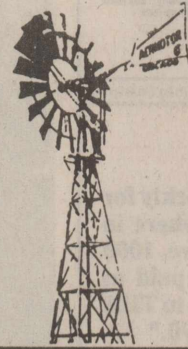
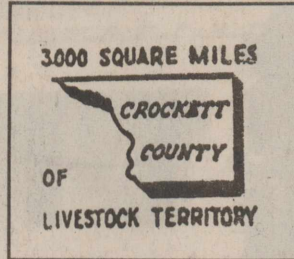

Ozona National Buys Bonds

Commissioners on Monday approved the sale of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$910,000 to Ozona National Bank. These bonds will finance a new county annex building, a library addition, provide funds for a Senior Citizens' building and renovation to the existing courthouse. The court also approved the contract for the 1995 Community Development Program Colonias project which will use \$490,000 in grant money for water pipes and sewer lines. In addition, a contract was executed with the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for the 1994 Texas Community Development Program. The community will receive \$199,999 to be used for elevated water storage and new pump station and removal of the old pump station.

Commissioners voted, after lengthy discussion, that there would be no county work on private property. Later in the meeting, this vote was rescinded. The subject arose in connection with an agenda item regarding exchanging road work on private property for caliche and water.

A problem with contractors placing building debris in the street to be hauled by the county resulted in a vote to charge for this service. Judge Jeffrey Sutton, Commissioners Freddie Nicks and Fred Deaton voted for charging. Commissioners Frank Tambunga and Rudy Martinez voted against. Warning letters will be sent.

Commissioners approved providing a part-time secretary for the

Tobar. The young women were escorted by David Browne, Lance Jamerson, and Adam Carroll.

During last week's homecoming activities, OHS students and faculty had fun with daily "dress-up" and spirit contests. Winner of Monday's Disco Fever Day was Roberta Ortiz. Tuesday was Opposite Day, with Chuck Preddy getting the nod for best-dressed. Winner of Wednesday's Sleepy Day was Dusty Stewart. Thursday was Foreign Culture Day with a teacher winning, as Kim Miller took the prize. On Friday's Spirit Day, two people were chosen—Julie Perez and Megan Tambunga. Lion quarterback David Browne dressed up every day

during the week's contest.

Friday, however, it was time to get down to the business of football. Lions' Head Coach Walter Hargrove said, "We're still getting better in areas than we have been. We're getting to our responsibilities, and there is not as much hesitation as to reacting where we are supposed to be—offensively and defensively."

The Lions received the opening kickoff and returned it to their own 26-yard line, then Casey Upham picked up 13 yards on a pass from quarterback Pete Castaneda. On the third play, however, a Castaneda pass

Expanded Local Calling Passes

Ozona Chamber of Commerce has received a memorandum from the

Public Utility Commission of Texas stating the vote taken to provide local calling to several surrounding communities has passed by more than 70%.

If you have a "392" number, beginning in mid-January you will be able to call San Angelo, Sonora, El-

dorado, Mertzon and Barnhart without paying a long distance charge. A flat rate of \$3.50 per phone line (number) will be charged to homes, and a \$7.00 charge per business phone

Hospital Warms Up

Electrical work leading to the installation of heating/cooling window units in hospital rooms began last week. A cold spell in September left hospital patients and office workers as well as care center residents in old hospital rooms shivering when the temperatures dropped into the 40s.

The existing boiler can no longer be used to heat the building. To remedy the problem, 25 window units, three through-wall units and a 7.5 ton unit will be installed.

Texas Heat and Air Conditioning of San Angelo was selected for the mechanical portion and Robinson Electric for electrical work.

Five applicants are being sent by the hospital to certified nurses' aide classes in San Angelo. The hospital is paying cost of the classes, \$270 per person, with the stipulation that those attending sign a contract to work for one-year or be responsible for reim-

bursement to the facility for the cost of the course.

Bids were received from four companies for a new hematology machine for the hospital lab. Board members voted to purchase the InfoLab 1-1800 machine which has a purchase price of \$25,000. The board plans to sell the old machine.

Dr. Marcus Sims has agreed to be medical director for the care center, EMS, hospital and future home health service. His compensation will be county health care benefits for himself and his family.

At their Oct. 5 meeting, the board voted to increase the salaries of the clinic's receptionist/assistant and the environmental and maintenance supervisor retroactive to Oct. 1.

The board also voted to seek an audit of existing long distance services and get at least three bids in order to make an informed decision regarding rates.

Villarreal And Sanchez Take First

Lions And Ladies Win First In Ozona Meet

Winning races is becoming a habit at OHS for the cross country teams. Both the Lady Lions and Lions Cross Country Teams won the 5th Annual Ozona Cross Country Meet held this past Saturday at the Ozona Baseball Complex.

The Lady Lions won first place with a total of 24 points. The Lions won their division with 20 points.

"I think the girls ran real well. We didn't have as many teams as we would have liked, but we still ran well. The boys had a good outing. The boys' had a little longer course (than the girls) and one of the toughest they'll run all year," said cross country coach Pete Maldonado.

There were five teams competing in the girls' division with 44 runners. Placing second in the girls division with 61 points was Iraan followed by 3 Irion County 71; 4 Comstock 87; and 5 Reagan County with 110 points.

Placing first in the girls' division was Lori Sanchez with a time of 12 minutes, 41.95 seconds. Other Ozona team members following closely were: 2 Terren Marshall 12:59.83; 4 Gina Castro 13:18.13; 6 Amy Laughlin 13:22.26; 21 Maria Trujillo 14:30.95; and 33 Felicia Ramirez 15:31.09.

"Every one of the girls got a personal record (best). That's what you like to see in cross country," said Maldonado.

The Ladies run one mile, and courses vary with Ozona's course being hilly. Coach Maldonado said, "This course here is a tougher terrain, but it may be shorter than the required two miles. This type of course—they will see in a month at Lubbock for regional."

In the boys' division, Ozona took first place with 20 points scored. Second place winner was San Angelo Central JV with 35 points. Iraan placed third and Reagan County

placed fourth, but neither team actually finished as only four of the five team members completed the race.

A total of 32 runners competed in the boy's division with Charles Villarreal placing first with a time of 18:06.63. Other Ozona athletes' placings and times were: 5 Johnny Porras 19:14.69; 6 George Hernandez 19:16.26; 9 Blas Villa 19:30.87; 15 Will Roane 19:59.50; 25 John Baker 22:02.10; 26 David Martinez 22:11.67; and 31 Alez Castaneda 24:16.40.

In the junior high girls' division, Reagan County "A" won the event with 34 points. They were followed by 2 Iraan "A" with 59; 3 Garden City 76; 4 Reagan County "B" 90; 5 Iraan "B" 99; and 6 Irion County 113 points.

There were 39 girls running in the junior high division. It was won by Kelli Goble from Comstock with a time of 13:04.93. She was followed by: 2 Suzanne Schneider, Iraan A,

13:58.48; 3 Lindsay Loftin, Reagan Co. A, 14:11.71; 4 Julie Smart, Iraan A, 14:23.90; and 5 M'Lynn Neihues, Garden City, 14:28.62.

Only three teams competed in the junior high boys division with 31 total runners. Ozona had four runners—lacking one to have a team. Winning first place with 24 points was Comstock. Placing second was Reagan Co. "1" 31 points and third was Reagan Co. "2" with 72 points.

Winning first place was Ruben Martinez from Comstock with a time of 11:08.14 minutes. Ozona's runners placings and times were: 3 Matt Castaneda 11:41.42; 6 I.J. Villarreal 11:49.50; 13 David Vanderburg 13:38.98; and 30 Roman Castaneda 17:51.56 minutes.

Coach Maldonado would like to thank the booster club and all the people for showing up. "That's one of the largest crowds to support our cross country teams," he said.

The high school and junior high cross country teams will compete in Water Valley on Saturday, Oct. 14. The district meet will be held in Iraan on Saturday, Oct. 21.

Parker pled guilty and also waived his right to appeal and delayed sentencing.

Judge Jones found him guilty and assessed punishment as confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for life.

Parker was represented by attorney Tom Davidson of San Angelo.

Department of Public Safety. A budget line item change will be made at the next meeting to provide for this. Also approved was the payment for an historical marker to be placed at the Parker Ranch.

A vote was taken approving installation of a computer in the library through Concho Valley Council of Governments as part of the Dislocated Worker Program. The system, which is installed and maintained at no charge to the county, will have a computer system with information about different services available to county citizens, a fax/copy machine and a TV/VCR set.

The court also approved use of certificate of obligation money for two computers and a dot matrix printer for the library. This equipment will be available for use by the public.

Jessie Zuniga was appointed by the court as a new member to the library board.

Hospital/care center administrator Virginia Box told the court that a

new ambulance is on order. The board selected a Taylor ambulance, the same brand as the newest one the ambulance service has.

She also reported that work is underway installing air conditioning and heating units in hospital rooms. Bidding requirements on this purchase were waived under Local Govern-

ment Code 262.024 (2) which allows such action "due to the necessity to preserve or protect the public health or safety of the residents of the county."

Reports were also heard from Janet McDaniel for Helping Hands, Garland Young for the civic and youth center, Eddie Moore for the road parks department and John Stokes, auditor.

"Refuse To Be A Victim" Makes Women Safer

Experts say the first step in ensuring personal safety is to make the decision to "refuse to be a victim". Monday evening, Oct. 9, 75 women in Ozona made that decision by attending the "Refuse to be a Victim" seminar at the civic center.

Alice Tripp, an Austin resident, taught the seminar, which was developed by the Women of the National Rifle Association. She emphasized using common sense, thinking and planning skills, and ingenuity to outwit criminal predators.

Tripp related human criminals to animal predators. "They don't stalk the big bull in the herd," she noted, "rather, they look for the young, the weak, the sick, or simply the dumbest, most unaware animals to prey upon."

During the seminar, Tripp discussed important safety tips for home security, such as various types of locks, lighting, alarms and dogs. She noted that dogs don't have to be trained attack dogs - just sensitive to strangers

and willing to bark and raise an alarm. Tripp also noted that the best protection devices are no good if not used, and that most of us fail to think about what makes a home inviting to criminals - open garage doors or windows, poor exterior lighting, open drapes and blinds and lots of un-thorny shrubbery. With a few simple changes, Tripp suggested most homes would be more "intruder-proof".

Tripp also discussed automobile security, emphasizing the need to lock

one's vehicle every time you enter or leave the auto. "It only takes a second to be distracted and for someone to enter your car," she noted. The speaker also discussed the importance of keeping car keys accessible and separate from house keys and other keys.

She made several suggestions for those who walk and jog, and for those who travel to the city, mostly focusing on awareness of the surroundings and the people who are nearby. She also talked about different types of personal protection devices such as Mace, pepper sprays, key chains and stun guns, and noted they are only useful when a person has planned how and when to use them and they are not buried in the bottom of a purse. These devices, Tripp noted, all have drawbacks as well as pluses.

Throughout the seminar, Tripp continued to emphasize the individual's responsibility to pay attention, stay alert and think ahead. The booklet provided to participants in the program notes, "If you are always aware of your surroundings and the people around you, your chances of successfully avoiding a bad situation are vastly improved. Be curious about people. Don't worry about appearing rude, or paranoid, or odd. Follow your instincts. If something or someone looks wrong for some reason, take action. Leave, turn, and walk the other way, get into your car and drive off, or don't stop in the first place."

This seminar was developed by the Crockett County Extension Family and Consumer Sciences Committee as a part of the Long-Range Planning process in 1994. Personal safety from crime was a major issue identified in the town meeting held that year, and the committee agreed a program of this nature was needed.

The program was sponsored by the Ozona Woman's League and the three chapters of Beta Sigma Phi -

Alpha Alpha Mu, Xi Sigma Omega and Preceptor Mu Chi - as well as the Crockett County Family and Community Education Clubs, as their October meeting. Hostesses from the groups included Laurie Hale, Janet Thompson, Zoe Green, Mary Ann Deaton, Connie Jennings, Janet Smith and Cynthia Hokit. G. L. and Kristen Bunger provided refreshments as part of their 4-H community service.

Local sponsors included the Ozona Lions Club, Ozona National Bank, Crockett County National Bank, Upham Insurance, Comfort Inn, Small Fashions, Sutton Chevron, The Baggett Agency and South Texas Lumber Company. "We appreciate the tremendous support shown by our local businesses for this effort," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent - Family and Consumer Sciences, who coordinated the program and publicity. Ulmer noted that Tripp was also able to visit for a short time with the Ozona High School Senior Class about safety tips and that a child safety newsletter was distributed through Ozona Community Center and the primary, intermediate and junior high schools last week as part of the ongoing safety programming.

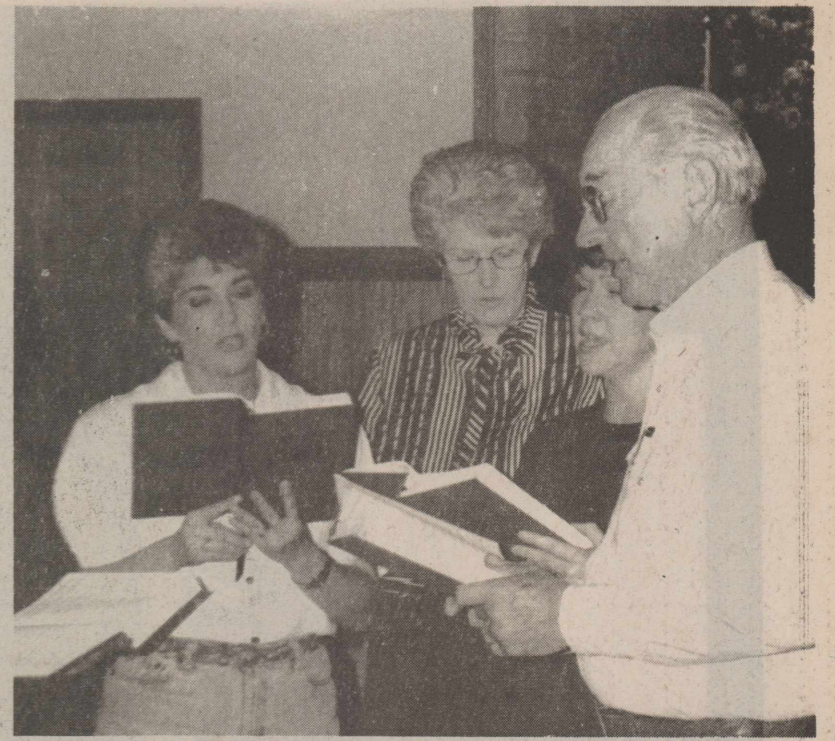

The Crockett County Museum Bookstore features several informational books about our hero, David Crockett. When he was a young man in Tennessee, he was considered "a legend in his own time". It was popular to write one's own story, and many times someone would make up wild stories and publish them as "David Crockett's own". David ignored them and didn't respond to comments about them for a long time. Finally, he took the advice of a friend and set about writing his own story. He wasn't formally educated, having gone to school less than a year, but he had help learning to write and read when he was a young man, and his story is written in his style of speaking. It's a lot like a journal, adding a little insight to his legend as he expounds on his adventures while providing food and shelter for his family.

Just a few years after writing his book he rode horseback to Texas and

fought the great and last battle at the Alamo. He became a hero to Texas—thus our county's namesake. Out of 254 counties in the State of Texas, most are named after Texas heroes. We should feel fortunate to have ours named after so great a man as Crockett. In all the books I've ever read about him, my impression is that he was very honest and always kept his word. That's important today, too, and we should follow his example, although I think the day of the hand-shake business deal is past history. Think how our lives would change if honesty was our only policy.

The great principle of the Protestant Reformation is salvation by grace alone through faith alone. This principle comes through loud and clear in Isaiah 1:27 in the Old Testament of the Bible. "Zion will be redeemed with justice, and her repentant ones with righteousness" (Isaiah 1:27).

In the Old Testament, Zion is a picture of the New Testament church. Hebrews 12:22-23 teaches us this. When someone redeems a slave, they pay a price for that servant. Justice refers to the just payment for evil. Justice demands recompense be made for evil acts. Righteousness refers to the requirement for heaven. Leviticus 18:5 says, "So you shall keep My

JV Lions Win First Game Against Junction

The Ozona JV Lions won their first game of the season over the Junction JV Eagles 18-8 in last Thursday's action in Junction. With their first win the Lions are 1-3 for the season.

"We were real pleased with the total team effort both offensively and defensively," said junior varsity coach **Dane Vickers**. "It was a good win, and the kids were really excited. The most important thing is they played hard. Overall, it was a good win, and it will be good to play Iraan this week."

Ozona's first score was set up when a Lion forced a quarterback fumble and recovered the ball on the Eagle 10-yard line. **Jesse Salazar** and **Matthew Galindo** got the ball down to the 2-yard line. Then Galindo scored their first touchdown on a 2-yard run with six minutes left in the first period. Salazar attempted the 2-point conversion but failed, leaving the score 6-0.

Ozona coaches used six running backs in the game including Salazar, Galindo, Robert Daniels, Donnie Bullard, Gary Dominguez and Chad Myers.

In the second quarter Junction attempted about a 37-yard field goal, but it was no good. Gary Dominguez recovered a fumble in this quarter also, but the Lions were unable to convert the turnover. Other Lions recovering fumbles were Alan Cruz and Donnie Bullard.

Later in the quarter the Lions started their next scoring drive on the Eagle 34-yard line. Good runs by Salazar and Galindo helped move the ball downfield along with a 3-yard pass by Efran Ramirez. The Lions scored on a 20-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Anthony Ortiz to Robert Daniels with 48 seconds left in the first half. A 2-point conversion run attempt by Salazar was no good, and the Lions went into the field house leading 12-0.

Ozona's last scoring drive occurred in the third period starting from their own 35-yard line. Several plays later Anthony Ortiz ran 50 yards on a quarterback option with 15 seconds left in the third period. A pass fell

incomplete for the 2-point conversion attempt, but the Lions increased their lead to 18-0.

The Eagles scored their only touchdown midway into the fourth period. They started on their own 34-yard line and turned a 25-yard pass into a 65-yard touchdown with 4:27 left in the quarter. A pass for the 2-point conversion was successful, bringing the Eagles within 10 points of the Lions at 18-8.

Junction had two other chances to score with the main one being their next possession. With 2:44 left in the

final period, Junction started moving the ball down field. They reached the 3-yard line before Efran Ramirez intercepted a pass with 43 seconds left in the game.

Several plays later Junction got the ball back on their own 28-yard line. They were without any timeouts and consequently time ran out with the final score Ozona 18, Junction 8.

Vickers praised his team, saying, "Offensive line did especially a good job controlling the line of scrimmage. The defense played well, especially our front four." Vickers said he and

the other team coaches were really pleased that some of the young kids who have not played much came through and made big plays on offense and defense.

The Ozona JV Lions will host the Iraan JV Braves at 6 p.m. in Lion Stadium Thursday, Oct. 12. Come out and "Back the Lions".

line will be added to your local monthly fee.

Other towns on the original petition were Big Lake, Iraan and Sheffield.

Big Lake residents filed for the same extended local calling earlier, and Ozona was on their petition. You may dial Big Lake with no long distance charge because of their petition.

Ozona petitioned for extended local calling to Iraan, but it is in the Midland LATA (Local Access and Transport Areas) while all the other towns except Sheffield on Ozona's petition are in the San Angelo LATA. Requirements to secure a waiver of federal restrictions on inter-LATA calling require proof of "community of interest" for Iraan. To prove community of interest, you must have: 1.) a public school district in common with your exchange; 2.) your county seat in the inter-LATA you are requesting; 3.) a primary local hospital in the inter-LATA; 4.) prove a relationship with the local government; 5.) a business relationship with the number of employers, number of people affected with identified relationships; 6.) proof of hardship that would exist if expanded toll-free local calling was not granted to each of the inter-LATA/SMA (Special Market Areas) exchanges.

was intercepted by an Eagle defender on the Junction 49-yard line.

It took the Eagles 12 plays to travel 51 yards for their first score. Eagle running back Justin Bierschwale scored on an eight-yard run with 5:44 remaining in the first period. Kicker Trey Sullivan added the extra point, giving the Eagles a 7-0 lead.

On the Lions' next possession they were able to move the ball from their own 28 to their 47, when an Ozona player was flagged for offensive pass interference. This forced punter Justin Browne to kick on a fourth-and-six to the Eagle 24.

The first quarter ended with the Lions in possession of the ball but behind on the scoreboard with Junction leading 7-0.

Both teams were stopped by penalties and good defense until Junction started moving the ball from their own 45-yard line. It took six downs for the Eagles to cover 55 yards for their next score. Their touchdown came on a 17-yard pass from quarterback Kennon Doyle to strong end Josh Butler with 3:14 left in the first half. The PAT by Sullivan was not good, but the Eagles increased their score to 13-0.

Jon Sanchez returned the kickoff to the Lion 43. Castaneda took the ball down to the Eagle 24-yard line with the help of a Junction penalty. The Lions changed quarterbacks, with Justin Browne taking the helm.

Good running by Darin Jackson, Castaneda, and Browne got the ball down to the six-yard line. Then Junction received a personal foul penalty

for roughing the passer, placing the ball on the Eagle three-yard line. With 23 seconds left in the half, Jackson dove into the end zone for a Lion score. The PAT by Bryan Mendez failed, but the Lions cut the Eagles' lead to seven by a score of 13-6.

The Eagles moved the ball well on their next possession, getting down to the Lion 24-yard line. However, some aggressive hitting by the Lions forced a fumble, and Mendez and Browne recovered the ball on their own 20-yard line. Unfortunately, the Lions had difficulty moving the ball and were forced to punt.

The Eagles received the ball on the Lion 46-yard line and the Lions played good defense, holding Junction effectively until the Eagles threw an 8-yard pass on a fourth-and four to pick up a first down on the Lion 19-yard line. Junction had their problems, taking the next five plays to score.

An offside penalty and an incomplete pass slowed the Eagles down, but they eventually scored on a 5-yard run by Bierschwale with 2:42 left in the third period. A pass failed on the two point conversion try when Justin Browne intercepted the ball. With the touchdown and no conversion, the Eagles expanded their score to 19-6, leaving the Lions still within striking distance.

The third quarter ended with the Lion quarterback Justin Browne sacked on the Ozona 35-yard line. On fourth down as Browne was ready to punt, the ball went over his head, and the Eagles recovered on the Lion 3-yard line. The Eagle quarterback kept the ball for a 1-yard gain and Trey Sullivan scored on a 2-yard run with 11:12 left in the fourth quarter. A pass for the conversion failed and the Eagles increased their score to 25-6.

On the Lions' next possession, bad went to worse as the Lions moved the ball. On a third-and-four on the Eagle 46, Browne had the ball stripped from his grasp, with an Eagle recovering it on the Lion 47-yard line. Defense again played an important part in the game, with the next Eagle and Lion possessions.

Junction's last touchdown occurred in the final period after an Eagle returned an Ozona punt to the Lion 39-yard line. The Eagles' second team offense took eight plays before scor-

ing on a 12-yard run by senior running back Zane McKinney with 22 seconds left in the game. The PAT by Sullivan was good, giving the Eagles a 32-6 victory.

Coach Hargrove analyzed the game by saying, "We're getting to the right places but we're not blocking and tackling. We're not finishing our blocks and our tackles--we'll have to get better."

Looking for ways to improve, the coach added, "Our kids need to turn loose and play hard every time. When they do that, we do good."

The Lion defense had their hands full as Bierschwale rushed for two touchdowns and 100 yards on 17 carries. However, on the Lions' side, there were some good tackles made during the game. Making solid tackles were Patrick Sanchez with 12 stops, followed by Bryan Mendez with nine, Albert Flores eight, Lance Jamerson six, and Justin Browne with five tackles. Six Lions had three tackles each, four had two each, and two players had one tackle each.

The Lion offense had a tough time rushing, with Darin Jackson getting only 42 yards in 17 carries. Justin Browne had 18 yards, and Pete Castaneda had eight yards, with the three runners accounting for a total of 68 yards. The play where the snap went over the punter's head accounted for a 32-yard loss. Thus, the Lions ended the night with a total of 36 yards rushing on 39 carries. Quarterbacks Castaneda and Browne had three completions out of eight thrown, for 29 total yards in the air.

The Lions will open District 5-2A competition with the 5-0 Iraan Braves at 8 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 13, in Iraan. Last week the Braves beat the Stanton Buffaloes 28-0 and the week before

According to Coach Hargrove, "Iraan is tough and as good as their ranking, if not better. They are very aggressive and play hard all the time. They don't have a weakness--I haven't found one yet."

The Braves run a wing-T offense and a 4-3 defense. Hargrove says they do a lot of pulling and trapping with their linemen on offense. On defense, they stunt and blitz a lot.

It's not easy, to form a game plan against such a strong team as the Braves. "Offensively, we will have to be able to move the ball," Hargrove said and added, "Defensively, we're going to have to tackle extremely well."

Iraan's Head Coach Larry Hanna

sees their team strengths as experience, depth, quickness, and strength.

The Braves' last district title was in 1991 and they look to repeat in '95. There isn't any one player to watch on the Braves' team, as they all play well. The Braves are led by quarterback Lance Harvey and running backs Heath Copeland and Reinaldo Mendoza have gained a lot of yardage. The defense is led by linebacker James Flores, end Erik Wright, tackles Rudy Galindo and Tim Harris and backs Ross Blackwelder and Billy

Palmore.
