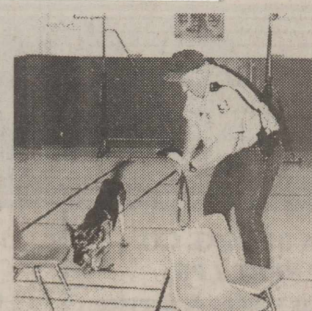

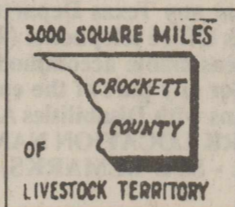

Tarr, McWilliams named to All-West Texas Team

From the first tip-off of their schoolgirl careers, Amber Tarr and Amber McWilliams were meant to play basketball together on the floors of dozens of gymnasiums across the state of Texas, from Anthony to Austin and Lubbock to points south. As teammates, they have endured all the highs and lows of four brilliant seasons of high school basketball, from a pair of state titles to the heartbreaking loss in Abilene and the final game in Austin this year.

In the early years, they fully expected for themselves, along with Autumn McWilliams and Bobbie Bryson, to play every single game together. That idealistic dream crashed around them when Bryson missed the final two seasons while battling cancer. The realities of our fragile existence on this earth began to test the resilience of these two seniors, but both of them stood up to the challenges.

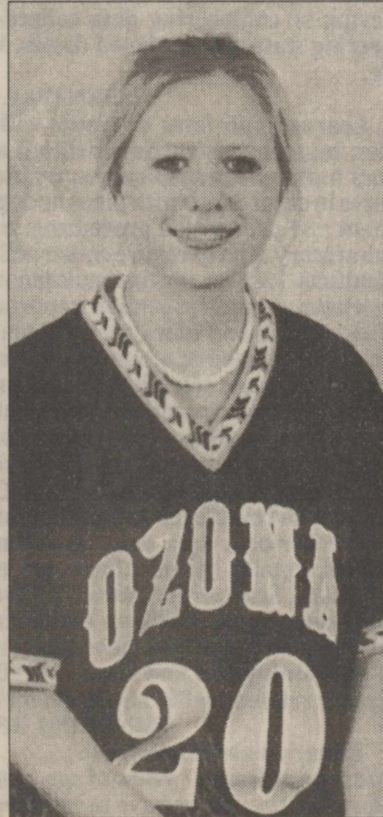
It is only fitting that both Ambers were named to the All-West Texas 2A team last week. Tarr was the catalyst on a team that closed out the year with 38 victories. She averaged 17.7 points

per game but would likely have scored more on squads that played less as a team than the Lady Lions. She also averaged nine rebounds per game. Again, on teams with less talent, she probably would have rebounded in double figures.

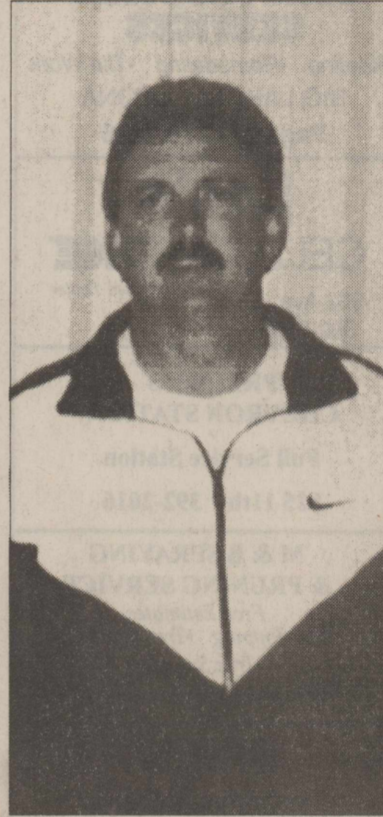
McWilliams became noted for her shots from the three-point range, nailing 43 of those in the 40 game season, including three in the state championship game. Her proficiency at hitting the threes overshadowed her other contributions to the game, tenacious defense and an uncanny awareness of the position of every player on the floor. She became extremely adept at dishing the ball down low to the open Lady under the net.

Tarr was named the Most Valuable Player on the 2A squad as well as on the All-West Texas Super Team. It was her fourth time to make the squad and the third time as the Most Valuable Player. Dickie Faught joins Tarr as the pick for the coach's spot on the Super Team.

Tarr and McWilliams were both true leaders on the court, their knowledge of the game surpassing that of the average high school player and even many coaches.

Tank airborne in explosion

Ozona Fire Department received a call at 8:55 a.m. Thursday, March 19, of a tank explosion. Two trucks were dispatched down Couch Lane on Pandale Road to a Devon Energy Corporation location.

Preliminary investigation of the explosion by Fire Marshal Steve Kenley showed that Marcos Sandate, a Devon Energy employee, was standing by the wellhead, opening a valve to allow fluid to flow into the tank. Apparently static electricity caused an explosion, propelling Sandate onto the hood of his company vehicle.

The bottom of the tank was blown 30 feet to the east. Assorted pipe fittings were scattered around the location by the blast.

Sandate was transported to the Family Health Clinic of Ozona by company vehicle and was transferred to Shannon Hospital by ambulance. He was kept overnight for observation and released.

Marie Gerlach likes helping people. The vivacious 85-year-old crochets lap robes which she gives to friends in Crockett County Care Center. She also makes bibs for care center residents.

Gardening is also a favorite activity. She brought some plants from her home state of Michigan to see if they will grow in West Texas. Known as weeds in Michigan, the beautiful blooming plants grow mostly where you don't want them to, she says. Her yard is filled with a variety of flowering plants, cacti and a pecan tree which yielded 72 pecans last year. The deer and rabbits manage to munch on some things, including last year's tomato crop.

Near the front door is a well-protected flower bed with a planting of columbines. Her husband gave her bouquets of the flowers before and after their marriage, and it was his suggestion that they plant the flowers at their Ozona home.

The Gerlachs, Marie and her late husband, Arnie, moved to Ozona in 1989. They had been winter Ozonans since 1981, spending time here with daughter and son-in-law, Mary and Len Hillman. The Gerlachs finally moved here for good because Ozona was better for their health, "Arnie was allergic to the snow shovel," she said with a grin. The three other Gerlach daughters remain in Michigan.

When the children were growing up, the family lived on a farm where they had a big garden and plenty of eggs. "My kids were raised on milk and eggs," she said.

Daughter Mary's favorite cookie is her mother's sugar cookie. Marie says it is simple. Just make any sugar cookie recipe, add cinnamon and put a pecan on top. You may also add 1/2 cup of chopped pecans to the recipe if you like.

Another recipe Marie shares is

her mother's chop suey. "Everyone was having chop suey, so Mother decided that she was going to have American chop suey," recalls Marie. She prepared her version and announced to everyone at the family gathering where it was first served, "This is American chop suey." The recipe, which is about 40 years old, follows.

American Chop Suey

- 1/4 c. uncooked rice
 - 3 potatoes, cubed
 - 2 onions, diced
 - 3 T fat
 - 1/2 lb. chopped beef
 - 2 c. tomatoes (or tomato soup)
 - Salt and pepper to taste.
- Boil rice 10 minutes. Add potatoes and boil until potatoes are cooked, then drain. Melt fat and brown meat and onions. Mix tomatoes with rice and meat mixtures. Pour into a greased baking dish. Bake on high (450 degrees) about 15 minutes or until slightly brown. Serves 4.

Marie's Corn, Rice and Cheese Casserole

- 2 c. whole kernel corn (1 1/2 oz. can, drained)
 - 2 c. cooked rice
 - 1 c. shredded sharp cheddar cheese (4 oz.)
 - 1 tsp. dried dill or basil
 - 4 eggs
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - Dash pepper
 - 1 & 1/2 c. milk
- In 8-inch square baking dish (greased), stir together corn, rice, cheese and dill or basil. In bowl beat eggs, salt, pepper and milk until blended. Pour over corn mixture. Bake in pre-heated oven at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Serve hot or cold. Serves 4.

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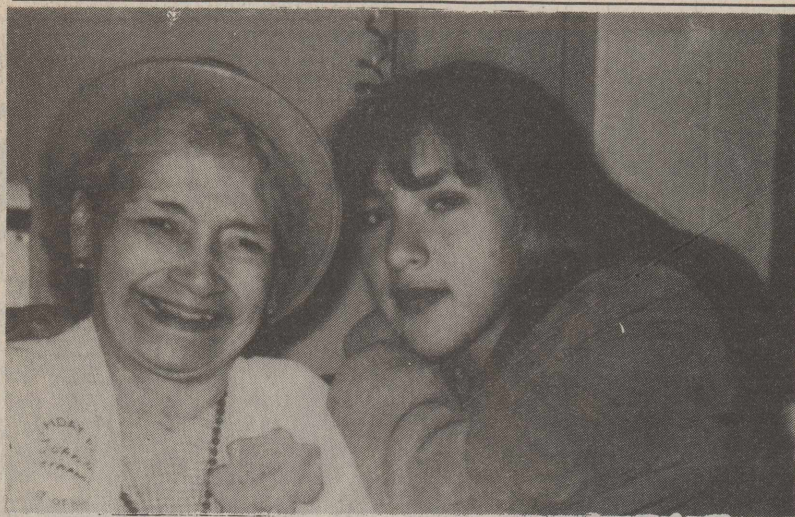

Why Is Church Membership Important

There are two things that must be understood in order to appreciate the Biblical meaning of church membership. 1. What is the church? 2. What does it mean to be a member of the church?

What is the church? The Greek word for "church" is "ekklesia", which means "the called out ones". The word carries with it the idea of being called out of the world into the church. According to I Corinthians 12:13, all believers have been baptized into the body of Christ. However, the New Testament in several places indicates that the local church kept track of its members and knew who was a part of their company (Acts 4:23). The membership of a community of believers was so clearly defined that it was known who belonged and who withdrew from the group (I John 2:19).

The church is not an organization, but a living organism that is alive and constantly growing. I Corinthians

12:20 states that the church is a body made up of many members. I Corinthians 12:25-27 suggests that the members of the body of Christ are inter-related and inter-dependent. They are to support one another and care for one another. Ephesians 4:13-16 talks about the fact that as the body matures it grows and builds itself up in love as each part does its work.

The church is not an institution, but a witnessing agent that pricks the conscience of the world. As it faithfully witnesses to the truth about Christ, men and women become aware of their need of a savior. Paul talked about our conversation being full of grace and seasoned with salt, so we would know how to answer everyone (Colossians 4:6). The Apostle warned that even when men do not want to hear, we must correct, rebuke and encourage with great patience. (II Timothy 4:23).

What does it mean to be a member of the church? The New Testament word that best describes church membership is "fellowship" or "koinonia", which means partnership or participation (Acts 2:42). The key word for "fellowship" is participa-

tion. So often we only use the word "fellowship" to refer to a church dinner or visiting after a service. The Biblical idea of the word means full participation in the family of God or the body of Christ.

When Paul wrote to the Colossian believers, he told them to live and worship together in harmony and peace. The Apostle told the Hebrew believers not to forsake the assembling of themselves together. They needed to come together on a regular basis to encourage, strengthen and build one another up in the faith (Hebrews 10:25). Church membership means participation in the witnessing life of the church. Jesus promised that every believer would receive power to be His witnesses (Acts 1:8).

Making a commitment to become a member of a local church means much more than adding your name to a membership roll. It means taking the responsibilities that come along with the privileges, being blessed and blessing others, and saying "no" to the world's standard of commitment and "yes" to God's. These are good reasons to encourage people to join the local church.

And they heard a loud voice, from heaven saying to them, "Come up here" and they ascended to heaven in a cloud, and their enemies saw them.

Revelation 11:12

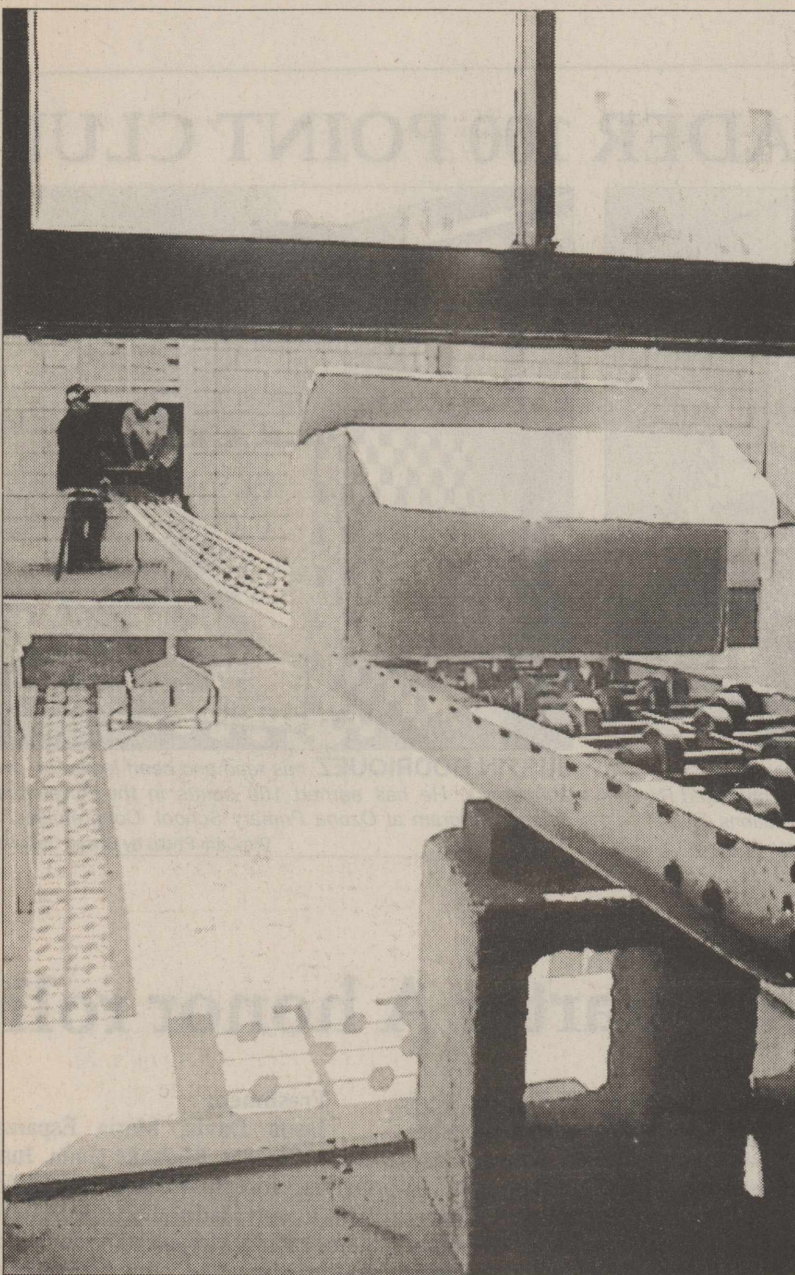

Texas Tomorrow Fund enrollment deadline

AUSTIN - State Comptroller John Sharp reminds Texas parents and grandparents of the quickly-approaching Wednesday, April 1, deadline for enrolling their children and grandchildren in the *Texas Tomorrow Fund*.

"Now that the annual enrollment period deadline is just two weeks away, we're reminding folks that it's time to mail in their applications. They should be postmarked by April 1," Sharp said.

Sharp said that over the past two years, the *Texas Tomorrow Fund* has received the majority of contract applications during the final weeks of the enrollment period.

"Families who order applications from our 1-800-445-GRAD hotline should be able to mail them back by the April 1 deadline," Sharp said.

Sharp said that application forms are also available on line, through the comptroller's home page on the World Wide Web at <http://www.window.state.tx.us>.

The *Texas Tomorrow Fund*, first proposed by Sharp in 1994 and approved by state lawmakers in 1995, allows families to lock in the costs of their children's future college tuition and required fees for about what they would pay today. The constitutionally-protected fund pays tuition and required fees at any public university or college in Texas. A private school plan is also offered.

Sharp noted that if a student opts to attend an accredited college or university in another state, the program will transfer the benefits and pay either the average Texas tuition of the plan selected or the actual out-of-state tuition and required fees, whichever is less, to the other school.

Refunds may be provided if a child decides not to go to college, dies or becomes disabled, or receives a scholarship for tuition.

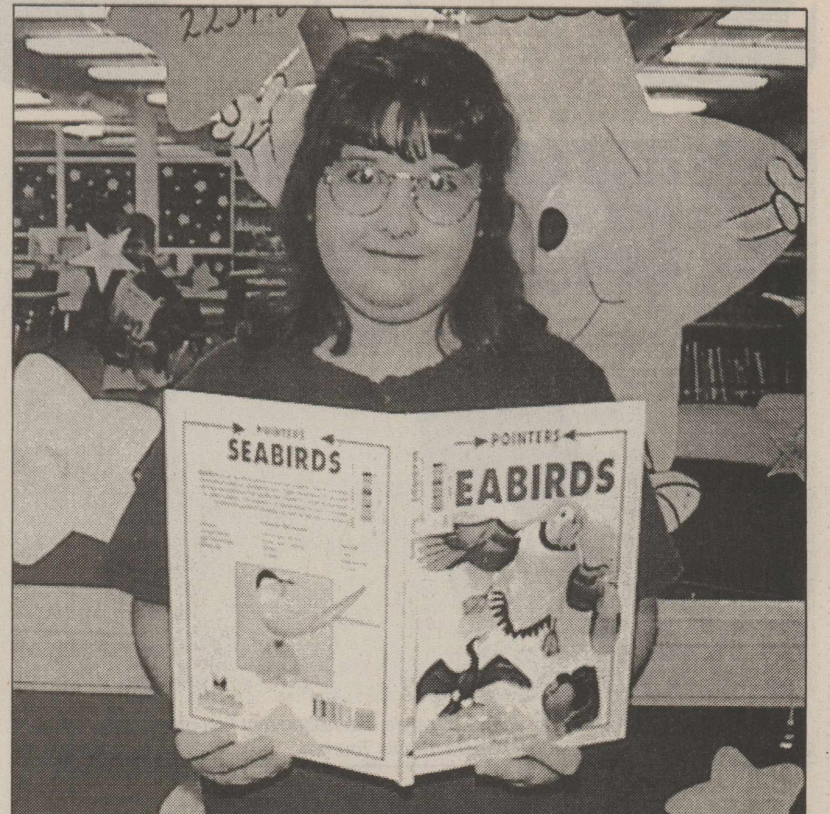

Hearing loss affects entire family

HOUSTON - Spouses and children of people with profound hearing loss are often "the forgotten family". Often, someone who is losing their hearing is so focused on their own fears and anxieties that they are unaware of how their hearing loss is affecting their loved ones.

"Family members might feel helpless and sometimes even hopeless

in not being able to communicate satisfactorily with the hard-of-hearing person," said Bob Beck, associate professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

For the family member who has hearing loss, Beck says it's important not to use the hearing loss as an excuse to "tune out", but rather stay involved with the family, career and friends.

"There is a vast difference between existing and living. Living demands participation," Beck said. "As difficult as the hearing loss might be to cope with, it must not result in a diminished life."

Beck says that if frustrations are not expressed, they might be turned inward and place additional stresses on the relationship.

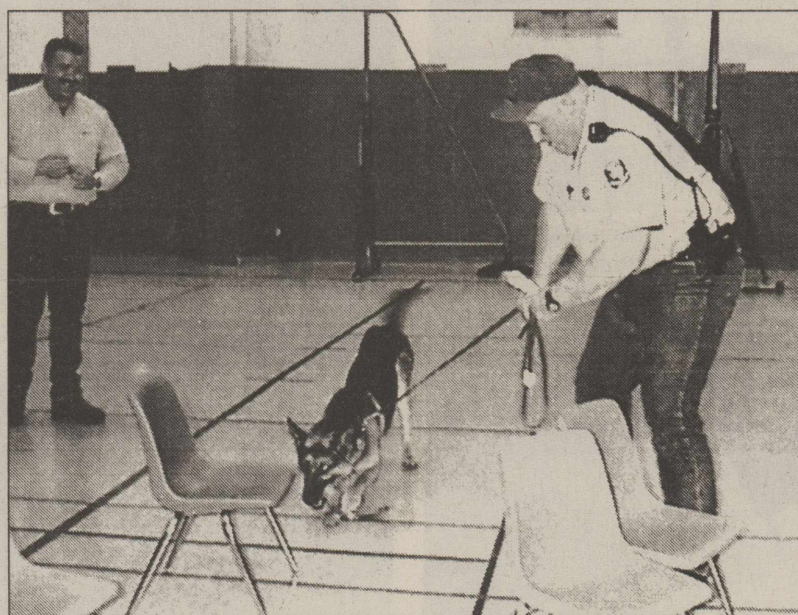

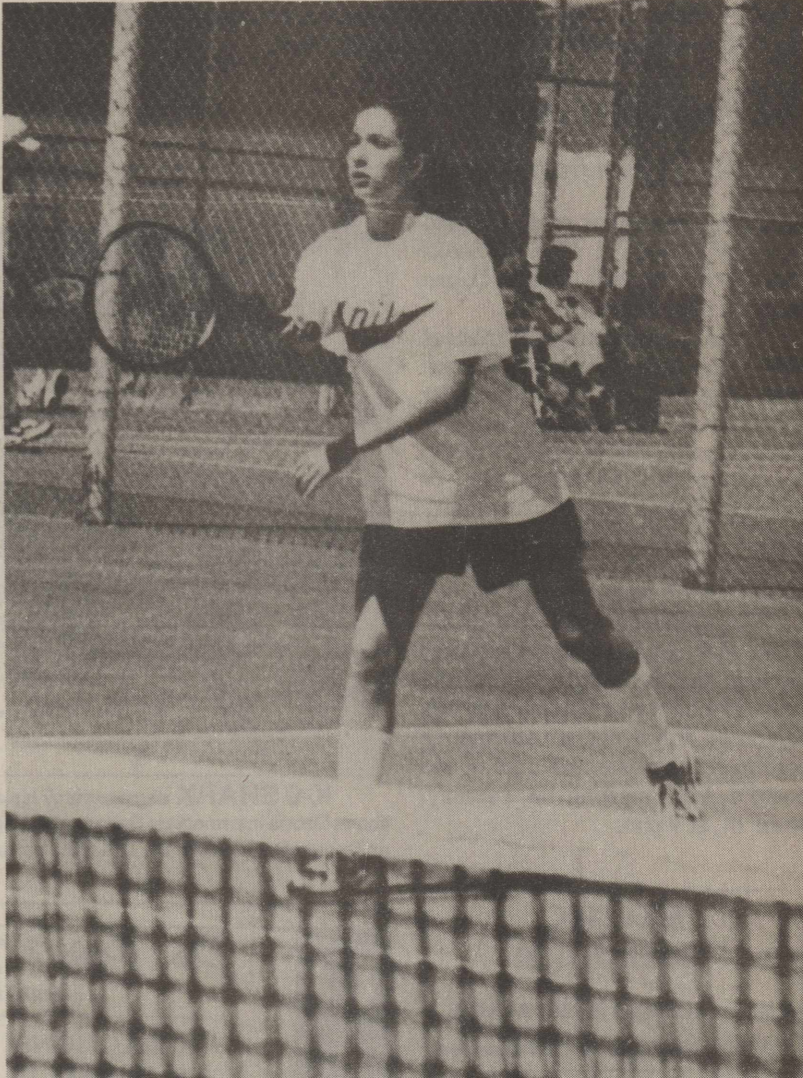

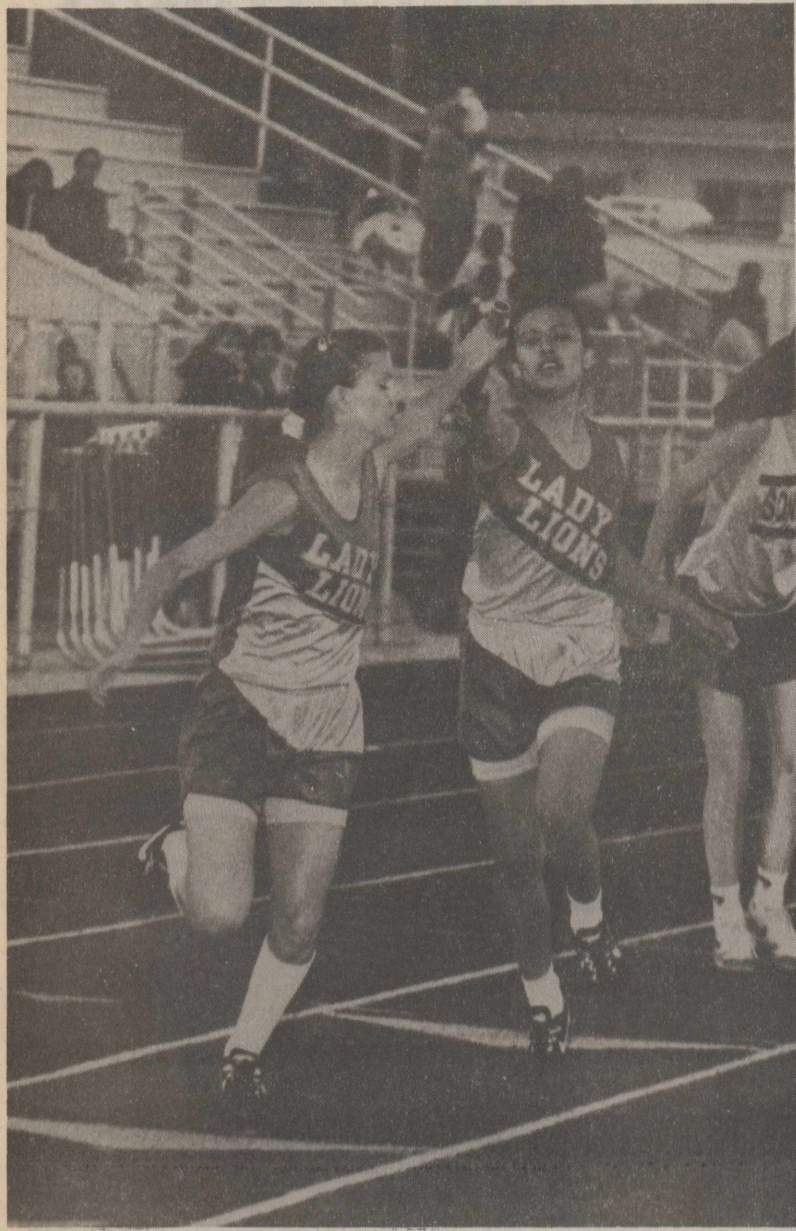

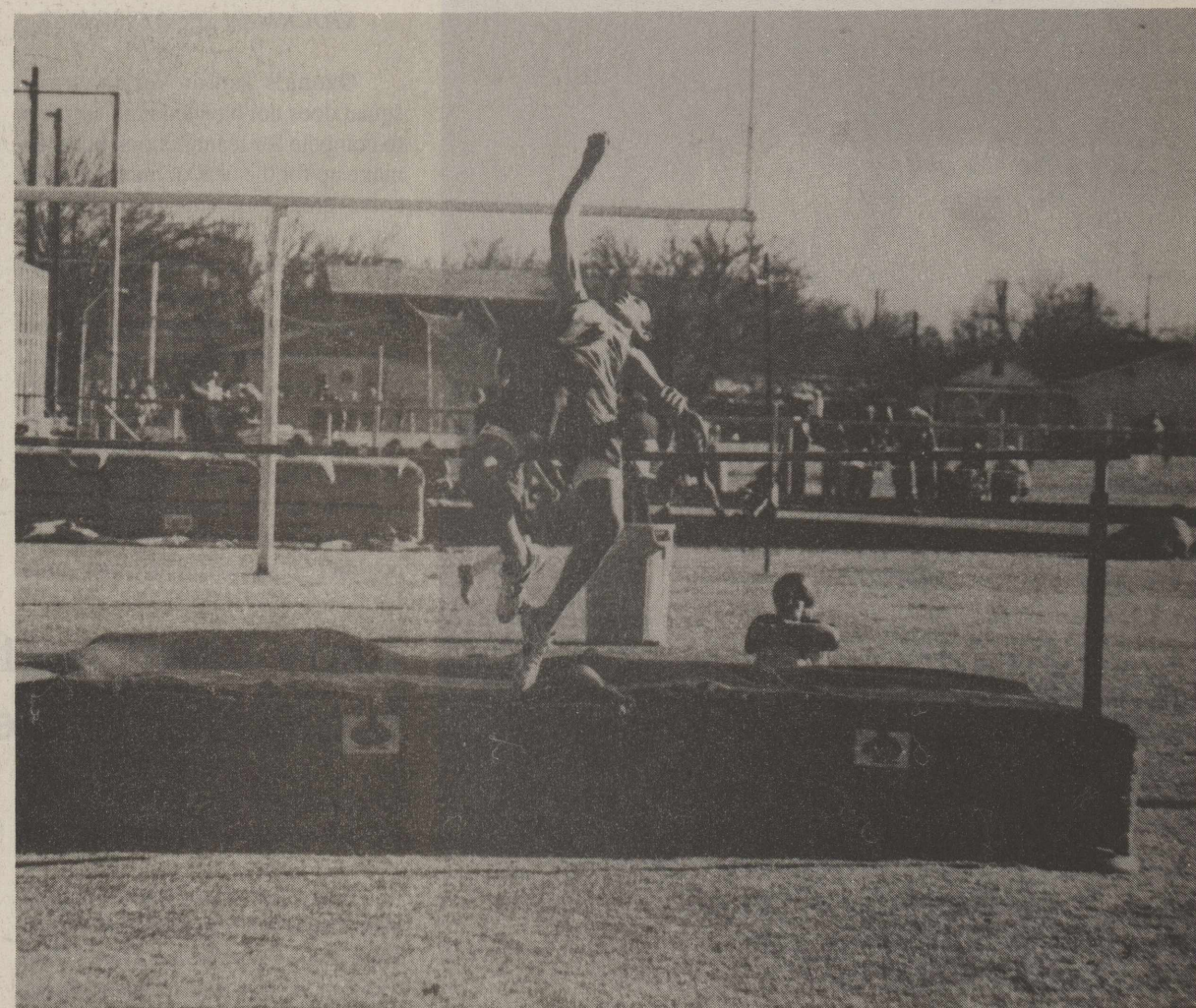

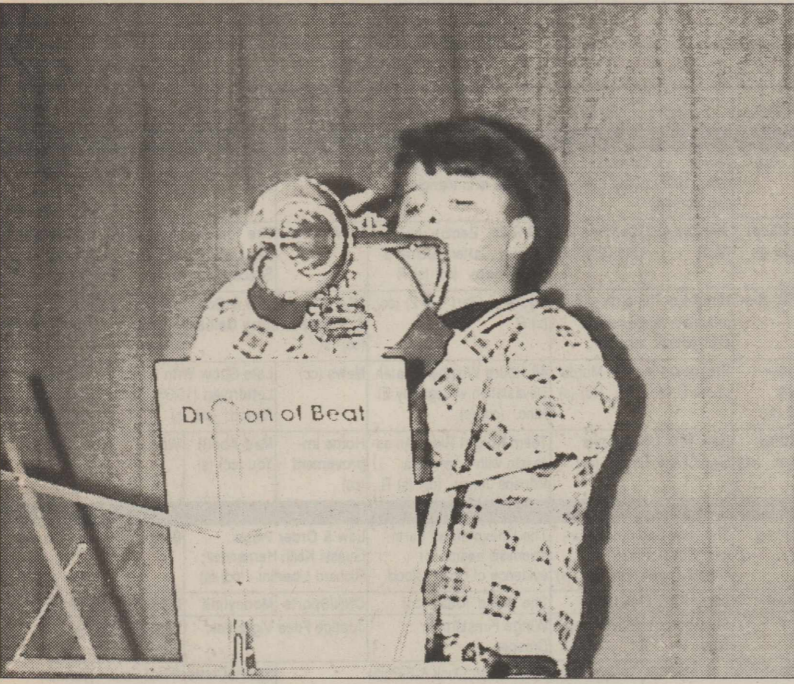

Expanded Judge Roy Bean Visitor Center dedicated

The Texas Department of Transportation celebrates the renovation of the historic Judge Roy Bean Visitor Center, located on U. S. 90 West at State Loop 25 in Langtry, with an official ribbon cutting earlier this month.

The information center, which provides professional travel counseling to visitors, was established in 1968. In 1994, the Val Verde Historical Commission donated the Lillie Langtry Opera House to TxDOT. The Opera House has been historically restored and integrated into the visitor center.

The center features Judge Roy Bean's rustic saloon, courtroom, billiard hall and opera house, preserving the historic site where he ruled with a high-handed brand of homespun law in the 1880s. An extensive cactus garden displays native Southwest flora and interpretive signing. As part of the center renovation the path through the cactus garden has been redesigned for ADA accessibility.

The Judge Roy Bean Visitor Center is open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, except for New Year's, Easter, Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve Day and Christmas.

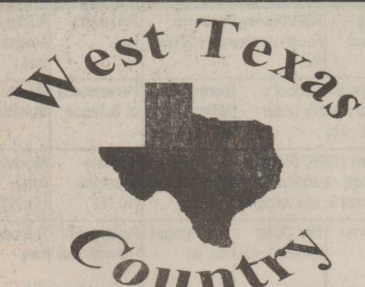
