

## JV Lions win relay division

The JV Lions did well in the annual OHS Relays March 18, advancing 10 contestants to the finals. Other JV teams participating were from Iraan, Sonora, Reagan County and Nueces Canyon.

Representing Ozona in the finals were: Luis Cruz, Jared Shaffer, Gus Perez, Jacob Tambunga, Kyle Richardson, Chase Clark, Brandon Marmolejo, Nat Hernandez, Jeffery Mendez, Victor Hernandez and Lalo Garza.

Richardson placed first in the pole vault with a height of 10' 6". He was third in the 100m dash with a time of 13.78 and fourth in the 200m dash with a 28.48.

Jared Shaffer placed first in the long jump with a leap of 18' 6 3/4". Shaffer also captured first place in the 200m dash with a time of 24.55.

Luis Cruz came in first place in the triple jump with a distance of 37' 2 1/2" and was second in the long jump with 18' 4 1/2".

Gus Perez earned second place in the triple jump with a distance of 36' 9", was third in the long jump with a leap of 16' 11" and second in the 400m dash with 56.58.

Jacob Tambunga came in first in the discus with a throw of 107' 1" and third in the shot put with 33' 11 1/2".

Chase Clark captured second place in the pole vault with 9' 6" and third in the 110 hurdles with 21.41.

Brandon Marmolejo raced to second place in the 3200m with a time of 11:59.57 and was also second in the 1600m run, finishing with 5:23.92.

Fourth place in the 3200m run went to Jeffery Mendez with a time of 14:16.56, and he was fifth in the 1600m with 6:21.50.

Capturing second in the 100m dash with a time of 13.08 was Victor Hernandez. Hernandez also won third in the 200m dash with a 27.15 finish.

Lalo Garza earned second place in the 110m hurdles with a time of 20.93.

The JV Lions' 400m relay grabbed first with a 48.08. Runners for the 400m relay are: Gus Perez, Jared Shaffer, Lalo Garza and Luis Cruz.

A time of 3:49.05 earned second place for the JV Lions' 1600m relay team. Runners were: Gus Perez, Jared Shaffer, Lalo Garza and Luis Cruz.

She has judged UIL events, been a parent-leader in 4-H, prepared and served lunches for high school golf tournaments, helped with the one act play, cooked for Lions for Christ, chaperoned at Fifth Quarter, opened her home for open houses to benefit Crockett County Public Library, co-hosted the wine and cheese party which benefits the American Cancer Society, volunteered at the museum

and served on the Crockett County Civic Center Board.

In addition she helped develop the current Ozona Community Center daycare program and has been the driving force behind the extremely successful Project Graduation program for Ozona High School students.

## Annual Ozona Relays held March 18

Cuero girls won first place in the Ozona Relays with 193.5 points followed by Sonora in second with 93 and Iraan third with 74 points. The remaining seven teams and their placings were: 4 Nueces Canyon, 64; 5 Reagan County, 53; 6 Ozona, 41; 7 Presidio, 34; 8 Rocksprings, 28; 9 Comstock, 3 and 10 Angelo Christian, 1.

Advancing to the finals for the Lady Lions were Tammy Alvarez, Laken Villarreal, Jordan Webster, Paige Tambunga and Codi Richardson.

Tammy placed second in the discus with a throw of 105' 8" and third in the shot put with 31' 10".

Laken came in fifth in the 3200m run with a time of 13:14.33 and third in the 1600m with 6:08.99.

Jordan Webster was sixth in the 100m dash with a time of 13.74. Paige Tambunga ran the 300m hurdles in 57.02 for fifth place. Codi Richardson came in fourth place in the 200m dash with a time of 57.02.

The Lady Lions' 400m relay placed fourth with a time of 53.81. Runners for the 400m are: Jordan Webster, Colbey Crawford, Jessica Herring and Codi Richardson.

The 800m relay team earned a fifth place with their time of 1:54.79. Team members are the same as for the 400m.

In the boys' division, there were eight teams competing. Placing first as a team was Sonora with 158 points; second was Iraan with 135; third was Reagan County with 95 points, and

fourth place went to the Ozona Lions who earned 69 points. Rocksprings earned fifth with 48 points followed by Nueces Canyon with 27, Presidio with 22 and Angelo Christian with three points.

Advancing to the finals for the Lions were: Dustin Faught, Jimmy Lopez, Zeke Rivera, Lance Unger, Wesley Bishop, Martin Sanchez, Josh Tambunga, Bobby Cervantez and Ken Sessom.

Faught took third place in the high jump with 6'0". Jimmy Lopez placed fourth in the long jump and in the triple. His distance in the long jump was 19' 2 3/4", and in the triple, he leaped 40' 9 1/4".

Josh Tambunga was fourth in the 1600m run with a time of 4:58.39 and fifth in the 800m run with 2:11.73.

Martin Sanchez placed third in the pole vault with 10'6" and fourth in the 200m dash with a time of 25.49.

Lance Unger placed third in the shot put with a throw of 43'6". Zeke Rivera and Wesley Bishop were close behind. Rivera threw the shot 40' 11 1/3" for fifth, and Bishop placed sixth with a throw of 40'8".

Ken Sessom placed second in the 100m dash with a time of 11.37, and Bobby Cervantez came in fifth in the 100m with 11.56.

The Lions' 400m relay team was fourth with a time of 45.26. Making up this team are: Ross Crawford, Bobby Cervantez, Gabe Tijerina and Ken Sessom.

The Lions' 1600m relay team was third with their 3:35.71 finish. Runners on the 1600m relay team are: Martin Sanchez, Gabe Tijerina, Bobby Cervantez and Ken Sessom.

Hill was awarded the Medal of Valor in 1979 after saving Claude Russell from his burning home. He received the Texas Game Warden Association Award in appreciation for years of involvement at the Perry Ranch in the hunting program for Boys Ranch youths. He also received the Outstanding Service Award for his years of service to the county.

### LEGACY OF SPIRIT

Legacy of Spirit recipient Jane Murphey Black is a fifth generation Texan with agriculture in her bloodline all the way back. One of three girls, she grew up on a ranch near Sweetwater. As the oldest daughter, with considerably younger sisters, she was the only help her Dad had unless a neighbor rancher came by. Her family moved to Crockett County in 1936, and she followed a year later after completing high school.

She met and married Charlie Black, and they had a partnership marriage. She helped with the ranchwork and he helped with the housework. In the early years of their marriage, they had no running water, she cooked on a wood stove, and long distance phone calls were made only in an emergency. She rode horseback in the pasture and worked right in line with the men marking lambs and

drenching sheep.

Jane took over the ranching business in 1966, showing those she did business with that a woman could make the ranch succeed. She retired from ranching in 1999 and moved to town.

She has been a member of the Ozona Woman's Forum for 53 years, was president in 1954 and is the current president. During this time she helped campaign for public swimming pools. She served on the hospital board and worked with the Planned Parenthood satellite clinic. She has been the memorials chairperson for the American Cancer Society for more than 30 years.

In April of 1955, she was one of four Ozona women summoned to serve on a grand jury. This was the first time women were allowed to serve on juries in Texas.

She was the first woman to serve as chairman of the administrative board of Ozona United Methodist Church, where she has been a member for 53 years. She has served on several boards and taught different Sunday school classes.

The late Charlie Black and Jane Black have two children, Bill and Judy, four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

## Miller appointed to Criminal Justice Board

AUSTIN - Governor George W. Bush announced on March 17 the appointment of two individuals to the Texas Board of Criminal Justice.

Crockett County native Pierce Miller of San Angelo will serve a term ending Feb. 1, 2001. He will fill the unexpired term of Allan Polunsky of San Antonio, who resigned. Mary Bacon of Houston will serve a term ending Feb. 1, 2005. The board is responsible for the management and control of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Miller is managing partner of VIP Livestock Company and president of Moleo Gas Corporation. He served as chairman of the board, chief executive officer and president of San Angelo National Bank/Texas Commerce Bank of San Angelo from 1978-81.

In addition to serving as chairman of the USDA appointed, 7-member board of the National Sheep Industry Improvement Center, Miller is chairman of the advisory board of the Texas Food and Fiber Commission and a member of the executive committee of Texas Agricultural and Natural Resources Summit Initiatives. He is secretary/treasurer of the Mohair Council of America and past president of the American Sheep Industry Association, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo Association.

Miller earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Texas at Austin and graduated from the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking at Southern Methodist University.

Bacon is currently a visiting judge in Harris County. She served as a judge of the 338th District Court in Houston from 1983 until her retirement in 1998. Bacon was first appointed to the TDCJ Board in March 1999, and she resigned from her board position in December 1999 following the issuance of an interpretation of the Code of Judicial Conduct initially requested by Bacon. Upon further review, the Texas Supreme Court amended the Code of Judicial Conduct to expressly permit service on the board by a judge.

Bacon is past president of the Gulf Coast Family Law Specialists and the Association of Women Attorneys. Bacon has received numerous honors including the "State Judge of the Year" award from the Houston Police Officers Association and the "President's Award" from the Houston Bar Association. Bacon earned a bachelor's degree from Georgia State University, and she received her law degree from the University of Houston.

Both appointments are subject to Senate confirmation.

## Crockett County Sheriff's Department investigates water contamination

Crockett County Sheriff's Department was notified Friday, March 17, that a person or persons had pumped brackish oilfield condensate water into the home water system of R. J. Everett on the George Bunger Ranch. Damage has been estimated at \$100,000.00.

"Two fresh water holding tanks and pipelines were contaminated, whether intentional or by accident, when a person or persons pumped oilfield-condensate oil well or gas well water into the fresh home water system," said Chief Deputy Alton Davis. "We are not sure if it was by accident or intentional," Davis further stated.

Chief Deputy Davis reported that the investigation is ongoing at this time.

### Administration policies put U.S. troops in dangerous situation in Yugoslavia

**Bonilla's long warned of attacks from both sides in Kosovo**  
 Washington, D.C. - U.S. Rep. Henry Bonilla expressed concern today over the deteriorating situation in the Yugoslavia. Yesterday morning United States Army Troops raided weapons caches and command posts of ethnic Albanian guerillas in southeastern Kosovo. It was the first military action against the Kosovo Albanians, whom the U.S. and NATO allies aided just last year with a bombing campaign that drove out Serbian troops.

"Since the President first considered putting American soldiers on Yugoslav soil, I warned that our troops would be vulnerable to attack by both sides of that struggle. Unfortunately, that prediction may come true. Our soldiers may soon find themselves battling the Kosovo Albanians, the same people they have been protecting," said Bonilla.

During recent weeks, ethnic Albanian guerillas have attacked Serbian communities in Kosovo, in what some see as an attempt to drive the remaining Serbs out of the province. The guerillas include former members of the Kosovo Liberation Army, which was supposed to disband while Kosovo built an autonomous judicial and administrative system. Five separate stashes were raided. The raids are supposed to prevent cross-border attacks into Serbia, as well as arms smuggling into the republic.

Bonilla said the President should re-evaluate the depth of our commitment and our resources. "Is Kosovo still so important to our national security that it is worth grinding down our already bare-bones military?" asked Bonilla. "I am concerned because while our attention is diverted to a clan struggle in Europe, we are not paying proper attention to other potential crisis, such as China's increasing threats toward Taiwan."

Three individuals were recognized for their combined effort in rescuing Jewel Bailey from her burning home last July. Ted Spence, Deputy Lyndon English and Deputy Tyler Roy kicked in the front door of the home just after 2:00 a.m. July 5 and began a search through the house to find the sleeping Mrs. Bailey.

The origin of the fire was on the roof in an area close to the garage. The fire entered the garage by burning through the attic ladder and igniting the vehicle parked below. As they carried her from the home, fire was burning through the door between the garage and the living space just a few feet away from Mrs. Bailey. Minutes after they entered her room and started back down the hall to safety, her bedroom door burned completely through.

The heroic efforts of these three who were willing to risk their own safety saved the life of Mrs. Bailey.

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

## Mason recognized by State Bar

William S. (Bill) Mason of Ozona was one of 4,100 attorneys recognized as members of the College of the State Bar of Texas during its annual awards luncheon in Austin Feb. 5. This distinguished group of attorneys accounts for less than eight percent of the total number of attorneys in Texas.

The College was created in 1982 by the Supreme Court of Texas as a means of recognizing members of the State Bar who voluntarily attain an extraordinary number of continuing legal education credits each year. To qualify for membership, attorneys must complete 80 hours of continuing legal education within a three-year period or 45 hours during the current year. To maintain membership in the College, an attorney must complete at least 30 CLE each year, twice the number of hours required of all lawyers in Texas.

## Area students WOW'ed by WTU

This week, on Thursday, the "Watts on Wheels" (WOW) renewables trailer is coming to Ozona Middle School courtesy of West Texas Utilities Company. "Watts on Wheels" is a renewable energy program targeting middle school students and is designed to increase knowledge and understanding of renewable energy technologies. The name is derived from the fact that the power or "watts" is provided by renewable energy sources (a wind turbine and solar panels) mounted on a 27-foot trailer - the "wheels".

It was developed as a result of

customer input during the Deliberative Poll held at WTU a few years ago. Participants asked that WTU do more in the area of educating their children on renewable energy in a hands-on way. WOW elicits student participation through the Kilowatt Challenge, a team-based educational gameshow-style contest.

This team-centered, interactive reproduction involves a fast-paced game called Kilowatt Challenge, and features an exhibit of renewable energy resources systems that produce power for everyday appliances in a real-home setting. Students from each class are divided into four teams that compete for kilowatt points. The trailer, designated as Home Base for game purposes, is equipped with 12 solar photovoltaic panels that can produce 75 watts each at peak output plus a 300-watt wind generator.

Central and South West Corporation (CSW), parent company of WTU, Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO), and Central Power and Light (CPL) contracted and collaborated with National Theatre for Children (NTC) in Minneapolis, Minnesota, to develop the "Watts on Wheels" educational program. NTC also coordinates the Louie the Lightning Bug electrical safety programs for elementary schools throughout the WTU territory each year.

## National AG Week: Texas takes stock in a real growth industry

Like all things Texan, agriculture is big.

To get a sense of its size in truly Texan terms, visualize 8 million pairs of boots, 1.3 billion pairs of jeans and 9 billion peanut butter sandwiches. Think of the massive pride Texans have for their homes, their families, their state — we're talking huge.

That's why this week is National Ag Week, and people across the nation are taking note of the impact agriculture has on their everyday lives

— and the important role agriculture has in feeding and clothing the world.

Texas is the nation's leading producer of cotton and cattle. Agriculture is the second largest industry here, employing one out of every five working Texans. And that's not just farmers and ranchers. Agriculture offers careers in biochemistry, communications, computers, engineering, processing, research, banking, animal health and livestock pharmaceuticals, to name just a few.

Teaching children and adults about agriculture helps them see that ordinary things like bread, toothpaste and peanuts are, well, not so ordinary.

That's because education gives people a profound sense of where things come from and how the global cycle of growth, consumption and conservation is forever necessary. And that is what agriculture is all about.

Each year Texas produces enough leather to export 8 million pairs of boots, enough cotton to make 1.3 billion pairs of jeans and enough peanuts to make 9 billion peanut butter sandwiches. Corn is used to make household items like laundry detergent and bath soap, and it's even used in fireworks. Animal fats and proteins are found in everyday items like toothpaste and crayons. This newspaper is a product of forestry, antifreeze is a pork byproduct and oyster shells from our growing oyster industry are used for artificial reefs.

Clearly, agriculture isn't just about harvesting corn or herding cattle. Agriculture has a hand in turning wheat into loaves of bread, chipping potatoes and even for popping corn. Beyond growing and processing,

farmers and ranchers are delving into technological innovations like precision farming, drip irrigation, optical scanners and robotic harvesters.

Of course, all of this happens while population levels continue to skyrocket and land and water become more precious. The agriculture industry is looking for ways to seamlessly continue putting food on the tables of the world. That is the vision of Texas producers, whose hearts and livelihoods are entrenched in this larger-than-life industry.

## Social Security publication focuses on women's rights

March is Women's History Month, and one way women might celebrate is to review their Social Security protection. To help women understand their benefits under the Social Security program, we are encouraging them to get our booklet, *Social Security: What Every Woman Should Know*.

If you are a woman, you will find that the booklet shows how Social Security protection affects you as a worker, wife, mother, widow - all the roles you may be required to play. The same benefits are payable to men, but they are less likely to qualify for them because of their earnings and the likelihood of having a higher benefit on their own earnings records. For example:

\*A woman may have a choice of retirement benefits on her own record or that of her spouse. She gets the larger of the two, not both.

\*Workers can retire as early as age 62 and receive reduced benefits. However, a widow may qualify for benefit on the record of her deceased spouse as early as age 60.

Survivors benefits are paid to women with children under age 18 in their care (or 19 if still in school, or at

any age if the child is disabled before age 22).

\*A woman may collect Social Security disability benefits as a disabled worker at any age. Widows who become disabled at age 50 may collect disability benefits on the record of their deceased spouse.

While age 65 is the earliest age people retire and collect full benefits today; people born after 1938 will have their full retirement age gradually increased to age 67 by 2022.

Women should realize that their financial future is in their hands and this booklet supplies information that will help them make the right decisions. For a copy, they may call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, or visit our website, www.ssa.gov.









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

## Summer freshman classes to be taught at Junction Tech campus

Educational opportunities are improving for the region with the addition of Freshman Core Classes to the Junction campus of Texas Tech University. This summer for the first time, freshman English, college algebra, political science, and Texas History are being taught at the TTU campus in Junction. Instructors are faculty from the Lubbock campus. Each course is a 3-hour credit class and is taught in three weeks time. Students will attend classes for three hours a day Monday through Friday. College algebra and English are taught the first summer semester, June 5 through 23, and are taught mornings. Political Science and Texas History are taught July 10-28, the second summer semester. The scheduling is still not firm, but it is assumed that the second semester classes would be taught either in the afternoon or evening, depending on the most demand. Due to the condensed format, students will be able to take only one class per semester.

It is hoped that these classes will serve a variety of students. Graduating seniors, students from other colleges who are in the area for the summer only, high school students who have completed their sophomore or junior year and others who want to start a college career or continue with a degree are all encouraged to apply. The application process varies with the student's academic background. Texas Tech director of admissions is currently working on a "special visiting student" status for persons still in high school. High school seniors will be admitted to a program only and would not have to meet as high a standard as if they were apply to Texas Tech University. High school students will have to pass the TASP test and have taken either the SAT or ACT. Students from other colleges would most likely have to prove they were in good standing at their present college, but not have to present transcripts or test scores. Other potential students with some or no college background may have to undergo some testing, depending on their educational experiences.

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

A new gas producer has been brought on line in Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field, about 40 miles southwest of Ozona. Designated as the No. 5 M. K. Daniel, the well was drilled by Altura Energy Ltd. It probed to a 6,003-ft. bottom and was plugged back to 5,922 feet. Production will be in the Canyon Sand and will range from 4,787 to 5,382 feet into the hole.  
Pumping oil at the rate of 14 barrels daily, the No. 5 Powell "56" has been completed in Crockett County's East World Field.  
Location is about 16 miles northeast of Big Lake with E.O.G. Resources as the operator.  
The well produced with 140 PSI tubing pressure.  
It was taken to total depth of 8,250 feet and will produce from perforations in the Strawn Formation, 8,058 to 8,162 feet into the hole.  
Rated at 2,326,000 CF gas per day on absolute open flow, a new producer has been brought on line in Crockett County's Hunt-Baggett Field eleven miles southeast of Ozona.  
The well is designated as the No. 7 Riggs "21". It was drilled by Rising Star Energy Inc.  
When gauged on a 6/64 choke, the well showed capacity to flow 143,000 CF gas per day.  
Rising Star took the hole to total depth of 10,265 feet and plugged it back to 9,600. Production is in the Strawn Formation, 8,912 to 9,022 feet into the wellbore.  
The No. 2 McMullen "F1" has been recompleted for extended production life in Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field. Location is 11.3 miles southeast of Ozona.  
With Union Pacific Resources as the operator, the well was re-perforated for production ranging from 8,106 to 9,080 feet into the wellbore.  
Production intervals showed ability to flow 179,000 CF gas per day. The open flow rating was calculated to be 183,000 CFD.

## Opportunities for natural gas producers

AUSTIN - Texas Railroad Commissioner Tony Garza and Rebecca Roberts, chair of the Subcommittee of the National Petroleum Council (NPC) Committee on Natural Gas, presented the NPC's recent natural gas report to the Senate Natural Resources Committee. Garza says he sees an increasing opportunity for Texas producers to help meet the nation's growing demand for natural gas.  
The NPC report, "Meeting the Challenges of the Nation's Growing Natural Gas Demand," recommends the development of a national strategy in order to meet an anticipated 29 TCF annual demand for natural gas by 2010.  
"The NPC's efforts appear to give the best commentary on the future of the natural gas market," Garza said. "While our nation's natural gas resources are clearly adequate to meet demand for many more decades, reaching and producing this gas is growing more difficult."  
"Texas would be well served in positioning itself as a leader in natural gas production. We should actively look for ways to encourage research, development and production of this increasingly important commodity," Garza said.  
Highlights from the national Petroleum Council's report include:  
\*Demand will increase by 32% between 1998 and 2010. The study estimates an increase in demand from 22 TCF by 2010 and to levels exceeding 31 TCF by 2015.  
\*Almost 50% of the seven TCF increase will come from electricity generation.  
\*While there's adequate supply to meet the increasing demand, the study emphasizes that reaching and producing the resource will become more difficult.  
\*The NPC calls for increasing research and technology development while also assessing the impact of environmental regulation on natural gas supply and demand.  
"With over 57,000 producing gas wells, Texas is the largest producer of natural gas in the U.S. The increasing demands on these wells means we should look at programs and incentives that encourage production," Garza said.  
Garza is Texas' 41st Railroad Commissioner. He serves as second vice chairman of the Interstate Oil and Gas Compact Commission, a 37-state organization representing the governors of oil and gas producing states.  
Prior to his election, Garza was a partner in the Austin office of Bracewell & Patterson, L.L.P. He also served as Texas' 99th Secretary of State and was a Senior Advisor to Governor George W. Bush.

## Rep. Turner participates in statewide rural health summit

Access to healthcare providers, recruitment and retention of healthcare providers, and provider reimbursement issues topped the list of rural health concerns discussed at the second annual statewide Rural Health care decision and policy makers, providers and citizens who gathered together at the Summit to identify rural Texas health care issues and discuss possible resolutions.  
In a panel discussion, Chairman Turner expressed his deep concern about the barriers to accessing health care that his constituents face every day, committing his support in resolving the issues brought forth during the Summit. He noted a number of the health care issues and concerns facing folks living in his district, including the impact that redistricting may have on rural Texas. "The redistricting process will affect policy decisions, regulatory rule making, and reimbursement rates, which are all determined by state legislation," he cautioned. "Redistricting could significantly impact how the rural perspective is represented and understood in Austin."  
Throughout the Summit, Chairman Turner shared additional concerns also expressed by other Representatives and Texans representing a broad range of interests, including state agencies, public health officials, rural health care providers, and consumer advocates. Robert J. "Sam" Tessen, executive director of the Center for Rural Health Initiatives, sponsor of the event, noted that the issues discussed at the Summit are broad in scope and will impact all Texans, not just rural Texas communities. "It's important that all Texans realize that smaller communities usually struggle to maintain the resources or facilities to provide the care any Texan may need in times of emergencies or illness," he said. "For this reason, Texans are encouraged to get involved in supporting health care in their communities, and communicate with their Legislators."  
The Rural Caucus of the Texas State Legislature focuses on the rural perspective in Texas, facilitating the identification of legislation impacting rural areas. Chaired by Representative Judy Hawley (D-Portland) and co-vice chaired by Representatives Suzanna Hupp (R-Lampasas) and Robby Cook (D-Eagle Lake), the 70-member Caucus provides a nonpartisan forum for assessing and formulating policy on issues affecting rural areas.

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
