Now we have two agencies of the government saying it's illegal to burn trash in the backyard but legal to burn the flag in the front.

According to the latest 5-4 ruling of the U.S. Supreme Court the desecration of Old Glory is "symbolic speech" and protected under the first amendment's freedom of speech.

Despite the fact that the federal government and every state except Alaska and Wyoming have laws against flag-burning, the justices threw out the conviction in Texas of Gregory "Joey" Johnson of New York City, who was sentenced to a year in jail and fined \$2,000 for burning the flag at a 1984 rally at the Republican National Convention in Dallas.

At that rally, protesters chanted: "America, the red, white and blue. We spit on you."

But the court ruled this week that Johnson's flag-burning was a form of expression protected by the Constitution's guarantee of freedom of speech.

The Environmental Protection Agency outlawed burning of trash in your backyard, garbage in a landfill, or B.S. in an oil field pit, but the burning of the flag is now protected under the First Amendment.

The U.S. government prints a lengthy official manual detailing how to treat the American flag. It gives specific instructions on how to show it, drape it, troop it, post it, fold it,

salute it, fly it, hold it, respect it, revere it, and how to come home dead beneath it.

The blue-bellies of General Sherman, the Rough Riders of Teddy Roosevelt, the members of the Lost Battalion of World War I, the tankers of General Patton, and the Green Berets of Vietnam, will be shocked to find that the flag under which they fought is now an item of "political expression".

Carried to a logical end,

every citizen who dislikes or disagrees with a decision of the Supreme Court can and should burn a few judicial robes on the steps of the building as an expression of political disgust. And in view of the latest ruling by that August body of liberals, the skies over Washington should be filled with the smoke from burning robes.

The American flag is more than a symbol. Indeed, one of the justices of the majority, Justice Blackmun, once wrote that, "The flag is a national property and the nation may regulate those who would make, imitate, sell, possess or use it."

Congress has the power to forbid the mutilation of the Lincoln Memorial, the Washington monument, or the defacing of the White House. The flag is itself a national monument, subject to similar protection.

Freedom of speech does not give a person the right to shout "Fire" in a crowded theater. Those who framed the First Amendment believed in freedom for all speech not injurious to the health of others or to the government.

To our way of thinking, there's a whale of a lot of difference between "speech" and "an act of expression".

If burning the American flag is an "expression" under freedom of speech, then logically, a screwball dissenter could be tarred, feathered, and rode out of town on a two-by-four as a means of political "expression".

We think it is ironic that Johnson, a member of the Revolutionary Communist Youth Brigade, turned to the very flag that he set afire with lighter fluid, for protection under the Constitution.

This nation, thanks to the rulings of a liberal majority on the Supreme Court and a Congress that acquiesces to the protests of the tiniest group of minorities, has largely ignored the wishes of the majority of American people.

Protecting the voice of dissent is important and American. But dissent should not include the desecration of our flag-it means too much!



### Postal employee indicted

Maryhelen G. Cantu, a clerk in the Ozona Post Office, was one of three Texas postal employees indicted by a federal grand jury.

The indictment alleges that Cantu "did intentionally convert to her own use" \$5,597 "which had come into her hands and under her control in the

execution of her employment". The indictment stated that the money was taken between Feb. 28 and April 27.

Also indicted by the Lubbock federal grand jury were Ernest Gonzales of 1105 E. 24 1/2 St. in San Angelo and Lavoy K. McNeill of Wingate.

Gonzales was indicted on a charge of willfully, knowingly and unlawfully detaining, destroying and delaying third class circulars May 3 and May 10.

Wingate was indicted on two counts of theft of mail by a postal employee. The indictments were filed in U. S. District Court in San Angelo.

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### Commissioners vote on few items during full agenda

Commissioners put in a full day, but voted on few items when they met Monday.

Court members did vote to approve the hospital board's hiring of Doris Hull as care center administrator. Mrs. Hull was interviewed and approved by the board during its July 6 meeting.

Mrs. Hull has previously worked in Ozona as an L. V. N., Bill Boswell told the court.

A registered nurse is needed for the care center to meet upcoming requirements for skilled nursing facilities, Boswell said. The center will be required to have an R.N. on duty eight hours per day, seven days a week in order to be permitted to care for patients released from hospitals who are not yet able to go home, he explained.

An engineer from West Texas Utilities has determined that the air conditioner in the hospital kitchen is adequate to meet temperature requirements. His recommendations for bringing the kitchen temperatures to acceptable levels include extending the vent hood and closing the laundry room vent when the facility is not in use.

Eddie Moore commented on the need to replace the International mowing tractor at the road department. Replacement consideration was tabled until the July 24 meeting.

The road superintendent also told commissioners he has located a used chip spreader for possible purchase. Moore and a member of the court will examine the machine and report back.

Pavement cutting permit fees and reimbursement for repairs were also discussed by the court and Moore. A \$25 permit fee was previously approved by the court.

Commissioner House suggested that Moore come up with repair cost estimates for several sizes of cuts to be considered at the next meeting.

The court voted to close approximately 12 miles of the north end of River Road at the request of eight landowners. The closure will begin at the south side of Hwy. 290 east of the Pecos River bridge south to the intersection of Deer Canyon and River Roads.

Notices must be posted for 20 days at the courthouse and in two places in the vicinity of the area to be closed before the measure takes effect.

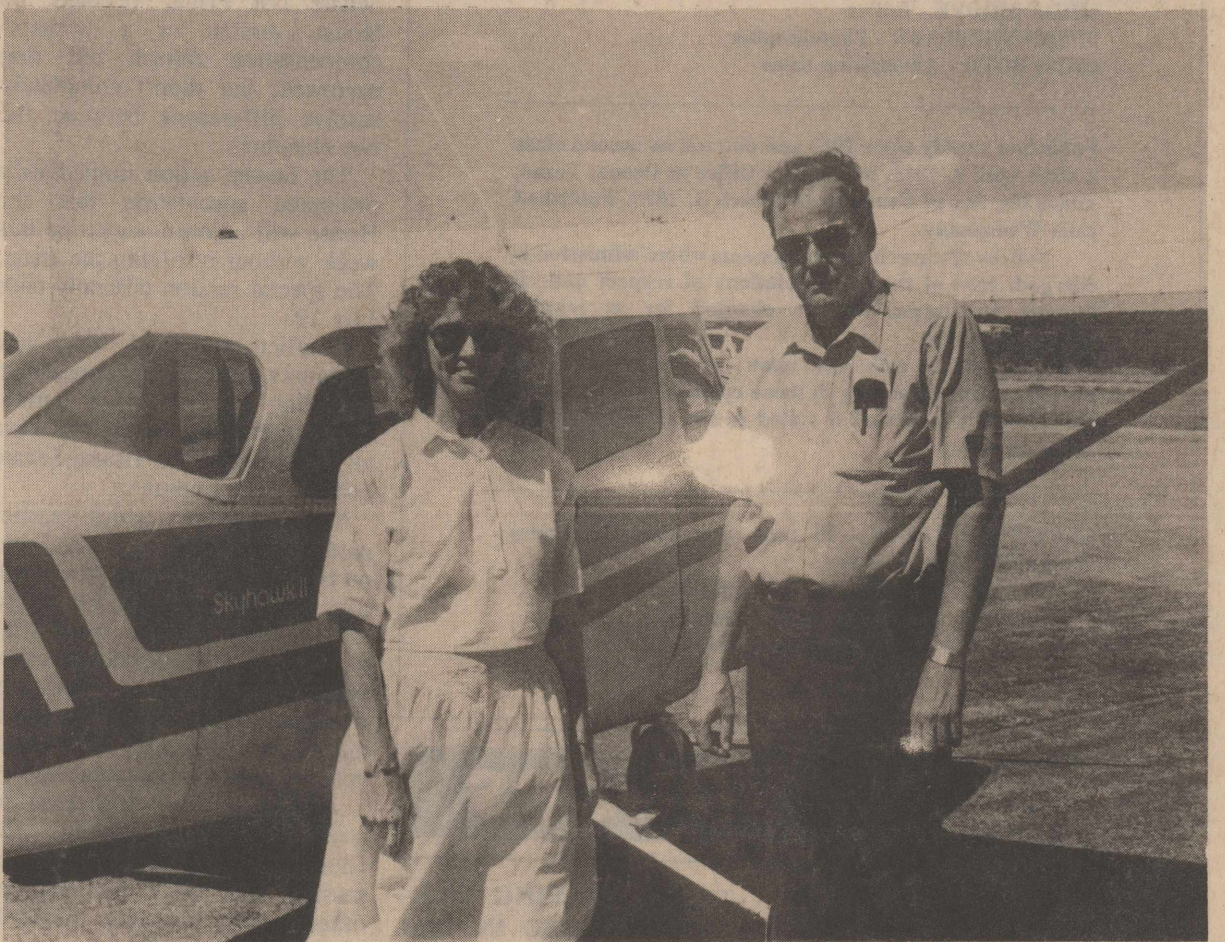
Judge Mayfield informed the court that Crockett County must adopt an ordinance requiring permits for septic systems. The ordinance is part of statewide requirements for planning, construction and operation of on-site sewage facilities. The legislation is effective Sept. 1, 1989.

Other legislation pertinent to the county includes a bill which would prevent the county from paying any person or business who owes back taxes or other debts to the county, Judge Mayfield said.

Jack Baggett, Bob Mims, Calvin Humphrey and Fred Jones have accepted appointment to a committee to review resumes of firms wishing to prepare applications for the airport master planning grant. One additional committee member will be chosen.

Reports were heard from: Janet Hill for Meals on Wheels, Sheriff Jim Wilson, Louise Ledoux, librarian; Garland Young, civic and youth center director; Constable Raymond Borrego and Sandy Stokes, county auditor.

Meals on Wheels delivered 412 lunches during June, Mrs. Hill said. Commodities were given to 92 families representing 218 people. Commodity distribution numbers are down because a number of people have moved, she explained.



Did you hear an airplane buzzin' around most of the day Monday? Sharman West had just completed thirty minutes of instruction time with her flight instructor Louis Traveland of Traveland Helicopter, LTD. of San Angelo.

Sharman is one of six local students, one of the largest groups gathered in several years, who have started flight school with Traveland here in Ozona.

Sheriff Wilson reported 38 persons placed in county jail, nine civil papers served and 251 calls received for assistance during the past month. Welfare funds received for the period were \$25 with \$45.79 disbursed.

The report of evaluation of Crockett County Public Library will be forthcoming soon according to Louise Ledoux, librarian. The collection was recently evaluated at no cost to the county by Lila Jeffers of the Big Country Library System. Mrs. Jeffers was impressed by the progress made at the library during its short time in the new building.

Approximately 164 youths attended the mid-summer dance at the youth center, Garland Young said.

During his report, Young requested that music for the all-night graduation party be included in the budget for the next fiscal year. New filing cabinets, tables, plastic pans and trays for the kitchen and a heavy duty food processor are also needed at the center.

Constable Raymond Borrego presented his semi-annual report to the court. During his six months in office, Borrego stated that he has served 13 citations, nine indictments, 12 arrest warrants, 14 delinquent tax suits and two temporary restraining orders. He has also acted as bailiff and assisted the sheriff's office with incoming calls and arrests in addition to arrests he has made.

Commissioners voted to appoint the following as election judges: Stella Valadez, Pct. 1; Donna Sanders, Pct. 2; Bobbie Fatout, Pct. 3; Concha Zapata, Pct. 4; and Perry Barton, Box 36.

Judge Mayfield reported on a letter from the judge of Walker County asking Crockett County to request that Hwy. 190 be included in the Texas Mobility Arterial System. According to the letter, the Texas Department of Transportation is considering including Hwy. 190 as a military route. No action was taken on the request.

Commissioners discussed complaints regarding the condition of the alley between Terrace Drive and Plum Streets off Beall Street.

Personnel problems, salary increases for two parttime secretaries and a request from District Attorney J. W. Johnson that he and his secretary be added to the county health insurance plan were discussed in executive session.

Commissioners voted to have parks superintendent Onecimo Ortiz write by certified mail to personnel requesting them to respond within 10 days regarding their intentions of employment.

Salaries of parttime secretaries to Judge Kathryn Mayfield and County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos were increased to \$650 per month effective

July 1. A dissenting vote was cast by Commissioner Janet Hill. Voting for the increase were Sostenes DeHoyos, Chuy Castro and Jim House.

The matter of insurance for Johnson will be on the agenda at the July 24 meeting of the court.

Whitney Vannoy, daughter of Gary and Nancy Vannoy, placed first and received a blue ribbon in the Intermediate Buying Evening Wear division. Just to keep it all in the family, JoLynn Vannoy carried off second place and a blue ribbon in the Junior Buying Non-tailored Daywear category.

Another second place and blue ribbon went to Robin Myers, daughter of Burl and Diane Myers, in the Senior Daytime Tailored Construction division.

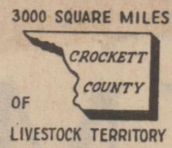

## HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—On a voice vote, the Senate last Friday rejected the House version of a workers' compensation reform bill that narrowed, but didn't completely resolve differences between the two chambers.

The Senate action immediately prompted speculation that the House will adjourn sometime this week without resolving the issue. The special session officially ends July 19.

Conflicts on the bill, which now contains a major House concession providing jury trials in certain kinds of disputed cases, will have to be resolved by a House-Senate conference committee.

The measure, which earlier passed the House by voice votes on both the second and third readings, would have raised maximum weekly benefits from \$238 to \$416, provide discounts on insurance premiums to companies with good safety records, and keep the system voluntary. The Senate voted to make coverage mandatory.

As the workers' compensation struggle continues, Gov. Bill Clements predicted another special session this year focusing on other topics, probably including abortion restrictions.

#### '90 Election Electrified

Like a lightning bolt from the blue, the Supreme Court's decision allowing states to draw their own abortion laws has electrified the 1990 election as few Texans could predict.

The Texas Legislature in the early '70s, after a long, divisive



floor fight, adopted a rather liberal set of abortion laws. The memories of that battle over the volatile issue, which subsequently destroyed several political careers, still linger in the Capitol halls.

Since then, the Legislature has, for the most part, ignored the issue, except for a few bills to narrow the scope, hoping it would go away.

Last week, in the space of two days, the issue rose to life like a cadaver sitting up in the morgue and today it promises to affect statehouse elections from top to bottom.

#### Women's Vote Pivotal

With pro-choice leaders warning of a return of the days of back alley abortions and pro-lifers calling abortion nothing less than murder, fears and emotions are running high among the focal interest groups.

After the High Court convenes next fall, it may make a subsequent decision which will defuse the issue for state legislatures.

But, if it doesn't, count on the women's vote to be pivotal in 1990, and the groups shouldn't presume victory one way or the other.

#### Ann Richards to Gain?

One candidate who stands to gain, at least in the Democratic primary, is Ann Richards, who is running for governor.

She is already considered the great feminist hope in Texas to beat the good-'ol' boy system.

Now she stands to enlarge that base with those who fear that abortions will be made illegal under any other governor.

Her core campaign organization for many years has drawn from Austin feminist professionals; her core supporters statewide are professional women.

Although she hasn't released her campaign platform yet, it's hard to imagine Ann Richards campaigning to make abortions illegal.

As governor, she could veto any anti-abortion measure short of a proposed constitutional amendment. In short, there would be no narrower scope, unless she allowed it.

Such leverage could boost her in the general election, or work against her, depending upon popular opinion, whatever it is.

#### Pollsters At Work

You can bet the political pollsters have been at work all week, trying to take the pulse of the Texas voter, and the results should be released shortly.

If '90 elections here follow the national trend, Democrats will generally take pro-choice stands, and Republicans will be pro-life.

Exceptions are expected in both parties, and no one will know until they reveal their positions on the campaign trail.

### Exchange student finds Ozona enjoyable

Life in a distant, unknown land can be a scary, disheartening time, but George Billis of Campinas, Brazil seems to be enjoying his time in Ozona, U.S.A.

"It is very different," the 16-year old said of his first visit to the States. "Ozona is a very clean town and there are no poor people."

Of course, comparatively speaking, Ozona has a few less people than the one million+ of Campinas, but George has already experienced the complexity of the U.S.' own "big cities."

He flew from Campinas to Rio de Janeiro, then to Miami without a hitch; however, upon arriving at the Dallas-Ft. Worth airport, George became scrambled between planes, but he responded coolly.

"That's a big airport, but I went to the information desk for help."

George's ability to speak English proved a plus in that situation. In fact, positive attributes spurred his taking English courses outside of regular school work.

"In Brazil, knowing English can help you get jobs at some of the factories," he noted. More so, George looks ahead to the day when he serves his residency at a U.S. hospital while following in the footsteps of his father, Dr. Athanase Billis.

First, though, George has two years of secondary education to finish. In Brazil the first stage encompasses eight years, fairly complementary to our first through eighth grades. The second stage takes three years to complete. Following completion of the second stage, George plans to pursue university education en route to becoming a doctor.

### Crockett County census taking under way

Sheriff Jim Wilson has been notified that the 1990 census has started in the area. Most of the work involving census enumerators will occur from January through August 1990, with the heaviest activities in April and May of 1990.

Citizens are urged to verify that anyone calling on them is in fact a census taker. Each worker will wear a red, white and blue identification card. The card carries the title "U.S. CENSUS ENUMERATOR", the name of

the census taker and the date the credential expires on the front. The employee's signature appears on the back.

This badge will be worn by all census enumerators while working as census takers.

Under Federal law, Title 13, United States Code, information collected by the Census Bureau can be used only for statistical purposes. No information that could reveal the identity of a person can be released. All Census

Bureau employees, including temporary workers, pledge that they will not disclose any information about individuals that has been gathered by the Census Bureau.

### Sheep reproductive symposium set for July 20-21

A reproductive symposium entitled "Improving Lamb Crop Raised" will be held here July 20-21 in connection with the Annual Meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association (TS&GRA).

Kerrville's Inn of the Hills will be the site for the symposium.

Dr. Maurice Shelton, San Angelo based Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researcher and a program coordinator, said the program content is similar to a National Symposium scheduled July 10-11 in Fort Collins, Colorado.

"Though the national meeting is similar, the Kerrville program is tailored more specifically to conditions of Texas and the Southwest," Shelton said.

He added that proceedings of the national symposium will be provided to those registering for the Texas program.

"Low lamb crops is one of the problems plaguing the sheep industry of the Southwest," Shelton said. "We expect that information presented in this program will help to partially alleviate this problem."

The first day's afternoon session will be in the Inn of the Hills Medallion Room from 3-5 p.m. The initial speakers and their topics include Shelton's entitled Significance and Approaches to Improving Lamb Crops; C.V. Hulet, U.S.D.A., Las Cruces, New Mexico, speaking on Environmental and Management Factors Affecting Reproductive Effi-

ciency; a panel on Reducing Lamb Mortality featuring Dr. George Ahlswede, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, San Angelo; Dr. Percy Turner D.V.M., Water Valley and Tim Willingham, TAES, San Angelo.

The evening's activities will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Youth Exhibition Center following a barbecue at 5:30 p.m. The night's first demonstration will be Breeding Soundness and Fertility Examination of Rams with Hulet and Dr. Charles Livingston, TAES researcher at San Angelo. Then Artificial Insemination will be discussed by Willingham, Jack Ruttle of New Mexico State University and Mike Jernigan of Iran.

The evening's final discussion, Pregnancy Diagnosis and Multiple Birth Determinations, is by University of Wyoming's Bob Stobart and Elmer Herndon, DVM, Uvalde.

The final day will open in the Medallion Room with Shelton and Turner delivering Genetic Improvement and the Use of Prolific Breeds. Then Dr. Hudson Glimp, U.S.D.A., Dubois, ID will discuss Accelerated Lambing followed by an open discussion and conference summary.

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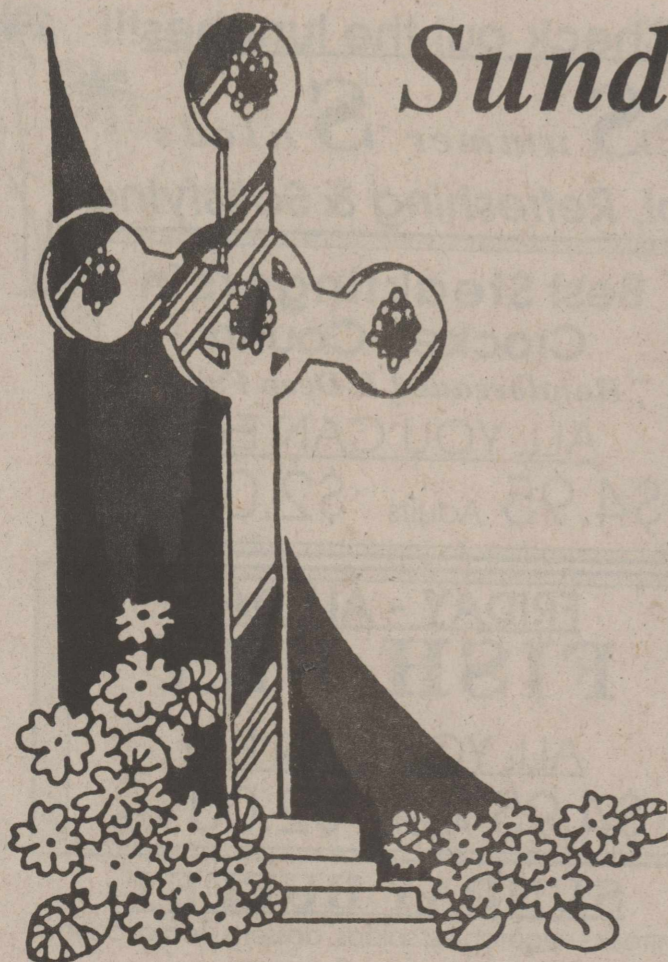

He has known baseball personalities Paul (Daffy) Dean and former New York Giant player Marty Kupich who was a member of the Fargo-Moorhead Twins with Stuart.

After moving to Ozona and becoming involved with baseball, Stuart influenced the life of many a Crockett County boy.

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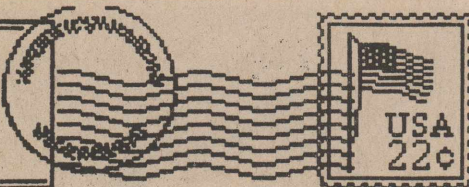

Dr. Red Duke is familiar to many television viewers as the easy-going spokesman on the tri-weekly Texas Health Reports. What most television watchers don't know about Duke would fill a book.

The colorful physician, a native of Ennis who grew up in Hillsboro, helped build the UT Houston medical school, worked in New York and Afghanistan, founded Hermann Hospital's LifeFlight helicopter ambulance service and helped care for Gov. John Connally after the Kennedy assassination. He earned a divinity degree before going into medicine.

Care Center board selects administrator

Mrs. Doris Hull of Sonora has been hired to fill the position of administrator at Crockett County Care Center. Her employment will begin July 17, according to Bill Boswell, hospital administrator.

She was interviewed by the board at its July 6 meeting and accepted subject to approval of commissioners' court. The court approved her employment Monday.

Hospital board members received an update on the recent overhaul of ambulance 332 and received literature on new ambulances at its last meeting.

While prices of new ambulances vary with the type and equipment included, cost estimates range between \$52,000 and \$55,000. The board voted to include the price of a new ambulance in the 1990 budget.

Board members tabled a decision to purchase a FAX machine until information could be obtained on cost of transmitting documents. Also tabled were the purchase of wheelchairs for the care center and over-the-bed tables for the hospital. More information about price and availability will be obtained.

An investigation of the heat problem in the hospital kitchen revealed that the vent hood needs to be enlarged to cover the deep fryer, and a small fan should be installed to assist in removal of heat and smoke. West Texas Utilities engineers determined that the existing cooling equipment is of correct size and functioning properly. Board members voted to modify the range hood.

Director of Nurses Peggy McWilliams reported that her registered nurse situation is getting deperate. The board was reminded that the care center will be required to employ an R.N. director of nurses and an R.N. working days on the weekend beginning January 1, 1990.

During June there were a total of 41 inpatient stays with 838 recorded for 1989 to date.

The ambulance runs for June totaled 13 with 100 recorded during the first six months of the year.

Expenses for both the hospital and care center are below budget at this time according to Sandy Stokes, County Auditor.

Angora field day and sale set

The Annual Angora Goat Field Day and Performance Test Billy Sale is set for July 27 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Sonora.

The day's activities start with an informal inspection of the animals beginning on arrival until 11:30 a.m. A barbecue lunch will be catered by the Edwards County 4-H Club following the inspection period.

Dr. Maurice Shelton, San Angelo based Experiment Station Researcher and a coordinator for the test, said about 250 animals will be completing the performance test.

"Many observers believe this to be the best collection of animals we have ever tested," said Shelton. "It is very likely that the best Angora male in the world is in this test group, but the challenge is to determine which one he is. In fact, there is likely not a single best animal, but rather a male whose potential may be influenced by the producer conditions and his long-term goals."

Shelton added that the day's for-

mal program prior to the sale should be of interest to goat producers. ## Summertime--the right time to prevent food poisoning

Summer is here, and Americans are practicing the rituals of the season: softball, swimming, sunbathing, and, most of all, ignoring the clock.

Unfortunately, bacteria that cause foodborne illness don't take a summer vacation. And time is just what these bacteria need to multiply — along with the right temperature, a source of nourishment, and other amenities.

So, as you pack up the coolers and grills to head for picnics and barbecue, remember to watch the clock to keep summer eating safe.

**Time: Too Much Or Too Little Spells Trouble** — When it comes to food handling mistakes that cause illness, failure to cook or reheat foods long enough is an all-time great.

**Protein rich raw foods** such as meat, poultry, eggs, and seafood can provide bacteria with the nourishment they need to proliferate. If these raw foods are not cooked long enough at the proper temperature, bacteria can survive. A study of foodborne illness outbreaks involving meat and poultry over a ten year period found that inadequate cooking or reheating was a factor in about half of the cases.

**Refrigerate Properly** — After cooking, perishable foods should be cooled rapidly and evenly. USDA home economists advise consumers to refrigerate foods containing meat and poultry within two hours after cooking. If you're grilling outside and "room temperature" is 90 degrees F, it's wise to refrigerate foods even sooner to avoid giving bacteria too much time to reproduce.

**Deep containers** holding large portions don't allow even cooling of the food inside. Divide larger portions into shallow, covered containers to promote fast cooling. Shallow containers will probably fit the cooler better, too.

**Cooling errors**, such as leaving cooked foods at room temperature too long, contributed to about 50% of the food illness outbreaks covered in the study.

**Take Time For Thorough Grilling** — Grilling is a popular way to cook food in warm weather, but use a meat thermometer to check that large cuts have been cooked for the right amount of time. The internal temperature of roast beef or pork should be at least 160 degrees F for medium, which is adequate to destroy either salmonella bacteria or the trichina parasite. Most people prefer roast chicken or turkey that is cooked to 180 or 185 degrees F.

**Avoid Interrupted Cooking** — Many people like to partially cook ribs or other foods inside, then finish them on the grill. However partial cooking is safe only if food is moved immediately from the oven or microwave to the hot grill, with no time on the counter or in the refrigerator.

**Use Care When Preparing Ahead of Time** — Cooking foods ahead of time can be convenient if you're planning to serve large numbers of people. However, preparing foods in advance can also compound undercooking, cooling, sanitation, or other food handling mistakes you might have made. In the study of food illness outbreaks, preparing foods a day or more ahead was a factor in almost one

third of the cases.

**Watch The Clock** — The bacteria that cause most foodborne illness are common in our environment — on raw meat and poultry, in water, soil, and the human nose, to name just a few places. When these bacteria are allowed enough time to reproduce in food, some of the people who eat that food may become ill. Children, the elderly, AIDS, and cancer patients are most at risk of serious health problems from foodborne illness.

**Ironically**, bacterial foodborne illness is the easiest type to prevent: Watch the clock! Take the time to practice food safety to prevent foodborne illnesses.
