Announcement by the U. S Department of Agriculture that it is supporting the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee's plan for 1958 Texas cotton allotments can scarcely be construed as any. thing except a kick in the teeth

to West Texas growers. The ASC plan, announced several days ago, drew vigorous protest from West Texas cotton organizations and growers, who hoped it would fail to win approval by the Federal agency. But, apparently, this was a futile hope. As the plan now stands West Texas growers will be deprived of acreage to which they are entitled in keeping with prac-

The ASC plan provides that no county will get less than 98.5 per cent of the 1957 allotment for the year 1958.

This looks good, but there is a catch to it. The catch is, the plan lets the State Committee hold a reserve of six per cent of the State allotment-450,000 acres out of 7,500,000 acres - for hardship cases, inequities, and small farm allotments. Practical ly no farm in West Texas falls into this category. Therefore, all those 450,000 acres will be dis- allotment under the ASC plan. tributed to Central and East Tex as farmers.
