

Ozona **National** Bank to celebrate centennial with 'Barbecue in the Park'

In 1905 several ranchers and businessmen in Ozona established the Ozona National Bank. It opened on June 1, 1905 in the rear of the Smith Drugstore. Total deposits on the first day were \$12,847.85.

The first permanent bank structure was erected in 1906. It was designed by Oscar Ruffini using native limestone. This original building is still standing on the west side of the town square. Since 1968 the Bank has been located in its black marble building on the south side of the square.

Two additional locations were added in the 1990's. The Wimberley Bank was purchased in June of 1990. A loan production office in San Marcos, opened in 1995, moved to its new full-service location in 1999. The Ozona National Bank San Antonio Loan Production office opened in 2001.

To celebrate its centennial the Ozona National Bank will host a "Barbecue in the Park", from 5-9 Please see, BANK page 9



The Department of Health and introduced new Medicare-approved prescription drug discount cards. The new cards offer seniors discounts of up to 25 percent off the cost of their medications.

Some discount card sponsors will charge an enrollment fee of prescription drug cards, visit around \$30. However, other card www.medicare.gov or call 1-800sponsors will offer a lower fee or MEDICARE



The amount of time and mowing off of their upper stem, money you spend maintaining your lawn depends a lot on what your idea of a lawn should be not necessarily what you lawn actually needs.

Early lawns of the Middle Ages did not require much maintenance. That's because they were inspired by glades or grassy openings in the forest (not pictures in magazines or golf courses). These lawns were slower than shorter grass. You meadow-like mixtures of grasses and flowers that were planted among fruit trees, vines, flowers, and herbs, and enclosed by fences or courtyards. There was no mowing. Grass was kept from growing too tall by trampling it into a soft, woven, matlike surface.

If you too can adjust your expectations to taller grass, a mix of other plants in your turf, such as clover, and mid-summer periods when your grass temporarily turns brown, you can achieve a low-maintenance lawn - and one that's closer to the original spirit of the lawn.

The right height. There are several reasons not to cut your grass too short. First, grass grows from the crown, not the blade tips. Third, taller grass grows can use this simple fact to eliminate up to 20 percent of the mowing you do annually. That's a savings of about 8 hours for the average lawn owner, not to mention a savings of gasoline and wear and tear on equipment. Finally, by keeping your grass at the high end of its recommended mowing height, you can prevent 90 percent of all weeds from germinating - and thereby eliminate the need for herbicides.

Warm-season grasses should be mowed when 2 to 2-1/2 inches tall. Cut no more than 1/3 of the grass height at each mowing to avoid damage to plants. Bill would strip new park development from river authority



A Hill Country state senator has introduced a bill that would bar the Lower Colorado River Authority from

developing any new recreational areas along the

SB 1232, introduced by Sen. Troy Fraser (R-Horseshoe Bay), would strip that authority from the LCRA, which over the years has opened 40 public parks from the Hill Country to the coast. In 2003, more than 1 million people visited LCRA's existing parks.

By repealing Chapter 152 of the Texas Water Code, Fraser's bill also would end LCRA's Development Community Partnership Program. Since 1996 the economic development program has provided \$9.4 million in grants to volunteer fire departments, local governments and other non-profit ventures in the authority's jurisdiction.




