### **Howard Payne Scholarship Fund for Callahan County** Students Established in **Memory of Jack Scott**

Payne University scholarship established in memory of Cross Plains native Jack Scott is available for students from Callahan County. The fund was established by his daughter and son-in-law, Mary Scott and Lynn Nabers of Austin. Jack Scott passed away in 2003.

The scholarship is a tribute to Scott's commitment to education and his desire to see students from Callahan have the opportunity to get college degrees.

"My dad was passionate about wanting students from Cross Plains and the surrounding area to be able to attend college, said Mary Scott Nabers. "He would be enormously pleased to know that there is a fund in his memory that offers financial assistance to deserving students desiring to attend Howard Payne University."

Applications for the scholarship may be made to the Director of Student Financial Aid at HPU, 325-649-8015. Recipients must be from Callahan County, Texas, and must maintain a grade point average of at least 2.5.

Jack Scott was born September 14, 1909, in Baird, Texas, to George B. and Adelia Scott. His maternal grandparents, the J.B. Cutbirths, moved to the Baird area in 1876 before Callahan

BROWNWOOD—A Howard County was organized. The Scott family dates back to 1890 when the F.T. Scotts, Jack's paternal grandparents, settled in Cottonwood, Texas.

As a young man, Jack attended school in Baird and Cross Plains until his junior year when he transferred to the West Texas Military Institute at San Antonio for two years. Upon graduation, he enrolled in Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene. He graduated in 1930 and during his tenure there served as Editor of the campus newspaper, The Brand. After graduation, he went home to Cross Plains and persuaded the local bank to allow him to purchase an interest in the newspaper on credit. He became the Editor of the Cross Plains Review at the age of 20 and by 1940, he had bought the business.

In 1933 Jack married Juakana (Kanie) Westerman, a native of Cross Plains. The couple had a remarkable marriage that lasted for 67 years, Juakana Scott died in 2000 after a courageous one-year battle with cancer.

Jack spent most of his life as a newspaper editor in Central Texas. He was Editor and Publisher of the Cross Plains Review and numerous other weekly newspapers in the area. He served as Mayor of Cross

Clyde CISD reported 1,461 to start the school year Monday, August 16, 2004, up one student from last year's 1,460 stu-

Clyde CISD reported enrollment at Clyde Elementary School dropped 26 students from last year. The elementary school, which includes students in Pre-Kindergarten through third grade, had 400 students this

year compared to 426 last year. Clyde Intermediate School reported 23 more students this year compared to last year. The intermediate school, which includes students in grades fourth. fifth and sixth, had 335 students this year compared to 312 students last year.

Clyde Junior High School reported 17 more students this year compared to last year. The junior high, which houses grades seventh and eighth, had 248 students this year compared to 231 students last year.

Clyde High School had a net loss of 13 students. The high school, which includes grades ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth, had 478 students this year and 491 students last year. Eula ISD reported 27 mores students this year compared to last year. Eula ISD had 519 re-

Insects are the most successful living organism on the Earth. That is just one of the reasons it makes good sense to balance one against the other, rather than trying to kill pests with poison.

Using insect to control other insects has a long history. Ancient Chinese constructed bamboo runways to help predator ants move through citrus groves and for hundreds of years Yemeni nomads brought ant colonies from the mountains to control

palm pest.

There are two kinds of beneficial insects, predators and parasites. Predators eat or otherwise destroy one or more insects

Large quantities of beneficial insects in your garden can work in several ways. Sometime it's like a biological insecticide. The predators go straight to work and clean your garden up and then disappear or die off.



### Callahan County Commissioners accept tax rate proposed .42653 cents per \$100

ers, in a regular commissioners' court meeting Monday, August 23, accepted the proposed tax rate of .42653 cents per \$100 of property value for Callahan County for 2004-2005 fiscal

Although the tax rate is two percent lower than last year's tax rate of .44462 cents per \$100 of property value, it is above the effective tax rate. The effective tax rate is the rate which would generate the same amount of revenue as last year. The new tax rate will generate an increase of 7.78853 percent in property tax revenue over last

The proposed General Fund tax rate is .3210 cents per \$100 of property value, while the Road & Bridge Fund tax rate being proposed is . 1055 cents per \$100

The total income for the 2004-2005 fiscal year budget is \$2,597,452.72, while total expenditures are \$2,597,235.42, giving the county a surplus of \$217.30 in revenue for the fiscal

On a motion by Commissioner Charlie Grider and second by Commissioner Harold Hicks, the county commissioners held a voice vote to accept the proposed tax rate for Callahan County. Voting for the motion were Commissioners Grider, Hicks, Bryan Farmer, Tommy Holland and County Judge Roger Corn.

Other items brought before the commissioners' court included:

-The commissioners court meeting was called to order at 9:05 a.m. with Judge Corn presiding. ### **New Mortgage Funds Include** Manufactured Housing

AUSTIN-Manufactured housing will be included in a new low interest mortgage funds program for professional educators, firefighters and police officers announced recently by the Texas State Affordable Housing Corporation (TSAHC)

TSAHC is providing \$50 million in mortgage funds and assistance grants through its Professional Educators, Firefighters and Police Officers Home Loan Programs under legislation authored by State Senator Eddie Lucio of Brownsville and State Rep. Allan B. Ritter of Nederland.

The agency will make the mortgage funds available to local lenders by issuing tax exempt mortgage revenue bonds, which in turn, will be purchased by Fannie Mae, the nation's largest source of financing for home

The Professional Educators, Firefighters, and Police Officers Home Loan Programs will offer 30-year, real estate mortgages with affordable fixed interest rates and down payment and closing cost assistance grants of up to five percent of the loan amount. For example, on a \$100,000 loan, home buyers can receive \$5,000 in assistance. TSAHC officials said qualified home buyers, in some cases, could become homeowners for as little as \$100.

"We are very pleased to be part of this important program benefiting the teachers and first responders of Texas," Jody Anderson, executive director of the Texas Manufactured Housing Association (TMHA), said. "TSAHC is making this assistance available on all new or existing manufactured homes located in the state, as long as they are treated as real estate, do not exceed the maximum purchase price limits of the Program and meet FHA guidelines."

Borrowers must be first-time homeowners or not have owned a home in the last three years. Income and home price limits vary throughout the state and can be viewed at the Web site, www.tsahc.org. Funds must be used for the purchase of a singlefamily, owner-occupied resi-



§43.042. License required. (a) The owner of a hunting lease or the landowner's agent may not receive as a guest for pay or other consideration another person engaged in hunting unless the owner or agent has acquired a hunting lease license from the department.




