# ASU releases Big Lake

**Disincorporation Study**

Reagan County Judge Larry Isom has received Angelo State University's disincorporation study for the

city of Big Lake. The document, which totals 21 pages, is in the form of a template.

"This template is an objective analysis of the facts," ASU's Jack Barbour, Ph.D. said. "People across the state can use it as a tool when thinking about disincorporation.'

Barbour said that he wanted to keep the template broad so that it could be applied to many communities.

"We could have been bogged down by minutia if we had focused specifically on Big Lake," Barbour said. "This template will help get people to focus on different areas that are impacted by disincorporation no matter what community they live in.'

County Judge Larry Isom said that the document was not what he was expecting from the study.

"I thought we were going to see more of a pros and cons type of paper,

Isom said. "Something everyone could look at and form an opinion on.

Then we could move forward."

The paper begins with a brief description of what disincorporation is legally and the different forms it

can take. It points out that there

are three types of disincorporation: passive, involuntary and voluntary. The first two are initiated by the state while the latter, which is being discussed for Big Lake, is initiated from the local level.

The study then directs the reader to the legal framework for disincorporation for a general law city (such as Big Lake.) That framework is found in Texas Government Code Section 62.002.

The code state that "it is the responsibility of the mayor to order and election on the issue of disincorporation upon receiving petition signed by at least 400 qualified voters of the municipality. Upon the receipt of the petition, the mayor shall order the election to be held on the same date as the next general election at which the office of the mayor is to be filled."

If a majority of the voters cast ballots in favor to disincorporate, the mayor shall declare the abolishment of the community and certify the abolition to the county commissioners' court, the report stated.

County government does not play a role in this process as the county judge is restricted from ordering special recall municipal elections, the report stated.

The report also gives an example of how Center Point, Texas went through the disincorporating process in 1999.

# Rehab center's annual telethon raises its second-highest total

ABILENE — The West Texas Rehabilitation Center 2014 telethon Saturday raised a little more than \$1.28 million, its second-highest amount in the event's 44 years.

The final tally of \$1,280,765 is up slightly from last year's total of \$1,202,646. Dan Huggins, the center's director of donor relations, said the 2012 campaign remains the record, with just over \$1.33 million raised.

Ozona Woman's League raised an all-time high of \$14,050. All of that money will go to the West Texas Rehab Center in Ozona.

## Postage increase takes effect Sunday

Mailing a letter is going to get a little more expensive next week.

Starting Sunday, Jan. 26, the price of a first-class stamp will increase 3 cents, bringing the charge to 49

cents a letter. The increase, according to the Postal Regulatory Commission, is to help the Postal Service recover from severe mail decreases brought on by the 2008 economic down-

The higher rate will last no more than two years, allowing the Postal Service to recoup \$2.8 billion in losses.

Bulk mail, periodicals and package service rates will rise 6 percent. The Postal Service is an

independent agency that does not depend on tax money for its operations but is subject to congressional control.

Under federal law, it can't raise prices more than the rate of inflation without approval from the commission.

tion to help with its financial woes, including an end to Saturday mail delivery and reduced payments on retiree health benefits.

The figures through Sept. 30 were actually an improvement for the agency from a \$15.9 billion loss in 2012.

The post office has struggled for years with declining mail volume as a result of growing Internet use and a 2006 congressional requirement that it make annual \$5.6 billion payments to cover expected health care costs for future retirees. It has defaulted on three of those pay-

The Postal Service has only twice lowered the price of a stamp: in the mid-19th century from 3 cents to 2 cents, and again after the end of World War I. In neither case was the higher price the result of a temporary autho-

The last price increase for stamps was in January, when the cost of sending a letter rose by a penny to 46 cents. A postcard also increased by one cent to 33 cents.

#### The Federal Reserve needs a 100-year checkup

aintaining the purchasing power of the dollar is critical to a strong U.S. economy and to the economic well-being of middle-class American families. The Constitution grants Congress power over our nation's currency. One hundred years ago, Congress assigned this responsibility to the Federal Reserve. The Fed's centennial anniversary, reached last month, marks an appropriate time for a constructive and bipartisan review of America's central bank's performance over its first century and the proper role for the Fed in the future.

Unfortunately, the purchasing power of the U.S. dollar over time has been anything but stable. A dollar in 1967 is equivalent to barely 14 cents today.

There are significant and thoughtful disagreements among policy experts and free-market leaders about whether the Fed should maintain its current policies or begin aggressively reinmg m us easy-money poncies to avoid stoking new asset bubbles or planting the

seeds of future inflation. There are concerns about the dual mandate that Congress placed on the Fed in 1977; picking winners and losers in the credit markets, which jeopardizes the political independence of the institution; the make-up of the Federal Open Market Committee; and the trans-

parency of the Fed. We believe the moment is right for an objective, comprehensive survey of the Fed's existing mandate and policy framework. That's why we have introduced the Centennial Monetary Commission Act, which would establish an independent, balanced, bipartisan panel to collect evidence and make recommendations to Congress.

The Fed's original mission was to provide an elastic currency within the context of the gold standard to combat seasonal financial issues. A hundred years later, its mission has obviously become much broader.

Today, in pursuing its employment mandate, the Fed has purchased more than \$3 trillion worth of Treasury bonds, federal agency bonds, and federal agency mortgage-backed securities — its so-called "quantitative easing" strategy. Its total balance sheet now stands

at \$4.1 trillion — four times larger than before the crisis. The Fed has also gener-

ated a staggering \$2.4 tril-

lion in excess reserves. In normal times, commercial banks convert excess reserves into new loans and investments, boosting the demand for goods and services. However, in recent years, commercial banks have been reluctant to lend and invest, and so the Fed's dramatic monetary expansion hasn't increased aggregate demand to the levels we might have expected.

Indeed, despite the Fed's "monetary morphine" stimulus to Wall Street, America is experiencing its weakest economic recovery of the postwar era.

Admittedly, quantitative easing and extraordinarily low interest rates have clearly boosted stock prices. The S&P 500 Total Return Index adjusted for inflation has more than doubled since the official end of the recession in June 2009. Real disposable income per capita has increased by less than 4 percent. At this point in an average recovery, a rami ly of four would have nearly \$11,000 more to spend than the Obama recovery provided. We don't begrudge Wall Street's success, but we do lament the fact that so many middle-class families on Main Street have been left behind.

While families' net worth on paper looks much better today than it did in 2009. will the gains prove illusory? Is America headed for a major stock market correction, or perhaps even another crash? Will the fuel of excess reserves spark general price inflation?

Most importantly, what is the best role and rules for the Federal Reserve to ensure America remains the strongest economy on earth through the 21st century?

These are the thoughtful issues and long-term view the members of the Centennial Monetary Commission would address.

Both Republicans and Democrats have a common interest in getting monetary policy right. Good monetary policy provides the foundation for a strong economy that is essential to eliminating our fiscal deficit.

Given the centennial and the experience of the recent financial crisis, there has never been a more appropriate time to re-examine the Fed's role in American life.

## Faults Alarm

As an admirer of old bits and spurs I bought a fancy catalog for an estate auction of a very rich man who was a collector of collections. The sale featured his fine art, furniture, cars, Indian blankets, saddles, silverware, dishes, bits, spurs and a host of other items. As a potential bidder I had to pay \$20 just to get the catalog. Can you imagine if a bull breeder tried to charge a potential customer for his or her sale catalog? No one would show up for the sale, and if they did I'm quite sure that such a greedy person might also charge for the traditionally-free lunch.

The company that handled the sale usually sells art so the catalog was like no other I'd seen. It read like the sale manager was allergic to lawyers because after every item description in capital letters were the words: "YOUR BID INDICATES ACCEPTANCE OF ALL OUR CONDITIONS OF SALE. ALL SALES FINAL." If those words appeared after every description of a horse in a sale the auctioneer would never get a bid.

No one should ever complain about the commission they pay to sell or buy livestock because in this auction 20% of the hammer price was added right on top. If you didn't have any money and charged your purchase on a credit card it was an extra 2.5%. Add to that the applicable sales tax and the buyer would have to pay over 30% on top of what he bid! And this doesn't count what the seller had to pay the sale manager in commission! Hey, warping on the back with dirt accumula-

give his opinion on what they were worth and his estimates were then lowered by the sale manager so as to not scare off any buyers. Some lots brought ten times more than the estimates. Just think what might happen to a cow buyer who missed that badly.

It got me to thinking, what if bull and horse sale catalogs were written up like art? Here's how a typical description might read:

Condition: Areas of leather show scratches, rubbed wear, cracks and dents one would expect to see on a bull of this era. White spot in eye indicates early repair. There is some minor

## Report proposes paths toward water security

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — State Comptroller Susan Combs on Jan. 14 released "Texas Water Report: Going Deeper For The Solution," a study of water issues Texas faces, and a set of recommendations.

"Texas has been prone to cycles of drought for centuries and there is no reason to expect that basic pattern to change," Combs said in bringing attention to the report. "Yet our state has changed and its booming population and economy are creating an increasingly unquenchable demand for water," she added.

Available now at the comptroller's web site (cpa.state. tx.us) the report also explains the \$2 billion in new funding for water projects approved Nov. 5 by voters in a constitutional amendment. Voter approval was a positive step, Combs said, adding, "We need a revolution in water technology. We need a breakthrough in this field, and some of our

state funding should be used for innovative technologies which increase conservation." In the report, Combs recom-

mends: - A "prize framework" to be established by the Legislature, "to reward those who develop

drinking water." - Cost-effective supplements to reservoirs and aquifers.

- A grant program to provide assistance to local water authorities "including but not limited to" cities, counties, river authorities, water conservation districts and municipal utility districts that achieve "meaningful and verifiable increases in water efficiency due to conservation activities."

"Although we tend to point to the historic drought as a singular cause for our water problems today, we're not

blameless," said state Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, in quoted material included in Combs' release.

"Moreover, there exists no single silver bullet solution. To make matters more complicated, Texas is so geographically and meteorologically diverse, that what may work in one part of the state would be ineffective in another. That is why it is so critical that the Legislature continue to promote conservation and innovation for municipal, industrial and agricultural water uses," Duncan said.

#### **DROUGHT DISASTER CONTINUES**

Gov. Rick Perry on Jan. 16 renewed his July 5, 2011 drought disaster proclamation certifying that exceptional drought conditions posed a threat in 120 counties in Texas.





#### THE FAITHFUL SOLDIER

His name was Hiroo Onoda and was the last Japanese soldier of the Japanese Imperial Army to surrender after WWII some 29 years after it ended. His assignment by his commanding officer was to remain undercover in the Philippian jungle and spy on American troops. Japanese soldiers were taught absolute loyalty to the nation and the emperor. They observed a code that said, "Death was preferable to surrender". He heard rumors saying the war was over but not wanting to be tricked he would not give up until he received orders from his commanding officer to come home. He passed away last week at the age of 91. That soldier reminds me of something in the Bible. Center Point, a town of around 800 people near Kerrville, faced court battles and legal challenges before the Kerr County Commissioners' Court accepted the vote by the town citizens.

The document then outlines different areas of a community that can be affected by disincorporation. The areas mentioned are: social and cultural aspects; Institutional structure, service delivery concerns, financial issues and specific questions (sales tax, hotel occupancy tax, property tax, roads within municipalities, special districts in Texas and health issues.)

The study also includes Ozona and Crockett County as an example of how county government can provide many of the services generally associated with municipalities. As an unincorporated area within the county, Ozona's services are provided by the county.

"Regardless of which

level of government provides the services, however, costs don't disappear. So determining which services and at what level and quality to meet current and future needs and expectations can develop into a highly charged political issue. To help reduce anxiety over disincorporation a dialogue with the residents as to which services, at what level and costs is

essential," the report stated. The paper includes an addendum from John Brockman, former president of Coastal Bend College and the person who started the disincorpora-


tion discussion in Big Lake. At the end of the report, the study states: "If Santa Rita # 1 had been discovered in 2013 instead of 1923 and just as suddenly Big Lake town had a population of 3,000 and Reagan County one of 3,400 there would be no real need to incorporate the town. For one, the voters of Big Lake would have immediate control of the county government. In 2013 they would not have to wait 27 years to get a majority of

the population and another 18 years for a Supreme Court decision to establish majority rule in county governments. These were done deals in 2013. And in 2013, there would be little concern about the impact of county taxes on rural land already long taxed on its productive rather than its market value.

The question today is why have both a city and a county governments when only one is required? This is especially true in situations where the taxable valuations in a county such as Reagan are so much greater than the valuations in a town such as Big Lake. Just have one government and leave \$750,000 a year in the pockets of city property owners. In ten years, the savings would be \$7.5 million."


Board President Ray Don Myers told Lombrana to



## **Highway patrol seizes** 900 pounds of marijuana

The Texas Highway Patrol stopped a Ford pickup pulling a cattle trailer on Interstate-10 west of Ozona at 8:30 p.m. Jan. 16.

One of the occupants identified as Julio Cesar Gonzalez-Garcia was found to be a Mexican National that was in the country illegally.

The traffic stop resulted in the discovery and seizure of approximately 900 pounds of marijuana in the trailer that the vehicle was towing.

The case has been turned over to federal authorities for prosecution and the investigation is ongoing.

## **Gallego announces 22 counties** receive drought relief

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Today, U.S. Rep. Pete P. Gallego, D-Alpine, announced federal drought relief assistance for 22 counties in the 23rd District of Texas. The assistance comes through a declaration by U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack. The funds are made available through the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"Our farmers and ranchers have been hit by a terrible drought in Texas," he said. "Now, these businessmen and women can seek help and protect their farms and ranchlands through an emergency loan. I will continue to work with Secretary Vilsack, and the House Agriculture Committee to make resources available for this."

Secretary Vilsack designated 108 Texas counties as primary natural disaster areas due to the recent drought. These counties suffered from a "drought intensity value during the growing season for eight or more consecutive weeks," according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Those primary natural disaster counties that qualify

for federal relief are: Bexar, Dimmit, Edwards, Frio, Kinney, La Salle, Medina, Terrell, Uvalde, Val Verde and Zavala.

As part of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, under a similar classification, Secretary Vilsack designated contiguous counties, near counties affected by the drought, to also receive federal relief.

Those counties are: Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Maverick, Pecos, Reagan, Schleicher, Sutton, Upton, Ward and Winkler.

A disaster designation makes farmers in primary counties and those counties near primary counties eligible for assistance from the Farm Service Agency (FSA), including FSA emergency loans. FSA considers each emergency loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of production losses on the farm, and the security and repayment ability of the farmer.

Anita Perry, first lady of Texas, on Jan. 9 said it's not too late for Texans to get immunized.

"As a nurse, I know how safe and effective the flu vaccine is, and how easy it is to get. I'm urging all Texans to protect themselves and their fellow Texans from this potentially deadly disease by getting vaccinated," she said in a Jan. 9 announcement along with state Health and Human Services Commissioner Kyle Janek.

Flu kills an average of 23,600 Americans a year, say statistics from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

#### **SAFETY MEETINGS SCHEDULED**

The State Fire Marshal's Office on Jan. 13 announced plans to conduct a series of meetings with county officials and first responders to reinforce best practices for ammonium nitrate storage facilities.

Partnering in the initiative are the Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas Department of State Health Services, Texas Office of the State Chemist, and Texas A&M Engineering and

Extension Service. The purpose of the meetings is to review lessons learned from the April 2013 fertilizer plant fire and explosion in West, Texas, best practices for storage of ammonium nitrate with facility management, and response techniques and strategies of first responders to these type of incidents.

Meetings were scheduled in Edinburg Jan. 15, Hillsboro, Jan. 23, and Pasadena, Jan. 31.

#### 'WANTED' PROGRAM **SETS RECORDS**

Texas Department of Public Safety announced Jan. 14 its Texas 10 Most Wanted Program set records in 2013 in total captures, including sex offender apprehensions.

The program's 32 total apprehensions during the past year broke the record of 30 arrests in 2012. The 19 captured sex offenders exceeded the previous record of eight also set in 2012. And, the \$77,500 paid in rewards is the second-highest total payout in a year, the DPS stated.






