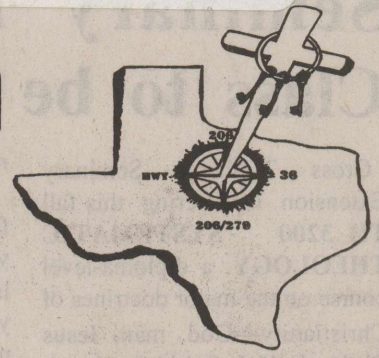

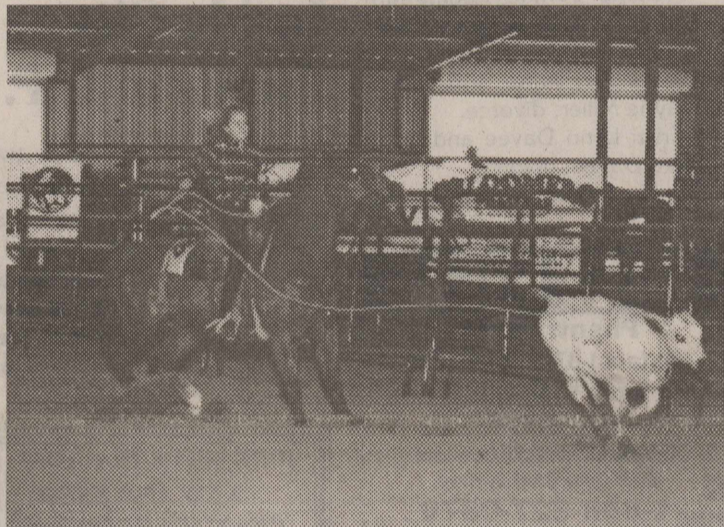
Dedication Ceremony Cancelled

During the Rodeo Finals in Abilene, Rainey was awarded a \$500 scholarship for her writing talents from the Ariat Boot Company. She submitted the winning entry to the Ariat Extreme News writing competition. Rainey will be submitting 12 articles for the 2004-2005 seasons. She will be reporting all the rodeo news and happenings in the Texas High School Rodeo Association. The Extreme Team newspaper is sent to over 2000 contestants each month. Texas has the largest publication in the

United States. At the end of the reporting year, Rainey is also eligible for additional scholarship monies and awards.

Rainey competes in barrel racing and breakaway roping and qualified for the state finals in both events. Rainey has won in excess of \$15,000 running barrels in her high school career and has already had many scholarship offers to rodeo in college. Library Facing Hard Financial Decisions

Everybody can surely agree that the economy is forcing people and organizations to make difficult decisions about their budgets. Your public library is no different. We are facing some serious financial situations. Our operating costs have increased just as yours have. Although the library budget has been trimmed to the bare necessities of books, salaries and utilities, we are still operating with a deficit.

Over the years, we thankfully have received generous and essential financial support from the city, the county and the community as well as from many donors living beyond the immediate area.

We have always been blessed with wonderful volunteers who have carried the burden of the children's programs and adult activities in addition to all of the fund-raising efforts.

One of our long range plans is to

turn the annex into a special fun place for all children to develop a love of books and to learn. This is being developed only as grants are acquired.

In light of the over-all declining economy, your Library Board of Directors is faced with making some serious decisions in order to continue to serve this area. Options such as shorter hours of operation, half days, substantial reduction in staff salaries and reduction of free services such as internet access are all being considered. Whatever action is taken, there will be a serious reduction in programs and services.

Of course a much more favorable alternative would be for donations to increase substantially in the very near future. If folks can, they are encouraged to dig a little deeper to continue their support of their library that is so essential and

vital to this community and area. Memorials, monthly contributions and one time financial gifts would all help.

We would hope that some people could plan to budget \$5.00-\$10.00 per month on a regular basis. This would provide a very helpful steady source of income. And you could just write a check to the library at the same time you pay your other monthly bills.

Before making a decision in mid-August about the future of the Cross Plains Public Library, the Board of Directors is seeking your help.

Drapers Return from Mexico with Good Report

What are you going to do with your summer vacation? Wendel and Jean Draper have returned from a trip to Mexico where they spent their working on a church for Mexican citizens in Nava, Mexico.

"It was a lot of fun and we did enjoy the work," said Draper. They spent their time pouring cement to build walkways and painted the inside of the church building. Jean Draper took some scraps of cloth to piece a quilt for the congregation.

"One of the main things is that the Mexican congregation donated their time working on their own place of worship. It cost them \$8-\$10 a day in salary and 10 or 12 of them worked for their church. We enjoyed the work and the great worship services each night. One night we had 12 conversions and the next day we went to the river for the baptism," Draper reported.

Camp Cooper and the Indian Reservation Experiment

Camp Cooper was a fort established by the Texas Legislature in 1854 to watch over an Indian Reservation designed for the Comanche Indians. It was located astraddle the Clear Fork of the Brazos River, just about 50 miles north of Callahan County, and though brief in existence, played an important role in the history of this area of Texas.

It was an experiment in frustration, or so goes the tale. The feds could not send enough troops to quell the Indian raids and they did not want to quell the immigration of settlers into Texas. Shortly after the War with Mexico, which ended in 1848, the immigration became "tidal-wave of 'nesters'", according to Mary G. Ramos, writing in the Texas Almanac of 2004.

It seems that the plains of Texas, upon which the settlers had their eyes, was not empty, it was peopled by other: the

Comanche's, Wichita's, Tonkawa's, Anadarko's, Caddo's and other tribes. The Indians considered the land open and free, and free access to all the land was a basic concept in their lives.

But "free land" meant cheap land to the white settlers and individual ownership was the very stuff that their dreams were made of.

On October 6, 1854, the Texas Legislature authorized two Indian Reservations each 12 leagues, (18,756 acres), and both on the Brazos River. One was near Fort Belknap, to house the Caddo, Waco and other sedentary tribes and it was known as the Brazos Indian Reservation.

"Camp Cooper was beset by bad weather, wolves, rattlesnakes, irregular supply trains and grasshoppers," wrote Ramos.

Indians on the reservation tried to farm but because of the arid condition were unable to raise enough food for themselves. And non-reservation Indians continued their raids on white settlers. The white settlers blamed the reservation Indians and retaliated.

"Fearing for the Indians' lives, Maj. Robert S. Neighbors, Indian agent for the Comanche's, finally and with great sadness, recommended abandoning the two reservations, moving the Indians to Indian Territory (Oklahoma). On September 1 1859, Major Neighbors delivered the former residents of both reservations to the Wichita Indian agency in the Washita Valley," wrote Ramos.

And that is a thumbnail sketch of the beginnings and endings of Camp Cooper. Consult the Texas Almanac, page 26, for more complete explanation.

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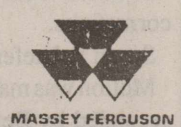

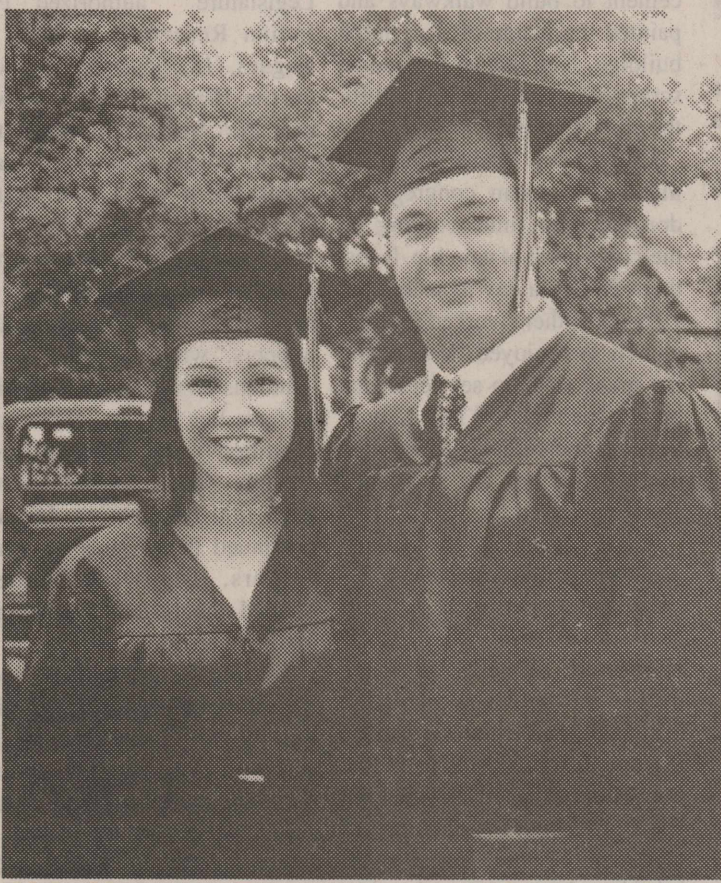
