Fire Control Unit Wrapping Location Signs







Sales tax holiday Class of '54 this weekend

Texas shoppers get a break from state and local sales taxes on August 6, 7, and 8, 2004the state's sixth annual tax holiday. Layaway plans can be used again this year to take advantage of the sales tax holiday.

The law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend.

This year's sales tax holiday for clothing and footwear begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, August 6, and ends at midnight on Sunday, August 8. The tax break is expected to save Texas consumers millions in state and local sales taxes. This is one time hard-working Texans can keep their money in their pockets for their families' priorities.

"I have been a strong advocate for the sales tax holiday since its inception and am pleased to do my part to ensure its success. I have enclosed a list of items for a quick reference and a flyer you can post in a prominent place in your store in advance of the tax holiday," said Texas State Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn.

The list cannot include every possible item that qualifies for the exemption. If you have questions about items not shown here, please call the State Comptroller's office at 1-800-252-5555

Here are some highlights about the sales tax holiday:

* The tax holiday occurs every year on the first Friday, Saturday, and Sunday of August. Qualifying items are exempt from state sales taxes, but exemption from local sales tax is up to individual cities. This year, since no cities opted out of the holiday, qualifying items will be fully exempt from tax throughout Texas.

* Most clothing and footwear priced at less than \$100 will be exempt from sales tax. Customers will receive the break on individual items, regardless of the total amount they buy. For

* Clothing and footwear used primarily for athletic activities or for protective wear are not eligible for the exemption. Customers buying golf cleats or football pads, for instance, must pay sales tax. Athletic wear that is also used for participation in other non-athletic activities can qualify for tax exemption. For example, tennis shoes, baseball caps, and jogging suits are worn during everyday activities and thus may be purchased tax free during the holiday.

* Also excluded from the sales tax holiday are accessories such as jewelry and watches; items that are carried rather than worn, including handbags, briefcases and wallets; clothing rentals, such as formal wear and costumes; and repairs and alterations.

Property appraisal values throughout Callahan County increased over 2003 values, according to Callahan County Appraisal District's Chief Appraiser Bun Barry

Barry provided appraised property values to the taxing entities throughout Callahan County last Monday and taxing entities will soon begin work on setting tax rates in the various taxing jurisdictions throughout the county. Barry said the Appraisal District reappraised all the land values throughout the county this year and said land values were up across the county. He said statewide, land property values seem to be increasing 20 to 22 percent annually. Barry said its been three years since land values were last readjusted in the county.

The taxing jurisdiction of Callahan County reported the largest property value increase over last year. The County reported property values of \$347,618,021 2004, compared to \$312,720,660 in 2003-an increase of \$34,720,660.

Barry said the reason for the increase is based upon the higher land values in the county. He also said the price of oil has gone up by a substantial amount, which also raised the price of property values. He said mineral values in the county were \$11 million this year compared to \$8 million in 2003.

Barry reported the City of Clyde had property values of \$82,828,390 in 2004, compared to \$79,892,940 in 2003 for an increase of \$2,935,450. Barry said the jump in property values in the City of Clyde is because of annexation. Barry said the City of Clyde had some \$1.7 million in new construction last year, which included the new Family Dollar store on Interstate 20. Barry said land values were reevaluated in Clyde last year and the Appraisal District just picked those number up this year.

The chief appraiser said Clyde CISD reported property values up \$12,728,638 this year. The school district has \$145,958,817 in property values in 2004, compared to \$133,230,179 in values last year. Barry said the increases in Clyde CISD can be attributed to land and oil value increases, as well as some \$5.1 million in new construction through the school district. Barry said the largest growth is being seen in the Clyde school district. "They're growing like a weed," Barry said of the property value increase in the Clyde school district. The Baird ISD property values increased \$3,863,379 in 2004, according to Barry. He said Baird ISD recorded \$72,312,229 in property values in 2004, compared to property values of \$68,448,850 in 2003.

Barry said Cross Plains ISD also reported \$2,690,659 in property values on the books this year compared to last year. He said Cross Plains ISD reports \$62,227,959 in 2004 property compared to values, \$59,537,300 in property values last year.

The City of Cross Plains does not levy a tax rate, Barry noted. The City of Putnam saw the

smallest increase in property values this year compared to last year. Property values increased in the City of Putnam by just \$4,460. He said the City of Putnam had property values of \$1,789,680 in 2004, compared to 2003 property values of \$1,785,220. Back on the subject of land values, Barry said land values are increasing in the county because of buyer speculation. He said approximately 90 percent fied. of new land buyers are from outside the county. He said people are buying up land, speculating the prices will increase, which they have all over increase by three percent annuthe county.

tracts of just 10 acres or less. Barry said that low interest rates are also driving land prices up. Barry said in talking with real estate experts, he believes the real estate market in Texas is at its peak. Barry said it's getting to the point where cattlemen cannot buy land and make a profit on it.

The chief appraiser hopes land prices in Callahan County have stabilized. He said the recent property reappraisals should hold the county for three more years.

Barry said property values could increase next year, based upon the current price of a barrel of oil. He said property values this year were based upon \$30 oil, and next year he said the average price of a barrel of oil could be in the lower \$30 to mid \$30 level. Barry said the Appraisal Review Board has completed all property value appeals and the tax rolls have now been certi-





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
