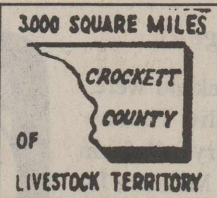

## Firemen honor Minnie McCaleb

A surprise party at her home Nov. 28 was the only way firemen and other friends were able to say their thanks to Minnie McCaleb. Not one to accept being fussed over, Mrs. McCaleb had vetoed a retirement party earlier. She retired in October after 25 years as a station attendant for the Ozona Fire Department.

Mrs. McCaleb and her late husband, L. A. McCaleb, were already in their 60's when they began their jobs as station attendants Aug. 26, 1973, and he continued until his death at age 84 Aug. 17 of 1993.

Mr. McCaleb first came from Oklahoma to Ozona in 1932 and worked on the Perner and Couch ranches. After a time, he returned to

Oklahoma and married Minnie Adams in 1936 in Paul's Valley, OK. They moved to Ozona the following month. He worked as manager of the West Texas Utilities ice house, then later in the butane delivery business and for Maness Texaco before becoming a fire station attendant.

Recognition as Unsung Heroes was given to the couple by Ozona Chamber of Commerce at the annual awards banquet in January of 1990. They were commended for their dedication to the job, which included maintaining the fire trucks, answering phones and radios and dispatching the firefighters. A family atmosphere at the fire station included waiting up for all the firemen to re-

turn from a run, no matter how long it took.

The McCalebs were honored by the county in October of 1990 for 17 years of faithful service as fire station attendants.

Among those attending the surprise come and go party were several retired firemen, including former fire chief Dorris Haire of Grape Creek. Also present were her daughter and son-in-law, Wanda and Otto Knudson of Victoria, and son and daughter-in-law, Don and Pat McCaleb of Bellaire and their children, Sherry, Kim and Donnie and their families.

A gift of an air conditioner for her home was presented on behalf of the firemen by Bob Falkner, current fire chief.

## Elena Ybarra dies in wreck

An accident Saturday, Nov. 28, took the life of Elena Ybarra and left her husband, Armando, in critical condition. Mrs. Ybarra was a passenger in a vehicle driven by her husband near Midland. The 1997 Chevrolet was broadsided by a tractor trailer according to the Midland Department of Public Safety.

The DPS report indicated that Ybarra was driving north on Texas Road 191 about 10:30 p.m. when he failed to stop at a stop sign. The car was hit by a 1985 Peterbuilt tractor

trailer which was being driven north on Farm-to-market Road 1788 by Michael Elliott of Bryan.

Mr. Ybarra, his sister, Delia Hernandez of Ozona, and his grandson, Jacob Tambunga, also of Ozona, were taken to Midland Memorial Hospital. Jacob was released from the hospital Monday.

The driver of the truck was not injured.

Funeral service for Mrs. Ybarra will be held at 3 p.m. Dec. 2 at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church.

## Porter advances to State Food Show

On Saturday, Nov. 14, twelve Crockett County 4-H members participated in the District VI 4-H Food Show in Fort Stockton. In order to be eligible to compete at the district food show, each of these participants had to place first in the Crockett County 4-H Food Show. Judging in both the county and district food shows takes place in three different age divisions - junior, intermediate and senior. Only senior age 4-H members may compete at the state level. In order to be eligible to participate in the State 4-H Food Show, a senior member must place first in the district competition.

In the senior divisions (grades 9-12), Ty Porter placed first in breads and cereals, Amanda Carson placed second in fruits and vegetables, Ashlee Worley competed in main dish and Amanda Hignight competed in nutritious snacks.

Ty Porter, who placed first in his category, will compete in the state 4-H Food Show during State 4-H Roundup next June in College Station.

## West Texas Boys' Ranch Hunt

The 16th annual deer hunt got under way during the second weekend of the season as eight boys from West Texas Boys' Ranch converged on the Gene and Betty Perry Ranch east of Ozona Friday evening.

As the boys arrived, each one was assigned a guide for the weekend, and a good meal was provided. Soon after, it was off to the bunkhouse to arrange their beds for the little sleep they will be getting this Friday night.

The boys were quickly asking questions about what they could shoot and when. It was decided one buck and one doe could be taken by each boy; then the conversation started about how big a buck each boy wanted to bring in.

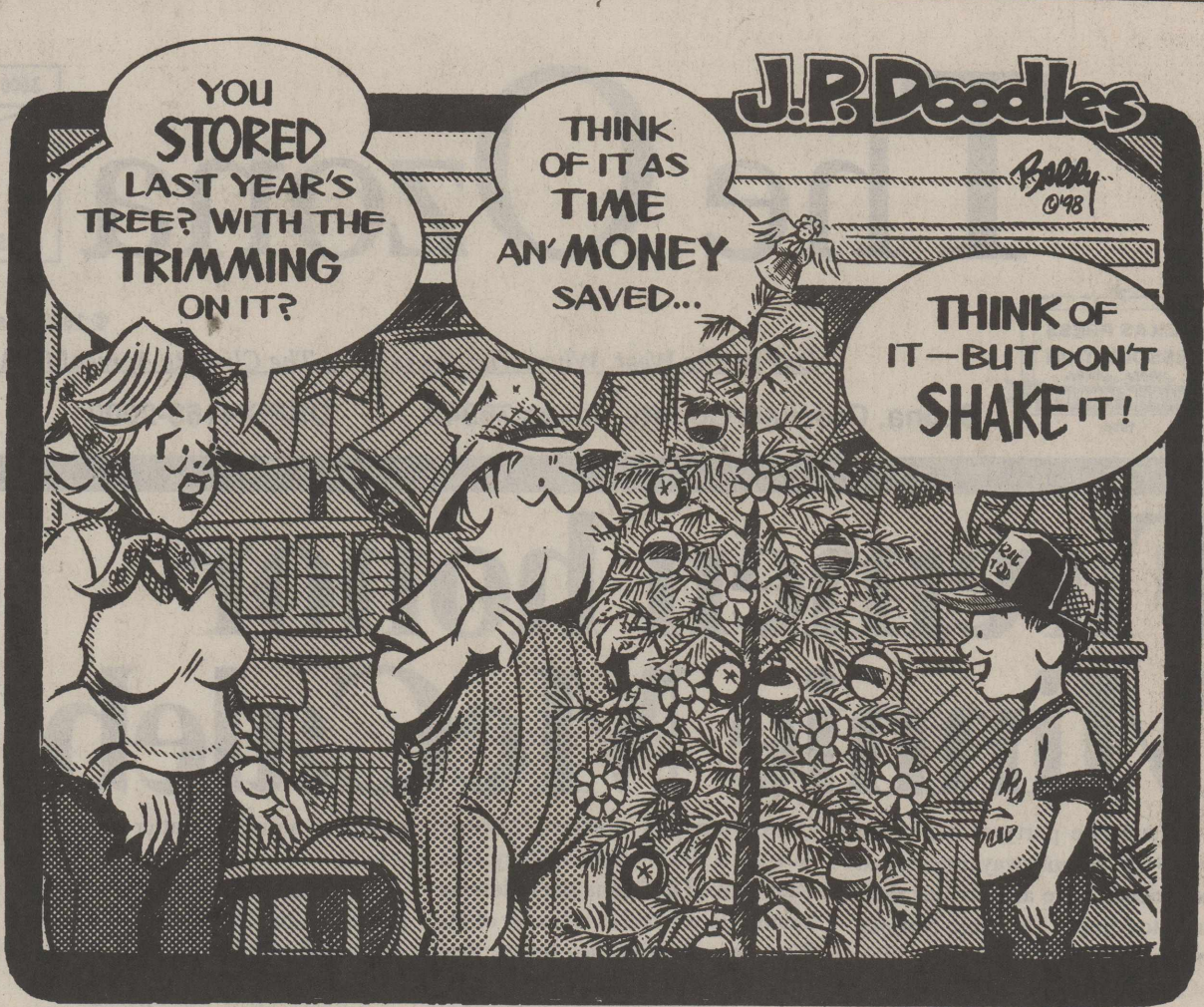

### State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN** — A multistate inquiry into alleged mistreatment of consumers by one of the nation's largest sellers of credit insurance ended Nov. 23 with the company's agreement to pay fines totaling \$12 million.

American Bankers Insurance Group agreed without admitting any violations of state insurance laws, and 24 states will share the fine.

Of the fines, Texas is to receive nearly \$597,580. The money will go into the state's general revenue fund, but there also will be restitution to consumers, Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer said last week.

American Bankers underwrites credit insurance plans, such as those sold by department store

chains to their credit card customers and others who finance purchases of appliances and other big-ticket items.

American Bankers allegedly charged more than authorized rates, failed to make required refunds to consumers and underpaid claims filed by its customers.

**Warning Signs to Be Installed**  
Americans are learning the hard way that it is illegal to carry firearms and ammunition across the border into Mexico.

On the heels of a recent increase in travelers serving jail time for such offenses, the Texas Department of Transportation announced plans to spend \$600,000 to install signs along the border warning travelers about carrying firearms into Mexico.

More than 50 new signs will be posted at border crossings from El Paso to Brownsville.

**Holiday Road Safety Urged**  
Before Thanksgiving, the Department of Public Safety beefed up surveillance on Texas highways in anticipation of heavy traffic.

DPS Director Dudley Thomas stressed the need for heightened traffic safety.

"The Thanksgiving holiday is one of the busiest travel times of the year. Motorists headed to see family and friends will have plenty of company on the roads and it's

imperative they give themselves every chance of arriving safely at their destination," he said.

Last year, Thanksgiving was the single-most deadly holiday period in Texas, resulting in 48 fatal crashes and 55 deaths. Forty-four percent of those who died were killed in alcohol-related crashes and 45 percent of those who died were not wearing safety belts.

**HIV Name Reporting to Begin**  
Texas doctors, hospitals and medical providers will be required to report the names of Texans who test positive for the AIDS virus beginning Jan. 1.

Anonymous testing for the human immunodeficiency virus, which causes AIDS, still will be available, but the new rules, adopted unanimously Nov. 20 by the state Board of Health, will require medical providers to send to the state, the names, if they know them, of any patients found to have HIV.

Confidentiality of the tests has not been compromised since anonymous testing began several years ago, according to the Board of Health.

**Other Highlights**  
■ Texas Education Commissioner Mike Moses said last week he wants to raise the percentage of students who must pass the

Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exam for a campus to get a rating of acceptable. He also said he wants to add the Algebra I end-of-course exam into the accountability system.

■ Texas Parks and Wildlife Department says the number of boating-related deaths in the state has dropped from 66 in 1997 to 44 this year. The agency attributed the decrease in deaths to new, tougher boating regulations.

■ The Travis County medical examiner last week ruled alcohol poisoning caused the death of University of Texas fraternity member Jack Ivey Jr., a 23-year-old junior from Plano. The university is investigating.

■ Robert E. Sovil Jr. of Georgetown pleaded no contest last week to misdemeanor charges of possession of a gambling device and gambling promotion in the state's first successful prosecution of eight-liner gambling machines.

Cook of the Week Grace Arredondo is photographed with her constant companion of two years, the feeding tube mechanism which has kept her alive. In November of 1996, Grace became ill and had surgery the following month for an aneurysm that necessitated the removal of her stomach, and part of the small intestines. She has been unable to eat or drink since that time.

"I always wanted to be thin, but not like this," said Grace.

Last week, on Nov. 24, Grace underwent surgery to enable her to eat again. Word was received Monday that she is being allowed to have soft foods such as Jello.

"Dr. Karman Weatherby is a great doctor. I wouldn't be here without him," praises Grace.

"It's been hard," she said describing Loneliness because she couldn't go out was one of the factors.

"I do all my housework; I just have to drag my machine along with me," she said.

"God's helped me this far; He's brought me this far."

Originally from Rocksprings, Grace and her family lived in Oklahoma before coming to Ozona almost 11 years ago.

The children, Natalie, Maribel, Joey, Romie and Gabriel, have worried about their mother during her illness, helping as much as they could.

"Last year they worried about me cooking Thanksgiving dinner, but I did," Grace said. Even though she has been unable to eat, she has continued to enjoy cooking for the family when her health allowed.

She is excited about the prospect of becoming a grandmother next March and again in April. Daughters Natalie and Maribel are both expecting, and Grace has plans to make quilts for both new babies as well as baby sitting in the future.

Grace also likes to embroider; she was busy completing dresser scarves before her return to the hospital last week. She also enjoys reading and collecting recipes.

Many dishes made from her collection of recipes are served at a long dining table with benches made by Joey in wood shop at OHS. He also built a matching microwave table, and Maribel built a china cabinet for Grace in wood shop. Not to be outdone, Natalie made a bookshelf for their home.

A favorite main dish of all the Arredondo children is Lasagna Ole from Ozona Woman's League's Diamonds in the Desert cookbook.

**Lasagne Ole**  
3/4 c. Monterey Jack cheese, grated  
1 2/3 c. Parmesan cheese, grated  
2 lbs. hamburger  
1 onion, chopped  
1 10-oz. can tomatoes  
1 8-oz. can tomato sauce  
1 10-oz. can Rotel tomatoes  
2 c. sour cream  
1 pkg. taco seasoning  
Flour tortillas  
Saute onions and meat. Drain and add taco seasoning, tomatoes and tomato sauce. Layer tortillas, meat, sour cream and cheeses twice in a 9x13x2-inch baking dish. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes.

**Cheese Soup**  
Saute in 1/2 stick butter or margarine:  
2 shredded carrots  
2 stalks celery, chopped  
2 green onions, chopped  
Add:  
4 cans cream of potato soup  
2 cans chicken broth  
1 lb. grated cheddar  
1 lb. or 10 oz. Velveeta with jalapenos  
After cooking 30 minutes or so and stirring frequently, add 3 T sour cream.

A similar recipe from Nancy Vannoy which makes a smaller amount uses 3 green onions instead of two, 3 cans of potato soup instead

will leave her position open. Nancy Hale volunteered to take over as treasurer.

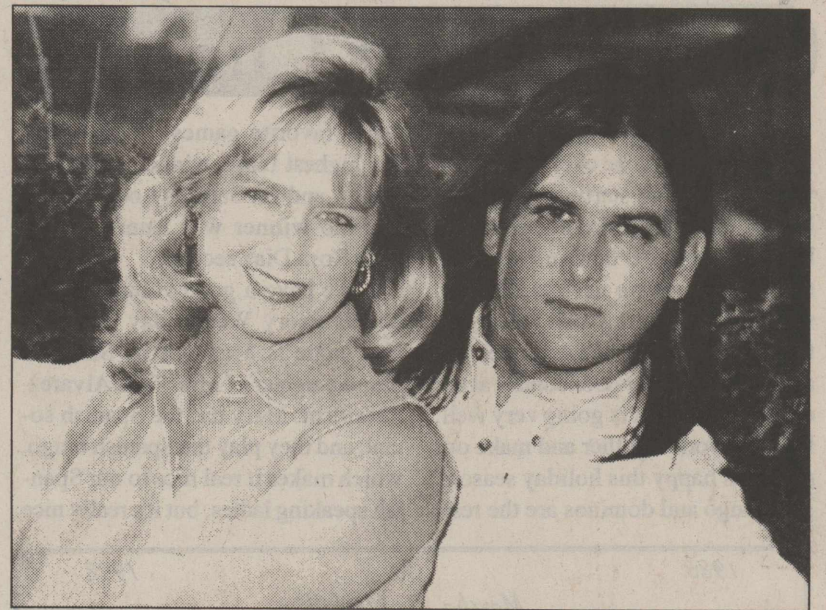

Eugene "B.E." Green and Kitty Elizabeth Francis Green.

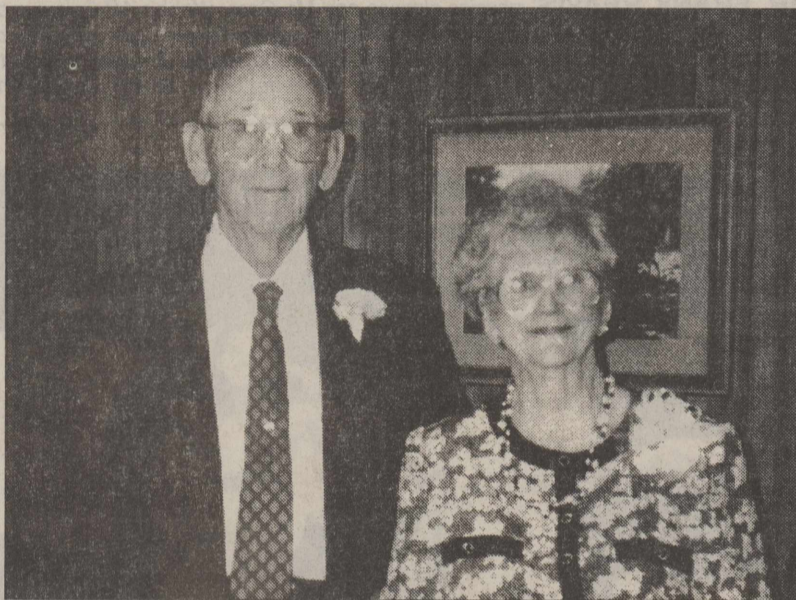
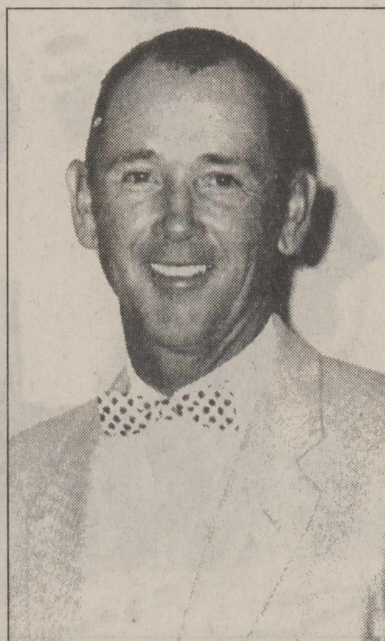
June and Dub married on her birthday, Sept. 29, 1938, in Lynn County, Tahoka, Texas. At the time

## Negotiating can help stepfamilies cope with holidays-new traditions

Holidays can give stepfamilies a chance to start new traditions.

"It's unrealistic for newly formed stepfamilies and their relatives to expect the stepfamily to function as a typical nuclear family and to carry on the same holiday traditions," said Dr. James Bray, a psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"They need to realize that the children belong to more than one family, and adjust their holiday routines to accommodate the situation," he said.

Problems can arise when stepfamily members' traditions clash. Everything from how to carve a turkey to how many gifts to buy and when to open them has the potential to start an argument.

"The best way to minimize conflict is to discuss expectations before the holidays and then negotiate and compromise," said Bray, director of the Department of Family and Community Medicine's Family Counseling Clinic and Family Psychology Programs at Baylor.

If one family is used to opening presents on Christmas Eve and the other family has always waited until Christmas morning, the stepfamily can compromise by opening a few gifts on Christmas Eve and saving the rest for Christmas Day.

"It's important that the stepfamily develop new rituals for celebrating holiday traditions because it gives

them a sense of identity," Bray said. He cautions new stepparents against making dramatic changes too soon in the way the stepfamily celebrates the holidays. "Over time, the new stepparent's wishes and needs should be considered more strongly," he said. "But the stepparent would be wise to just blend in at first to help minimize the amount of change the kids must cope with during their first year as a stepfamily."

Alternating which family the children will spend a particular holiday with each year is a standard option. When scheduling long-distance travel arrangements, be sure to have contingency plans for weather-related delays and canceled plane flights and bus trips. Bray encourages stepfamilies to be open to creative ideas when trying to resolve holiday-related conflicts, such as not being confined to a particular date for the celebration.

Some stepfamilies plan their Thanksgiving dinner or Christmas celebration for a day other than the actual holiday so that all members of the family can be there.

This arrangement enables children to spend the holiday with one biological parent and celebrate with the other biological parent at another time. "When it goes well," Bray said, "the kids love it because they get to have Christmas more than once a year."

## Treat some injuries with RICE

Egos aren't all that may take a beating in friendly games of pickup basketball and football. Muscles may be strained, and knees and ankles often are injured.

"You want to be the jock you once were, but that's not always realistic," says Dr. Ronald Charles, assistant professor of emergency medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. "To reduce the risk of injury, stretch and warm up before play and try to realize your limitations."

If an injury leaves you unable to walk, in severe pain or with moderate swelling, get to a hospital emergency department for evaluation. Otherwise, Charles says, remember RICE: rest, ice, compression and elevation. If RICE and over-the-counter pain medications don't bring relief, then see your doctor.

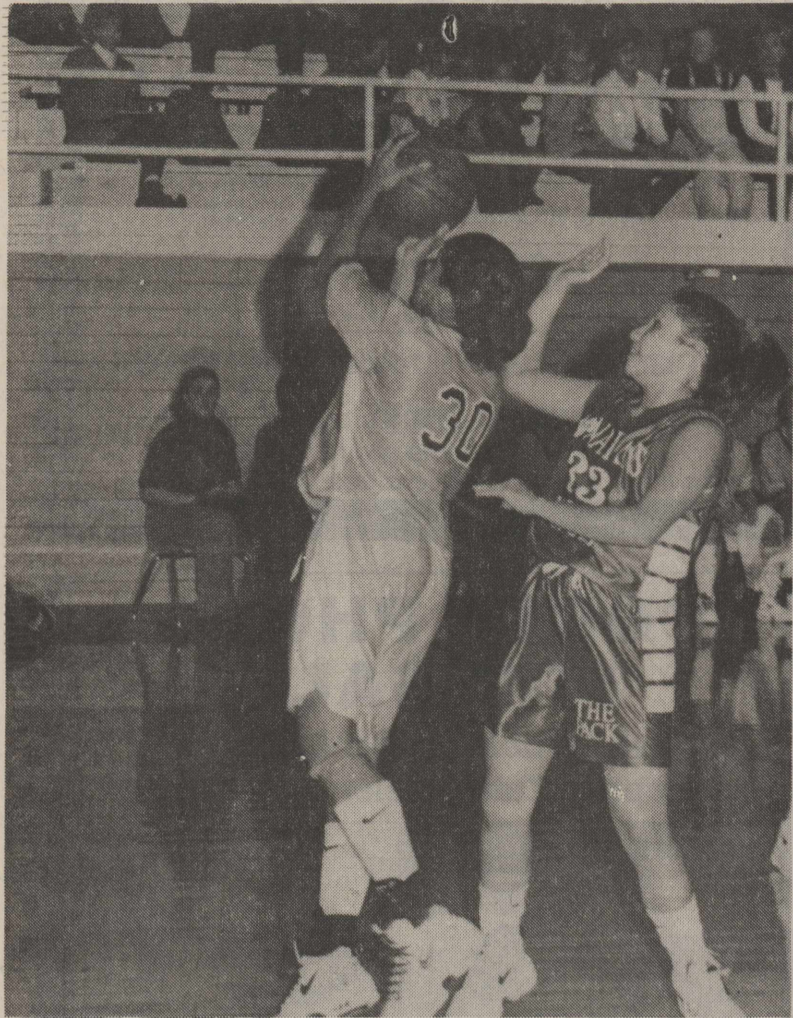

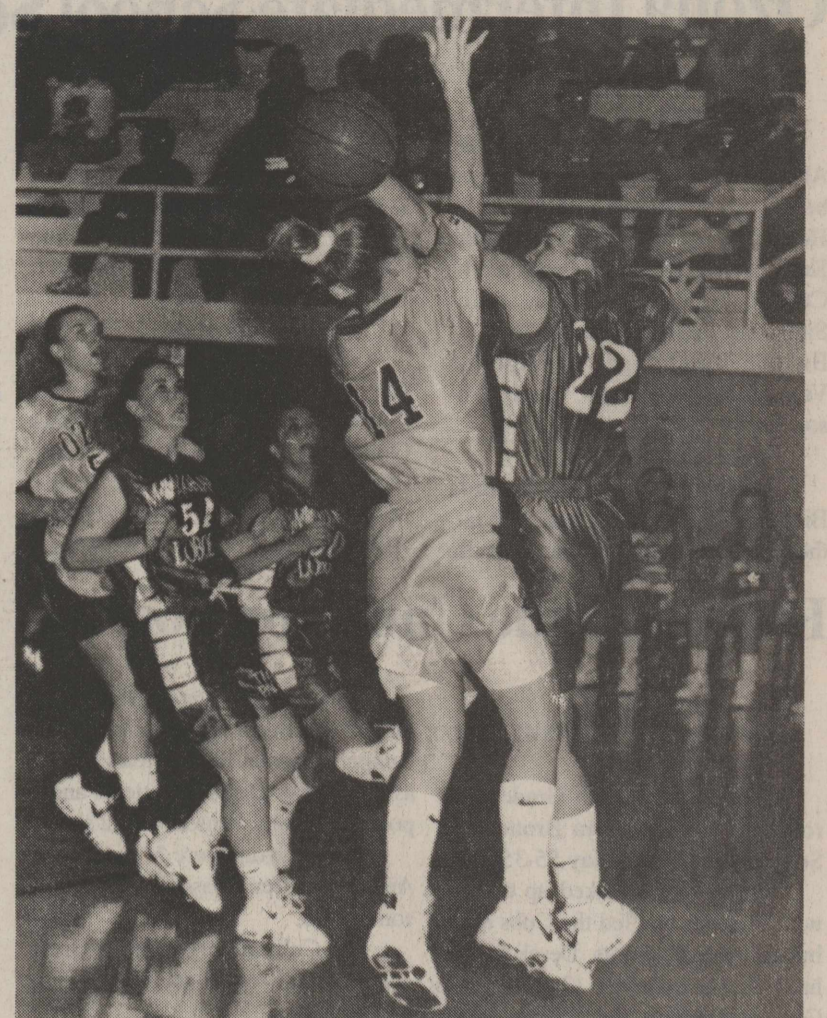

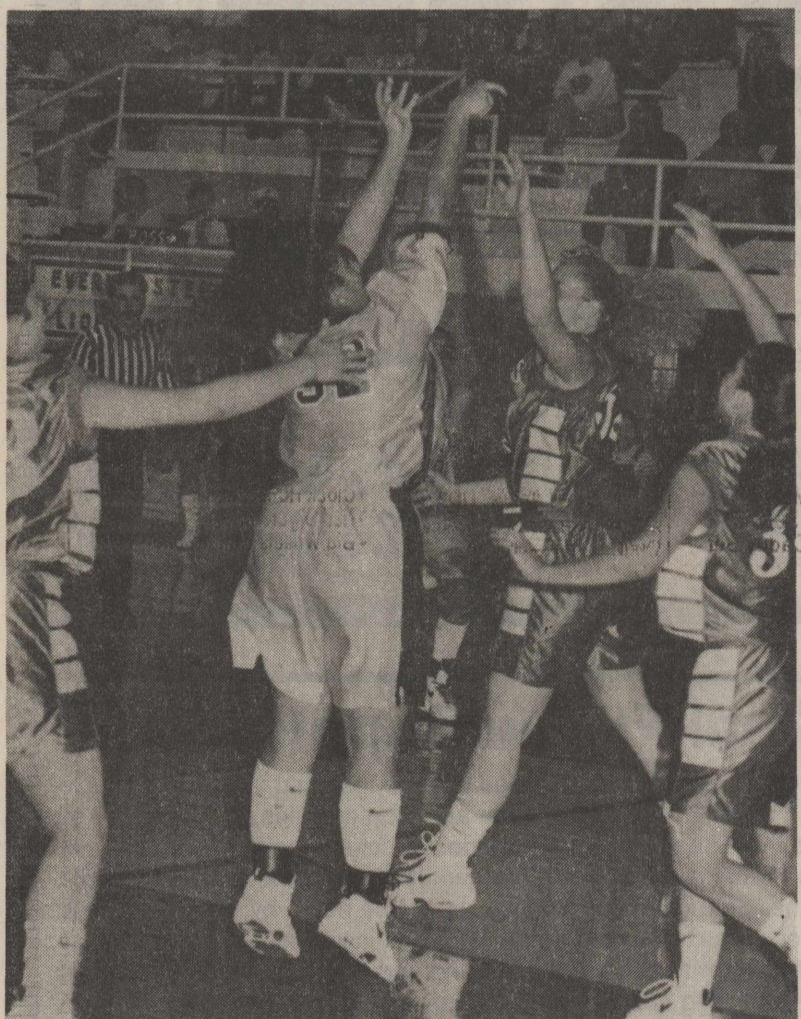
Chad Myers had 14 points as lead scorer, Bobby Cervantez 13 with 14 rebounds, and Peter Rodriguez 10 points.

The Lions increased their victory list to 3-0 for the '98-'99 season.

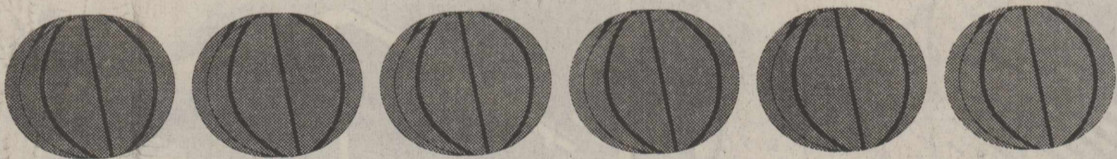

The Lady Lions took on the Monahans Lady Lobos last Tuesday in Davidson Gym, and kept their victory train rolling on down the line.

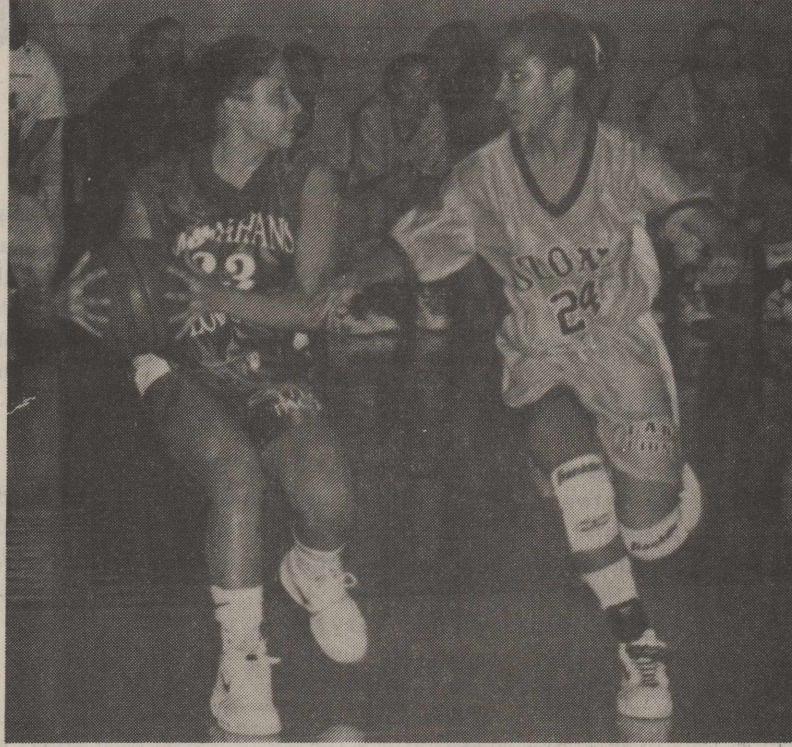
The Ladies found themselves down by one point at the end of the first quarter, however, after a steal and a lay up by Donika Martinez the Ladies went into the locker room up 20-16.

## Holiday Traditions Have Ties to English History

Singing carols, exchanging gifts, enjoying a holiday feast and wishing others good cheer — this is what Christmas is all about to many people. However, some may not know that these traditions are related to English celebrations.

Giving gifts on Christmas is a Victorian custom. Before that time, people exchanged gifts on New Year's Day or Twelfth Night. Beginning in the Victorian era, British children would write letters to Father Christmas and throw them into the fireplace. They believed the draft would carry the letters up the chimney and Father Christmas would be able to read the smoke.

The tradition of hanging stockings from the mantel also comes from this time period. According to legend, Father Christmas once dropped some gold coins while coming down a chimney. Instead of falling through the ash grate, the coins landed in a stocking that had been hung on the mantelpiece to dry. From then on, children have hung out their stockings in hope of finding them filled with gifts.

Singing carols at Christmas also has English origins. In the Middle Ages, groups of singers and musicians, called wassailers, would roam from house to house singing carols to

spread the holiday spirit. Most of the popular carols sung today were written during the Victorian era.

Decorating the home with holly and other greenery is an English winter tradition that began long before the Christian era. Historians believe this was done to lift people's spirits and remind them that spring would soon arrive. Hanging mistletoe has become especially popular today, because people enjoy kissing under the mistletoe. This custom descended from ancient Druid ceremonies.

Drinking wassail is another English custom that continues today. Derived from the Anglo-Saxon phrase "waes hael," meaning "good health," wassail was meant to enhance the merriment of the holiday season. It originally was made of mulled ale, cream, roasted apples, nuts, eggs and spices. Throughout the years, people have developed quite a ceremony for drinking wassail. First, the bowl is carried into the room. Then, people sing a traditional carol about the drink. Finally, the hot beverage is served.

This year, as people decorate their homes and raise their glasses in a toast of good cheer, they can know that they are carrying on centuries-old traditions. SX964379

### Don't spank or scold your kid for bad behavior-Baylor College of Medicine

Parents who are inconsistent about disciplining their children are like slot machines.

"If a child throws temper tantrums and gets what he or she wants every now and then, that intermittent 'payoff' can encourage more tantrums," said Dr. Ernest Fruge, a psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

The same type of intermittent reinforcement motivates parents to keep putting money in slot machines, he said, because they think they may hit the jackpot on the next try. "If a parent's method of disciplining is inconsistent, kids don't know when a misbehavior will pay off, so they keep trying to win by misbehaving," Fruge said.

He advises parents not to spank or scold children for bad behavior.

"By definition, discipline means teaching, not spanking or punishment," said Fruge, assistant professor of family medicine. "The goal should be to teach children the right way to behave."

Spanking can teach kids that "might makes right" and to use physical force to get what they want instead of finding better ways to work out conflict. "The message conveyed to the child is that when people don't do what you want them to, hitting them gets the desired result and is acceptable," Fruge said.

More effective ways to stop undesirable behaviors include taking away privileges and making a child take "time out" to calm down. Parents who use these methods demonstrate by example that nonviolent approaches can be used to solve a problem.

Children's misbehavior usually results from the frustration of not being able to do or have something. Parents should accept the fact there will be times when a child is going to act up and anger them, Fruge said. "Once parents realize their child is entering that zone of misbehavior, they should try to remain calm and decide the lesson they would like to teach their child, such as how to express frustration verbally instead of destroying property or hitting a pet or sibling."

Rehearsing appropriate behavior is another way to teach children what is acceptable. Tell a child who slams doors why this behavior is annoying, and have the child practice opening and closing doors normally.

Fruge said one of the biggest disciplining challenges parents face is to overcome conflicting messages conveyed by other people. The class bully who always gets what he wants by beating up other kids reinforces the idea that violence is rewarding. Many kids avoid reporting the bully to the teacher because they don't want to be called a "tattletale". Fruge said an adult analogy can help children realize there are times when seeking help from authorities is necessary. "If a father were mugged on the street, wouldn't his son want him to report the incident to the police?"

Teaching appropriate behavior with positive reinforcement is the best long-term strategy for preventing misbehavior, he noted. Praise and affection can be strong incentives. ## Air bags pose serious danger to children younger than 12

According to state and national health officials, children younger than 12 are at risk for serious and fatal injuries if they ride in the front seat of a motor vehicle equipped with passenger air bags. Safe Riders, the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) traffic safety program for children, recommends that all children ride buckled up in the back seat when traveling in a motor vehicle.

While it has been widely publicized that air bags can injure infants and unrestrained riders, new government studies also show that air bags have seriously injured and killed children restrained by safety belts in the front seat. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration urges that children younger than 12 ride buckled in the back seat to avoid passenger air bag injuries.

According to NHTSA, passenger air bags have killed 22 people, 21 of them children, since 1993. Air bags were designed as a supplemental restraint to cushion adults in motor-

vehicle crashes. Children's more fragile physiques put them at higher risk for air-bag injuries.

Studies conducted by Children's Medical Center in Washington have found that several children six and younger suffered serious head injuries from passenger air bags, even though they were buckled up or in child safety seats. The National Transportation Safety Board reports that a 3-year-old child was seriously injured by a passenger air bag even though the child was restrained in a booster seat.

"Last spring, Safe Riders provided

life-saving information about air bags and safety seats to more than 1,200 automobile dealers throughout Texas," said Steve Anderson, director of traffic safety programs for the TDH State-wide SAFE KIDS Program. "It is vital that we communicate the new findings about air-bag dangers. Motor-vehicle crashes are the leading cause of injury and death to children. It is urgent that we reduce the risks, including air-bag injury risks, when transporting children," he said.

Statistics show that air bags have saved more than 1,500 lives since their

introduction into motor vehicles in the late 1980s. But air bags are dangerous for small children. NHTSA plans to release detailed information about how to make air-bag use safer by September. However, current recommendations include:

\*Everyone, drivers and passengers, should always use their vehicle safety belts, as required by law.

\*Infants and children should ride in the back seat, properly restrained in a safety belt or child safety seat. The back seat is safer than the front, regardless of whether the vehicle is equipped with air bags.

## Texas Tomorrow Fund's enrollment period open

The Texas Tomorrow Fund, proposed by Comptroller John Sharp and approved by state lawmakers during the 1995 legislative session, allows families to lock in the costs of their children's future college tuition and required fees for about what they would pay today.

The Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board, which Sharp chairs, determined that a prepaid tuition contract paid in a lump sum during the upcoming enrollment period for a Class of 2021 college graduate will cost \$11,609. The new rate, which is about 6.5 percent higher than last year's, reflects the rising costs of tuition and required fees at the state's public four-year universities. The program covers up to 128 academic hours of tuition.

"The Texas Tomorrow Fund is the best education bargain this year and one of the safest investments for your hard-earned money," Sharp said. "And at less than \$100 a month until the child graduates from high school, the parents of a newborn Texan can afford to sign their baby up for four years of tuition and required fees at a public university."

The Texas Tomorrow Fund's fourth annual sign-up period will run through Thursday, February 18, 1999. During the program's first three enrollment periods, nearly 80,000 families took advantage of the pay-now, learn-later program.

"If you're an expectant parent whose baby isn't due until after February 18, 1999, you can still purchase a Texas Tomorrow Fund contract at this year's prices, instead of waiting until the fifth enrollment period," Sharp said.

Among the 1,500 freshman, sophomores, and juniors that are using their contracts to pay for college this year, the top three public universities' campuses are the University of Texas at Austin, Texas A&M University's main campus in College Station, and Texas Tech University in Lubbock. Altogether, nearly half of the 80 institutions of higher education across the state have at least one Texas Tomorrow Fund student on campus.

## Screwworm case confirmed in Edwards County

It took only one tiny fly larvae this fall to shake up West Texas and put ranchers around the state on high alert, watching for flesh-eating screwworm, a pest that has been officially eradicated from the U.S. and Mexico. Still uncertain when or where this pest entered the country, state and federal livestock health officials are urging ranchers and hunters to check animals for maggots that may have burrowed into sores or wounds.

According to the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency, one of nine suspicious maggots submitted to the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) in Ames, IA, was confirmed to be a

screwworm larvae. A rancher near Rocksprings, in West Texas' Edwards County, collected the maggots in late October from an Angora goat that had suffered a shearing wound.

"Ranchers, hunters or anyone handling livestock or wildlife should check animals and pets closely and call us immediately if there are any maggots or larvae in wounds," said Dr. Terry Beals, TAHC executive director and state veterinarian. "A TAHC or USDA field specialist will go to the ranch or hunting lease to pick up the larvae for laboratory submission and gather information for the investigation."

"If we find another screwworm larvae in the state, the USDA's Emer-

gency Services will make sterile screwworm fly drops over the affected area," said Dr. Beals. He explained that sterile screwworms would mate but produce no offspring, thus eradicating the pest. This procedure has been used since the mid-1970s in the successful screwworm eradication programs in the U.S. and Mexico.

"We are collecting preliminary information about airport facilities in the area, storage space and costs, in case another larvae is found. Within 24 hours, the USDA could have sterile screwworms shipped from the plant in Tuxtla Gutierrez, Chiapas, Mexico, the world's only sterile screwworm production facility," he said.

Field staff from the TAHC and USDA have distributed nearly 2,400 screwworm submission kits to veteri-

narians, county agents, livestock markets and feed stores. The kits consist of a cardboard tube containing a test tube filled with a holding solution and small plastic bags for maggot collection. Dr. Beals said maggots can be placed in alcohol in a glass jar, medicine bottle or film canister for safe-keeping until a TAHC or USDA staff member arrives. Animals infested with the larvae should be held in a pen or barn, so they may be inspected.

"Please call the TAHC or USDA immediately if maggots or larvae are detected," said Dr. Beals. "We must act quickly if another screwworm larvae is found to prevent further spread." 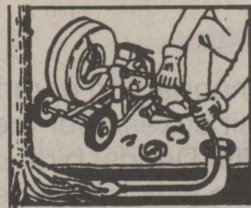

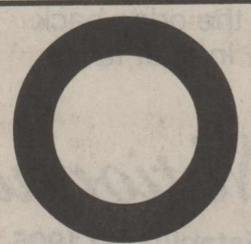

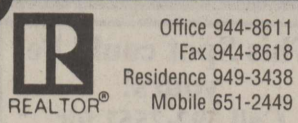
