

Dust collection on high voltage poles caused the problem **Early voting** ends March 10

Early voting in the Democratic and Republican primaries comes to a

close Friday, March 10. As of Tuesday morning, there had been right at 650 to vote Democratic, including mail outs according to Jean Conner, early voting election judge.

Saturday and Sunday's extended hours voting accounted for around 80 of the votes, Mrs. Conner said.

At this point voting is running "a little more than what I've ever had," she said. She expects 850 to 900 early voters and commented, "who knows, there may be more".

Republicans casting their ballots by Tuesday morning numbered six with four more ballots mailed out.

The polls will be open on Election Day, March 14, from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Democratic voting places and election judges are: Pct. 1 - Courthouse, Juanita Delgado; Pct. 2 - Road Department, Donna Sanders; Pct. 3 -Civic Center, Pat Ortiz; Pct. 4 - Primary School, Concha Zapata; Box 36 - WTU Power Plant at Girvin, Debbie Cornelius.

All Republican voting will be at the courthouse on March 14. Jo Davidson is election judge.

Power outage throws southwest **Crockett County in the dark**

Dust and drizzle combined to cre- McCamey WTU office and Skeen, ate a power outage and fires early Monday in an area west and south of Ozona. Power was out all the way from the WTU substation at Pandale to Del Rio, Ozona and Sheffield according to Darrell Skeen, area operations manager with Rio Grande Electric Co-Op in Fort Stockton.

Rio Grande Electric buys power from WTU to serve its customers in this area, and classed the outage as a phase-4 disaster.



Bonilla urges OSHA to listen to small businesses before hitting them with ergonomics proposal

Washington, D.C. - U.S. Rep. Henry Bonilla, R-Texas, today introduced legislation calling on the Occupational Safety and Health Administration to wait for a "sound scientific basis" before allowing its proposed ergonomics regulation to take on the power of law. The resolution also calls on OSHA to extend the public comment period, so that businesses will have time to adequately voice their concerns. The deadline for public comment ended on March 2. The ergonomics proposal was announced last year on November

"It's ridiculous for OSHA to pretend to truly include the public in the process when the comment period has only lasted a few months, and not one single hearing on the ergonomics proposal has been scheduled anywhere south of Washington, D.C.," said Bonilla. "OSHA should extend tomorrow's deadline and give the public a real say." Hearings have been scheduled for Washington, D.C., Portland and Chicago.

Ergonomics refers to injuries caused by repeated motions. Scientific and medical researchers have not reached a consensus on the best ways to treat these injuries. The definition of a work related ergonomics injury also gets blurred when the initial injury is received outside of work. For example, a person who plays for a softball team might pull an arm muscle during a game, and then find that injury aggravated by typing all day at work. Under OSHA's proposal, about 1.6 million companies that employ workers in very physical jobs, such as production or manufacturing, would have to have a basic ergonomics program. Other companies are pulled into the regulation if they report a musculoskeletal injury. While OSHA claims the regulation would cost around \$4 billion, the Small Business Administration estimates the proposal will cost more than \$18 billion per year.

'OSHA is rushing to administer the medicine before the problem's fully diagnosed. They're acting like amateur doctors, guessing at solutions which we should wait for medical professionals to give us," said Bonilla.

The National Academy of Sciences is currently studying ergonomic injuries and any link they may have to the workplace. The administration has fought against this study by experts. The study was commissioned by Congress in 1998 and is expected to be completed in January 2001.

The concurrent resolution introduced by Bonilla today is non-binding.

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

Lazarus died. His sisters wept. Four days later Jesus arrived. "Your brother will rise again" (John 11:23). Martha knew the hope of eternal life taught in Scripture. "Martha said to Him, 'I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day" (John 11:24).

Jesus pointed Martha to the incarnation and personification of life. "Jesus said to her, I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in Me will live even if he dies'" (John 11:25). A person who enters the state of death, separation of the body and spirit, will return from death. The implication is clear. A time will come when dead bodies and departed souls will be reunited. Does this sound far fetched?

To prove His point, Jesus turned to the tomb of Lazarus and "cried out with a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come forth.' The man who had died came forth, bound hand and foot with wrappings, and his face was wrapped around with a cloth. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, and let him go'" (John 11:43-44). Pretty impressive lesson.

Jesus adds, "Everyone who lives and believes in Me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 5:26). Literally, He says, "Everyone who lives and believes in Me will not die forever." Death gives way to life. The big question is simple. "Do you believe this?"

Responsibility



"Be more responsible!" You have probably heard it at home and at school dozens of times. What people are telling you, is to grow up and be responsible for your own actions. Being responsible means you do your duty, are accountable, pursue excellence and exercise self-control. It takes a lot of work, but once you decide to practice it and make it part of your life, it won't be long before you have made it a lifelong habit. Responsibility is

Responsibility is a big word, so take a few minutes this week and talk

to your child about it. Without responsibility wouldn't the world be a mess! What if the trash man wasn't responsible enough to pick up the trash in your neighborhood? It might start to smell pretty bad. What if mom or dad wasn't responsible enough to pay the electric bill? What if the ladies in the cafeteria at school weren't responsible enough to cook lunch? There would be a lot of hungry people. Then, talk about ways that your child can demonstrate responsibility at home, school and in the community. Developing responsibility contributes to positive character development and a successful future inisias

At the end of my third anniversary as sheriff and beginning my campaign for a second term as your sheriff it seems appropriate that I present you my "Report Card" of past performance. But, it is important that we all understand that your Sheriff's Department has been successful because of the support we have received from our Commissioner's Court, our department employees, and most importantly, you, the Citizens of Crockett County.

When I was elected you identified law enforcement issues where action was required. The following is a review of those issues.

THE DRUG ISSUE — Drugs in our world is a concern for all. I am proud to report that our drug related arrests have increased over 400% with 190 arrests being recorded. We hired a full time drug interdiction officer at a minimum cost to Crockett County. With the exception of \$2,000.00, the Rio Concho Multi-Agency Drug Task Force provides the salary and benefits. Then we asked you for a specially trained drug detection dog to help our officers and your generous donations made that possible. Although there is much debate about this thing commonly called the "Drug War" all over the world, I think that we are doing more than many agencies our size. We have been providing our deputies with as much special training as possible to keep our anti-drug efforts active. I initiated the D.A.R.E. program in the schools to raise the awareness of our children and to let them know that we care about them and will support them when they "Just Say No". In the past three years our anti-drug efforts have brought in over \$40,000.00 in money seizures. These funds can be used for officer training and equipment that our County budget does not provide.

SAFETY AROUND OUR SCHOOLS - All of our deputies have made a special effort to increase our visibility and enforcement efforts in school zones. Deputy Emilio Tambunga has been assigned the task of providing daily enforcement around our schools. Unfortunately, some of us have had to talk to him about our speed, but most of us have noticed that there has been a voluntary compliance with the reduced speed in school zones.

CITIZEN SAFETY — The ultimate goal of all law enforcement officers should always be the safety of the citizens they are obligated to protect. Officer safety is also a goal. Special schedules and shifts have allowed the optimization of our officers. We have been able to schedule deputies so we have three officers on the street during those times when our services are most often required. This program has been especially effective at night and on weekends when our officers are most likely to become involved in events that require more than one officer. We appreciate your support in this effort.

911 — The 9-1-1- system provides an immediate way for people to seek emergency assistance. Although many of us have known the direct dial number, our many guests during hunting season and those who pass through the County don't. This nationally recognized program has gone a long way to reducing our response times and providing quick assistance. We will soon upgrade our 9-1-1 so that a person who is unable to provide a verbal communication can still dial 9-1-1 and their address will automatically be displayed to the dispatcher. All of our citizens will be better served with the enhanced 9-1-1 system.

As your sheriff I continue to believe that the citizens of Crockett County must demand honesty, integrity and fairness. I welcome your questions and inquiries about our management of your trust. In the past three years the first bookkeeping system has been instituted that tracks all monies that are the responsibility of the department.
