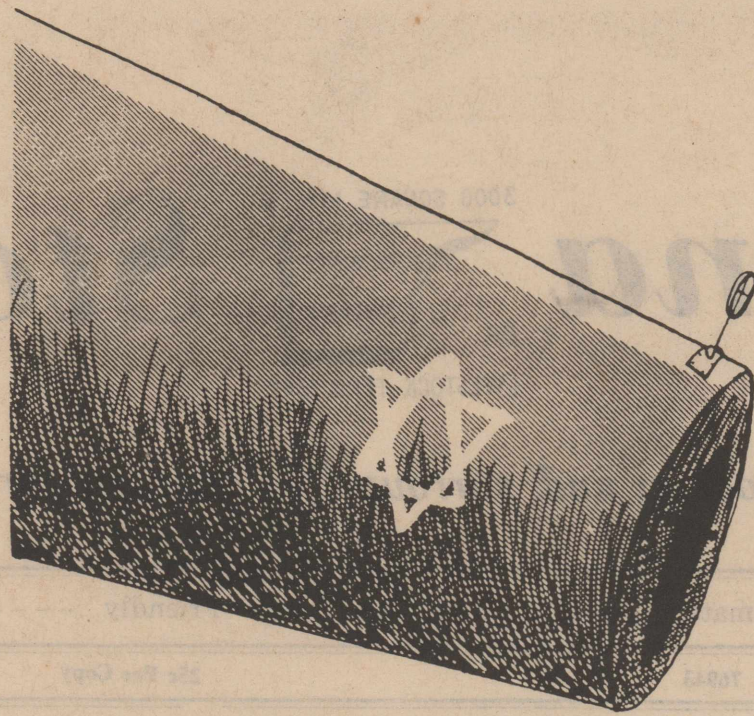
Dear Editor,

## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN**—Unlike any other primary election in Texas politics, the top of the Democratic slate is set and the hottest action will be in the Republican nominations.

With the February filing deadline for public office only a few short weeks away, gubernatorial hopefuls are gearing up for what promises to be one of the hardest-fought '86 campaigns in the nation.

Democratic Gov. Mark White last week returned empty-handed from Japan, to learn a third GOP candidate had thrown his hat in the ring against him, and all three were maintaining Republican harmony at his expense.

White had gone to Tokyo to talk Toyota Motor Co. officials into building their new 2,000-new jobs plant in Texas. While Toyota didn't commit, the U.S. ambassador told White he was the 44th governor to visit.

**Hance Announces**  
 On the day White left for Japan, former Congressman Kent Hance announced for White's job and launched a four-day campaign swing around the state. Hance blasted White on a number of points, but mainly for spending too much money.

Hance faulted White for not using his veto power to curb "unchecked" growth in state government.

When asked if his switch last year from Democrat to GOP hurt his chances, he noted that 500 Dallas County Republicans were on his steering committee and he had heavy endorsements in Houston and San Antonio.

**Junior-Sized LBJ**  
 With perhaps the hottest-ever Republican primary just ahead in May, many Republicans want to prevent the infighting from becoming bitter and fragmenting the party against White.

So, the three who want to take White's job, Hance, former Gov. Bill Clements, and Congressman Tom Loeffler, are leveling their big guns at him, not each other. Some observers are wondering how long it will last.

A few days ago, Clements told an audience that White saw himself as a "junior-sized LBJ" who is positioning himself for the VP slot with Ted Kennedy as president in 1988.

The liberal Massachusetts senator is often waved as a red flag to stir up Texas conservatives, but last week Kennedy visited Austin and Houston for fundraisers in his behalf.

**Hispanic Connection**  
 While the Democrats have racked up considerable votes in Hispanic precincts, the Republicans are attempting to break that hold by encouraging an Hispanic to run for attorney general.

The potential candidate is San Antonio state district judge Roy Barrera, Jr., son of the one-time Texas secretary of state. As he prepares for fundraisers across the state this month, he is being backed by no less than former Gov. John Connally, Eddie Chiles, Trammel Crow, Nelson Bunker Hunt, Sam Barshop and H. B. Zachary.

Barrera is ripping Democrats for playing on minority voters' without running a minority candidate for statewide office.

Democrats have been grooming San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros to run for just about whatever he would like to, but Cisneros has declined every time. Barrera will probably not get the barrio vote into the GOP primary, but if he survives as the nominee, his surname may attract Hispanics to cross party lines in that slot.

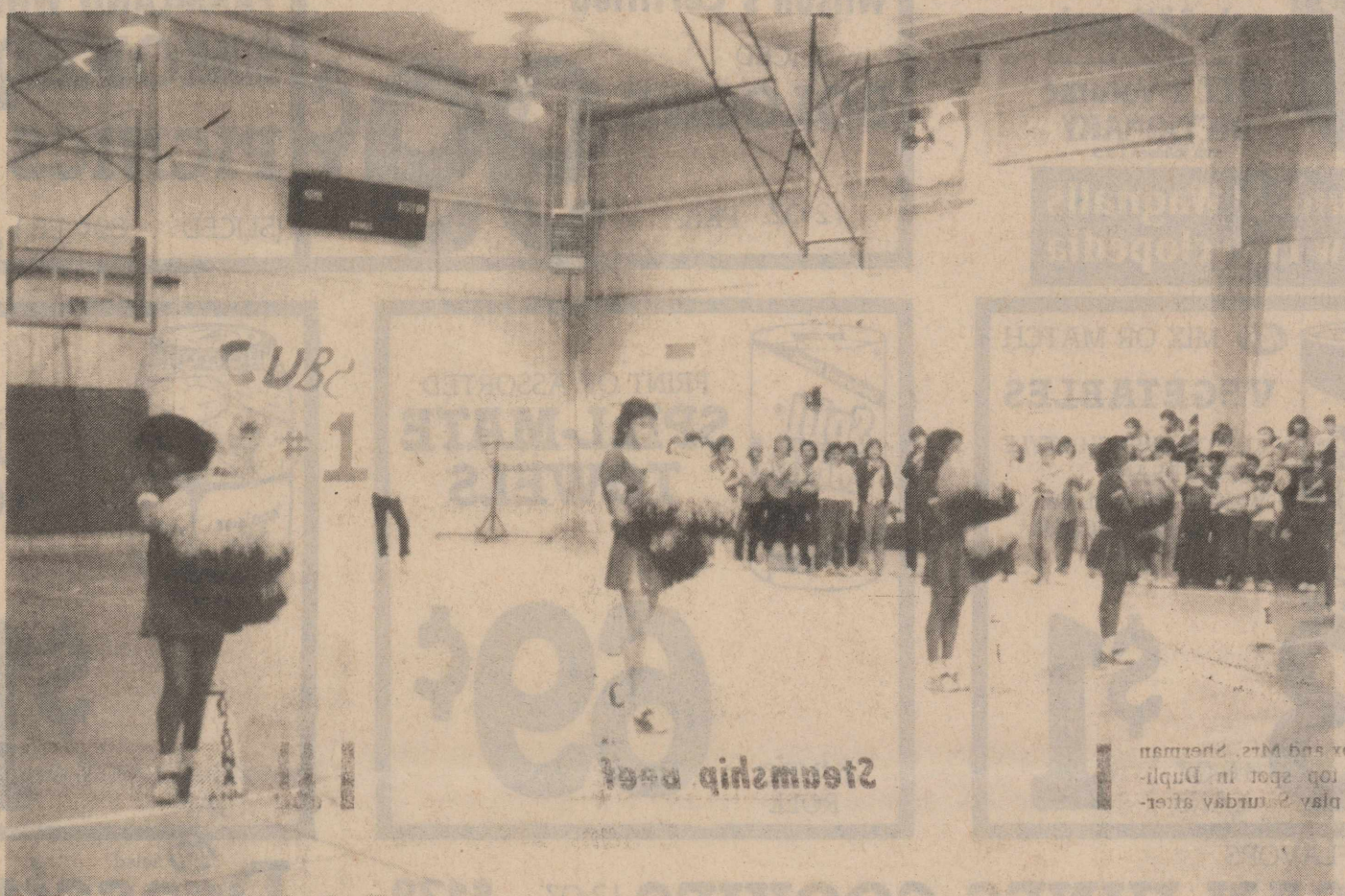

### Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Our locality is not the only area missing the usual fall color which should reach its peak of brilliance this and next month. Two factors are necessary for the production of red and fall colors—sunlight and cool nights. There must be warm, bright, sunny days during which time the leaves manufacture sugars. Such days must be followed by cool nights. We have been having the cool nights, but very few sunny days the past month. Perhaps this is the reason for so little color to this date.

Brightly colored foliage of our deciduous trees and shrubs interspersed with evergreen plants, presents an array of fall beauty. The blazing reds of native sumac, red maples and oaks are the first fall colors. Then come the bright yellows of the elms, red bud, persimmons, pecans, pomegranate, oaks, hackberry and Chinaberry.

Trees with a multitude of colors, from wine to red to yellow are the tallows, crepemyrtles, sugar maple and crabapple. Foliage of trees and shrubs growing in the shade usually do not show much red fall color. The best time to plant trees, shrubs and woody vines in the Southwest is

during the fall and early winter months. After deciduous plants become dormant and lose their leaves, they may be dug either bare-root or balled-and-burlapped. Deciduous or evergreen plants about 12 feet in height are seldom moved bare-root. It usually takes one season to overcome the shock of severe root damage after moving.

You can save geraniums from year to year by growing them in pots all summer and taking them to the attic in the fall just before frost. Leave them in the pots and stop watering them during the winter. In February, bring the plants downstairs or in hot house. Cut them off about an inch above the soil, pot them in fresh soil, and begin watering. By the time the weather is warm enough in spring, they have new foliage and are ready to bloom.

Some old roses that will grow on a faucet placed about 4 feet apart are The Fairy, a polyantha rose with abundant, small pink flowers. Buff Beauty, Harison's Yellow that blossoms in spring and early summer.

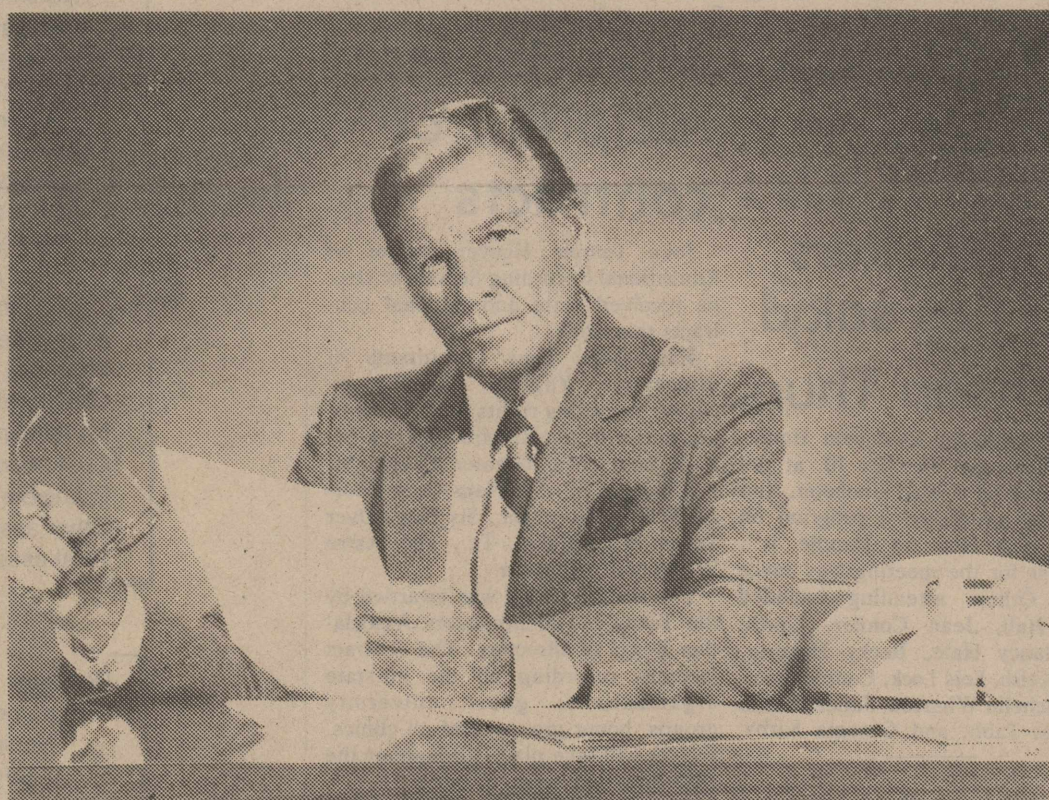

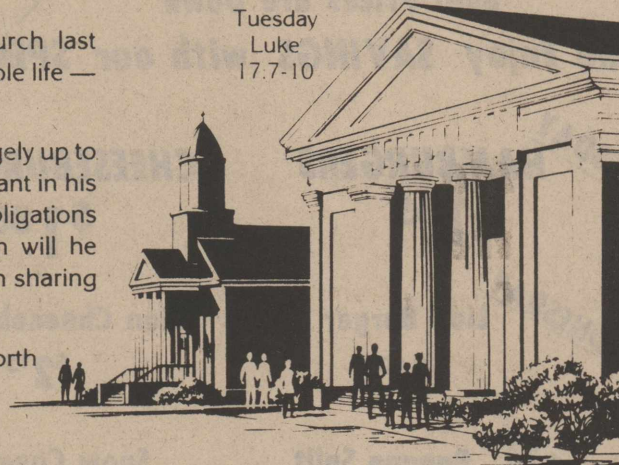

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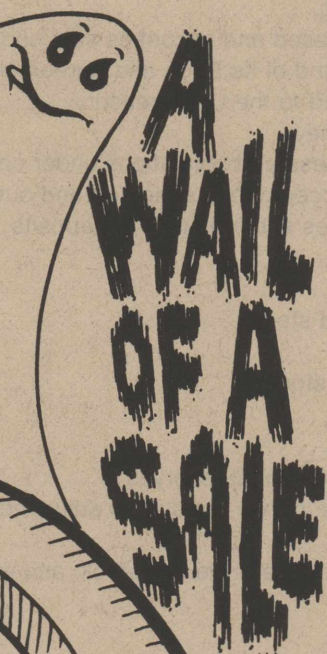

# Courses offered to ranchers

Crockett County farmers and ranchers interested in the use of microcomputers in farm and ranch management will want to take note of some upcoming short courses.

## Halley's Comet

Comets swing around the Earth in orbits that can stretch from years to eons. One of those heavenly objects is visiting the Earth, as it does every 76 years, this fall and spring. Start watching for Halley's Comet with a telescope or good binoculars in late October. This could be your only chance-unless you're lucky enough to be around in the year 2061!

Stargazers predict that Comet Halley will be dim and low in the sky. Because city lights make it impossible to see many stars, go to the country on a moonless night for best viewing.

Rice University and Burke Baker Planetarium in Houston are planning major comet excursions to the Southern Hemisphere in the spring; that's when the comet will appear the biggest and brightest. Both trips will be guided by experts in astronomy. If you can't get away, plan on seeing one of the special comet shows this fall at Burke Baker, the Science Place in Dallas, or Noble Planetarium in Fort Worth.

McDonald Observatory, near Fort

Davis, is the best place in the continental U.S. to see Halley's Comet. The folks there have free star parties each Tuesday and Friday at sundown. From November through January they'll add a Saturday party and begin concentrating on the comet. In March and April the parties start an hour before sunrise. A free brochure entitled "When the Comet Comes Back" can be had for the asking. A subscription to the monthly McDonald Observatory News is available for \$6.00 per year (McDonald Observatory, University of Texas, RLM 15.308 Austin, Tx. 78712).

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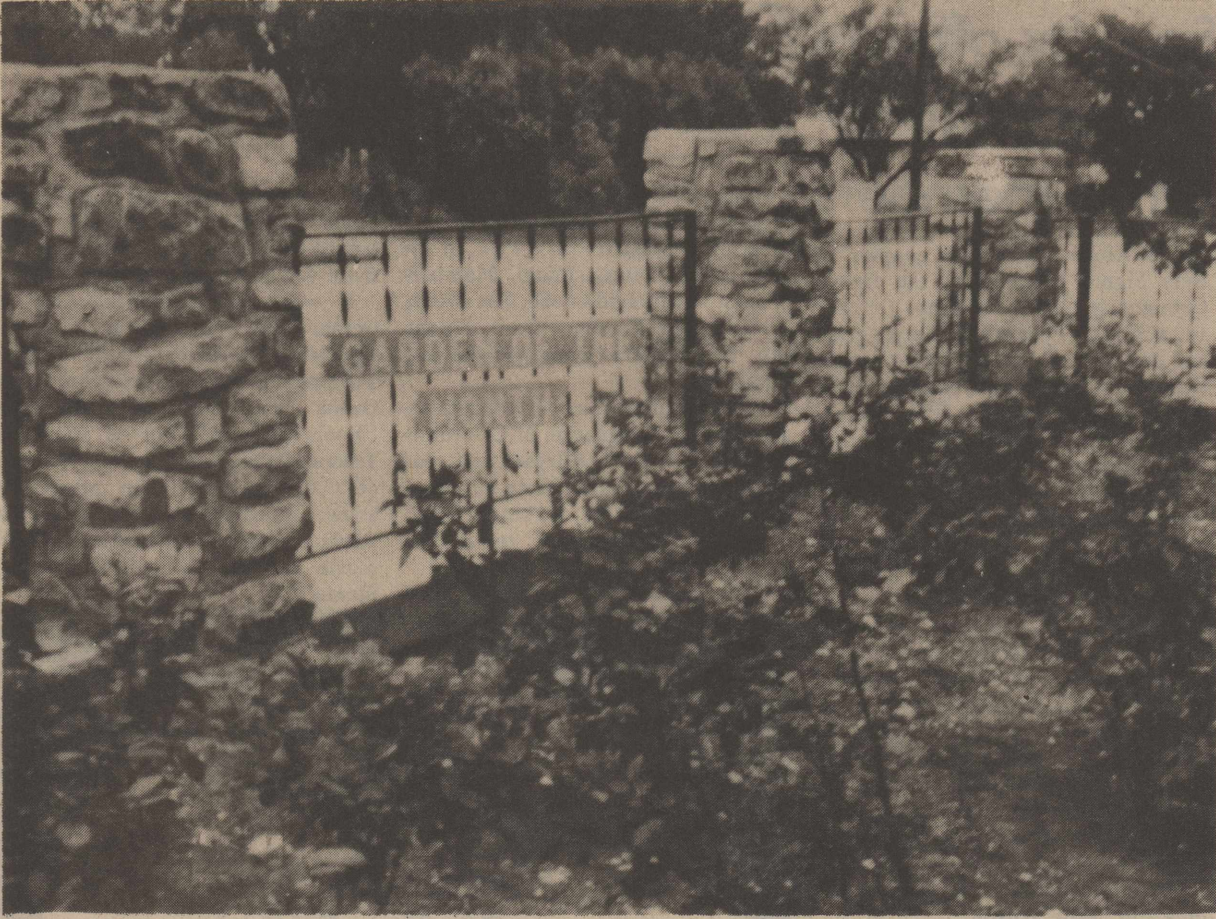

## Hospital board announces deposits and disbursements

Total cash deposits for the Crockett County Hospital was \$49,485.03 during September, according to a report made during the monthly meeting of the board of directors October 8. Disbursements were \$85,474.17. Total patient days were 47 with 7.83 percent occupancy.

It was also reported that Care Center deposits amounted to \$33,891.60 while disbursements were \$59,313.11.

Members of the board discussed collection of bills from private-pay patients at the Care Center and decided that the administrator would write a letter to an individual or the responsible party when a patient's account became 60 days delinquent, advising them that the bill needed to be brought current.

After 90 days the bill would be turned over to the county attorney to pursue collection of eviction. A letter will be mailed to all private-pay patients informing them of the new policy.

Dr. Barry L. Moak, Dr. R. W. Byrd, Dr. P. Knowles, and Dr. R. Peveto were granted temporary staff privileges during the meeting October 18. Don Hopkins, administrator of both facilities, informed the board that one of the physicians who was here temporarily would be completing his residency program in the late spring and had expressed an interest in setting up practice in Ozona. However, before he could do this, his government loan would have to be paid off, Hopkins added.

The group discussed the possibility of preparing meals for the Meals on Wheels program in the hospital kitchen and Lupe Galvan stated that she thought it could be done with the addition of one employee. ## EXTENSION OFFICE NEWS

By Rachel Hall

Crockett County has long been known as one of the major sheep producing counties. However, lamb in the local meat market has been limited. Many consumers feel confident in preparing poultry, pork, and beef, but feel somewhat limited in preparing lamb.

In order to prepare a variety of tasty lamb dishes, it is important to understand the many cuts of lamb and preparation methods. On Monday, October 21, at 7:00 p.m. at the Civic Center, there will be a lamb seminar concentrating on cutting, preparation, cooking, and serving of lamb. Anyone may attend this seminar. Orlando Vargas, Meat Manager at Thornton's Supermarket, and Charlie Frazier, Chef at the Inn of the West, will be presenting this seminar. Lamb cuts will be available at both Thornton's and T&T's meat markets for a limited time.

There are six basic methods of cooking lamb and two basic classifications of these methods. Dry heat methods of preparing lamb include: roasting, broiling, panbroiling and panfrying. As the name implies, the meat is cooked by dry heat, which means using open pans. Dry heat methods are best for tender cuts of lamb such as lion chops, steaks, leg or sirloin roasts.

Moist heat methods rely on moist heat to cook the meat. Moisture can result from sealing the pan with a lid or cooking the meat covered with a liquid. Less tender cuts of lamb such as shanks, breast, and neck slices are tenderized through moist heat methods. When cooking lamb, regardless of the method used remember that low heat produces the best results. Slow cooking is more uniform and keeps in juices.

### Cheese and Tomato Lamburgers

- 1 pound ground lamb
- 1/3 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup chopped onions
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon cold water
- 1 egg, beaten
- 4 slices tomato
- 4 slices process American cheese, cut diagonally in half
- 4 hamburger buns

Combine lamb, crumbs, onion, salt, pepper, water and egg; mix well. Divide lamb mixture into 4 parts. Shape into 4 patties about 4" in diameter. Heat small amount of oil in fry pan. Panfry patties, using moderate heat, about 4 minutes; turn and panfry about 3 minutes. Arrange tomato slices and two half slices of

cheese on each patty; cover and continue cooking until done. Serve on hamburger buns.

### SAVORY LAMB STEW

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 pounds cubed lamb shoulder
- 1 medium-sized onion, sliced
- 1/2 cup diced celery
- 1 small clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1 medium-sized green pepper, diced
- 2 cups stock or bouillon
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 1/2 to 3 cups diced potatoes
- 1 1/4 cups sliced carrots
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/2 cup water

Melt butter or margarine. Add lamb and cook over low heat, stirring occasionally until browned on all sides. Add onion, celery, garlic and green pepper; cook 5 minutes. Add stock or bouillon, salt and pepper. Cover and cook 15 minutes. Add potatoes and carrots and cook 45 minutes, or until vegetables are tender. Remove lamb and vegetables. Combine flour and water; blend. Add flour mixture to stock or bouillon mixture; blend. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Add vegetables and lamb.

### Clean out gutters now

Clogged gutters probably cause more damage to houses than any other single maintenance problem.

"When gutters are clogged, water can back up under the roofing," says Dr. Peggy Owens, a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

"Once the water gets inside the roof, it will be absorbed over time by the house material—the insulation, gypsum board and plaster," she explains. "All this moisture may create termite problems as well as walls that are rotted through."

Owens recommends checking the gutters two or three times a year, usually in the fall and again in the spring, to make sure they are free of branches, leaves or anything else that may block the flow of water.

## Lions fall to Ballinger in District 3-A season opener

The Ozona Lions will return home this Friday night as they continue their '85 district play. They will be hosting the Colorado City Wolves with starting time slated for 8:00. The Lions are coming off a district-opening loss at the hands of the Ballinger Bearcats who piled up 56 points while holding the Lions scoreless. The Lions will be looking for a win with hopes of evening up their district record at 1-1.

The Ozona Lions traveled to Ballinger last Friday night with intentions of pulling off one of the biggest upsets in Texas High School Football. Through 17:01 they appeared to be on their way as their defense held the Bearcats scoreless, but with 6:59 left in the first half Ballinger put its first of seven touchdowns on the scoreboard and the Lions fell behind. Stan Neff found paydirt first as he scooted in on a six yard run and teammate Brad Matschek added the PAT. Ozona then got the ball back and four downs later were forced to punt the ball away to the Bearcats. A bad snap to Harvey Fierro forced the Lions to try a pass play but an illegal man down field brought what would have been a first down back to the Lions thirty yard line. Just 54 seconds after their first score Terry Strambler ran twenty-five yards for another touchdown for Ballinger. The PAT was added by Cory Lee and the score was quickly 14-0. Ozona again gained control of the ball and two plays later threw an interception which set up another

scoring opportunity for the opponents. Ballinger answered for the third time in less than six minutes with yet another touchdown as quarterback Eric Lugo connected with Grant Teplcek for a nine yard toss to the endzone. Cory Lee again added the PAT and moved up the score to 21-0. Unfortunately the Bearcats were not through scoring in the half as Ozona turned the ball back over on downs. With just sixteen seconds remaining Timmy Kozelsky rushed twelve yards for the final touchdown of the half. A fake PAT was spoiled by the Lions and

the Lions trailed at half time 27-0. Ozona went in to the intermission stunned by an explosive scoring

outburst by Ballinger and came out with their backs to the wall. Ozona had taken the option to open the game and were forced to give Ballinger the ball to start the second half. Things continued to roll for the Bearcats as Terry Strambler took the kick and returned it for 60 yards for his second touchdown of the night. Only thirteen seconds had expired in the second half and Ballinger had struck for their thirty-third point. The PAT failed. Ozona was still unable to move the ball and after another turnover in the form of an interception another scoring drive was started. This time it was Stan Neff grabbing his second score of the night as he ran fifteen yards to the endzone. Cory Lee added the PAT and with 7:25 left in the third quarter Ballinger led 40-0. The Ozona offense was once again held to four downs and Ballinger once again took over. Ozona's defense then took hold and forced a field goal from thirty-one yards by Bobby Gomez which was good. Cory Lee added a thirty-three yarder with 10:34 left in the game to increase the lead to 46-0. With 6:24 left on the clock Timmy Kozelsky got his second touchdown of the night on a three yard burst and once again Cory Lee hit the PAT. The Bearcat's scoring ended with just under 2:40 left in the contest when Lee kicked a thirty-one yard field goal that cleared the uprights and the Ballinger scoring ended for the night with 56 points on the scoreboard.

As the score indicated things did not go well for the local team. Ballinger scored on every possession they had but five. They missed a field goal early in the game, punted twice and were picked off twice. Sam Hightower and Steve Sanchez each grabbed an interception for the Lions. Chuy Hernandez, Art Gonzales and Harvey Fierro all had good games defensively for Ozona.

Packages to the Military in Central and South America, Europe, Greenland and Iceland, must be mailed by Nov. 1, to ensure Christmas delivery. Nov. 4, is the deadline for military mail to Africa, as well as, international mail to Central and South


