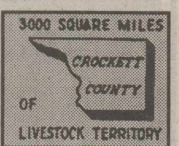

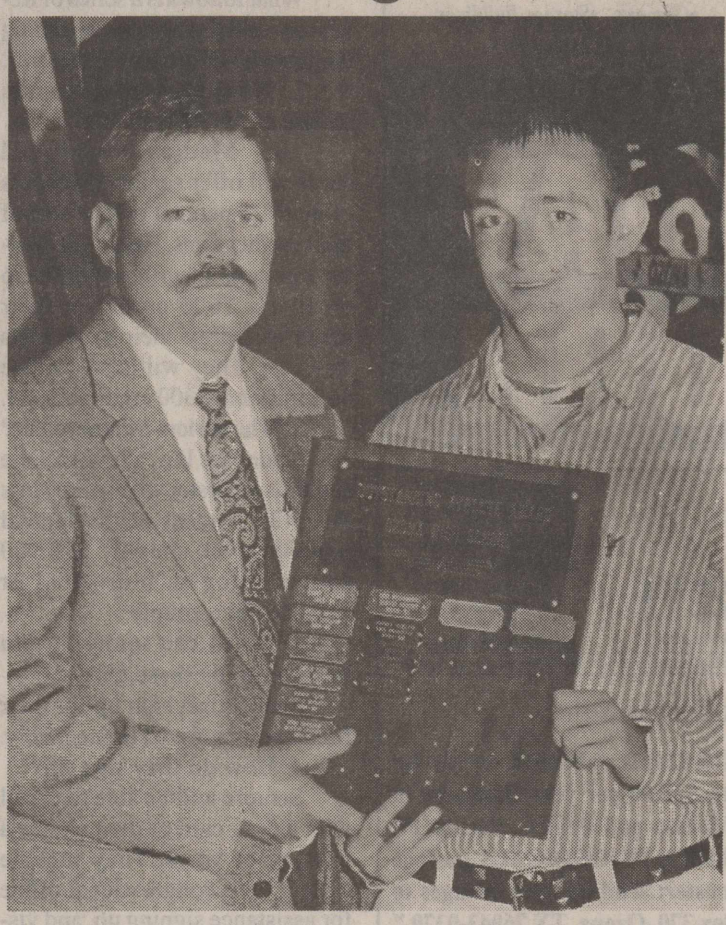

Ozono National Bank to celebrate centennial with 'Barbecue in the Park'

In 1905 several ranchers and businessmen in Ozona established the Ozona National Bank. It opened on June 1, 1905 in the rear of the Smith Drugstore. Total deposits on the first day were \$12,847.85.

The first permanent bank structure was erected in 1906. It was designed by Oscar Ruffini using native limestone. This original building is still standing on the west side of the town square. Since 1968 the Bank has been located in its black marble building on the south side of the square.

Two additional locations were added in the 1990's. The Wimberley Bank was purchased in June of 1990. A loan production office in San Marcos, opened in 1995, moved to its new full-service location in 1999. The Ozona National Bank San Antonio Loan Production office opened in 2001.

To celebrate its centennial the Ozona National Bank will host a "Barbecue in the Park", from 5-9

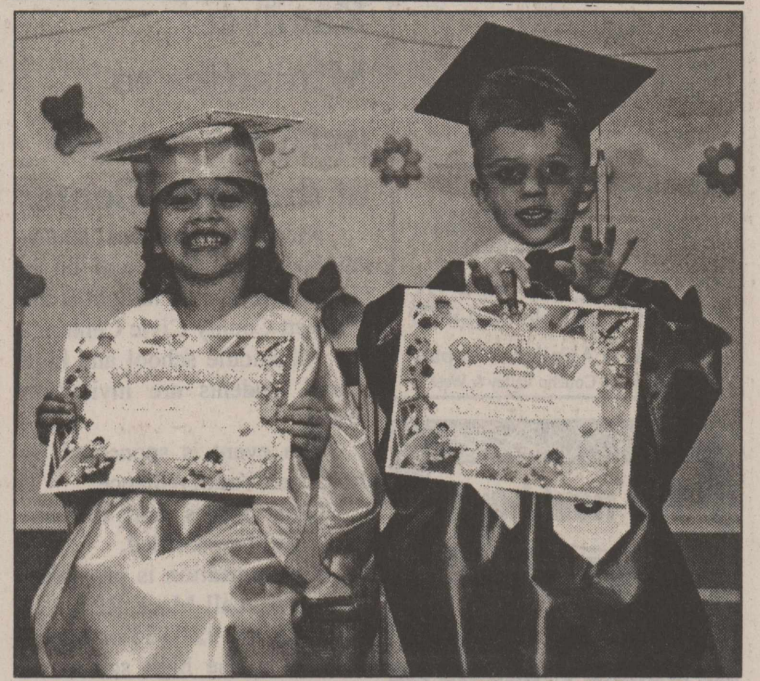

FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

Lawn Maintenance

The amount of time and money you spend maintaining your lawn depends a lot on what your idea of a lawn should be - not necessarily what you lawn actually needs.

Early lawns of the Middle Ages did not require much maintenance. That's because they were inspired by glades or grassy openings in the forest (not pictures in magazines or golf courses). These lawns were meadow-like mixtures of grasses and flowers that were planted among fruit trees, vines, flowers, and herbs, and enclosed by fences or courtyards. There was no mowing. Grass was kept from growing too tall by trampling it into a soft, woven, mat-like surface.

If you too can adjust your expectations to taller grass, a mix of other plants in your turf, such as clover, and mid-summer periods when your grass temporarily turns brown, you can achieve a low-maintenance lawn - and one that's closer to the original spirit of the lawn.

The right height. There are several reasons not to cut your grass too short. First, grass grows from the crown, not the blade tips. This trait makes grasses ideal for lawns because they keep on growing despite the regular

mowing off of their upper stem, leaf sheath, and blades. This is also why it's important not to damage grass crowns by accidental scalping with the mower. No crown, no grass!

Second, keeping grass on the longer side also allows it greater surface area to carry out photosynthesis. This in turn results in healthier plants.

Third, taller grass grows slower than shorter grass. You can use this simple fact to eliminate up to 20 percent of the mowing you do annually. That's a savings of about 8 hours for the average lawn owner, not to mention a savings of gasoline and wear and tear on equipment. Finally, by keeping your grass at the high end of its recommended mowing height, you can prevent 90 percent of all weeds from germinating - and thereby eliminate the need for herbicides.

Warm-season grasses should be mowed when 2 to 2-1/2 inches tall. Cut no more than 1/3 of the grass height at each mowing to avoid damage to plants. If the lawn grows too high for you to cut off 1/3 the height and have an acceptable length, cut off 1/3 now, and mow 1/3 off again in two or three days. Cutting more than 1/3 the height will cause grass clippings to lay on top of the

lawn and decompose more slowly, and will give the grass a more open, bristly appearance. In addition, short cutting will stunt or slow root growth and weaken the grass plants.

What to do with your lawn clippings. Today's advice, contrary to 20 or 30 years ago, is to leave clippings on the lawn. The old belief that clippings contribute to thatch build-up is false. Thatch is a build-up of roots and stems, not grass blades. Use a mulching mower, and leave clippings where they fall. It not only saves the labor of collecting and composting them, it also reduces the need for adding fertilizer to your lawn, and helps to conserve soil moisture. There are exceptions, however, to this advice. If you have neglected your mowing or must mow in wet conditions, the long clippings are likely to form heavy, soggy clumps that cover the grass. In such cases, the clippings should be removed so they do not smother the grass.

Today's new mulching mowers, also called recycling mowers, make it even easier to leave clippings where they fall. The deck and blade designs enable these mowers to cut each blade several times, producing a finely chopped clipping.

May is Motorcycle Safety Month

May is Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month in Texas, and DPS urges all motorcycle enthusiasts—both experienced and inexperienced—to attend a professionally taught motorcycle course to hone their skills.

"More than 700,000 people in Texas are licensed to operate a motorcycle," said Clifton Burdette, coordinator of the DPS Motorcycle Safety Unit. "Operating a motorcycle safely requires the use of special mental and physical skills. Riders can attain these skills by attending a professionally taught motorcycle operator training course, as well as through personal experience."

The DPS Motorcycle Safety Unit offers basic and advanced motorcycle operator training in 64 permanent locations. In addition, the unit offers basic and advanced training in nine rural locations by utilizing two self-contained mobile training units. Last year, 26,260 Texans took either the basic or advanced course.

The basic motorcycle operator training course is for inexperienced or unlicensed motorcyclists, and the advanced course is for more experienced riders. The basic course may be used to waive the licensing road test, and both of the courses may qualify for ticket dismissal and insurance discounts.

While Texas does not require all motorcycle riders to wear helmets, the DPS strongly encourages riders to wear helmets to increase safety and save lives. Texas law states that in order to be exempt from wearing a helmet, a person must be at least 21 years of age. In addition, they must successfully complete a motorcycle safety course or be covered by a health insurance plan providing at least \$10,000 in medical benefits for motorcycle-related injuries.

Commissioners approve closing of alleys

The Crockett County Commissioners approved the closing of some alley ways in Ozona as it relates to the adoption of the official county map.

County Auditor Sandy Stokes and resident Wade Richardson each stated in two separate letters that the alley from Avenue AA and Avenue A near Stokes' house, and the alley between Avenue C and Avenue D near the Dairy Queen business office be closed.

Stokes said that the reasoning for his was that part of his house and his entire carport sit on that designated alley.

Richardson stated in his letter that the strip of land has never been maintained or used as an alley by the county, and there is evidence of an old foundation to a building that was long ago erected. There are also grass and trees established and no sign of usage or maintenance, his letter stated.

The commissioners unanimously approved to close the alley at the 1300 block from Avenue AA and Avenue A then from the north-south alley between Avenue B and Avenue C to Avenue C and then Avenue C to Avenue D and Avenue E to Avenue F and Avenue F to Avenue G. The approval granted Stokes' and Richardson's requests.

County Judge said the commissioners will formally adopt the official county map at a special meeting in June.

Fire Chief Bob Falkner said that the fire department has already received numerous bee calls this year.

The department bought four bee suits and is responding to calls

of bees in public areas such as schools, water meters and other outdoor areas.

With a local honeybee removal business in town, Falkner said he was seeking the commissioners opinion as to handle the bee calls without going into competition.

"I really hate to go into competition with a local businessman, still on our side it got to the point last year that we couldn't get people to respond," Falkner said.

John Williams, local resident, runs a honeybee removal business.

Falkner said the soap and water method works for outside bees, but could damage the inside walls of houses.

"You are doing a good job. Let's leave the internal eradication

to the professionals, and we'll take care of mother nature," said Commissioner Pleas Childress.

- Execution of salt cedar eradication resolution.

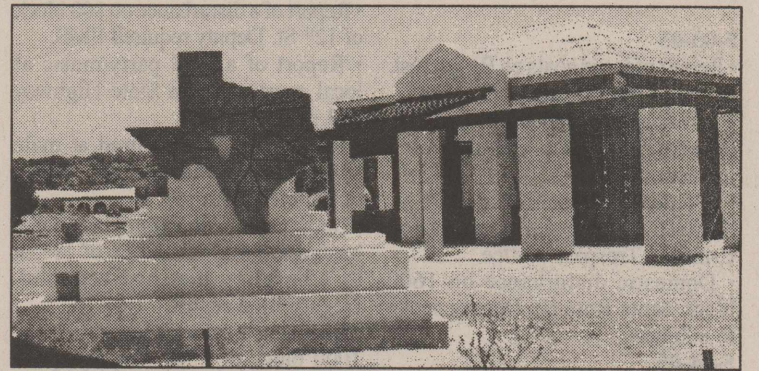

Bill would strip new park development from river authority

AUSTIN — A Hill Country state senator has introduced a bill that would bar the Lower Colorado River Authority from developing any new recreational areas along the river.

SB 1232, introduced by Sen. Troy Fraser (R-Horseshoe Bay), would strip that authority from the LCRA, which over the years has opened 40 public parks from the Hill Country to the coast. In 2003, more than 1 million people visited LCRA's existing parks.

By repealing Chapter 152 of the Texas Water Code, Fraser's bill also would end LCRA's Community Development Partnership Program. Since 1996 the economic development program has provided \$9.4 million in grants to volunteer fire departments, local governments and other non-profit ventures in the authority's jurisdiction.

Mayors and county judges from LCRA's service area gathered to speak against the bill in the Senate Committee on Natural Resources on May 3, but after sitting for hours waiting to testify, chairman Sen. Ken Armbrister (D-Victoria) announced that Fraser had asked that the bill not be brought up that day.

One of those on hand was Llano Mayor Roger Pinckney (re-elected to a second term without opposition May 7).

"No one showed up to testify in favor of the bill," Pinckney said. "We waited there for more than six hours but didn't get a chance to express our opinion."

Essentially, that opinion is that LCRA should not lose any of its authority.

"The LCRA is one of the most successful entities the Legislature has ever created and stands on its own, getting zero

funding from the state," Pinckney said. "The city of Llano would hate to see the LCRA's ability to provide service diminished in any way."

Legislator dies in traffic crash...

Rep. Joe E. Moreno (D-Houston) died early May 6 in a one-vehicle accident near La Grange on State Highway 71.

The 40-year-old lawmaker's House seat will be filled in a special election to be called by the governor.

Moreno and House member Rafael Anchia (D-Dallas) and Monica Pinch, chief of staff to Rep. Joe Pickett (D-El Paso), were all returning from a basketball game in Houston when Moreno apparently lost control of the vehicle and the car rolled. Anchia was treated for minor injuries and released while Pinon was hospitalized.

Communities bracing for economic explosions...

U.S. Department of Defense base-closure recommendations — news that could amount to an economic bust for some Texas cities and the counties in their surrounding trade area — could come as early as May 13.

Two installations considered particularly at risk are San Angelo's Goodfellow Air Force Base and Naval Station Ingleside near Corpus Christi.

Even Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, established in 1876 when hostile Indians still prowled West Texas, is a possibility for closure.

Cheerleading bill would face trouble in Senate...

To the delight of late-night talk show gag writers, the House last week passed on third reading Rep. Al Edwards' (D-Houston) HB 1476 barring sexually suggestive cheerleading.

Despite the 85-55 House vote, even if Edwards can find a Senate sponsor for the bill, it is not expected to get out of committee in the upper chamber.

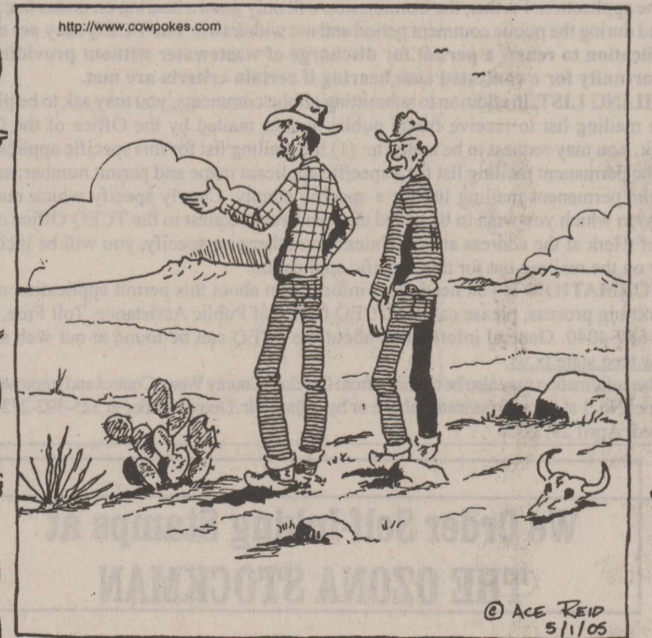




