

GARDEN TIPS

By James Nichols

Have you got a passion for garlic? To find a favorite, you need to grow several varieties.

For those who relish the robust flavor, garlic has a mystique few other crops has—health benefits and the ability to repel vampires.


Market growers and Alliums experts around the country find that they are under its spell, too, with some 350 strands of garlic that can be grown.

You may be captivated by the variations of flavor, some that initially starts with a fiery taste and then mellows to a pleasant garlicy finish such as that of Brown Tempest.

Susanville has a mellow taste with a slight bite almost delicate and sweet. Russian Red streaks an initial sharp taste in the front and roof of your mouth as flavor

In most areas garlic is planted in the fall, 6 weeks before the ground freezes, to allow the roots to get a start. That would be November and December around here.

Harvest is in midsummer. Let it dry in a cool dry place. It takes anywhere from 2 weeks to a month or longer, depending on humidity. When you cut the dried tops off 1 inch from the bulb and no moisture appears, the garlic is ready to store.

"Starting in November, the Texas Association of School Administrators will begin distributing information on the Child ID program to millions of parents and legal guardians of children attending our public schools. I encourage every parent to take advantage of this important program."

The FBI-approved kits will be made available to thousands of Texas families for a nominal fee of \$7.50. The process is simple, lasts just five minutes, and could directly lead to the safe recovery of a missing child. Since 1997, the program has distributed more than 14 million Child ID kits at schools, football games, churches and community events.

"When a child goes missing, every minute is critical. Each piece of identifying information that parents can provide will help law enforcement officials find their child and bring them home safely," Perry said. "By participating in the National Child Identification Program, we can ensure that many of these terrible stories have a happy ending."

minimal damage.

Officials of the Manufactured Housing Institute (MHI), working with state and federal staff throughout the impacted areas, reported that "newer manufactured homes, those installed after the wind standards were revised, have performed as designed without much, if any, damage from the storms' winds."

"The positive results reported from the two Florida hurricanes combined with the experience we have gained from hurricanes along the Texas coast have shown us that the post- 1997 built homes will perform as intended when properly installed," Tim Irvine, executive director of the Manufactured Housing Division, Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, said. "These homes seem like a great answer to housing needs in coastal areas."

The regulations adopted in Texas were first passed by Congress as a result of Hurricane Andrew in 1992. The new rules required construction materials to withstand 100 to 110 mileper-hour winds. Fasteners used to nail roofs, floors and walls had to be stronger, and the anchoring and support systems were redesigned.

Officials who toured the area said that many of the mobile homes claimed by Hurricane Charley were built in the 1960s and 1970s, with some dating back to the 1950s.

MHI officials said the pre-1992 homes "don't compare at all with those built with today's standards."







Lipstick Never Killed Anyone: Why Tobacco Needs Oversight

When Congress reconvenes after the summer recess in September, they have a chance to lives of countless Americans by granting the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) effective authority to regulate tobacco products.

In July, the U.S. Senate overwhelmingly passed legislation that would enable the FDA to regulate the manufacturing, marketing and distribution of tobacco products - especially in cess. relation to children. Unfortunately, the House-passed bill did not include such a provision. Now, members of the House and Senate will meet in conference to reconcile different versions of the Foreign Sales Corporation (FSC) tax bill, which contains the FDA measure.

You might be surprised to learn that although the federal government monitors the safety of products like orange juice, cereal, cosmetics and pharmaceuticals, tobacco products are left virtually unregulated. I don't think anyone can dispute the fact that a cigarette is more harmful than a tube of lipstick. Tobacco use remains the nation's leading cause of preventable death, costing Americans more than \$157 billion annually in direct medical costs and lost productivity.

Each year, one in five Americans - or an estimated 440,000 people - will die from tobaccorelated illnesses. Smoking is a major risk factor for heart disease and stroke, and causes diseases in nearly every organ of the body. In Texas alone, 24,000 adults die each year from ciation-Texas Affiliate, and the smoking, while an estimated Associate Professor of Pediatrics 56,000 children under the age at Texas Tech University Health

The human cost of smoking has been well documented. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), adult smokers die an average of 13 to 14 years earlier than non-smokers. The economic burden of smoking is make a historic difference in the overwhelming, costing Texans \$10 billion each year.

FDA oversight of tobacco products is by far the best remedy for reducing tobacco's deadly toll. Granting the FDA authority to regulate tobacco products will keep consumers informed, while keeping our kids protected by restricting advertising and marketing, and reducing youth ac-

As a pediatrician, I see children every day whose parents smoke and who suffer diseases related to secondhand smoke exposure. such as ear infections and asthma, as well as teens and college students who start smoking and can't quit. As an American Heart Association volunteer, I have been involved in successful statewide efforts to reduce youth access to tobacco and local efforts to promote clean indoor air through smoke-free ordinances. Although these smaller battles have impacted the war on tobacco, broader FDA authority over tobacco products is the critical weapon that has been missing for far too

I hope that every Texan will contact their members of Congress and urge them to put public health and safety first by supporting FDA oversight of tobacco.
