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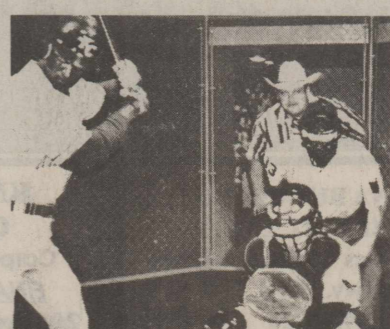

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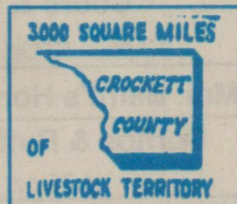

## Ozona hosts regional airport planning meeting . . . . .

# Airport construction to begin soon

Construction is to begin on improvements to Ozona Municipal Airport within 35 to 45 days according to TxDOT personnel at their regional planning meeting in Ozona Thursday morning at the civic center. Improvements scheduled and approved are part of the Aviation Facilities Development and Financial Assistance Program, which provides assistance through loans or grants to public entities for the purpose of establishing, constructing, reconstructing, enlarg-

ing or repairing airports, airstrips or navigational facilities administered through the Texas Department of Transportation. Area counties represented at the meeting were Crockett, Upton, Schleicher, Sutton and Reagan. Representing TxDOT from Austin and conducting the meeting and program were Linda Howard and Jim Cummins, airport development planners.

The meetings are held at least once every three years at approximately 60 locations throughout the state. Information on local economic

conditions, community goals and objectives, and the community's perception of needed airport improvements is obtained during the sessions.

Attending and representing Crockett County were Shelly Childress, Ozona Chamber of Commerce executive director; Jim Heame, justice of the peace; John Stokes, county auditor; and Scotty Moore, Ozona Stockman publisher.

"In 1993, Texas became a Block Grant State for general aviation to airports and federal aviation improvements, which means FAA gives us the money to administer to airports that are eligible for federal funding. Texas also became responsible for administering funding for reliever airports," Linda Howard said. "One of the other things that we have realized is the lack of funds in many communities to be used for maintenance. The Texas Transportation Commission approved last fall a new program called the Routine Maintenance Program. This new program allows us to grant up to \$10,000 annually per airport matched on a 50-50% basis to be used for airport improvements. This is going to go a long way in helping communities maintain their airports," Howard said. Sutton County has recently com-

pleted resurfacing improvements to its airport runway with funding partially obtained through the new Routine Maintenance Program.

Each of the counties represented at the meeting gave a rundown on their economic outlook and needed improvement to their airport facility.

Jim Heame, whose wife is fixed base operator at the airport, gave a rundown on airport use and the number of home based aircraft at Ozona. He told TxDOT planners that J. Cleo Thompson flies a Citation-3 jet aircraft and that several oil companies fly King Air jets. He also voiced his concern during the meeting, "We are imminently awaiting construction on the new runway, and what it comes down to is that we have paid our money and construction hasn't started yet." He then asked when construction was scheduled to begin and was given the answer of 35 to 45 days. Improvements scheduled for Ozona airport are a new 6,000 ft. runway, high intensity lighting and apron enlargement.

Former Ozonan Doyle Lovell has been appointed by TxDOT to oversee the full project.

Schleicher County representatives Judge Johnny Griffin, James

Doyle, justice of the peace; Johnny Mayo, county commissioner; Ross Whitten, commissioner and John Callison, city administrator all indicated that the airport in Eldorado was in bad shape and needed to be relocated for liability and safety reasons. Judge Griffin told the airport planners that he thought the grant program was inherently unfair. He felt that it was not written to help those communities that had low county budgets such as Schleicher County. "We have been written up by the FAA for safety violations, but can't do anything about it because of lack of funds. What do we do, close the airport?" he said.

Crockett County Auditor John Stokes answered his questions and concerns. He said that Crockett County supplemented their part of the money package with the value of the land deeded over to the county by J. Cleo Thompson. He said that he understood that Schleicher County had purchased 60 or so acres possibly to be used for a new runway, and that this land could be used as part of the county base money for the grant.

Both Sutton and Reagan counties showed no concern over airport enlargement, but were interested in the new maintenance program money.

# School tax rate drops one cent

During their regular monthly meeting that was held on Tuesday, Aug. 19, members of the Ozona School Board held a 1997-98 school year budget hearing to discuss and review the 1997-98 school year official estimated budget. The \$9,368,334.00 budget includes \$2,256,000.00 that must be sent to the state for recaptures. Overall district revenue is projected to be \$9,593,445.00 based on a tax rate of \$1.30 per \$100.00 of assessed value.

Following review of the proposed budget, the members voted unanimously for its approval, and they also voted to recommend to the Crockett County Commissioners Court a tax rate of \$1.30 per \$100.00 of assessed

value, which is a decrease of \$.01 from the 1996-97 school year budget. The new budget will have a dedicated fund balance of \$600,000.00 for district technology improvements. The board also voted to approve Sept. 3, 1997, at 7 p.m. as the date and time for a special meeting to hold a public hearing on the proposed 1997-98 school year tax rate.

During the meeting Superintendent Larry Taylor presented a report from the Texas Education Agency on the 1997 District and Campus Accountability/Accreditation Ratings Notification. He reported that the school district had achieved "Academically Recognized" status for the first time since ratings had been assigned by T.E.A. to receive "Academically Recognized" status, Texas

Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) results in grades 3-8 and 10 have to show an overall total of at least 75% students and student groups (African American, Hispanic, White and Economically Disadvantaged) passing each subject area (reading, writing and mathematics) on the 1997 TAAS, a 1995-96 school year dropout rate of 3.5% or less, and a 1995-96 attendance rate of at least 94%.

He also reported that three of the district's four campuses received the "Academically Recognized" Campus Rating from the Texas Education Agency. These campuses, utilizing the same criteria above on a campus-by-campus basis, are Ozona Primary School (paired with Ozona Intermediate for accountability purposes), Ozona Intermediate School and Ozona

Middle School. Ozona High School, which had at least 35% of its students passing each subject area, a 6.0% or less dropout rate, and an attendance rate of at least 94%, received an "Academically Acceptable" campus rating.

Taylor also presented the district's 1996-97 School Year Annual Report and the district's 1997-98 School Year Improvement Plan for trustee consideration. Concerning the district's 1996-97 School Year Annual Report, Taylor told the members: "The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District is making progress on the road to educational excellence and equity. With enthusiasm and shared determi-

Tedra Ulmer, Crockett County Extension Agent for Family and Consumer Sciences, was recognized at the Texas Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences annual conference in San Angelo on July 31.

Ulmer, who has been employed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for 15 years, was presented with the TEAFCS Distinguished Service Award and the state News Article Award. She has also been notified that she will receive the National Association's Distinguished Service Award in October during the Galaxy Summit in Cincinnati, OH.

The Distinguished Service Award recognizes NEAFCS members for outstanding program work, leadership and both personal and professional growth. To be eligible, a person must have a minimum of 10 years membership in NEAFCS, provide evidence of superior accomplishments in program-

ming, professional improvement and professional association membership and participation. The number of awards given yearly is determined by the number of paid members in the state organization, and Texas was eligible for five nominees this year.

The TEAFCS News Article Award is given for a "hard news" article or special feature story. Ulmer received this award for an article and photo of the first Better Living For Texans group to graduate in Crockett County.

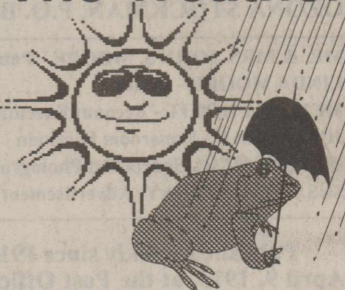
Ulmer, who received her bachelor of science degree from Tarleton State University and her master of science degree from the University of North Texas, was installed as president-elect of TEAFCS during the conference. She has served as a district association director, as state public policy chairman, historian and second vice-president. She is also a member of the American Association of Fam-

ily and Consumer Sciences and has met all standards and credentials to be Certified in Family and Consumer Sciences (CFCS).

Major program efforts have included youth at risk, crime prevention and nutrition programming. She received the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association "Home Economist of the Year" award in 1993, and the TEAFCS and NEAFCS "Program Excellence Through Research" awards in 1992. She also received a Texas State Senate Proclamation in 1992 in recognition for her work in teen sexuality education. Her programs have been selected for special presentations at State Extension Headquarters Staff Conference and several statewide agent trainings.

Ulmer, who is married to Neal Ulmer, has served Crockett County since 1988 and has one daughter, Katharine, a criminal justice and psychology major at Angelo State University.

## Someone's in the kitchen

"At one time, everybody in our family cooked," said Dorothy Montgomery. During the years she taught school, when the family members arrived home at mealtime, everyone pitched in. Beecher and their two children, Vicky Lynn and Brian, all had their specialties. Beecher is in charge of grilling. Vicky did sweets and Brian the salads and guacamole.

"I started cooking when I was a little kid," said Dorothy. "I was a spoiled only child and my parents would buy everything a recipe called for. They ate everything I cooked and bragged on it."

"Beecher's mother was a fabulous cook. I patterned after her and got a bunch of her recipes. She was an inspiration to me."

Mrs. Montgomery always said nothing was worth eating without butter, sugar and cream in it, Dorothy said. "Of course, we can't eat like that now."

"I even ate whipping cream on my oatmeal," said Beecher.

Dorothy still loves to cook, and the family loves to eat. As in most homes, when the children and grandchildren are there, everyone gathers in the kitchen.

Dorothy is sharing a meatloaf recipe from a cookbook of her mother's, the late Evelyn Bryant. The salad recipe is wonderful for summer, and the dressing is good on any salad, she says. This cornbread recipe is the one Dorothy always comes back to, no matter how many she tries.

### Dorothy's Meatloaf

Combine 1 slightly beaten egg, 1 lb. ground round steak, 1/2 lb. ground pork

Mix with 1 c. scalded milk and add to above: 1/2 c. cracker crumbs, 1 sm. onion, chopped, 1 T horseradish, 1 T. catsup, 1 T. chopped green pepper, 1-1/2 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. sugar, 1 tsp Worcestershire

Press in loaf pan and bake one hour at 350 degrees.

### Chicken Salad Habañera

1-1/2 c. cooked chicken in strips  
1 c. ripe olives, sliced  
1 avocado, cut in strips  
1/3 c. red onions, chopped  
2 - 3 T strips bell pepper  
4 c. lettuce, shredded  
Chill, add avocado, then dressing. Serves 4.

### Dressing

1/3 c. salad oil  
1/4 c. red wine vinegar  
1/4 c. lemon juice  
1 T sugar  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. coarse pepper  
1/8 tsp. fresh garlic, minced

### Cornbread

Mix well: 1 c. cornmeal, 1/2 c. flour, 1 tsp. salt  
Add: 1 c. buttermilk, 1/2 c. sweet-milk, 1 egg, 1 T. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. soda, mix and pour into pan in which 1/4 c. shortening has been melted. Bake at 450 degrees. Serves 16 or 18 pieces.

This recipe may be halved. Use the whole egg, however.

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### Apricot Glazed Holiday Ham

Use 5 lb. precooked ham. Place fat side down in Pyrex dish. Spoon any liquid over top. Cook in microwave 5 minutes on high. Turn over, baste. Score top of ham and place whole cloves at each intersection. Brush liberally with apricot preserves. Cook on medium high for 15 minutes, basting once or twice.

Combine in 1 qt. Pyrex dish and stir and cook 3 minutes on high:  
1 - 6 oz. pkg. dried apricots  
1/2 c. apricot or peach brandy  
1/4 tsp. paprika

Arrange apricots on top of ham. Pour remaining brandy mixture and coat with more preserves. Cook on high 5 minutes until probe in thickest part registers 120 degrees.

### Fruit juice for kids--are they getting too much?

Most people agree that eating too much "junk" is not good for our health. What's harder to understand is that even eating too much of a "healthy" food can be bad for us. This may sometimes be the case when children drink too much fruit juice.

Fruit juice is a healthy beverage, providing calories while being low in fat and high in Vitamin C and some minerals. However, several studies published recently have said that too much fruit juice—very large amounts—could be harmful for young children. This over-consumption of juice has been linked to what researchers call "failure to thrive" or to grow properly.

For infants, dental caries from feeding juice in nursing bottles—used as a sort of "pacifier," is a recognized health concern. The sugar and acid from the juice cause serious damage to developing teeth when children are allowed to go to sleep drinking from the juice bottle or drink too much too often.

Also, high amounts of fruit juice in the diet can cause diarrhea and other intestinal problems. That's because of the large amounts of sorbitol and fructose in juices. Sorbitol is a non-absorbable sugar and fructose is sometimes not well absorbed, leading to these problems.

Why is fruit juice so popular with young children? Obviously, children prefer the sweet taste. In addition,

parents give children juice because it's healthy, and because with new technologies available, it's become a convenience food. Juice has displaced water as the drink of choice between meals and snacks—and in fact, children under five drink more fruit juice than any other age group.

Don't get me wrong—fruit juice is important in children's diets because it helps them meet the recommendation to eat more fruits and vegetables. However, when juice accounts for fifty percent of the fruit servings, they're not getting all the benefits, such as fiber, or whole fruits. In addition, as children drink more juice, they drink less milk—which leads to serious consequences such as retarded growth and future risk of osteoporosis. Also, if children are already consuming enough calories daily, the juice may be providing extra unneeded calories, leading to obesity.

The best guide for parents? Remember the old saying that if something is good for you, more is not necessarily better. The recommendation for parents and care-givers is to limit intake of fruit juices to less than 12 ounces a day and to be sure the child is getting whole fruits, milk and water in sufficient amounts.

Miss Gillard, Mr. Jones Plan November Wedding

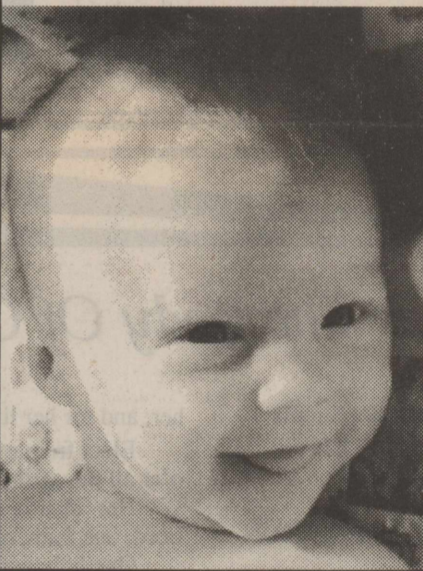

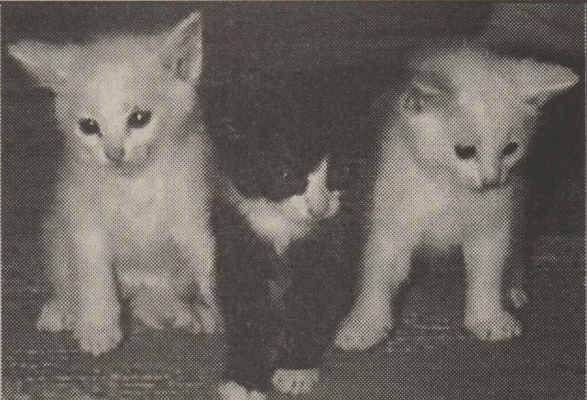

We'll have demonstrations and displays of pioneer arts and crafts and ranching activities. There will be storytelling and games for the children. Several local musical groups will perform for us. Challenge a friend to a game of horseshoes, checkers, dominoes, etc. We'll have a raffle with many fine items to win. There will be a bake sale. Barbara Malone will sell books about Crockett County and West Texas, as well as memberships in the Crockett County Historical, Scientific and Museum Society. Best of all, Pioneer Heritage Day will be a chance for a reunion with friends from far and wide.

We will ask all to register upon entering the area in one of three categories: Pioneers (all persons whose families were living in Crockett County in 1891 at the time of the county's organization); Old Timers

(anyone whose family moved to Crockett County after 1891 but before 1950); Newcomers (anyone whose family recently moved to Crockett County after 1950). About 11 a.m., all the Pioneers and Old Timers will gather to form a choir to sing some old songs (song sheets to be provided) and for group photos, which can be purchased later. The Robert Lee High School graduate enjoys going to sporting events and spending time with her

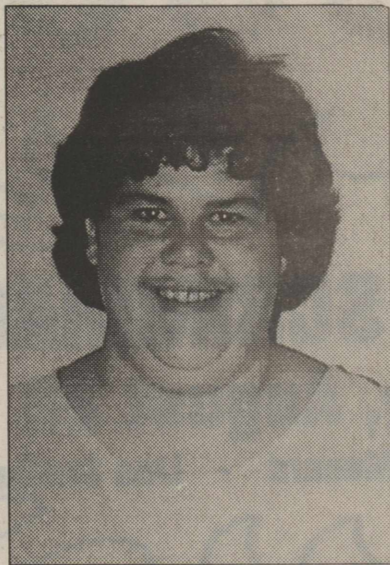
family.

nation, we, as a district, are seeing significant signs of success. Step by step we are building momentum, and the positive growth in student performance over the past three years has given us the energy and confidence to tackle the next larger challenge. That challenge is to continue upward improvement on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) and in all areas of the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS).

At this juncture, we have completed the fourth year of our efforts with significant gains on the TAAS tests in grades three through eight and the tenth grade, the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), the Iowa tests of Basic Skills (ITBS) in grades kindergarten through the second grade, and within all indicators of the AEIS," Taylor said.

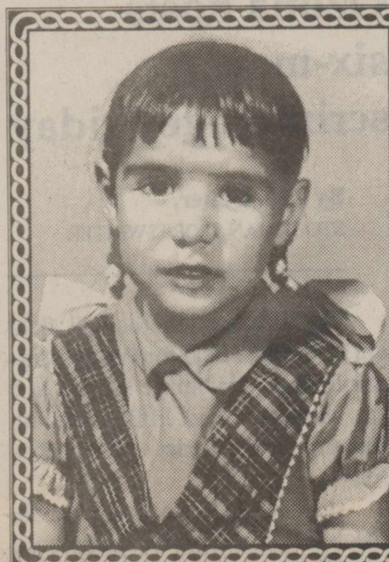
The 1996-97 School Year Annual Report contains priorities of the school district through the year 2000, district results on the ITBS, TAAS and the SAT, graduation/dropout rates and student attendance rates.

The district's 1997-98 School Year Improvement Plan was also presented by Superintendent Taylor. The plan lists five district goals for the 1997-98 school year, and these in-

They also approved a bid from Anthem Insurance Company for employee health insurance for the 1997-98 school year and updates to the school board policy manual.

The meeting was adjourned following an affirmative vote to approve Sept. 16 at 7 p.m. as the date and time for the board's regular September meeting.

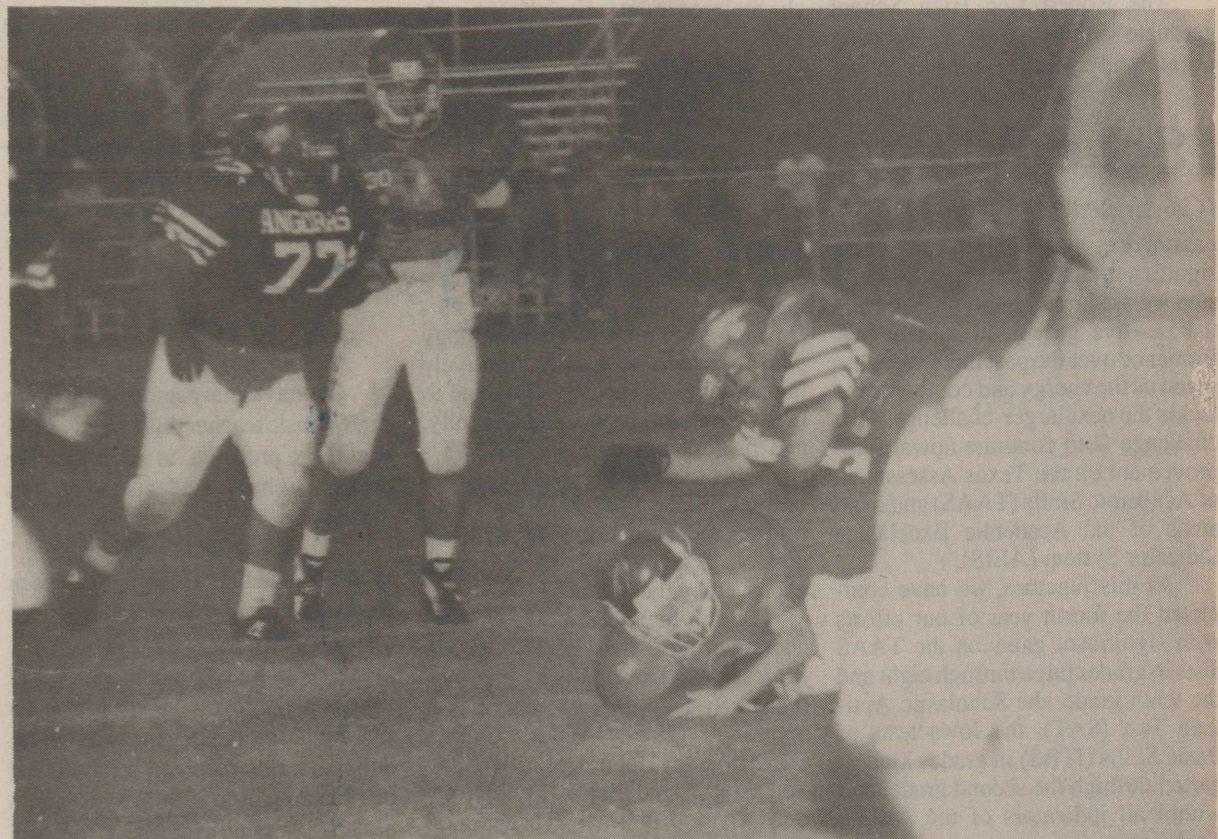

## San Angelo Center sets 24th Annual Sheep And Goat Field Day

Brush sculpting, a producers' lamb feeding program, industry updates, and special recognition of a veteran newsman are just some of the topics scheduled for the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center's 24th Annual Sheep and Goat Field Day Sept. 4. The center is located north of San Angelo on U. S. Highway 87. Registration runs from 8:30-9:30 a.m. Morning field tours begin at 9:30 a.m.

A major field day highlight is the special recognition of long-time farm broadcaster Roddy Peoples. Peoples has been a strong supporter of the Texas A&M University system throughout his career. He is the founder of the nationally known Voice of Southwest Agriculture network. Peoples began the network with two affiliates after moving to Midland in 1964. Another 60 stations were added over the years. Peoples sold the business in 1995 to Clear Channel Radio of San Antonio. He and his wife, Bettinae, now live in Dallas where he remains VSA's senior farm broadcaster.

The morning's tour stops include the "Pasture to Packer" program, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service lamb feeding project that allows producers to gain experience in retained ownership of their animals to slaughter. The program also provides performance data useful to producers wishing to improve their flock's efficiency. Drs. Frank Craddock, Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist at San Angelo, and Rick Machen, Extension Livestock Specialist at Uvalde, will man the stop. "Brush Sculpting", the art of managing brush for optimum livestock, wildlife and recreational use, is also a tour stop. Brush Busters originators, Drs. Allan McGinty, Extension Range Specialist, and Darrell Ueckert, Professor in Rangeland Ecology & Management, both of San Angelo, will join Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension Wildlife Specialist also based there, with the instruction. Plans include the introduction of new selective low impact application technology that may be used in the program's future.

Other morning tour topics and their San Angelo-based Experiment station presenters include: "Meat Goat Research", Dr. Dan Waldron, assistant professor in sheep and goat reproduction; "Feeding Value and Toxicity of Cotton By-Products", Dr. Millard

Calhoun, professor in animal science; and "Implications of Biotechnology to Sheep Producers", Dr. Andres de la Concha, assistant professor in veterinary pathology.

A catered lunch prepared by Ken Cook, District 7 Extension Director Emeritus, is scheduled from 11:45 a.m. until 1 p.m.

The afternoon program begins at 1 p.m. with recognition of special guests by Steve Byrns, extension communications specialist, followed by a special recognition of Roddy Peoples delivered by Dr. Zerle Carpenter, director of the Extension Service and associate vice chancellor at College Station. Carpenter also serves as master of ceremonies for the afternoon program.

Dr. John Walker, resident director of research, will speak on behalf of the center. He is followed by industry updates and status reports including: "National Sheep Industry Improvement Center", Pierce Miller, center chairman, San Angelo; "Texas A&M University Sheep Center", Shawn Ramsey, assistant professor in animal science, College Station; "Boll Weevil Eradication Program", Sid Long, executive director, Southern Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association, Robert Lee; "Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association", Dr. Tim Turner, president, San Angelo; and "Mohair Council of America", Zane Willard, executive director, San Angelo.

A "Value Added Products Panel" is next. Panelists and their topics include: "Ranchers Lamb of Texas", Chico Denis, board chairman, San Angelo; "Kothman Commission Company", Jamie Kothmann, president, Menard; "Supplying Year-long Slaughter", Dr. Ed Huston, professor in animal science and rangeland ecology and management, San Angelo; "Marketing Lamb Products", Ray Ellis, president and general manager, Ranchers' Lamb of Texas, San Angelo; and "Adding Value to Fiber", Ronald Pope, wool and marketing director, Producers Marketing Cooperative, Inc., San Angelo.

## Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

Flowing 110 barrels of oil per day on a 24/64 choke, the No. 1 University 2-13 has been brought on line 12 miles south of Rankin in Crockett County's Triumph Field. Chevron USA is the operator. With 9,585 feet total depth, the well was plugged back to 9,495. It will produce from a Wolfcamp formation interval, 8,167 to 8,203 feet into the hole.

Burlington Resources Oil & Gas Co. has posted first production data for the No. 021CH University Block 42 about 17 miles north of Sonora in Crockett County's Redemption Field. The new pool wildcat flowed 410,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke and was rated at 441,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Burlington bottomed the well at 10,720 feet and conducted a plugback to 7,996 feet. Production will be from 8,598 feet to hole's end.

The No. 423 Olson Unit has been brought on line 15 miles east of Iraan in Crockett County's Olson Field. Marathon Oil Co. is the operator. It pumped 56 barrels of oil per day. The well probed to 2,525 feet total depth and will produce from 2,236 to 2,252 feet into the hole.

Union Pacific Resources has added a couple of developmental wells to its Lease in Crockett County's Ozona Field. The No. 10 Zipp Ranch "34" is located 23 miles southeast of Ozona. It flowed 394,000-CFD on an 0.875-in. choke and earned a 462,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 7,382 feet, the well was perforated for Canyon Sand Formation pay, 6,472 to 6,636 feet into the hole. Flowing 387,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke, the No. 5H Friend "D" was rated at 487,000-CFD on absolute open flow. The well was drilled a total of 10,864 feet and will produce from 7,842 feet to hole's end.

The same operator has posted first production data for the No. 11H Roy Henderson "32" about 12.4 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's West Hunt-Baggett Field. It flowed at the rate of 1,085,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and was rated at 1,446,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 11,773 feet, the well was plugged back to 11,337 and perforated for Strawn Formation pay, 9,900 to 11,255 feet into the hole.

Union Pacific is preparing to make hole for the No. 7 Laura Hoover Est. "51" about 28 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field. Location is a 320-acre lease in the T&STL Survey A-4195. Authority has been granted for 7,600 feet of hole making.

Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field will see some developmental action when the No. 7 Joe Wylie McMullen "A" is recompleted 11 miles southeast of Ozona. Harrison Interests Ltd. of Houston is the operator. Location is a 396-acre lease in the GC&SFR Survey A-2405. Penn Formation will be the objective at a depth of approximately 9,400 feet.

Operating out of Midland, Cross Timbers Operating Co. has filed for permit to drill the No. 13 Jean Scheuber "B" 11 miles southeast of Ozona in Crockett County Henderson Field. Drillsite is a 664-acre lease in the TCRR Survey A-4684. The operator will seek Canyon Formation pay at a depth of approximately 8,000 feet.

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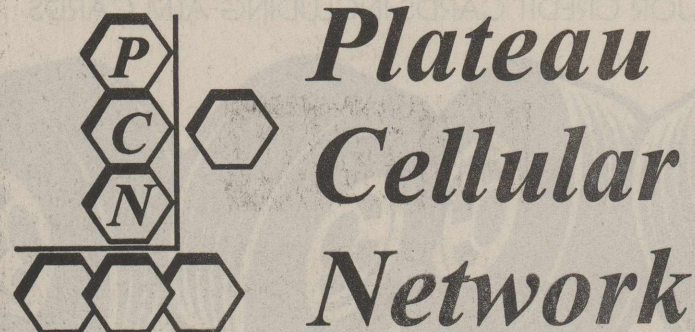
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## Homeward bound!

Home is really where the heart is...as wonderful as all the places we visited were, about all we could think about by the last day was starting for home. Of course, the adults were most apprehensive, since we would be the ones driving. Miles had let the Kentucky people know we had to get on the road that morning—but somehow they got confused and had us riding a riverboat, the Belle of Louisville, until 4:30 p.m. That meant by the time we were loaded and on the road, it would be 5 p.m. at the earliest. Oops!

After staying up late visiting the night before—most of us were becoming extremely attached to our hosts and hated to leave—we arose to find a beautiful Kentucky morning greeting us again. We loaded up the stuff in our two Suburbans and some of us said goodbye to part of our host families who could not attend the last day's activities. The rest of the group loaded into vehicles and we were off for our last great adventures—the Louisville Slugger factory and baseball museum, and the Belle—which would have another name before the day was over.

No one who visits Louisville should miss the Slugger factory—even if you aren't a baseball fan, it is fascinating—and if you are a fan, it is really awe-inspiring to see bats used by Babe Ruth, Ty Cobb, and Mickey Mantle, among others, as well as my own personal hero, Johnny Bench. There are lots of interactive exhibits. As usual, Miles interacted more than anyone—in the "Baseball Stadium", we have photos of him behind the ump and sliding into second. Most of us were fascinated with an exhibit which uses video to show what it's like to face a major-league pitcher throwing a fastball at 100 mph. Scary!

We toured the factory and learned about the exacting process in making the bats. The company also makes golf clubs, which we got to see being made, as well as hockey sticks. They even made the wooden part of the 1996 Olympic torches and the one which went through Louisville was on display.

One of the neatest things about the factory was the giant "bat" outside. It's an exact scale replica of the model designed to specifications requested by the Babe in the early 1920's, with an authentic signature and logo. The bat is hollow carbon steel and weighs about 68,000 pounds, is 120 feet long, and nine feet in diameter at the base. The handle is three and a half feet around and the knob is six and a half feet in diameter. It's coated with five layers of paint, including a hand-painted wood-grain coat that would make you swear it's really wood. It took 1,500 man-hours to complete over

## 4-H members need to re-enroll

4-H members need to remember to complete a new enrollment form for the 1997-98 school year. If new forms are not completed, the youth is not considered to be a current 4-H member and will not be on the mailing list.

"Our mailing lists come directly from our computerized enrollment program," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent-Family and Consumer Sciences, "so if you haven't filled out a new enrollment form, we can't keep your name in the computer." Ulmer noted that all a person has to do to join 4-H is to fill out an enrollment form and turn it in to the county Extension office.

When a youth signs up for 4-H, they indicate which projects and activities they are interested in. While there is no obligation to participate in everything they sign up for, this means they will get information prior to the beginning of the project or activity so they can make a decision based on their time and other resources available.

It costs nothing to join 4-H, and all youth in third grade (or age nine) through age 19 are eligible to be members. Project activities can be tailored to fit each person's needs and pocketbook. 4-H is a "learning by doing" organization, and parental involvement is strongly encouraged.

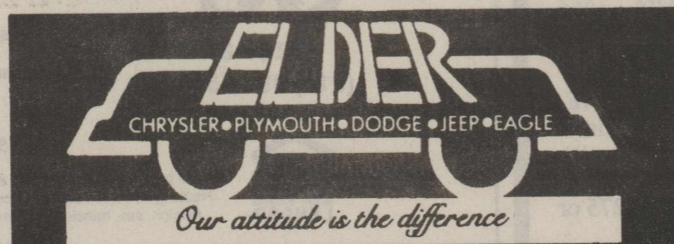
