**Official Memorandum**

AUSTIN, TEXAS

**GREETINGS:**

The right to vote is a treasured instrument of a democracy, and a solemn responsibility on the part of every American citizen of voting age. Unfortunately, it is a responsibility that is often treated lightly, for many eligible voters consistently fail to exercise their right and duty to cast their ballot.

Texans will vote in the primary elections on May 2 to select their nominees for public office at the local, state and national level.

On the same day the party precinct conventions will be held to select delegates to the county conventions and to consider resolutions affecting state and national policy. These conventions are the genesis of our entire political and governmental structure.

It is vital to our state and nation that as many persons as possible participate in these essential functions of representative government.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate Saturday, May 2, 1964, as

**TEXAS CITIZENSHIP DAY**



and urge all eligible voters to participate in the primary election and precinct conventions of the party of their choosing.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 29th day of April, 1964

**Cotton Planting Season Is Near**

Spring is here and cotton planting is drawing near. Several questions arise as this time comes, such as, "What variety should I plant?" and "Where should I plant?"

Fred Elliott, cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, has these general recommendations:

Stripper harvesting is the logical route to follow in this county and this would mean using storm resistant varieties. Due to the weather and other conditions, one variety will not stand head and shoulders above another from year to year.

Satisfactory varieties would be Bankart, Storm King, Western Stormproof or some of the Hockett strains.

Planting dates will vary with weather conditions. Generally the best dates will run from May 1 to May 20. If sufficient moisture is available and soil temperatures are right, cotton should be planted during this period.

Get your copy of L-218, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects", from the county agent's office.

**Wednesday Club Studies 'Hope'**

"Hope of the World" was the subject of the program presented to members of the Junior Wednesday Club at the April 20 meeting in the home of Mrs. Charles Walker.

Mrs. Jack Sims and Mrs. Wilburn Carrico gave the program on the hospital ship Hope.

Mrs. Sims explained that The Hope is a modern 230 bed hospital afloat. It is the independent project of Dr. William B. Walsh. The \$5,000,000 yearly maintenance is financed by private donations from the American people. The Hope travels to seaports throughout the world healing the sick and teaching native doctors and nurses medical skills.

American doctors and nurses serve aboard the ship for periods of four months on a voluntary, non-paying basis.

Mrs. Carrico told of the personal experiences of The Hope during its visits to Indonesia, Vietnam and Peru. She explained that the project Hope is people—helping them to be independent and develop themselves.

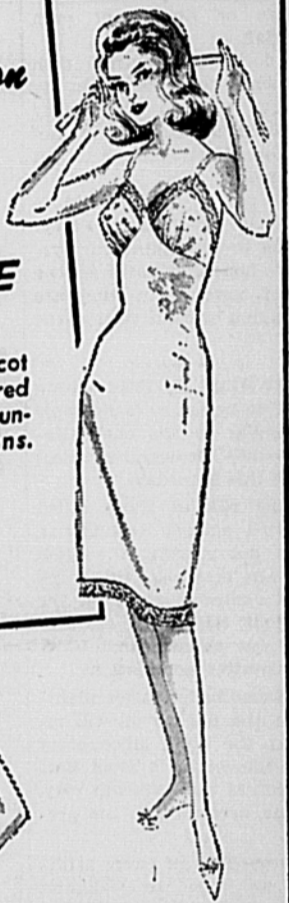

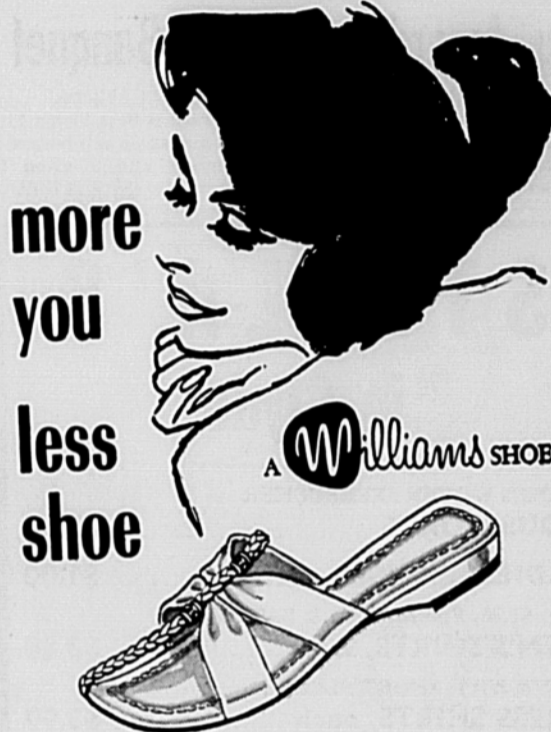

### Tye, Abilene Firms Win Bypass Contract

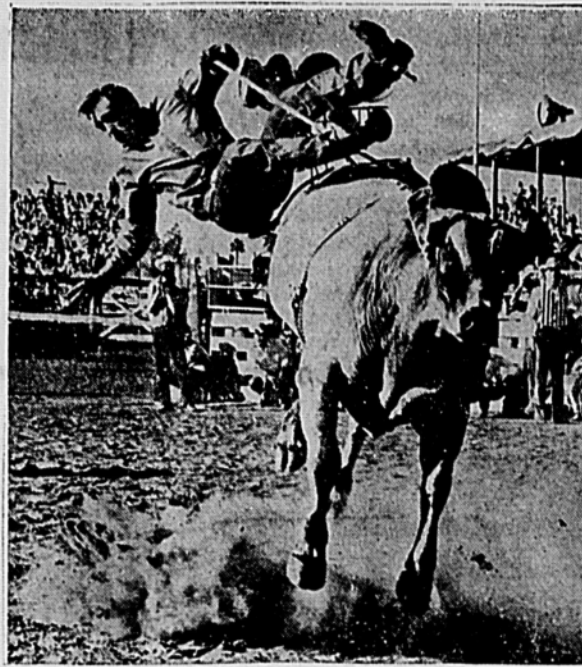

### STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Texans will have ample opportunity to give their views on how the state should be divided into 23 congressional districts of equal population.

A seven-member study group of Texas Legislative Council (research arm of the Legislature) plans to begin extensive hearings over the state soon after the May 2 primaries.

Congressmen and party officers already have been invited to make suggestions as to how districts should be drawn with approximately 416,000 population each.

U. S. Supreme Court has supported a Houston-federal court ruling that the districts must be formed to provide "equal representation for equal numbers of people" as nearly as possible. The Houston court on April 1 agreed that the Legislature

should have a chance to do the job in regular session of 1965.

Sen. George Noffett of Chillocoche, senior member of the Legislature in point of service, heads the study committee which will conduct the hearings. Other members are Sen. Abraham Kazen Jr. of Laredo, and Reps. Paul Floyd of Houston, Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth, Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge, Richard C. Slack of Pecos and G. F. Mutscher of Brenham.

Gov. John Connally praised Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr for his representation of the state during the redistricting case. He said work of Carr and his assistants made it possible for the state to "hold our 1964 congressional elections without the requirement of a special session or at-large (statewide congressional) races."

COURT REFORMS — U. S. Supreme Court Justice Tom Clark came to Austin for the Texas Conference on Judicial Selections, Tenure and Administration, sponsored by the State Bar of Texas.

Two hundred and fifty lawyers, judges and laymen talked about how to improve the Texas judicial system.

Court organization and administration, and judicial selection, tenure, retirement, discipline and removal were discussed. Lawyers and judges from a dozen other states where court reforms have been enacted participated.

AGING — Governor Connally revealed that 1,400 of the 3,500 senile patients in state mental hospitals have been moved to private nursing homes in the last year.

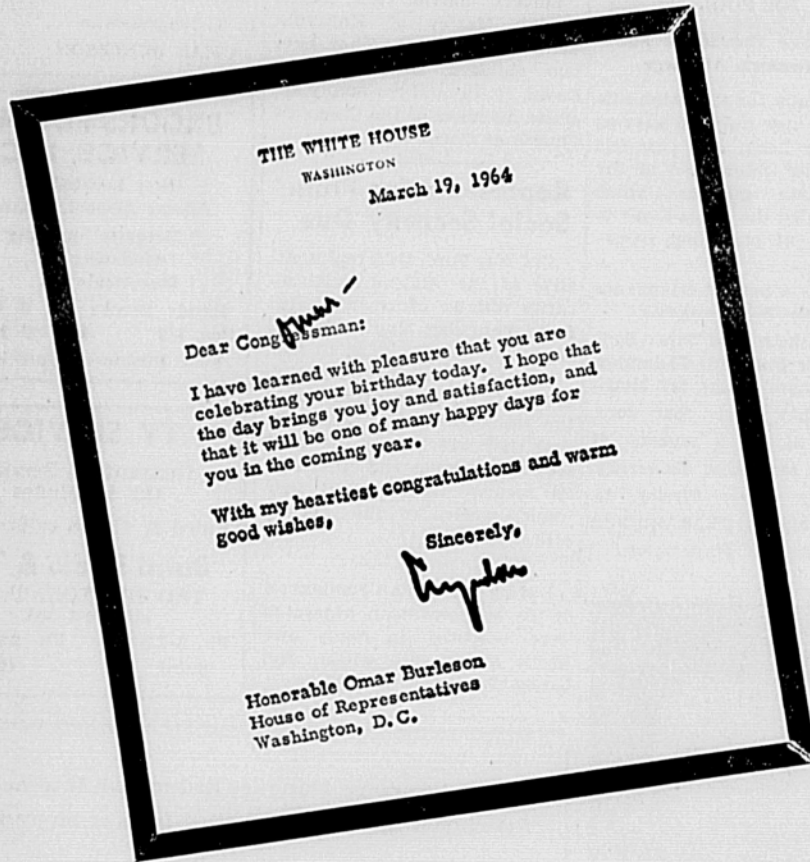

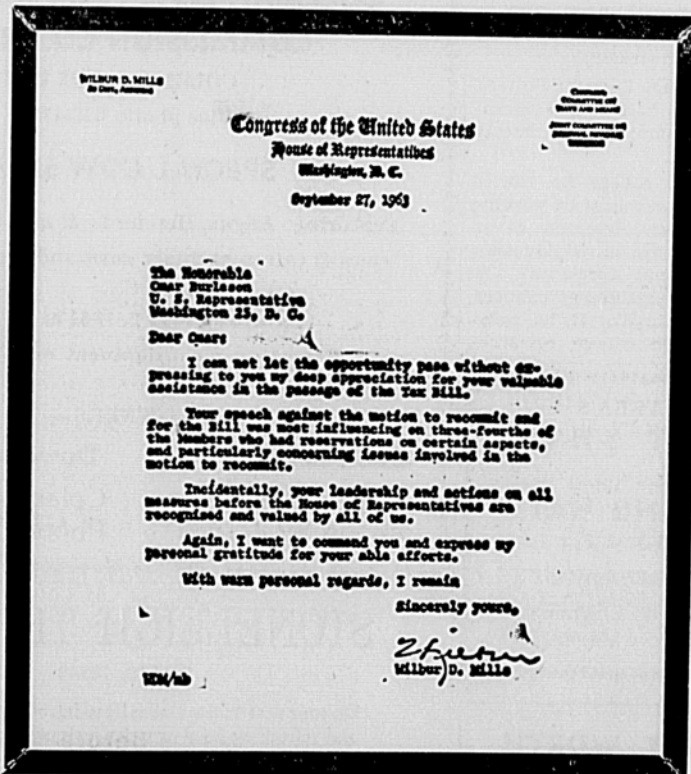

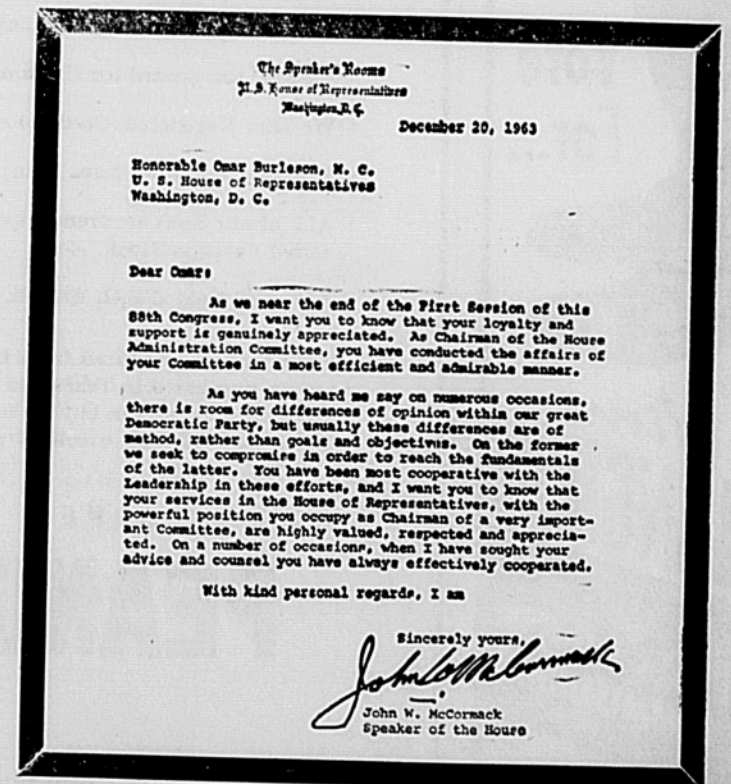

Company shall be entitled to require from each and every consumer of gas, before gas service is commenced, a deposit of twice the amount of an estimated average monthly bill, which said deposit may be retained by Company until service is discontinued and all bills therefor have been paid. Company shall then return said deposit to the consumer, together with six per cent (6%) interest thereon from the date of said

**AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF BAIRD, CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS, AND THE ENVIRONS THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF A FEE OR CHARGE FOR THE USE OF THE STREETS AND ALLEYS.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the City of Baird, Texas, hereinafter called "City," hereby grants to Lone Star Gas Company, hereinafter called "Company," its successors and assigns, consent to use and occupy the present and future streets, alleys, highways and public thoroughfares of City for the purpose of laying, maintaining, constructing, operating and replacing therein and thereon pipelines and all other appurtenant equipment needed and necessary to deliver and sell gas to persons, firms and corporations, including all the general public, within the City's corporate limits and the environs thereof, said consent being granted for a term ending on March 11, 1989.

SECTION 2. Company shall lay, maintain, construct, operate and replace its pipes, mains, laterals and other equipment so as to interfere as little as possible with traffic and shall promptly clean up and restore to an approximate original condition, at its cost, all thoroughfares and other surfaces which it may disturb. The location of all mains, pipes, laterals and other appurtenant equipment shall be fixed so as not to conflict with other utilities, and all placement and construction thereof shall be done in strict accordance with all utility, street, construction and other pertinent ordinances of the City of Baird.

SECTION 3. When Company shall make or cause to be made excavations or shall place obstructions in any street, alley or other public place, the public shall be protected by barriers and lights placed, erected and maintained by Company; and in the event of injury to any person or damage to any property by reason of the construction, operation or maintenance of the gas distributing plant or system of Company, Company shall indemnify and keep harmless City from any and all liability in connection therewith. Company shall repair, clean up and restore to an approximate original condition all streets and alleys disturbed during the construction and repair of its gas distributing system.

SECTION 4. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business, including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the

deposit up to the date of discontinuance of service. Company shall be entitled to apply said deposit with accrued interest, to any indebtedness owed Company by the consumer making the deposit.

SECTION 7. The rights, privileges and franchises granted by this ordinance are not to be considered exclusive, and City hereby expressly reserves the right to grant and/or operate, at any time, like privileges, rights and franchises as it may see fit to any other person or corporation for the purpose of furnishing gas for light, heat and power to and for City and the inhabitants thereof.

SECTION 8. Company shall furnish reasonably adequate service to the public at reasonable rates and charges therefor; and Company shall maintain its property, equipment and appliances in good order and condition.

SECTION 9. Company shall pay any street or alley rental under the terms of any lawful ordinance which is or may be authorized by law, Company

hereby stating and admitting that the present City rental ordinance insofar as it provides a two per cent (2%) charge on gross receipts from the sale of gas within the limits of the City of Baird is a lawful and valid ordinance.
