

## ASC Community Committeemen To Be Chosen In Mail Balloting

All farmers of Bailey County are hereby advised that an election will be held for the purpose of electing ASC community committeemen and alternate community chairmen for 1955.

The county election board, consisting of the county agent as chairman, representatives of FFA, SCS and the Farm Bureau, met Friday afternoon, July 30 to name the community election board for each community. The community election board will consist of three (3) members each.

The community election board for each community met Monday night, August 2, 1954 to nominate 10 eligible farmers from each community to be placed on the ballot. In addition to those farmers who are nominated by the community election board, there will also be included in the slate of nominees any name or names of farmers submitted to the board by petitions signed by ten or more eligible voters in the community. These petitions must be received by the chairman of each community election board by August 6, 1954, to be included in the slate of nominees. The chairman of each community election board is as follows:

## Dr. Billy Paine Loses An Arm In Traffic Mishap Last Thursday Night

Dr. Billy Paine, young Muleshoe chiropractor, lost his left arm last Thursday night when his car and a truck sideswiped on the T & P Railway overpass on Highway 80 at Big Spring. He is still under treatment in Cowper hospital there and his condition is reported to be satisfactory.

Dr. Paine was on his way to San Antonio to get his wife and baby, who had been visiting there several days. His mother, Mrs. Chet Layne and his sister and family, Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Beavers were with him at Big Spring in a short time after hearing of the accident.

His arm was completely severed from his body at a point above the elbow. The arm apparently was extended out of the window of the car at the time of the collision.

The driver of the truck involved, William Leroy Slentz, of Chickasha, Okla., and his passenger, O. G. Lynch, applied an emergency tourniquet to the arm. Ambulance operator from Eberley-River Funeral Home of Big Spring also applied a tourniquet en route to the hospital in an effort to stop the blood. Mrs. Layne, Dr. Paine's mother said the young truck driver directed traffic around and away from the accident scene and was praised by the officers for his intelligent handling of a situation which might have caused more accidents.

## Potato Harvest Nears End, Yield, Price Satisfactory This Season

This has been a much better year for potato growers in the Muleshoe area than 1953 was, according to information furnished The Journal.

Yield has been fair and likewise price has been pretty good. As an instance, Bill Millen, a veteran potato grower here, said on 136 acres he likely will average 200 sacks of No. 1 potatoes. Bill, who owns his potato processing shed here, said he harvests potatoes when he doesn't have anything else to do.

He said price has ranged from \$3.25 to \$3.75 per 100 pounds. It takes lots of money to grow a potato crop, still more to get it

harvested, processed and sold, but the operation apparently will this year leave the grower a fair net profit.

The Journal hears quite a few will plant lettuce again this year, most of them using ground on which potatoes have been harvested.

Barrett Produce has operated a large shed this year in Muleshoe, and has processed potatoes from a wide area, some coming from Springlake and Morton, besides some 500 acres in the immediate vicinity of Muleshoe.

Some of the potatoes go via the Santa Fe but quite a lot goes out by refrigerated truck.

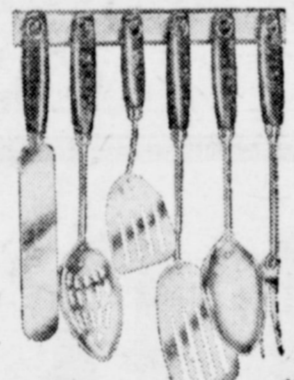

The Legislature may provide by law for some other State official to be a member of this Commission...

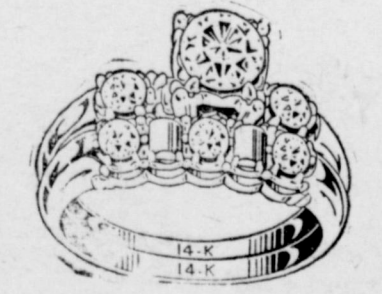

**Vacations And Investments**

Babson Park, Mass., Aug. 5 — Manufacturers, merchants and job seekers should always be looking for new industries. Habits control buying; and buying habits are constantly changing.

**WHAT ABOUT AUTO TRIPS?**

Vacations have been on the increase ever since my boyhood. Vacationing is not a new industry. Since World War II, however, it has become a big industry, primarily because of the vacations which almost all employers give their wageworkers. Vacations have become a MUST.

Automobiles have been the

factor booming vacations. If your automobile helps you to relax, then an automobile trip is beneficial. If, however, it is tiring and not relaxing, then it is harmful. It does the postman no good to "take a walk" on Sundays! Do something different when on your vacation — something you don't have the time to do ordinarily.

**VACATIONS AT HOME**

The best vacation is to be able to do as you want to do for two weeks. Get up when you want to, go where you want to, and take a real rest. Give your wife a rest from cooking and washing dishes.

es. Buy things which do not need cooking. Cooking is a bad habit in summer, and dishwashing is worse! Use paper plates in summer!

A real rest includes resting our stomachs. Doctors agree we should give our digestive organs a good vacation each year, spending money for fruits rather than for meats; and drinking lots of milk and water. In winter we must eat for two reasons: (1) to gain physical strength, and (2) to keep warm. In summer we do not need to eat to keep warm. I forecast that in years ahead people will give much more attention to eating less in the summer. In fact, experts tell me that each season of the year requires a different diet, both as to quantity and quality.

**RECREATION ON THE INCREASE**

Whatever your business or job, do not forget that "working hours" will be shorter rather than longer. This means that everyone will have more leisure time. This is the reason for the boom in "Do It Yourself" industries, which are hurting some trades, but helping others. See your local public library for one of the home-craft magazines which describes such work, or visit one of the many shows which the Orkin people of 19 West 44th St., New York City are putting on to help merchants.

All the above means that your real pay in future years will be in money plus hours of leisure. Accordin to this article, a scientist out in California is workin on a method of putting people into hibernation when they get sick. He's tryin to develop a pill you can swallow that'll cause you to pass into a month long sleep or daze, while you recover from whatever is ailing you.

And I've been thinkin. Grass is so short cattle are so hungry, and the price is so low, about the only thing that'll save em is some of them pills.

If I could give each one of my cows one of those pills and she'd hibernate in the barn until the drouth is over and the grass is

caterin to the lazy streak in us all. This is why we telephone instead of write. I forecast higher prices for "lazy stocks".

**WATCH YOUR CHANGE!**

## CASE HISTORY OF A DROUTH COUNTY

Scorching hot weather and diminishing soil moisture in Central Texas may result in another drouth disaster relief program for Texas this year.

Farmer groups in Central and Southern counties are petitioning state and federal authorities for aid. Many of them claim the situation is more critical than in 1953, although some sections have been benefited by recent rains.

A meeting between business men and farmers in Hamilton

County recently, gives a typical picture of what many of our rural families are up against. Hamilton is a crop and livestock county in upper central Texas. It's urban population amounts to only 29 per cent, the rest is rural. Rainfall in the last year varies from two to seven inches compared to a normal amount of about 31 inches. At the meeting, the men present expressed the opinion that conditions are worse now than they were at the same period last year. Some said it was worse than at any time in history. Each person present gave examples of his own plight

and urged quick action on some kind of relief program.

One farmer-businessman said he had 300 acres on which he was running 20 cows now. He is still feeding from last year, even though, in the most severe winters, ordinary feeding procedure stops about April 1. His ground tanks are dry and he made only 10 to 12 bushels of oats on his farmland this year where a normal yield is 40 bushels.

A second farmer-rancher who is considered to have the best land in Hamilton County has been feeding all year. His grass is about one-fourth gone and he made only two bushels of barley per acre on 50 acres.

Another rancher with only 25 head of cattle now, said he needs to have feed but cannot afford to buy it. His pasture is half normal but he did make fifty bushels of oats on 12 acres.

The effect of drouth on business was expressed by an insurance man. He said that for the first time in his memory, farmers were dropping their automobile, property and life insurance. He has been in Hamilton County 25 years.

Hamilton County is not an isolated example. It is no worse off than several other counties in the drouth area, and probably no better than many of them. If dry weather continues, then it is almost certain that another disaster program will be put into effect.

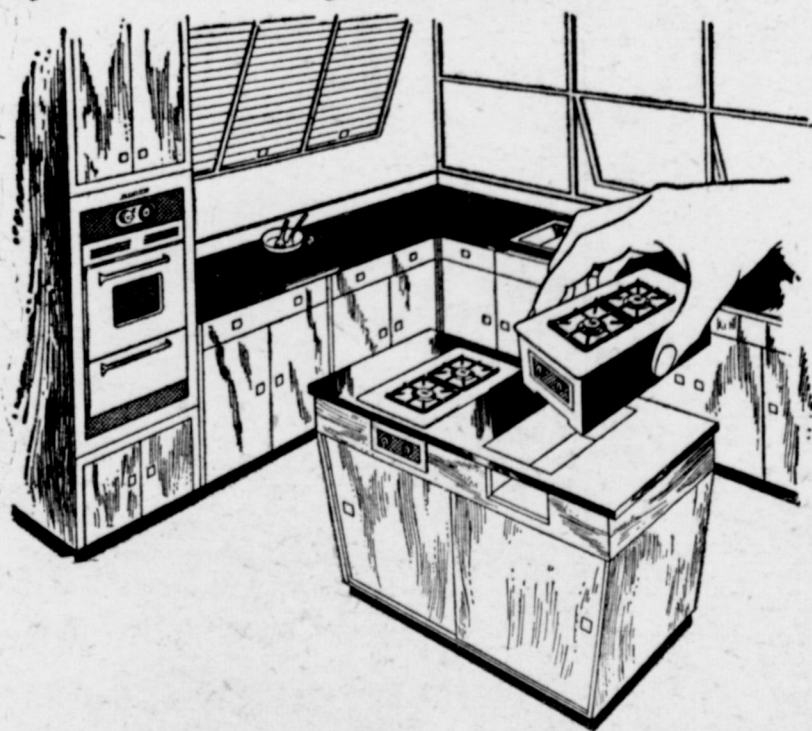

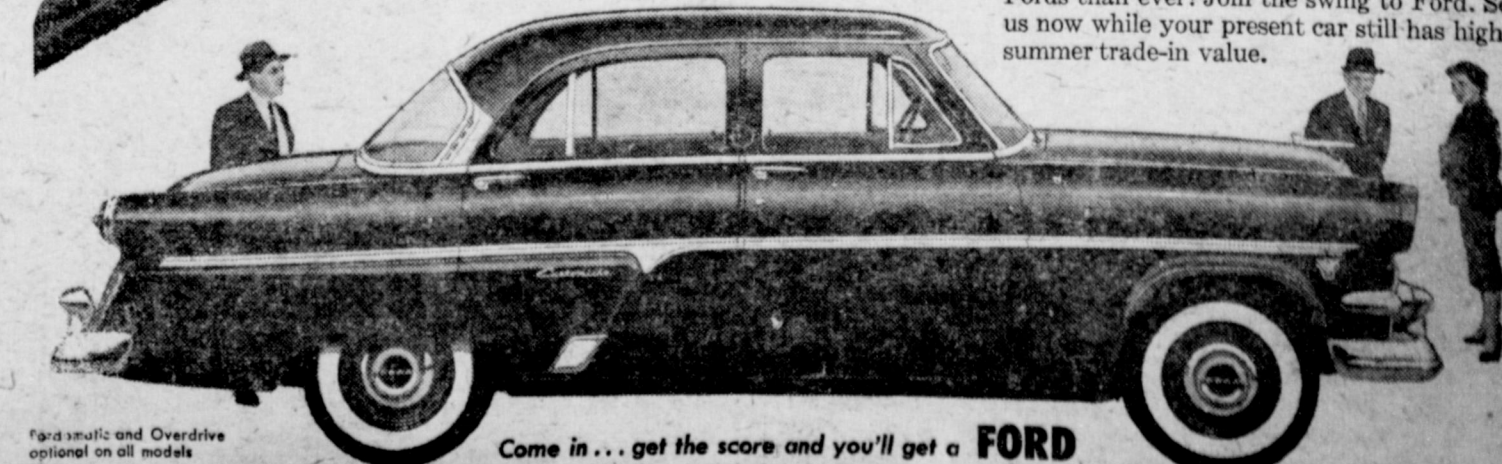

## Injuries Received In Accident Fatal To Fred Neeley

Fred Neeley, nineteen year old colored boy passed away at 9:30 p. m., July 28, at the West Plains Hospital and Clinic, of injuries received the previous day, when the 1940 model John Deere tractor he was driving, collided with a Santa Fe train at a crossing near Progress.

Neeley had made his home at Progress since the first of June, with an uncle, Lee Collins, who is a Baptist minister.

He had been hired the morning of the accident by Bud Wiseman and his partner, Eldridge to mow hay on the Morgan Locker farm. Eldridge told the boy to stay in the field with the tractor and mower, while he and Locker took a load of hay to town. When they returned, Locker said they noticed that Neeley had unhooked the mower and left it in the field, and had headed north toward the railroad tracks on the tractor.

Wiseman and Eldridge went back to the field and Locker said he had started working back of his house, when he heard a terrific impact, and looked up to see dust billowing around the crossing and the train coming to a stop. He said he jumped in his pickup and was one of the first on the scene of the accident.

When he arrived at the crossing, Mr. Locker said he noticed that the two front wheels of the tractor, and the motor were on the south side of the tracks, while the back wheels, the motor, and Neeley were on the north side.

Neeley was rushed to the hospital by a Muleshoe Funeral Home Ambulance where he later died.

Funeral services were held at San Saba earlier this week. Young Neeley is preceded in death by his parents.

## Warning Issued Wheat Growers On Allotments

Bailey County ASC committee has notified farmers that if they plant wheat for harvest above their allotment or for harvest without an allotment they will not be eligible for price support on any crop.

Under the 15.0 acre amendment farmers can harvest 15 acres without penalty; but if they have no allotment or less than 15 acres allotment and they plant more than the allotment, they will be out of compliance for price support on cotton, grain, or any crop. They can plant wheat for cover crop, green manure, or pasture, but it must not reach maturity.

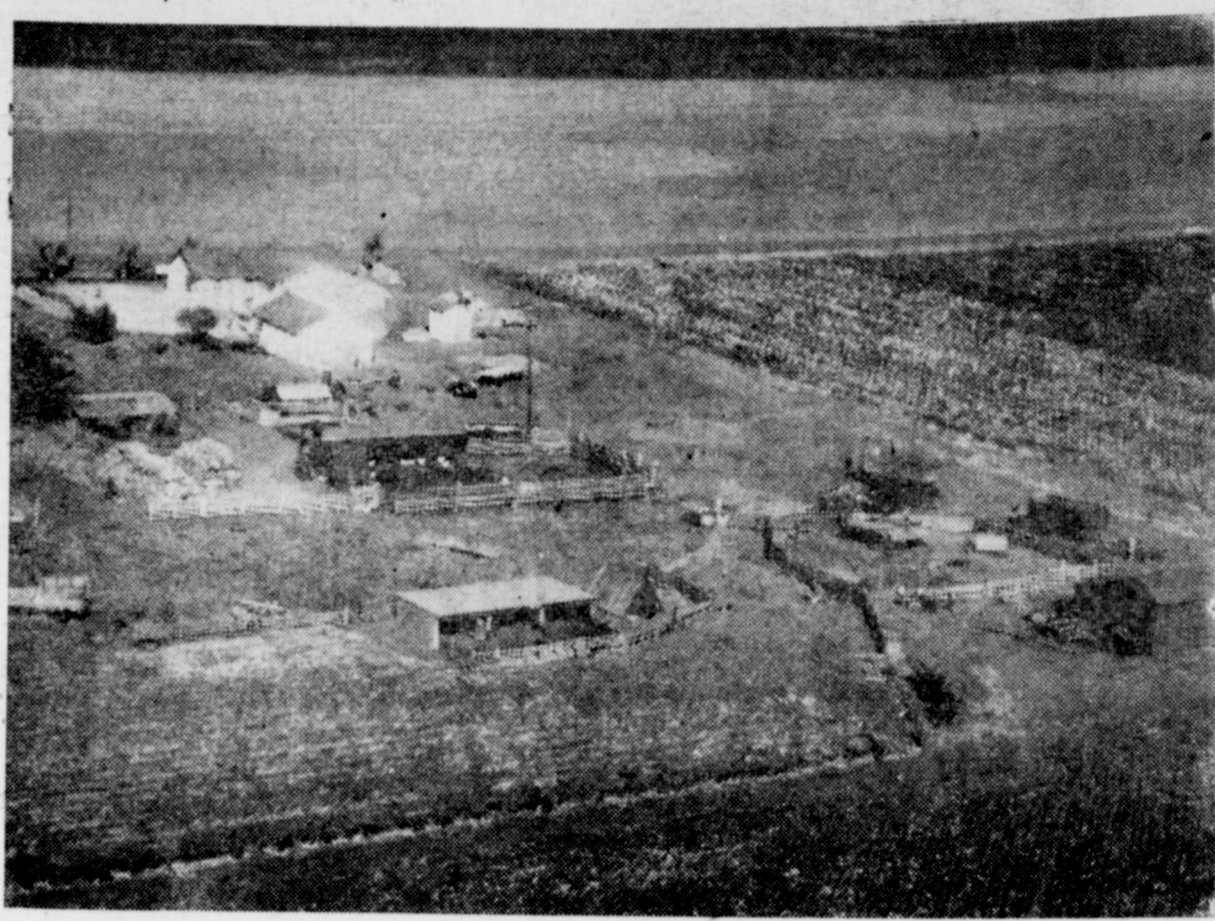
