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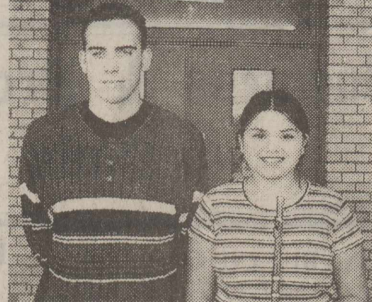

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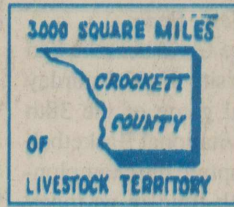

## Model school award given to Ozona Primary

Ozona Primary School Principal Marilyn Luce has been notified that her school is the first Renaissance Model School to be certified in the United States by the Institute of Academic Excellence.

The Institute of Academic Excellence is a company established by the creators of the Accelerated Reading Program, Judith and Terrance Paul. The Madison, WI, based company has, since its inception, trained thousands of educators to promote the adoption of Reading Renaissance methods in schools of all kinds, nationwide. Reading Renaissance is incorporating the use of the Accelerated Reader into a school's curriculum to become an integral part of the way reading is taught. The specific objectives of Reading Renaissance are: to create optimal, measurable growth in student reading ability; to help students become independent, self-directed readers and learners; to contribute to the development of critical and analytical thinking skills; and to make reading fun and help students develop a lasting love of reading.

### County serious about landfill

"We're serious, and we think we've found a good place," Judge Jeffrey Sutton said Monday night while talking about a landfill for Crockett County.

Danny Winchester and Gary Harris of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper were at the meeting to talk about landfill regulations and feasibility studies. The firm prepared a landfill study for the county several years ago, but regulations have changed and the proposed location is different now.

Commissioners voted to have PSC do economic and feasibility studies not to exceed \$23,000. The place being considered is dotted with wells and could have hazardous materials problems. If a trip to the site by Winchester and Harris determines this to be a possibility, there is a second site nearby, Sutton said. Harris said a hazardous materials study alone could cost \$25,000.

During their discussion, Commissioner Fred Deaton said he believed having a landfill would not create a savings for the county. Eddie Moore, roads and parks superintendent, looks at having a landfill here as a hedge against future higher costs of having trash taken elsewhere. A decreased charge by waste hauling companies to customers should result if trash is only hauled a few miles compared to more than a hundred, he said.

Buying the land, getting it permitted for a landfill and constructing the landfill could cost as much as \$500,000.

Court members voted to charge \$2,000 each to dispose of old tires and to enter an agreement with Safetire company to haul away the whole tires.

### 115 dogs compete in Winter Olympics . . . . .

## 12 states represented at Dog Trials

Handlers from 12 states were in Ozona last week for the Texas Sheep Dog Association's Winter Olympics Dog Trials. The three-day event was the last of the three-part trials held annually in West Texas. The first segment was held at the Harry Holmes Ranch at Sheffield and the second at the Charles Stegall Ranch at Sanderson.

One hundred fifteen dogs were expected to compete in the open, nursery, novice/ranch, open ranch and ranch classes. Beginning dogs and handlers are placed in the novice/ranch class. The nursery class is for dogs younger than two years, and the open and open ranch are for the most experienced handlers and dogs.

Placings out of the 15 finalists in the open class Sunday were: 1 Bud Boudreau of Red Owl, SD, with Cap, 93 points; 2 Red Oliver of Caldwell with Roy, 92 points; 3 Pat Colins of Weatherford with Wisk, 92 points; 4 Sarah Muir of Yerington, NV, with Dix, 91 points; 5 Ralph Pulfer of Millsap with Roy, 90 points; 6 Susan Carpenter of Rocksprings with Glen, 89 points; 7 Jo Woodbury of Millsap with Paint, 89 points and 8 Ivan Weir of Ozona with Moy, 84 points.

The top five in the nursery class finals Sunday were: 1 Ralph Pulfer of Millsap with Tweed, 77 points; 2 Budred Boudreau of Owl, SD, with Maid, 75 points; 3 Ralph Pulfer with Pat, 71 points; Leo Woodbury of Millsap with Ben, 62 points; and Ruelle Johnson of Bronte with Lad, 60 points.

Open Ranch Class winners were: 1 Nancy Duley of Carrizozo, NM, with Lass, 74 points; Joy Crawford of Fort Benton, MT, with Nell, 72 points; Ralph Pulfer with Tweed, 72 points;

Barb Ross of Crawford with Rex, 71 points; Joe Raines of La Mesa with Bell, 68 points.

In the novice/ranch division, Bobby Stegall of Sanderson and Lass earned 42 points in the novice, and Larry Burkes of Afion and Le earned 51 points in the ranch.

Judges for the Ozona Winter Olympics were Charles Stegall of Sanderson and Harry Holmes of Sheffield.

## Board considering drug testing

In their regular monthly meeting which was held Wednesday, Jan. 14, members of the Ozona School Board discussed the possibility of instituting drug testing for students who participate in extra or co-curricular activities in Ozona Middle School and Ozona High School.

The trustees first reviewed a policy that is currently used by the Mabank Independent School District to discourage students from using drugs. The policy defines students who are subject to mandatory drug testing as any student who participates in athletic, band, cheerleading, University Interscholastic League activities and all other voluntary extra or co-curricular programs.

It gives the district the right to test for the following substances: alcohol, amphetamines, barbiturates, benzodiazepines, cocaine metabolite, marijuana, methadone, opiates, phencyclidine, propoxyphene, hallucinogens, steroids and all other illegal or addictive drugs. It also defines the type of sample collection (urine or hair).

## Doctor's discovery may end obesity

HILTON HEAD, S.C. -- A doctor has discovered that an ingredient found in a small fruit grown in Asia, combined with an ingredient praised by the U.S. Department of Agriculture can help cause significant weight loss.



AUSTIN — Violent sex offenders would be locked up indefinitely and the death penalty could be assigned to repeat child molesters and drug traffickers under a proposal by Democrat John Sharp.

Speaking at a news conference last week, Sharp, state comptroller running for lieutenant governor, said, "Making Texas safer must be our top priority. My criminal justice reform plan will help accomplish that."

Sharp also proposed placing more state prison inmates in work programs and retroactively eliminating mandatory early release for prisoners by passing a law that could be upheld in the courts. He also recommended a crackdown on juvenile gangs and shoring up penalties against those who assault teachers.

Republican Rick Perry, who is also running for lieutenant governor, said, however, that Sharp's plan "echoes" his own plan for criminal justice reform. *The Dallas Morning News* reported. Regarding Sharp's news conference, Perry's campaign manager Jim Arnold, said, "Many of the ideas announced today are so good, they

have already been proposed by state leaders like (Agriculture Commissioner) Rick Perry and Gov. (George W.) Bush."

Both candidates' criminal justice reform plans would have to be approved by the Legislature to become law. The lieutenant governor presides over the Senate and wields much influence over the passage of legislation.

### Teen Drug Use Rising

The Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse has compiled figures showing that illegal drug use by Texas students in grades seven through 12 increased in 1996.

Released by the commission last week, the survey showed an upward trend in teen drug use beginning in 1992. About 34 percent of all secondary students in 1996 had used some type of illegal substance during their lifetime — up from 22 percent in 1992, but below the rate of 39 percent recorded in 1988.

"Alcohol continues to be the most widely used substance among Texas secondary students," the survey said.

"In many ways, curtailing alcohol consumption is more problematic than reducing the use of illicit drugs because of the availability of alcohol and the perception among adolescents that drinking alcohol is not as dangerous as using other drugs."

According to the survey, parents can do much to keep their kids off drugs, such as:

- Encourage children to work at getting good grades;
  - Show support for children at school events; and
  - Talk to children. Make sure they know that drug use is unacceptable.
- The survey was based on responses of 106,924 secondary students (48 percent male and 52 per-

cent female) in 72 school districts.

**Fund-Raising Suit Settled**  
 The Texas attorney general's office said last week that a telemarketer for Dallas police and sheriff's union has settled a lawsuit that accused it of fraudulent fund-raising, *The Dallas Morning News* reported.

Merritt Productions Inc. misrepresented where money would be going and what contributions were charitable tax deductions, the state alleged.

The settlement prohibits Daniel Merritt, owner of the company, from exercising control over any future firm that does not comply with strict solicitation guidelines.

The attorney general's office filed the lawsuit as part of a multi-state effort aimed at "police charities." The state's suit alleged that Merritt employees misrepresented that solicited funds were going to the police and sheriff's departments, when the money actually was going to support unions.

Some company solicitors also told consumers that deals provided in return for contributions entitled the person to break traffic laws with impunity, according to the suit.

The fund-raiser kept 85 percent of money collected for the two unions.

**Holzheuser to Skip Race**  
 Texas Railroad Commission candidate Rick Holzheuser, a Republican, dropped out of the race last week.

His announcement to withdraw came five days after former Secretary of State Tony Garza, also a Republican, announced he would run for railroad commissioner instead of land commissioner.

Garza announced his switch Jan. 2 — the filing deadline — too late for Holzheuser, a six-term House member from Victoria, to file for re-election to the House.

## Arrests made in vehicle theft

A wreck and manhunt near Fort Stockton Jan. 16 resulted in the arrest of two men suspected of stealing a car in Ozona.

Christopher Wayne Heisler, age 20, of Florida and Andrew Allen Ray Boegel, age 24, of Ohio, wrecked out and fled on foot from Pecos County officers last Friday morning. Texas Department of Corrections dogs were used in locating the pair, who were arrested and transferred back to Crockett County and jailed.

The car they were in had been

stolen around 3:30 a.m. from a resident at the Senior Citizens Apartments in west Ozona. Two cars at the nearby Hillcrest Motel were damaged the same night with a window broken on one and the ignition damaged on the other.

Sheriff Shane Fenton said the suspects are believed to have arrived here in a van which was reported stolen out of Florida. This vehicle was found on fire about 300 yards off the highway on the University Ranch west of Ozona.

Kay's father was out of work from a back injury and her future husband was coming for a visit. Kay didn't want Ray to know how bare the cupboard really was. She combined everything there was to eat, hamburger, macaroni and cheese and corn, and the casserole is now known as "Mom's Stuff".

Kay's mother is a good cook, but her grandmother is an excellent cook, she says. A pinch of this and a coffee cup of that makes up her measurement scale, and Kay also cooks by pinch and taste.

The Shaffer family likes fresh vegetables and homemade jellies, and part of each summer is spent putting up foods for later use. They also cook outside a lot in the summer to keep the heat out of the house.

"Ray's speciality is Buffalo Wings, which he prepares for Super-bowl."

The Shaffer children, Mandy, a senior, Dustin, a sophomore, Jared, an eighth grader and Andrew, a seventh grader, are not picky eaters. "They will usually try what I cook and give me their opinion," says Kay.

The Shaffer children are active in 4-H, and their parents enjoy working with them. "It's a good program here," says Kay.

Kay likes to sew, paint on wood and make crafts for her family and friends. She has cooked for company safety meetings and for other companies for special occasions.

The Shaffers moved to Ozona three and one-half years ago from Odessa. Ray is manager of the G. Q. Salmon office here.

### Mom's Stuff

1 lb. ground beef  
2 slices onion, chopped  
Macaroni and cheese, prepared  
1 can of corn  
Salt and pepper  
Cook beef in skillet, add onion, cook until done. Salt and pepper to taste. Stir meat mixture into macaroni and cheese, add corn.

Kay's peach cobbler and 1-2-3-4 cake recipes are handed down from her family. The cake recipe is from her grandmother.

### Peach Cobbler

1 large can peaches or 2 c. fresh peaches  
1 stick oleo  
1 c. sugar

1/4 tsp. cinnamon  
Mix in a small sauce pan and bring to a boil.

1 c. flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 T. baking powder  
3/4 c. sugar  
1/2 c. milk

Mix in a small bowl, then spread in a 11x13 dish. Pour peach mixture over batter. Bake for 15 minutes at 450 degrees or until lightly brown.

### 1-2-3-4 Cake

1 c. shortening  
2 c. sugar  
3 c. flour  
4 eggs  
1 c. milk  
1 tsp. salt  
2 tsp. baking powder  
2 tsp. vanilla

Cream shortening and sugar well. Then add eggs, one at a time. Add flour mixture, alternating with milk. Add vanilla. Pour into greased and floured large tube pan. Bake at 325 degrees for one hour.

### Pickled Beets

1 c. red vinegar  
1 c. sugar  
2 c. water

Boil beets to allow the skins to slide off.

Heat the above ingredients to a boil. Pour over beets in jars. Seal jars. I have used canned beets also with this recipe.

### Sirloin Cubes with Mushrooms and Onions

Cut up sirloin into cubes. Mushrooms can be sliced or left whole. Cut onion up into large pieces. Put into roaster pan. Pour Liquid Smoke and Worcestershire sauce over meat. Salt and pepper to taste. Add a touch of garlic salt. Cover with foil and cook in oven or on the grill. The slower it is cooked the more tender the meat will be.

### Bananas with Sour Cream and Brown Sugar

Slice bananas 3/4 inch thick, make a layer on plate. Spread sour cream over bananas. Sprinkle brown sugar over sour cream. The brown sugar will melt into the sour cream as it sits. Serve with tooth picks.

This is usually prepared around Christmas at the Shaffer house. The recipe is one of the kids' favorites. Young children can help prepare it, and it looks pretty and tastes good.

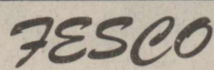

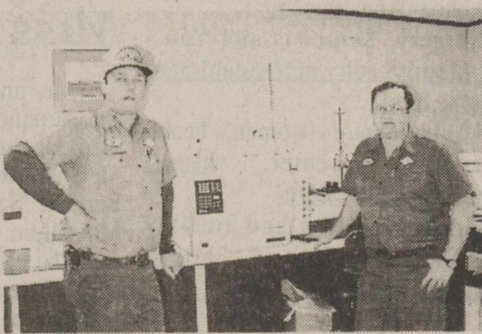

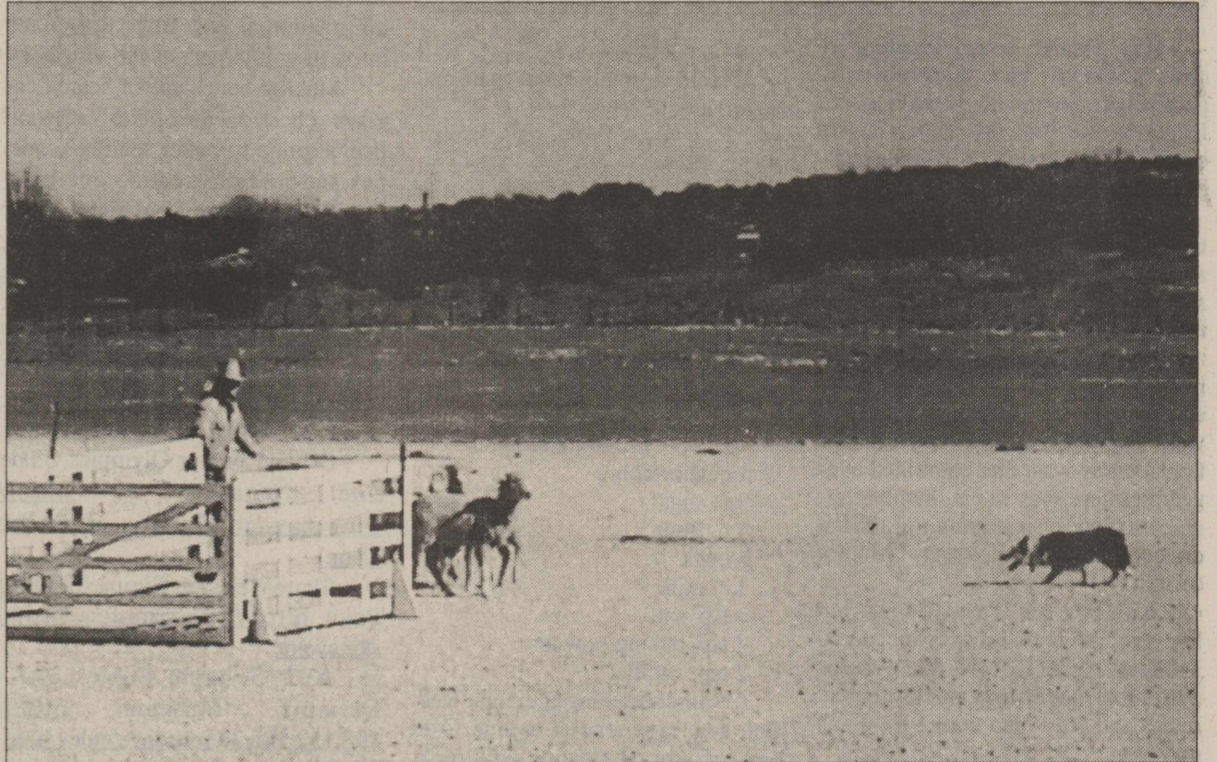
Alice, Bryan and Ozona are the only FESCO offices with laboratories. The Ozona lab has the capability to do extended gas and liquid analysis.

method of selection (random as generated by a computer program), testing procedures to be used, and consequences associated with positive drug tests.

Supt. Larry Taylor explained to the board that the courts have ruled illegal mandatory drug testing for all students; however, since student participation is extracurricular and co-

curricular programs have been ruled by the courts as a student privilege and not a student right, many school districts across the state are looking at testing their students through this method for the purpose of giving them another reason for saying "NO" to drugs.

Taylor went on to say that he had hoped to receive local results on The Community Drug and Alcohol Survey that was given to all students in Ozona Middle School and Ozona High School in November so that the board could review them; however, the results have not yet arrived. He explained that The Community Drug and Alcohol Survey is funded by an agency of the federal government (National Institute on Drug Abuse) and is administered by Colorado State University, who is nationally recognized for its work in the drug and alcohol field. The ultimate goal of The Community Drug and Alcohol Survey is to gather information that will help communities develop programs and activities to help reduce drug use among youth.

The survey contained questions that asked students about their atti-

tudes and activities regarding alcohol and drug use, along with factors that may relate to substance use, such as how they feel about school and the community; their experience with violence, victimization and crime, and their attitudes and those of their friends regarding drug use. Following an informational letter sent to their parents, the students took the survey at school under carefully established conditions to protect their anonymity. The students were not identified individually in any way, and they did not write their names or any other identifying information on the survey.

Following lengthy discussion on this drug testing issue, the trustees asked Superintendent Taylor to send them a copy of the results of the survey as soon as they have been received and to draft a model policy in regard to mandatory drug testing for their review at their February regular meeting, which will be on Wednesday, Feb. 11.

The board members also discussed what could be done to the Ozona Middle School facilities due to the failure of the December bond issue. Supt. Taylor told the members the district possibly had three options: (1)

prioritize repairs needed and do a little at a time; (2) consider a renovation bond issue; or, (3) consider another new construction bond issue. He explained that the district could repair some of the priority items over a period of years; however, the district does not have enough money in its 1997-98 school year maintenance budget to make any significant repair of these items at this time. In the future, raising the local tax rate to support this method of improvement would still subject the district to an approximate state recapture rate of \$30 per \$100. "In other words," he said, "for every \$1 we need, we have to raise \$1.30 so that we can give the state its share."

"A renovation bond or a new construction bond is not subject to state recapture of funds and would certainly be better for the district and its citizens than improving the middle school facility a little bit at a time," he added. The trustees also discussed the additional need to make Davidson Gymnasium handicapped accessible, and at the conclusion of these discussions, they voted to authorize Larry Harvey, district architect, to conduct a feasibility study for the purpose of renovating Ozona Middle School and its gymnasium and for the purpose of renovating Davidson Gym for Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) handicapped accessibility.

During the meeting the board approved: the taking of bids for new roofs to be installed on school housing; the appointment of trustee David Bean to the Crockett County Appraisal District; and, school board policy manual updates at first reading. Supt. Taylor presented certificates of appreciation to the individual members in recognition of School Board Appreciation Month and for their dedicated leadership in public education and continuing service to the children of the Ozona Community.

Toward the end of the meeting the board went into executive session for the purpose of reviewing all district personnel and their 1997-98 school year assignments, considering employment of a special education teacher for Ozona High School, and discussion and approval of the superintendent's contract.

Emerging out of executive session, the trustees voted to adopt the employment of Kevin Roberts as a school special education teacher. Mr. Roberts will take the place of Jim Cox who will teach in a self-contained special education unit located at Ozona Intermediate School. The members also voted to extend the present contract of Supt. Larry Taylor by one year.

The meeting was adjourned following board reaffirmation to set the date and time for their February regular meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 11, at 7 p.m. and to set the date and time for a special meeting of the board on Wednesday, Feb. 17 at 6:30 p.m. The purpose of the special meeting will be to conduct a review by the board's policy manual with Kathy London, representative from the Texas Association of School Boards.

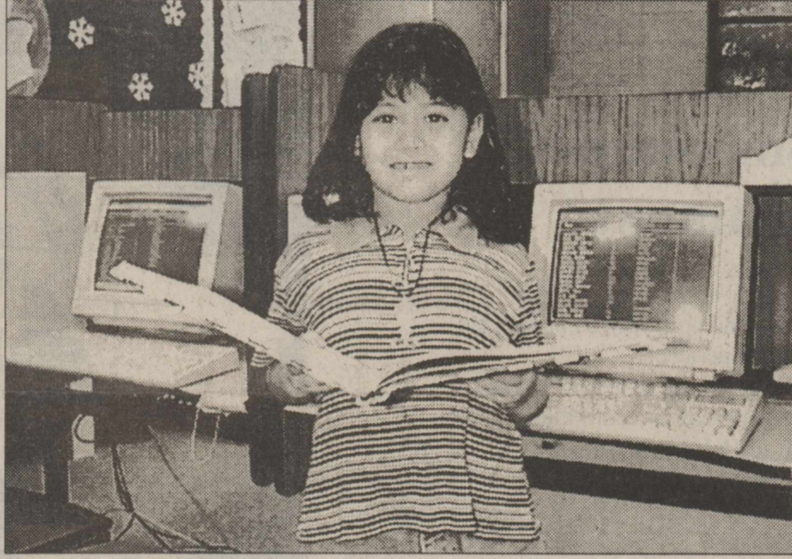
### Rio Grande Electric Co-Op to sponsor student for trip to Washington, D.C.

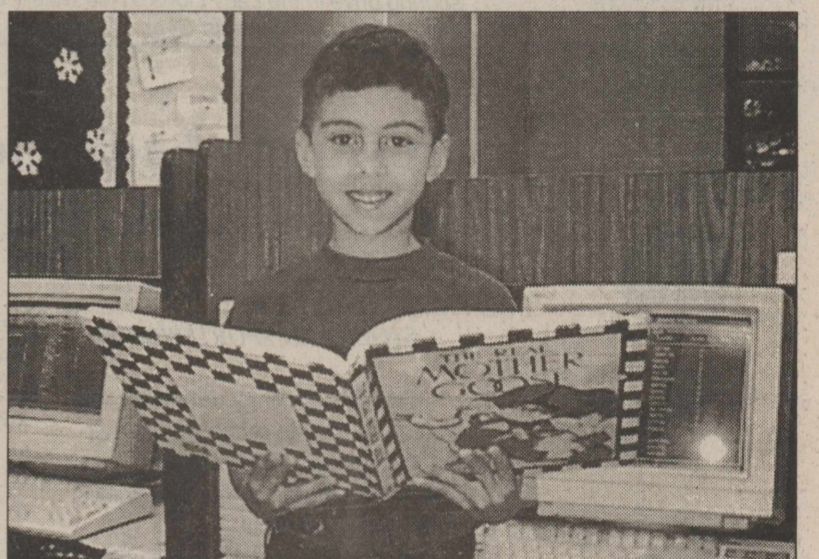

### State permitted student transfers

Parents of students at Ozona High School received a state required letter earlier this month telling them their children are eligible to request a transfer to another school. OHS is among 575 public schools in the state rated low performing or having 50 percent or more of their students fail the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills tests in two of the last three years.

The OHS rating was based on the fact that the 1993-94 school year drop-outs were above the state standard of 6 percent, and 50 percent or more of

the school's 1993-94 and 1994-95 school year sophomores did not pass the TAAS Exit-Level mathematics test.

Although parents may request another school district to accept their child as a tuition-free transfer student under the Public Education Grant program. Schools are not required to accept students asking to transfer under the program. Transportation is not provided to the new campus or district.

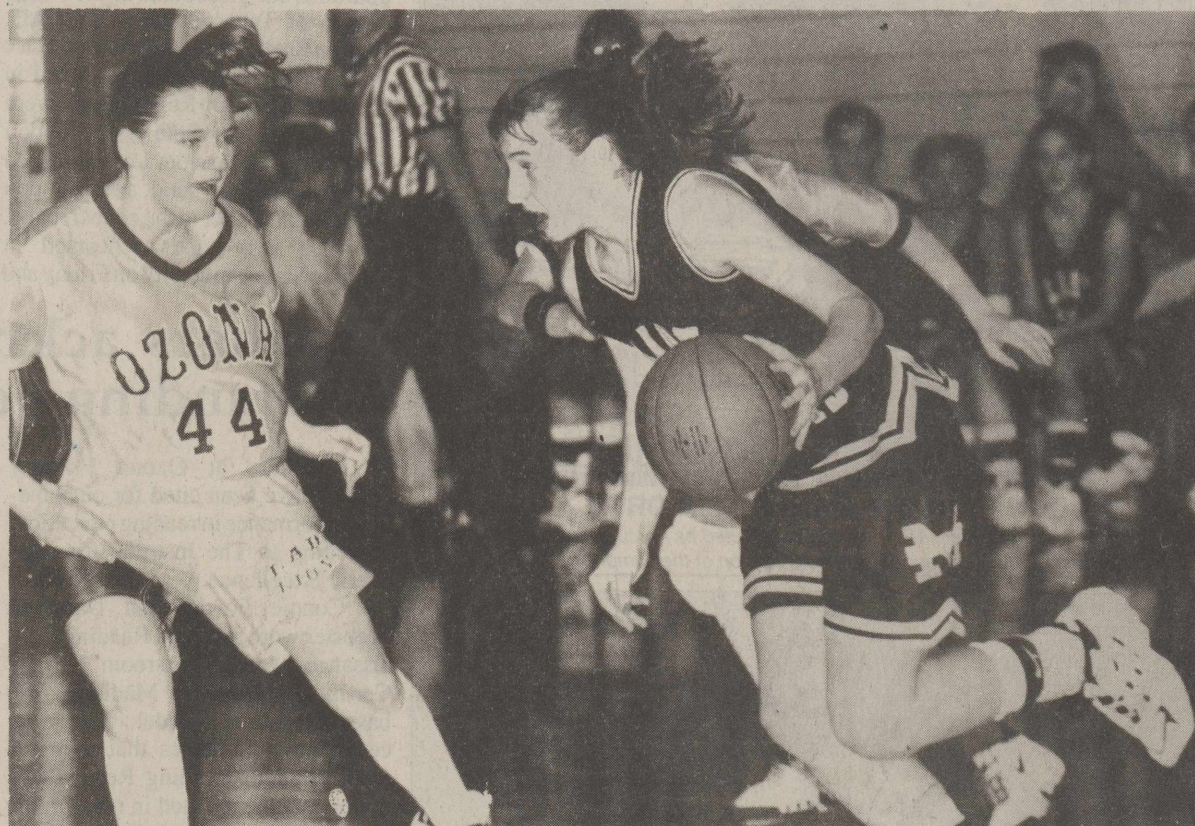

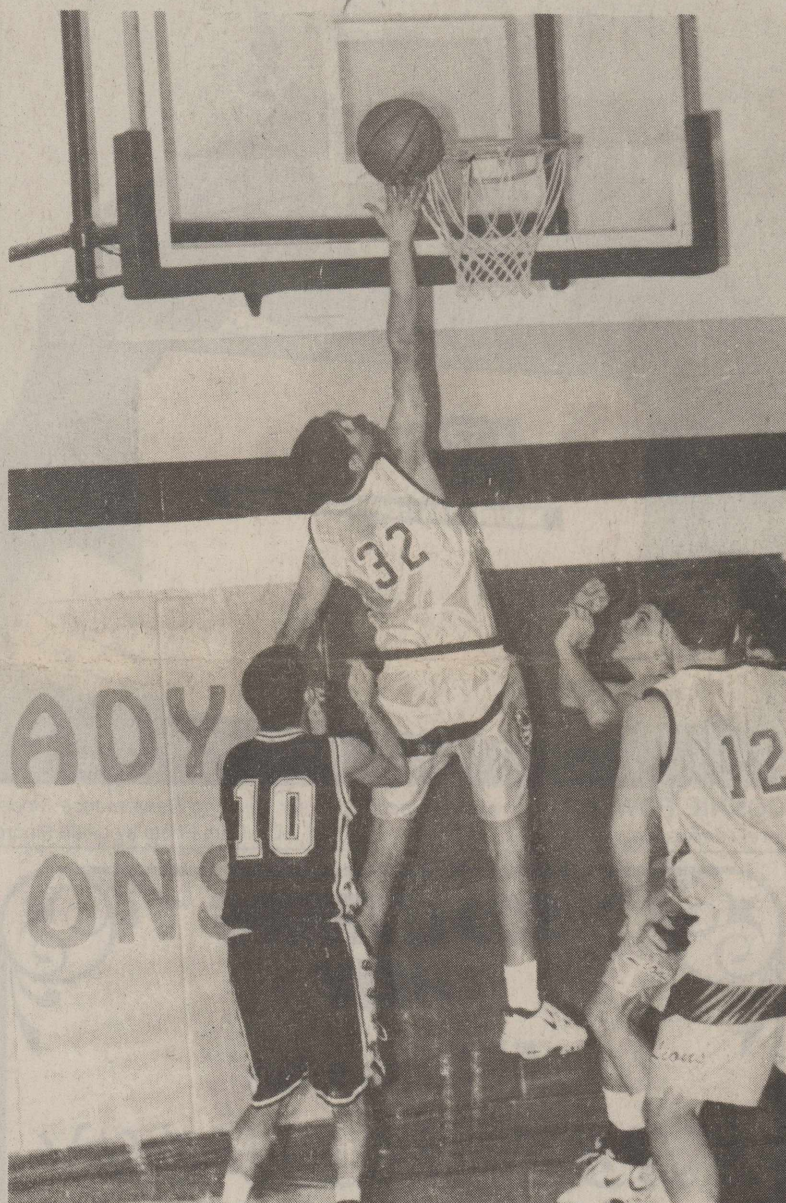

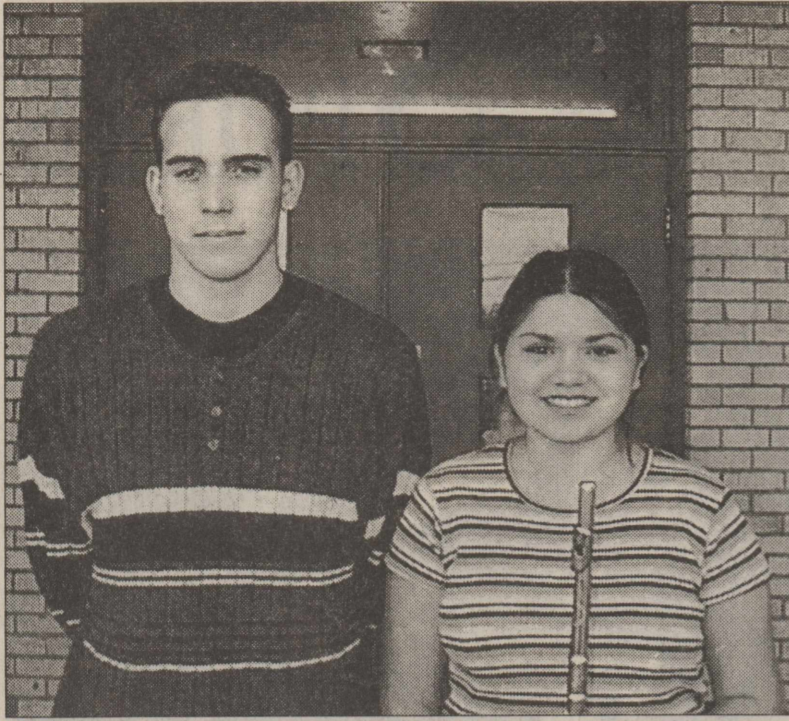

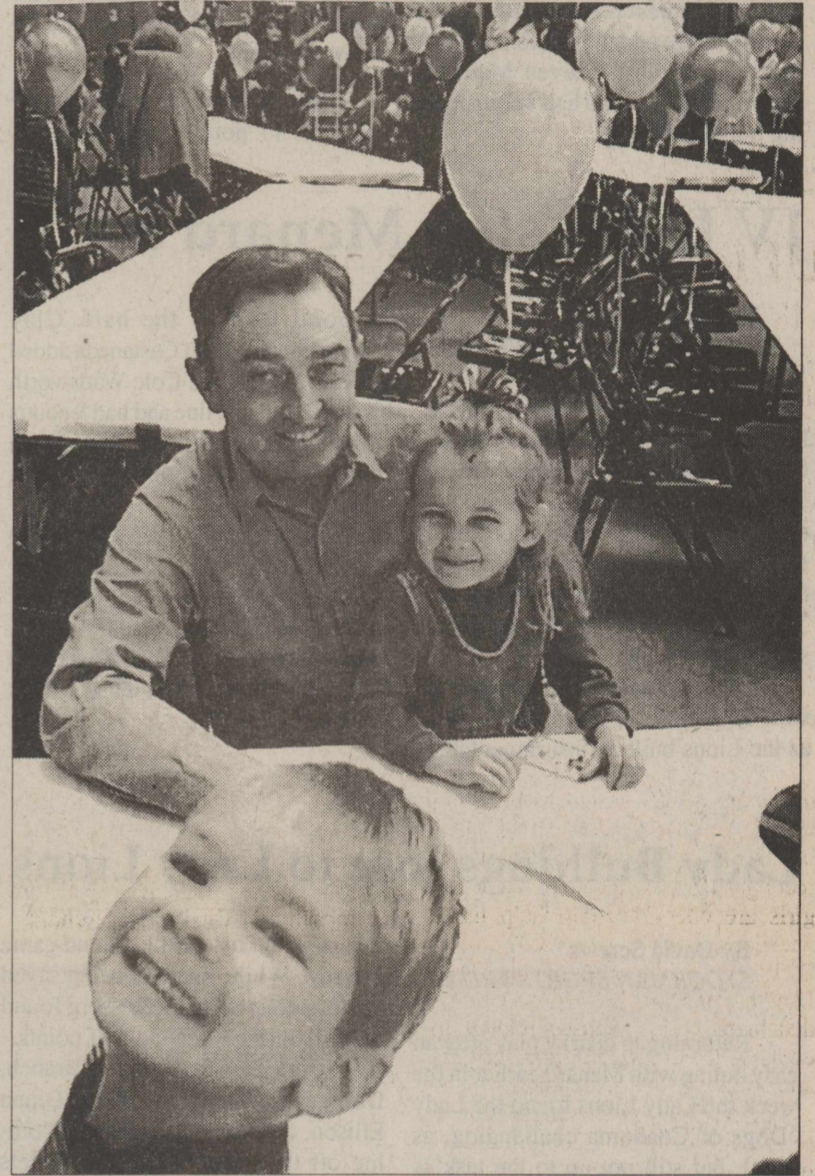

## Rep. Henry Bonilla visits OHS seniors

U.S. Congressman Henry Bonilla talked with OHS seniors about their futures and spoke a bit about his work at a recent assembly.

Using his own life as an example, he told the youths they can go a long way by figuring out what they want to do and going for it.

Growing up in the south side of San Antonio meant no special privileges, Bonilla said. The son of a 30-year employee at a military base, and whose grandmother was a maid, said he accomplished what he did by sticking to the task at hand, going to school, staying away from drugs, figuring out how to go to college and working hard.

Rep. Bonilla had a successful 15-year career in television news before running for congress. In 1992 when he first ran for election he was told he couldn't do that. "Just point me in the right direction," Bonilla said. He gave the campaign his best and defeated the incumbent.

"If you will go out and work and believe you can do it, you can do it," Bonilla said of goals. "In this country we have freedoms and opportunities. We have a society that encourages you to go out and pursue your dream. The only thing that can stop you from accomplishing those dreams is yourself."

At the same time, the congressman acknowledged that disappointments and failures do happen. "Pick yourself up and move forward again," he said. "The successful person is the one who tries over and over."

Bonilla is a member of the Appropriations Committee which handles funding for the entire federal government. He concentrates on the Defense Department, health care benefits, the Agriculture Department and the Labor, Health and Human Services Committee.

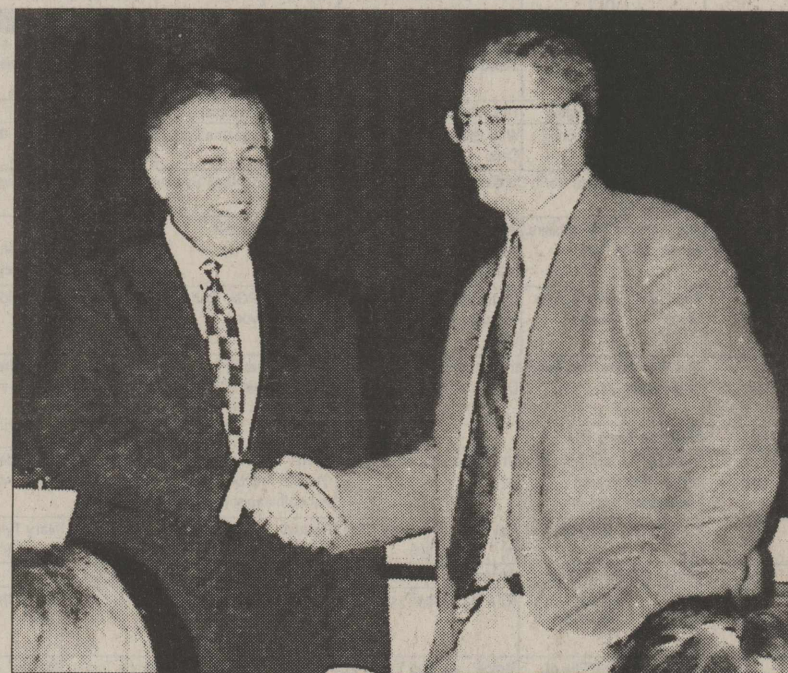
During a portion of the assembly open for questions, Bonilla emphasized that he is "absolutely opposed" to the Heritage River Initiative which he believes is a threat to individual property rights.
