LION STADIUM - It was all about the Lions Friday night as Ozona pounced, roared and ran past the Reagan County Owls for a 31-0 Homecoming victory.

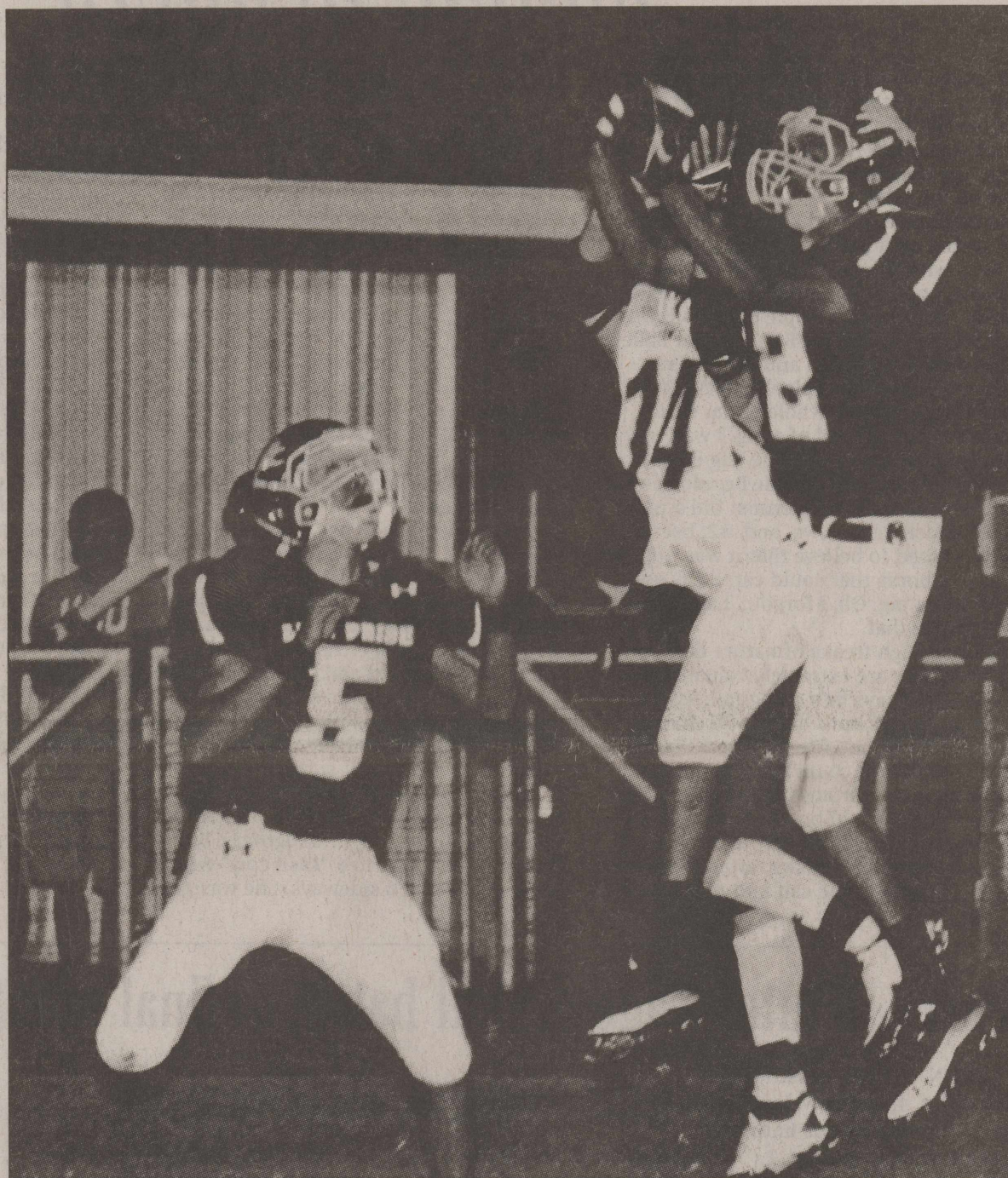
"Overall we played as hard and with as much passion as we have played all year. We executed fairly well on offense and swarmed to the ball on defense," said Coach Ray Brown.

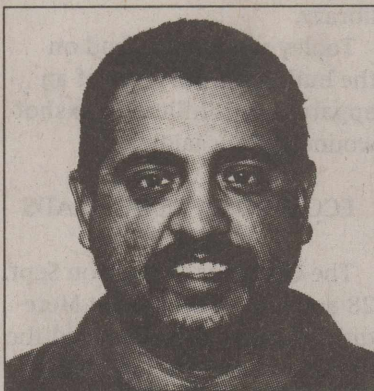
This week is the District 3 race between Michael Ybarra and Roland De Hoyos.

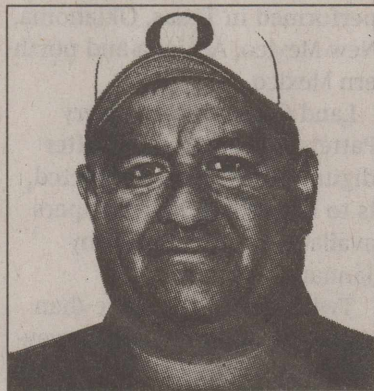

Landowners reminded licenses needed to operate hunting leases

TEXAS PARKS & WILDLIFE DEPARTMENT

AUSTIN — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would like to remind landowners that a hunting lease license is required for certain hunting operations, and that those licenses must be renewed yearly.

The owner of a hunting lease or the landowner's agent may not receive pay or anything of value from hunters unless the owner or agent has acquired a hunting lease license from the department. This law applies to all hunting leases.

There are three types of lease licenses: (1) hunting lease license; (2) hunting cooperative; and (3) wildlife management association. The license is required to be displayed on the hunt-

ing lease property.

The first type of license, the hunting lease license is for the total amount of property in a county owned by an individual, partnership, firm, or corporation. Lease licenses can be purchased at any location where Texas hunting or fishing licenses are sold. Or, licenses can be bought online with a credit card at www.tpwd.state.tx.us Fees are:

- Fewer than 500 acres - \$79
- Between 500-1,000 acres - \$147
- More than 1,000 acres - \$252

The second type of license, the hunting cooperative lease license, is for a cooperative enterprise in which participating landowners pool their acreage and lease it for hunting purposes under the au-

thority of a hunting lease license and in which the leasing profits are distributed to the landowners, according to the landowners' participation. Cooperative lease licenses require landowners to complete an application, available only at TPWD law enforcement offices across the state and TPWD headquarters in Austin. Cooperative lease licenses may not be issued to a corporation or entity.

The fees for this license are:

- Fewer than 10,000 acres - \$60 + \$5 per participating landowner
- Between 10,000-50,000 acres - \$120 + \$5 per participating landowner
- More than 50,000 acres - \$240 + \$5 per participating landowner.

Why newspapers will be around tomorrow

Editor's note: The following article is being reprinted with permission in honor of National Newspaper Week: Oct. 3-9. This year's theme is "Newspapers: The Print and Online Connector for Today's Communities."



The way that people consume information is changing rapidly, and I hear frequently that the death of newspapers is imminent.

I think that people feel this way because they aren't regular newspaper readers or they just don't think that other people read newspapers as much as they did 10 years ago. If they're referring to the printed newspaper, they are usually correct.

We've seen printed newspaper circulation declines for more than 10 years.

However, many of us in the industry are, slowly but surely, realizing that we're not in the printed paper business, but in the information business. This transformation of our attitude about print has not been easy.

Many of us like our printed paper traditions, and many readers are very loyal. Printed newspapers often sell out after elections, weather disasters and other significant events.

People still buy copies of the newspaper when their child makes the honor roll or their team has a win, and for many, the newspaper obituary is the defining memorial for a loved one.

Printed newspapers are one of the few mediums where people actually look forward to the advertising, and research indicates that ads are a desired part of the experience. The ritual of reading a Sunday paper continues to be strong, and many community newspapers have experienced circulation stability and even growth in the past decade.

But there is no question that the circulation of the daily print newspaper is down and still declining. The value of instant information on the internet is

readily apparent. While many of my friends still value their printed newspapers, their grown children often get their news via the internet, and increasingly, on their cell phones.

The good news for people who like the information they get from newspapers and want to see it continue is that in most American markets the number one source for local information is the newspaper's website.

A recent comScore survey ranked local newspaper websites first among all sources for trustworthiness, credibility and most informative place to find local content of all types, including news, information, entertainment and sports. Newspaper websites have the devoted readership that many advertisers covet.

While newspapers are still figuring out the best formula for monetizing their new products in the changing world of media consumption, the fact that more people than ever are reading their combined products will ultimately assure their longevity.

The way that people get their information is changing, but newspapers usually have more reporters than all other organizations combined in almost every community and no one covers local news better.

Newspapers will continue to report the news that is relevant to their community.

We can be assured of continued change, but we can also expect that newspapers will be around tomorrow, providing local information better than everyone else in a multitude of options.

Perry, White, wage digital battle in final month of campaign

AUSTIN — Voter registration ended Oct. 4, and now, less than a month remains until the general election on Nov. 2.

The 10-day period to early vote in person runs Oct. 18-29.

Election polls show incumbent Republican Gov. Rick Perry continuing to hold a margin of 6 points or so on Democratic candidate Bill White, the former mayor of Houston.

Meanwhile, the Austin American-Statesman, Houston Chronicle, The Dallas Morning News and KLRU-TV in Austin, are sticking with their plan to host an Oct. 19 debate between Perry and White.

The two have not yet hashed out their differences the old fashioned way — eye to eye in public — since winning their party primaries in March.

significant land surveys unavailable for more than 50 years will soon be made accessible to the public.

Willis Day Twichell's surveys of tens of millions of acres of public and private lands in West Texas, recently were donated to the Texas General Land Office by four oil companies operating in the Midland area.

Included are field books, working sketches, 200 finished maps, and about 50,000 pages of correspondence that document surveying work performed in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona and northern Mexico.

Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson said the goal, after digital archiving is completed, is to have the Twichell Papers available to researchers by January.

Twichell laid out more than 40 towns and provided surveying work in 165 of 254 counties in Texas. His surveys, critical to the exploration of oil and gas in West Texas, helped in giving

rise to the XII Ranch, funding the building of the State Capitol, building railroads and funding public education in Texas.

STUDENT DIES IN APPARENT SUICIDE

A masked gunman walked on to the UT-Austin campus and fired shots from the AK-47 assault rifle he was carrying on the morning of Sept. 28.

Police chased the man, identified as University of Texas sophomore Colton J. Tooley, 19, of Austin, into a campus library.

Tooley was found dead on the building's 6th floor of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound, police said.

ECONOMIST: TEXAS LEADS NATION

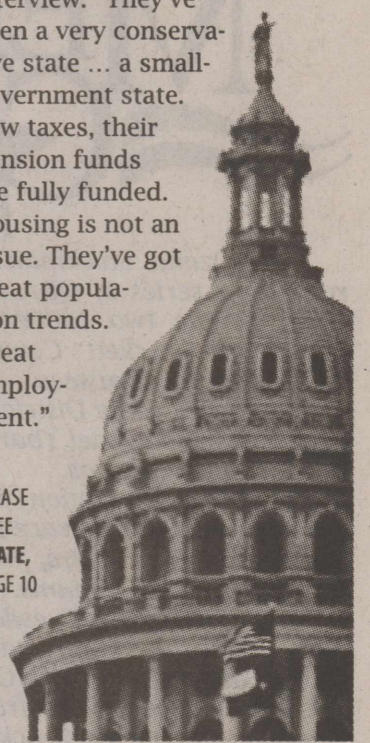
The Governor's Office on Sept. 28 announced economist Meredith Whitney, who predicted the national banking crisis, listed Texas as the national leader in state financial health in a report issued about the condition of

most state governments.

Of the 15 largest states, only Texas and Virginia earned overall positive rankings in Whitney's calculations.

"The best state is actually Texas, by a mile," Whitney said in a CNBC television interview. "They've been a very conservative state ... a small-government state. Low taxes, their pension funds are fully funded. Housing is not an issue. They've got great population trends. Great employment."

Taylor talks love of the West

Growing up near Buffalo, N.Y., Howard Taylor watched western movies and TV shows and saw images of Monument Valley, Calif. thinking that this is how Texas looked.

When he arrived in Texas, the now director of the San Angelo Museum of Fine Arts found a different and unique kind of western.

Showing various art and artists, Taylor spoke Monday night at the Crockett County Public Library Board and Friends of the Library annual board meeting at the Civic Center.

Taylor showed a sculpture, two paintings and several slides of various western art.

"No other place on earth developed as rapidly as the American West," he said. "We are all fascinated in this nation with the West."

Native American portraits, a pair of fur traders, landscapes and the American Cowboy were all the types of paintings presented during Taylor's presentation.

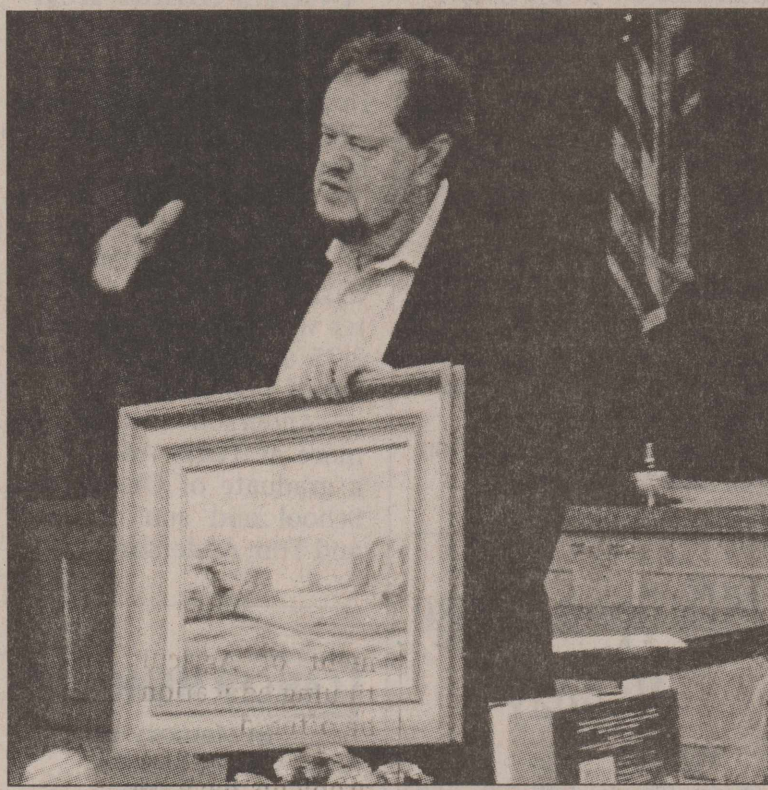
In one painting by artist George Caleb Bingham, Taylor said the artist emphasized painting "the real American West and real westerners" as opposed to the painting of Monument Valley, Calif.

"I kept looking for this Texas when I arrived," Taylor said of the Monument Valley painting. "In Europe they paint the great cathedrals. Here we have God's real cathedrals that are amazing. People couldn't people the early paintings of American landscapes."

The artwork of the American Cowboy was influential from Mexico and the vaquero, Taylor said.

The chaps, the lasso, posture, quality and historic stature came from the vaquero and moved into the "romantic" ideal of the cowboy, he said.

Photos of artwork by famous western artist Frederic Remington were shown, including Remington's famous sculpture "Big Cowboy" still on display in Philadelphia, Pa.

In the painting by Jimmy Cox, brought by Taylor, the cowboy was more rough and real-looking, instead of his romantic counterpart.

"In reality it's a rough job, not high class employment," Taylor said.

Animal sculptures are also popular in Western Art. Taylor showed one of a mountain lion with a boa constrictor by Edward Kemeys, the sculpture of the two lions that stand outside the Chicago Art Institute.

One thing that makes Kerney's work stand out is "he really went out and looked at nature," Taylor said.

Currently, the San Angelo Museum of Fine Arts has an exhibit called "Viva Mexico" celebrating the 200th anniversary of Mexico's independence from Spain.

Two historically significant paintings by Mexican artist Cristóbal de Villalpando are on display. On loan from a private collector, Esther Siegfried of Feldmeilen, Switzerland, these large paintings are part of a series that depict the life of St. Francis of Assisi.

In November, the museum will open a new exhibit featuring the furniture designs of Herman Miller.

"We are international," Taylor said of the museum.

Also speaking Monday night was local artist Ann Fowler who currently has an exhibit at the Crockett County Public Library.

Fowler thanked the library and everyone involved for allowing her artwork to be displayed.

"Art is a very powerful thing. Every day life contains my inspiration," she said. "I am hoping this people will see the power of art, and that art's greatest power is that it makes you think and discover."

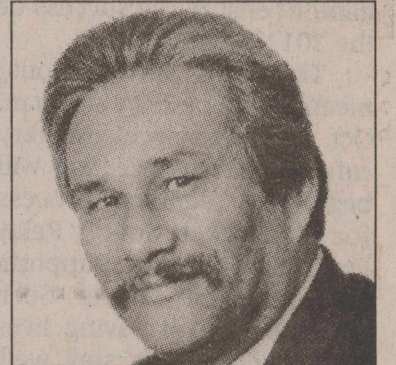

The Lions would battle back to take the lead again, after the hole defensive line would block a punt and Lombrana would scoop and

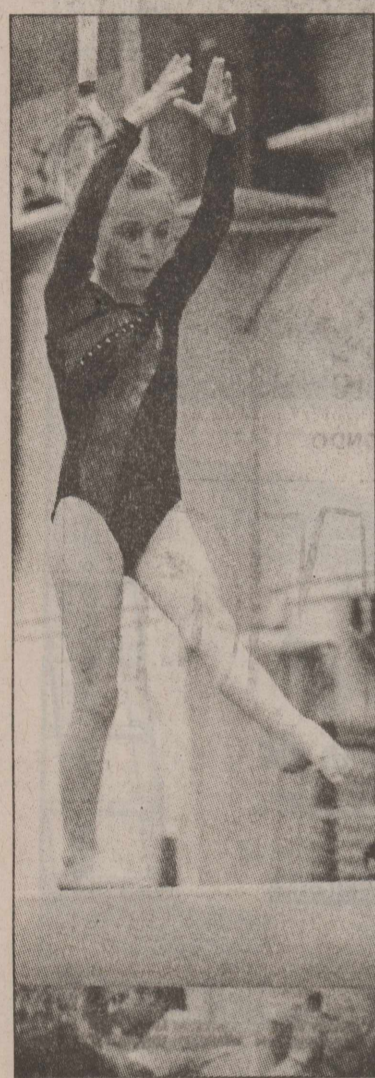
score and then add the two-point conversion to give the Lions a 16-14 lead.

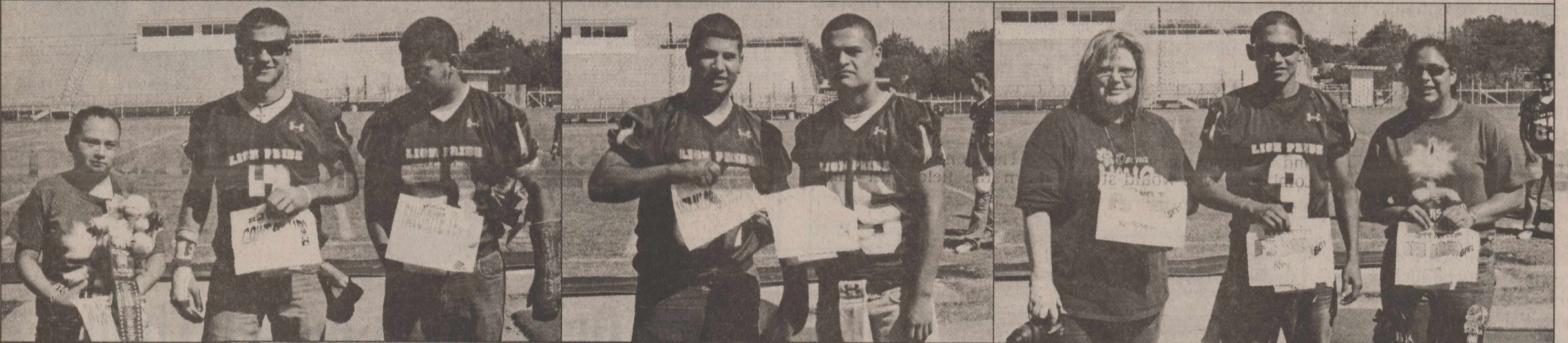
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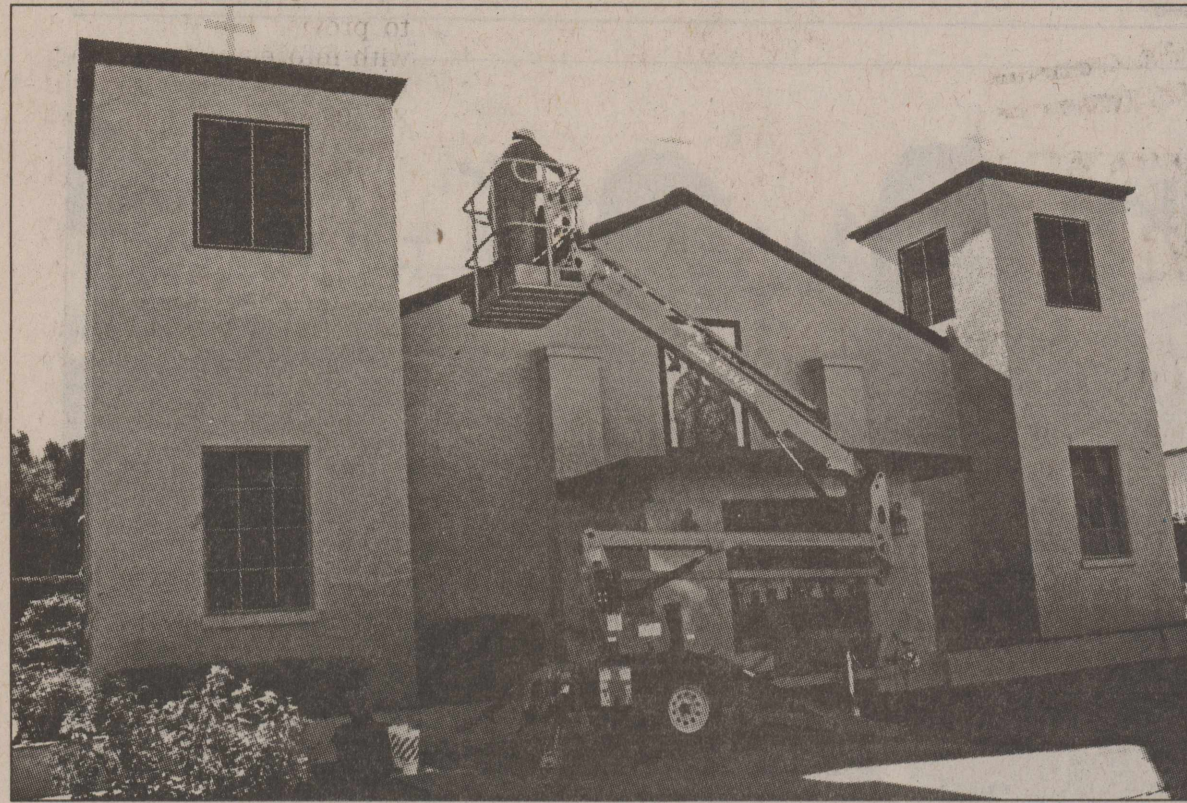

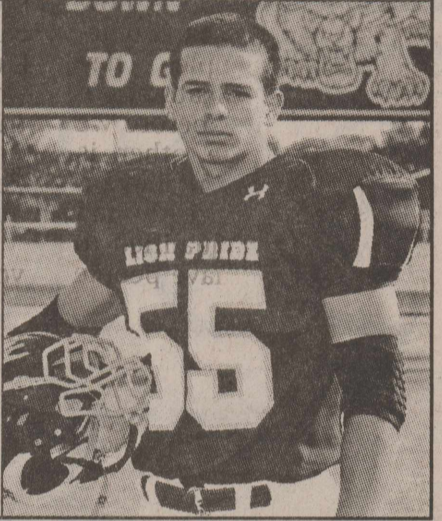

The third type of license is the wildlife management association area hunting lease license. This license also requires an application, available at law enforcement offices or TPWD headquarters. Wildlife management association area hunting lease licenses may not be issued to a corporation or entity. The department may designate two or more contiguous or proximate (a tract of land within one-half mile of another member tract) tracts of land as a wildlife management association area if:

1. each owner of the land applies for the designation;
2. the land is inhabited by wildlife;
3. the department determines that observing wildlife and collecting information about the wildlife will serve the purpose of wildlife management in the state; and
4. the landowners agree


to provide the department with information regarding the wildlife under Section 81.302 of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Code.

The fees for licensing of this type of area are:

- Fewer than 10,000 acres - \$38 plus \$6 per participating landowner
 - Between 10,000 and 50,000 acres - \$76 plus \$6 per participating landowner
 - More than 50,000 acres - \$152 plus \$6 per participating landowner
- A hunting lease license is valid for the period from Sept. 1 through Aug. 31

"A person who violates any provision of the hunting lease license requirements commits an offense that is a Class C Parks and Wildlife Code misdemeanor, which carries a fine of between \$25-\$500," said Scott Vaca, Assistant Chief of Wildlife Enforcement at TPWD.

Second-degree Felony - shall be punished by imprisonment in the institutional division for any term of not more than 20 years or less than 2 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.
First-degree Felony - shall be punished by imprisonment in the institutional division for life or for any term of not more than 99 years or less than 5 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

TEXAS BEACHES GET FALL CLEANING
