Brown Reflected In 17 Horn Past Year

Dunstreet recently reported that during the last five years 17 businesses have been built in Muleshoe. The staff of the newspaper questioned this figure and began a little quiet investigation just how many new businesses and business buildings have been built in Muleshoe in the last year alone.

A conservative estimate shows that at least 17 new businesses have either started or moved into town since the first of 1955.

The First National Bank was begun this year recently moved into the building. Bobby's Beauty and the Selective Service into a brand new building. So did the Raymond Green cotton office and the Nickels Gin office.

Blackburn Food moved into a new brick building, and Bovel Motor Supply absorbed space formerly occupied by the grocery store.

Hunkle's Electric moved into their new brick building, and Hut Crawford moved into his new building last week.

Remund-Wilson and Kent Furniture both occupied new quarters on main street, as did Johnson Shoes.

Dunlap's built a new building on main street, as did Red Johnson for his furniture business.

And out on the highway, at least three new service stations were constructed, and Bloddy Ray remodeled his station completely.

Since the city hall only recently began keeping building permit records, there is no accurate way of knowing how many new residences have been built here, but it is probably safe to estimate half a hundred within the past 12 to 18 months.

All of which reflect the ever increasing growth and prosperity of "The Capital of the West Plains."

Bond Election Set February 4

FIRST BABY OF 1956



Shirley A. Payton, born at 10:43 a. m., January 2, is the first baby reported born in Bailey County in the new year of 1956.

She was born at West Plains Hospital to Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Payton and has six brothers and sisters to share with. Her father is a farm laborer, working on the Tom Watson farm. Dr. L. T. Green was the attending physician, and the baby weighed six pounds, 15 ounces. For being the first baby of the year, Shirley Ann will receive a host of gifts from Muleshoe merchants, including blankets, baby food, free ride home, and many other gifts.

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The Bailey County Commissioners Court this week issued a call for an election to vote \$50,000 in road bonds for securing right of way for four-laning U. S. highway 84 and for farm to market roads in the county. The election has been called for February 4, and is in response to a petition received by the Court bearing the names of 84 qualified voters, which is more than the minimum number required for such a petition.

The election order states that \$25,000 of the total amount will be used for purchasing right of way on highway 84 and for farm to market roads, and the other \$25,000 will be used for right of way for farm to market roads only.

All bonds will be sold at a price not to exceed 3 1/2 per cent interest, with the Court pretty certain that the interest will not be more than 2 1/2 per cent annually.

At 2 1/2 per cent interest over a period of 10 years maturity an assessed valuation of \$11,000,000, the average yearly requirement for the principal and interest will be \$5,625. With an average .06 tax at 90 per cent collection the yield will be \$5,940 annually, or more than enough to cover the principal and interest. The tax rate would vary from about 6 1/2 cents the first year to about 5 1/2 cents the last year of the 10 year maturity period.

Some recently purchased equipment, including a frozen food display case will be used first in the new building.

Mr. Wagnon said the firm will continue its delivery service and its policy of charge accounts. The building they now occupy is practically new and is attractively finished. The fore will have 2400 sq. feet of floor space against 2400 sq. feet of present location. A plate for a formal opening will be announced after they have settled down in their new home.

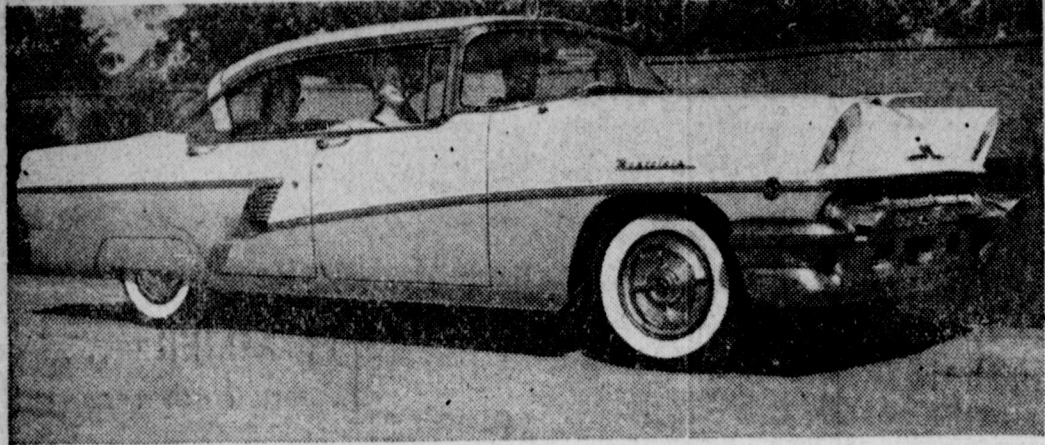

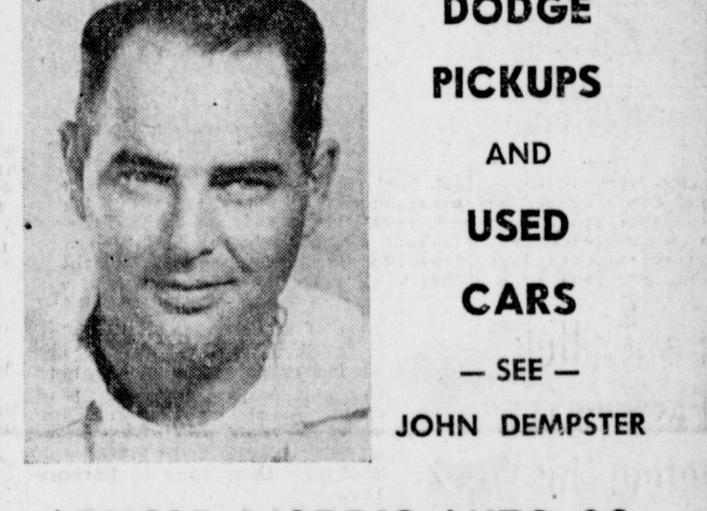

Both programs are conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

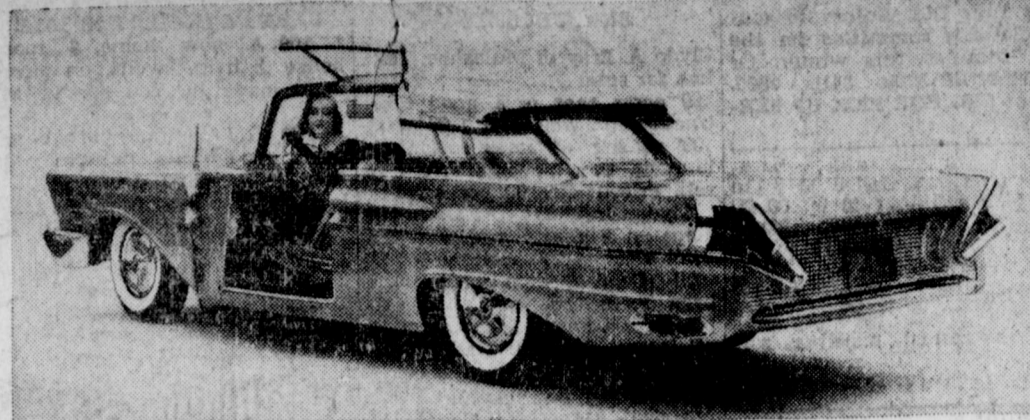

Jerry learned much about insects and insect life through the Entomology program.

He has 125 different insects in his collection and finds that it helps him to understand them as well as control harmful ones. He attended the Entomology short course at College Station.

For his insect control program he used his own garden and cotton fields, which he sprayed and dusted. He also sprayed his livestock for fly control and in his poultry demonstrations showed how to control lice and mites. He has an understanding of insecticides and the correct dosage for certain types of insects. He has been a member of 4-H five years under the leadership of H. C. Smith.

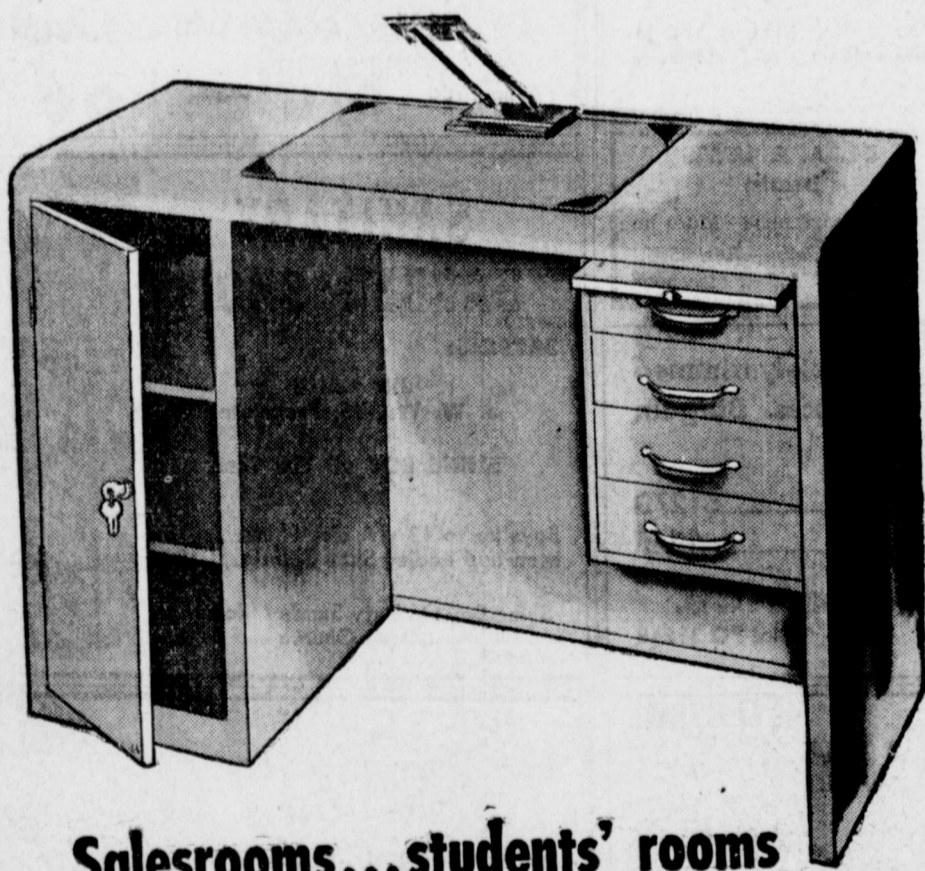

ON THIS, the 4th day of January, 1956, the Commissioners' Court of Bailey County, Texas, convened in special session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the courthouse at Muleshoe, Texas, the following members of said Court, to-wit: George Wilson and 83 others, for an election to be held in said Bailey County, Texas, to determine whether or not bonds be issued by said Bailey County, Texas, to the amount of \$50,000, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in Bailey County, Texas, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property in said County, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity; and

IT APPEARING to the said Court that said petition is signed by more than Fifty (50) qualified property tax paying voters of said Bailey County, Texas, and IT FURTHER APPEARING that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Bailey County, Texas;

IT IS, THEREFORE, CONSIDERED AND ORDERED by the said Court that an election be held in said County on the 4th day of February, 1956, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said Bailey County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000), in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in Bailey County, Texas; said bonds to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND ONE HALF PER CENTUM (3 1/2%) per annum, and to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed

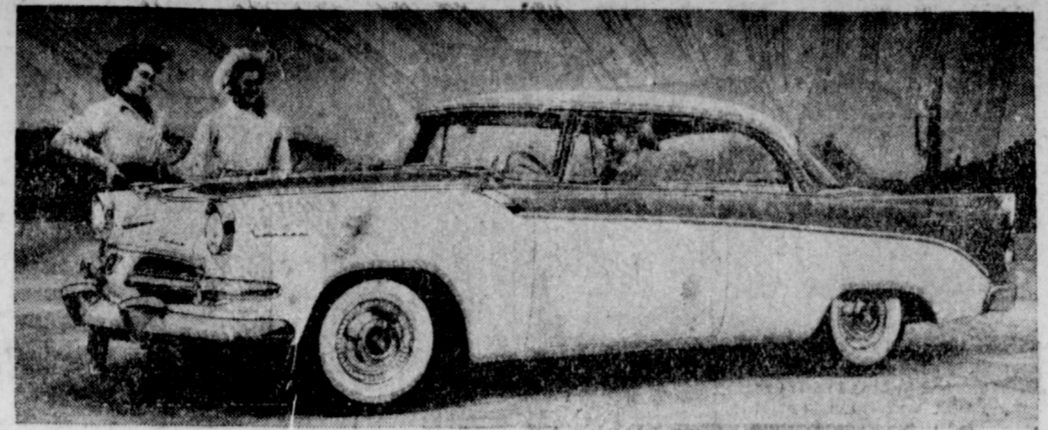

February

And the school band was promised new uniforms. Work started on the junior high building. The Mulettes won the district championship in basketball in February. Ray Franz resigned as Chamber of Commerce manager and Sen Slemmons was named to that post.

March

During March, wrestling was started here, and the Jaycees presented their annual minstrel. The Bailey county club stock show was held, and this area contributed more than \$93,000 to CROP.

The Babe Ruth league was organized in April, and Houston Hart and Lloyd Alsop and Horace Blackburn were elected to the city council. Salk vaccine was made available for 422 county youngsters, and a number of new business buildings were planned and later built.

Darla Myers was named salutatorian and Elizabeth Farley valedictorian of the 1955 graduating class at MHS.

MAY

In May, good rains fell at the right time. The big news that the Journal would soon install new equipment was announced that month also. The Little League

began play, and a shipload of CROP materials left for Korea. D. G. Smith bought Muleshoe Motors, and the alfalfa harvest began.

The Five Area phone coop began calling for bids, and Remund Wilson opened in a new building on main street. The new First National Bank was chartered in June, and the First Christian Church authorized a new building. The first issue of the New 8-column Journal came off the new high speed press on June 30. And the Methodist congregation broke ground for their new building.

JULY

In July, Bill Parker was made principal of the high school, and two men were killed by a bolt of lightning during a thunder storm. The new bank opened in temporary quarters, and contracts were awarded by the phone coop. Plans were announced to add to the Electric Coop building, and Gail Ann was crowned queen of the Bailey County Farm Bureau. Dunlap's told of their plans to open a store here.

In late August, the entire community was saddened by the death of Kay Lenderson as a result of polio. School started in early September, and six people were killed in a highway accident near here. The soil fertility day was held September 13, and the Mules met here for their football opener.

Arnold Alcorn was named postmaster, and Willis Branscum passed away after a lingering illness. Hall damaged large areas of crops, and school enrollment hit 1627 pupils.

OCTOBER

Harvest got a late start due to unseasonal rains, and the annual field day was held October 13. Rev. Carol Jones moved to Stinnett from Progress, and Laz-buddy school patrons approved bonds for new construction and repairs.

COL HAYNES
Col Inez Haynes, chief of the

Army Nurses Corps, came home to visit her parents, and was welcomed by the entire community. A record grain crop was beginning to pour in, a survey was made to determine if folks wanted more streets paved here.

In November, the Red Cross mobile x-ray unit was here, and a 2-inch snow fell. 4-H girls held achievement day, and postal receipts continued to climb.

The Christmas season occupied the community during December and brought the year to a close. While few of these events drew world wide attention, they were all important, and were all chronicled faithfully in the 52 issues of the Muleshoe Journal.

Parents Aid Asked In School Census During January

The Muleshoe school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old or over before September 1, 1956, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census.

The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

The school tax office at number 6720 may also be contacted for blanks, or they may be obtained by personal calls at either office.

School officials point out that the school census is of vital importance and urged parents to cooperate by filling out the census forms and returning them promptly.

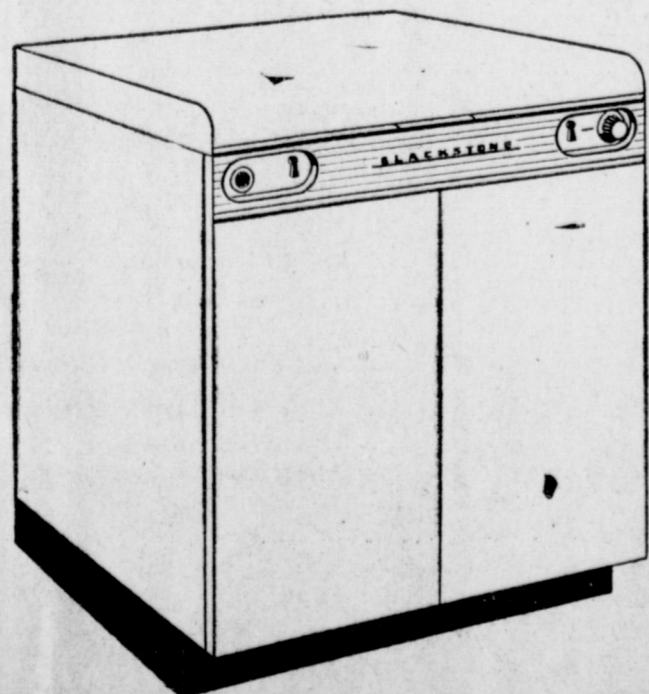

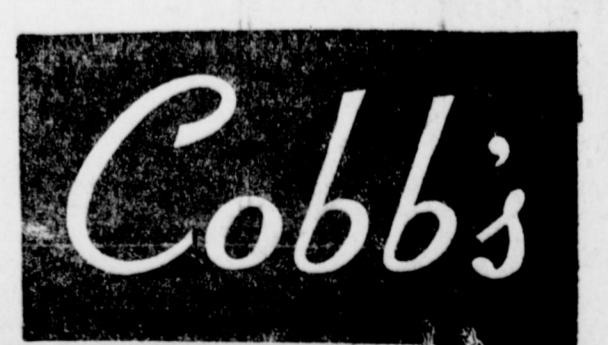

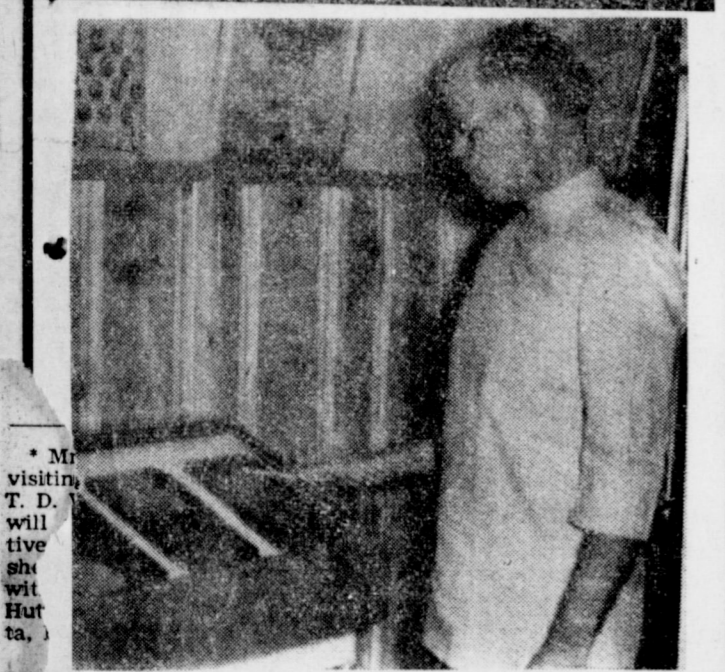

Bacteria Warfare on Texas Cotton Pests

The dread pink bollworm, Texas' most destructive cotton pest, may fall prey to a kindly new-found "bug" that thrives on insects—especially serious ones. A bacteria-carrying type nematode, discovered about a year ago, has so far proved deadly to some of the worst crop pests, including the codling moth, the corn earworm, and the two scourges of Texas cotton—the boll weevil and pink bollworm. The nematode is harmful neither to man, plants, nor animals.

If preliminary findings are upheld in research projects now underway, the disease bug may have broad-scale application and value to American agriculture in controlling insect pests. The bacteria-carrying nematode releases its disease by piercing the intestine of the insect larvae or adult. The bacteria multiply rapidly as a source of food for the nematodes, permitting them also to multiply rapidly. **60-70 Per Cent Control Possible**

The parasitic nematodes have been produced in early tests by

using larvae of other insects as hosts. Each larvae can produce about 150,000 nematodes, which can be maintained in the body of the host or in the jars of pure water that are refrigerated or aerated.

Limited field tests indicate that 60 to 70 per cent control of some insects may be possible with the nematode-borne disease. The disease-carriers have proved hardy to unseasonable hot and cold temperatures, but are most active when temperatures are moderate.

Moist conditions are also important because the nematodes move about in a film of water and cannot survive drying. However, they can live through long periods without rain by remaining in the host insect, in the soil, under the bark of trees, or in the stems of plants where moisture is available.

They are resistant to most insecticides in common use and can be applied through high-pressure spray nozzles without too great a degree of mortality.

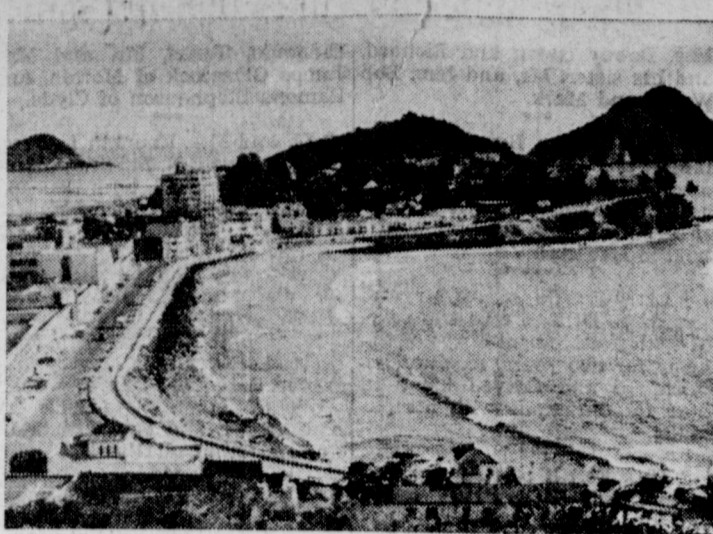
This makes it likely that both the nematodes and insecticides could be used simultaneously for insect control.

The nematode in its infective stage can survive long periods without food. This permits survival when hosts are not available.

Despite the promise of a successful "bacteria war" on serious insect pests, a lot more research must be done before it can be of real value to farmers. Much remains to be learned about the best time, mode of treatment and eventual effectiveness of the parasitic nematode in protecting our crops.

NOTICE! TO PARENTS of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1956, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in the census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 21 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone Supt. Jerry Kirk at No. 7300 or the School Tax Office No. 6720 and ask for a census blank.
2. Call in person at the School Tax office and get a census blank and fill it out.

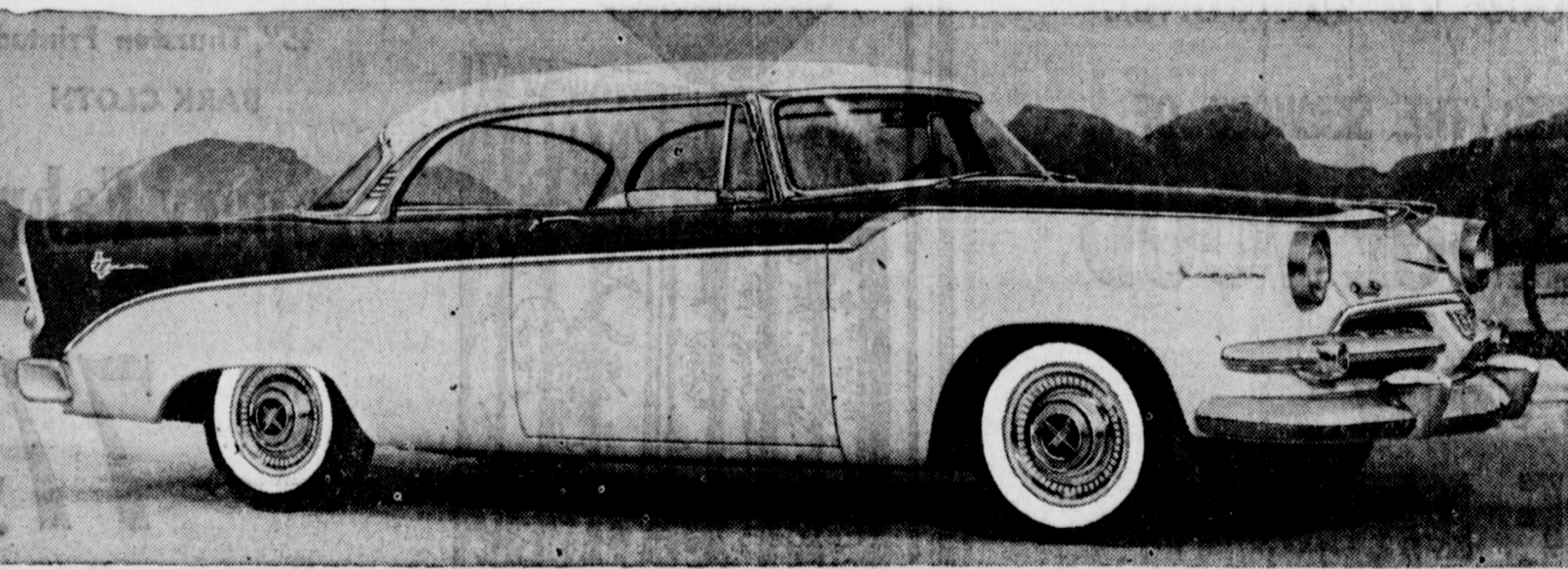
Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older on next Sept. 1st he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six years old who start next September to school are the ones most often overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and the taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

Please read the census blank carefully, fill it out completely, and return it by your child next day to the teacher. Thank you.
