# **KNOW AND OBEY TRAFFIC LAWS**

COLLEGE STATION, March 2 - No one can continually violate traffic laws without paying the penalty . . . either a fine or involvement in an accident. If you don't know the rules, learn them, advises the Texas Farm ard Ranch Safety Committee, and then obey them.

The committee has figures from the National Safety Council which show that records of fatal accidents in 1953 involved 76 traffic violations per 100 drivers. Speeeding, nearly 3 out of 10 drivers in fatal accidents were violating a speed law. The percentage in rural areas was even higher, slightly over 10 percent above the rate for cities.

Among drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents, 18 out of 100 had been drinking. Seven out of 100 drivers in fatal accidents did not have the right-of-way. The city rate exceeds by almost three times the rural rate in this classification. Improper passing involved 3 out of each 100 drivers in fatal accidents and 9 out of 100 drivers failed to keep to the right of the center

Disregarding a traffic sign, signal or officer was the violation involving 6 out of 100 drivers in fatal accidents. The committee points out here that rural drivers were more frequently guilty of disregarding stop and warning signs while their city cousins more often disregarded a signal or officer.

Statistics show 8,600 pedestrain fatalities in 1953 with 36 percent caused from crossing between intersections; more than 1,800 of the 6,650 adult pedestrain deaths were attributed to alcohol while crossing against the signal accounted for 5 percent of those killed. Playing in the roadway accounted for 26 percent of the child pedestrains under 5 years of age killed or injured and 18 percent of those between 5 and 14 years of age.

All girls interested in studying shrubs will meet Saturday, March 5 at 2 p.m. in the home demonstration agent's office in

he courthouse. This program is just getting underway so it is still open to anyone who would like to join 4-H and enroll in the program. Girls must be thirteen or over to be eligible to study shrub idenification.

The characteristics and uses of common shrubs will be studied. This study will be climaxed by a county shrub identification contest on April 16. The four high point girls will enter the district 4-H shrub identification contest in May. Winners of the district contest will go to 4-H Roundup at Texas A & M in June.

Everyone who enters the program should benefit from knowing more about shrubbery and the uses of these plants. This applies to the agent, too, who is really learning a lot while getting ready to help the girls. The group will probably meet once a week until the county and district contests are over. Field trips to nearby nurseries and experiment stations are planned.

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
