Gun control debate takes Mexico into account

In the recent debate about stricter gun control, some officials on both sides of the Rio Grande saw a sliver of hope — that such laws might curb the flow of illegal weapons over the United States' southern border. "I hope that whatever we are going to do in trying to protect our gun rights but at the same time regulate the legal ownership of weapons is

going to have a component on guns that are being smuggled out of the country so easily now and causing the carnage," said Alonzo Peña, the former deputy director of Immigrations and Customs Enforcement who also served as a Department of Homeland Security attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Mexico City. But the national debate, coupled with the Obama administration's proposals to tighten gun laws, has only fortified the

ranks of Second Amendment proponents in Texas, who remain adamant that the border states that are a main source for weapons in Mexico's drug war are not responsible for the thousands of murders in that country since 2006. After President Obama last week called for more background checks on potential gun purchasers and a ban on military-style assault weapons and high-capacity magazines, Republican lawmakers immedi-

ately rebuked the White House's efforts. Texas state lawmakers have already filed legislation in Austin that would permit college students to carry weapons on campus and proposed a measure that would also open the door for gun-carrying marshals at primary schools. Attorney General Greg Abbott last week threatened Travis County and the City of Austin with a "double-barreled" lawsuit when they considered banning gun shows on public

property, and Gov. Rick Perry has said the country's Democratic leadership is using the slaughter of innocent children as a political pawn. "The piling on by the political left, and their cohorts in the media, to use the massacre of little children to advance a pre-existing political agenda that would not have saved those children, disgusts me personally," Perry said in a statement on Wednesday. Other Texas Republicans

dismissed the notion that it was time to re-evaluate what role the U.S. plays in the carnage in Mexico, where more than 70,000 people have been killed in cartel-related violence since former President Felipe Calderón launched a war on organized crime in December 2006. A December 2012 report from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives showed that more

West Texas Rehab Telethon hits \$1.2 million

The Rehab 2013 telethon on Saturday, benefiting the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, brought in a little more than \$1.2 million, the fourth-best total in the telethon's 43-year history. 'Firearms Protection Act' would override federal gun bans

Positive revenue forecast means we can do more for education

House and Senate budget writers unveiled their starting-point budgets for 2014-15 in week two of the legislative session. While this first peek was somewhat disappointing because many of the cuts imposed last time are still there, it is early in the legislative process, and I am hopeful that some of those funds — particularly for public education — will be restored.

The 2011 session began in a deep financial hole, with the comptroller forecasting that we would be some \$26 billion short of the amount needed to meet then-current needs and account for the growth in public school enrollment, Medicaid caseloads, and other programs over the coming two years.

To close that deficit, a majority in the Legislature voted to cut public education and defer more than \$5 billion in Medicaid costs. Fast-forward to the current session, and it's quite a different story. When the 2013 session began, the comptroller announced there would be \$101.4 billion in general revenue available for the next two-year budget, almost 12.5 percent more than the current spending plan.

With a revenue forecast like that, there was good reason to expect that education funds would be restored. But in the budget overviews unveiled last week, the cuts imposed last time were still in place — not just for public education, but higher ed, public health, public safety, and other vital programs.

But there are reasons to be hopeful. These early budget proposals leave about \$5.5 billion unspent, and I believe school administrators, teachers, parents, and other advocates of public education can make a great case for giving more money to schools. I encourage them to make their voices heard as the session goes forward.

I also believe that we can give schools what they need without going on a "spending spree." Two years ago, we got a harsh lesson in frugality. We all want the state to live within its means, but the Legislature also needs to recognize the value of education and its vital importance to Texas' future.

Those House and Senate committees will soon be given to write detailed bud-

get plans that will be reconciled into a single bill that lawmakers will vote on in May. I am hopeful that the final product will adequately provide for the school children of Texas, while maintaining the restraint that allows us to balance the budget every time the Legislature meets. Let's hope the children come first!

HONORING AND SAYING GOODBYE TO GOOD FRIENDS

The second week of the session was an emotional one for me and my colleagues in the Senate, as we honored the longest serving member, Sen. John Whitmire; and paid homage to the late Sen. Mario Gallegos — both of Houston and best friends.

Whitmire, just 23 years old when he first took his seat in the Legislature in 1973, makes the official motion to adjourn each day and is charged with other ceremonial duties. But his main role can't be found in any rulebook.

As the guardian of Senate decorum, he has made it his job over the years to teach new members — whether Democrat or Republican — that the Senate is a place of respect and tradition; that its rules and its members must be held in esteem by the people for it to accomplish anything.

On Wednesday, we paid tribute to Sen. Gallegos, who died in October at age 62. A former firefighter, Gallegos was a big man with a great sense of humor, but also a tenacious and unrelenting champion for people who needed a voice at the table of government.

The accolades for Whitmire and Gallegos — from both sides of the aisle — showed why the Senate is such a special place. Regardless of our political philosophies and the fact that we are often adversaries who engage in heated debate, at the end of the day we are friends.

Dewhurst names Senate panel chairs

AUSTIN — Key to getting the 83rd session of the Texas Legislature in gear, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, president of the Texas Senate, on Jan. 17 made public his choices for committee chairs and members of each committee. Senate bills can now be assigned to committees and public hearings set.

Sen. Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands, returns as chair of the body's powerful Finance Committee, whose primary task is to craft the state budget for 2014-2015.

Also named as committee chairs were senators: Kevin Eltife, R-Tyler, Administration; Craig Estes, R-Wichita Falls, Agriculture, Rural Affairs and Homeland Security; John Carona, R-Dallas, Business and Commerce; John Whitmire (dean of the Senate), Criminal Justice; Bob Deuell, R-Greenville, Economic Development; Dan Patrick,

R-Houston, Education; Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, Government Organization; and Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville, Health and Human Services.

And, Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, Higher Education; Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, Intergovernmental Relations; Royce West, D-Dallas, Jurisprudence; Troy Fraser, R-Marble Falls, Natural Resources; Glen Hegar, R-Katy, Nominations; Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, Open Government; Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, State Affairs; Robert Nichols, R-Jacksonville, Transportation; and Letitia Van de Putte (Senate president pro tempore), D-San Antonio, Veterans Affairs and Military Installations.

Sen. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, was reappointed as vice chairman of the Senate Administration Committee

and the Agriculture, Rural Affairs and Homeland Security Committee, and appointed for the first time to the Transportation Committee.

Dewhurst also reappointed Uresti to the Health and Human Services and Natural Resources committees. Uresti's district includes Crockett County.

Speaker Joe Straus has not yet named House committee chairs and members. In the 2011 session, Straus named them on Feb. 9. In 2009 — his first term as speaker — Straus announced his committee appointments on Feb. 12.

As of the end of the second week of the session (Jan. 18), 748 bills and resolutions had been filed by House members, while Senate members had filed 201 over the same period. To give some idea of what lies ahead in that regard,

in the last 140-day regular session, 7,003 House and 3,312 Senate bills and resolutions were filed.

The bill-filing deadline is March 8, the 60th day of the current session. The deadline applies to bills and joint resolutions (proposed constitutional amendments) other than local bills, emergency

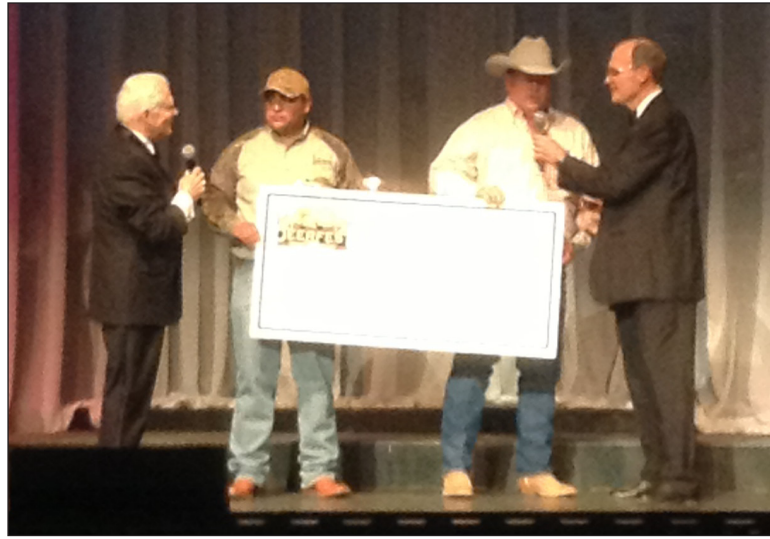

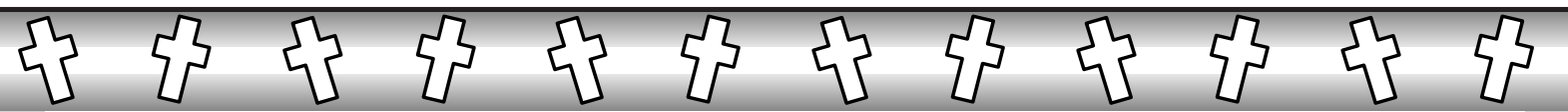

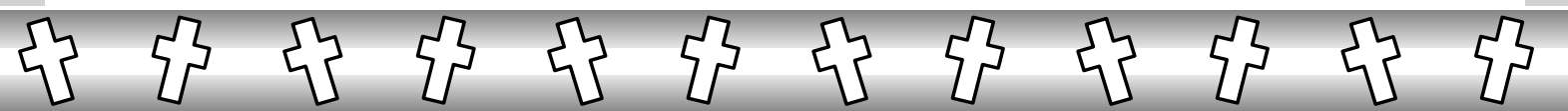

appropriations and bills that have been declared "emergency" by the governor. MANY GUN BILLS ARE FILED

More than a dozen state lawmakers have filed legislation pertaining to firearms, as reported by many journals. The bills deal with who, what, when, where and how a handgun can be carried, licensing procedures, permit fees, renewals and more.

One of the bills, SB 182 by Sen. Brian Birdwell, R-Waco, sets forth conditions under which a concealed handgun license holder may "carry" on land and buildings owned or leased by an institution of higher education.

In other news, a rally at the state Capitol on Jan. 19 against President Obama's recent gun control proposals drew several hundred people.

YEAR ENDS WITH JOB GAINS

December was the fourth straight month that the unemployment rate in Texas has declined, the Texas Workforce Commission reported on Jan. 18.

Texas' unemployment rate fell to 6.1 percent in December, down from 6.2 percent in November and from 7.4 percent a year ago, the agency's Chairman Andres Alcantar said. Also, private sector employers in Texas added 257,400 jobs since December 2011 for an annual growth rate of 2.9 percent.

TRAVIS LETTER TO HEAD HOME

William Barret Travis's "Victory or Death" letter written on Feb. 24, 1836 will be returned to the Alamo on Feb. 22 for a grand celebration at Alamo Plaza.

This will be the first time the letter -- which resides at the Texas State Library and Archives in Austin -- has been at the Alamo since it left with a courier on horseback during the famous 13-day siege in 1836, Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson said Jan. 16. Visitors will be asked to be silent and respectful when viewing the document "from a safe distance" and no flash photography will be allowed.

Alamo visitors will be able to view the letter Feb. 23 through March 7.

68,160 of the approximately 99,700 weapons recovered in Mexico and submitted for tracing from 2007 to 2011 had originated in the U.S.

U.S. Rep. Michael McCaul, R-Austin and the chairman of the House Committee on Homeland Security, said the data is misleading and that changing gun laws in the United States would not change gun behavior in Mexico.

"The fact is, guns are illegal to possess in Mexico," McCaul said, "and that certainly hasn't had any effects on the drug cartels."

He said he understood that the debate is fueled by emotion, which he said was inevitable after years of bloodshed in Mexico and the murder of 20 schoolchildren in Connecticut.

But he also said the public is not aware that many of the weapons favored by cartels like the Zetas come from other countries and are often not traceable, which inevitably leads to data that reflects poorly on the U.S.

"We all feel for what happened recently with the shooting in a very emotional way, but the fact is, a lot of their AK-47s, which is the Zetas' gun of choice, those are coming from China and Russia," McCaul said. "We could make guns in the United States illegal altogether and I don't think it's going to stop the drug cartels from getting weapons."

Gun-control proponents who link the United States' gun laws to violence in Mexico have drawn attention to what they call the gun-show loophole, which allows many dealers to sell firearms without conducting background checks.

Critics call it a significant flaw that allows weapons to fall into the wrong hands, and law enforcement officers say it has aided the illegal smuggling of weapons into Mexico.

Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson, a Republican and gun collector who authored the state's concealed handgun law in 1995 when he served as a state senator, drew attention last month when he suggested that he was open to changing how background checks are conducted at gun shows.

Patterson is not changing his mind on gun rights.

What he is actually calling for is a privacy measure, he said, which would allow a customer to get a background check at a gun show that is good for the duration of the event — but that would not leave evidence of the purchase.

Patterson said what gun owners fear is what they believe gun control proponents want: to record every conveyance of a firearm.

"The fear is that things like that lead to registration," Patterson said. "Registration may not be unconstitutional, but confiscation certainly is, and you can't have confiscation without registration."

In one of his first public statements after being appointed Mexico's ambassador to the U.S., Eduardo Medina Mora, the former attorney general of Mexico, said the Connecticut shooting presented officials in the United States with an opportunity to quell the illegal flow of weapons into his country.

U.S. Rep. Beto O'Rourke, D-El Paso, said ignoring the smuggling of weapons across the border during the current gun control debate would be counterproductive to the United States' work under the Mérida Initiative, a \$1.4 billion aid package of equipment and training designed to help Mexico and Central America fight drug violence.

He said better enforcement of existing American laws, closing gaping loopholes and instituting waiting periods for the purchase of high-powered guns should be on the table.

"As part of a community that has seen more than 10,000 people murdered in the last five or six years, this is certainly a discussion worth having," O'Rourke said. "El Paso and other communities that have a unique perspective on this, given the recent violence in Mexico, should certainly be part of the conversation."

Patterson acknowledged there is a problem with weapons smuggling into Mexico. But he said the best solution to end the carnage there is outside his purview as a Texas official.

"It wouldn't be a U.S. law; it would be a Mexican law," he said. "There is no right to bear arms in Mexico. I would put forth a law that would establish a Second Amendment to keep and bear arms for Mexican citizens."
