

Here on Cypress Creek in East Texas, only a short distance from the Louisiana line, is a marvelous lake for all types of recreation. It is one of the newest lakes in Texas, finished only three or four years ago by the Corps of Engineers. It is located 9 miles west of Jefferson, and only 65 miles northwest of
