

### **Old Symbols** New Year Babe, **Father Time Came** From Early Greece

The personifications of Father Time and the New Year Babe are as familiar as those of Santa Claus or Uncle Sam. Yet these fitting symbols for the end of one cycle of living and the birth of another have their roots in Greek mythology.

Father Time comes down to us as a descendant of the Greek god Cronus, lord of the universe. Cronus bore the lines of inestimable years on his face and he carried a scythe, but like many of mythology's earthy gods, he was not altogether admirable. Having been warned that one of his children would dispose of him, Cronus decided to give none a chance and got into the habit of swallowing them at birth. His wife Rhea, in an attempt to discourage the practice, hid their son Zeus after his birth and presented Cronus with a stone wrapped in swaddling clothes.

#### Plan Works

The ruse worked. Cronus disgorged not only the stone, but the previous children he had swallowed. Zeus later dethroned his father, settled on Mount Olympus and ruled as chief god of the Greek pantheon,

Later Cronus' name was confused with the word "cronos," meaning "time." But the hourglass has found a permanent place in the hand of the white-haired gentleman with the scythe.

The New Year Babe may be as old as Father Time. During ancient Greece's festival of Dionysus, a baby was paraded as i symbol of rebirth. A chief ceremonial in the Eleusinian Mysteries featured the image of a child.

In more recent times, farmers of western Prussia staged the symbolic birth of a child on harvest fields. A German folk song of the 14th century depicts the New Year Babe in its present form,

### Toys Will Suit Age, Interests of Child If Carefully Chosen

Picture the sight of the proud parent who sees to it that Santa brings bundles of expensive and intricate toys and soon after Christ-mas finds that little Junior prefers to play with Mother's pots and pans.

It happens, quite often, and poor Dad never realizes that he has made an unwise selection of toys. Quite often, he is slightly disturbed because his child isn't interested in what he considers excellent playthings.

Toymakers are highly conscious of the fact that children at various ages have different interests and manufacture toys for specific age groups. For the one-year-and-under age group there are hundreds of excellent toys-soft, cuddly bears, elephants and other animals that can be squeezed to make noises and sounds. For this age group, too, there are many floating toys, most of which are made of sponge, celluloid or plastic. Toys to Please

The child who has just learned to walk, or is less than two years, likes toys that he can pull or push around, including dolls, stuffed animals, rubber and plastic automo biles and vehicles. Toys that can be easily swallowed should be avoided as well as building blocks. which are just something to throw and scatter about.

Blocks, trucks, airplanes, boats, simple puzzles and toys of this nature are suited to the interests of pre-school children and it is usually at this age that children begin to see a distinction between toys for boys and toys for girls. Boys begin to favor cowboy and Indian outfits, girls choose dolls, frilly playthings and small replicas of household equipment such as brooms, toy furniture and dishes. Boys in the four-year age group, particularly if father is a "do-ityourself" enthusiast, will like small tool chests and workshop equipment that will enable them to imitate their fathers. **Creative Toys**



The Yule Log tradition is making a comeback as more and more of today's modern homes are designed with open fireplaces as well as central heating and gas stoves. For those who have a place to burn a Yule log and want one, tradition says that it should be oak, ash, olive, apple or pine. Whatever type you choose or may be able to acquire, get plenty of wood.

Ash is highly desirable since it can be used without being seasoned. It burns quickly, and throws off plenty of heat. Poplar, on the other hand, will spark badly if un-Elm is less desirable since it is

slow to get started. However, it lasts a long time and brightens up when it gets going. A few logs of birch, pine or fir will help it along. Beech and oak are among the

best logs. Beech has a pleasant aroma and gives off a steady glow. Oak has the outstanding merit of burning slowly. If none of these are available. select wood from some kind of fruit tree. Such wood gives off a

pleasant smell when burning.

But, for all of us, the happiest memories of childhood are those associated with the celebration of this great holiday. How easy it is to vividly call up scenes of long ago when a happy family gathered by the warm glow of an open fireside; to close the eyes to see again the snow-covered fields and to hear again the crunching sound of heavy boots plodding through the snow and visualize the little white church on the hill. In the silence of a darkened room one can so easily revisit that little church, breathe again the aroma of evergreens and burning candles and sense anew the presence that is so obvious in the quiet and solemn stillness.

These are the things about Christmas that have not changed and will not change with the modes and mannerisms of new generations. These are the things which reflect the spirit of Christmas. It is in the spirit of love and goodness, of close communion with God and with mankind and with it all is mixed a sense of awe at the wonderful miracle brought into being on that first Christmas night at Bethlehem so long ago.

This is the spirit of Christmas, and so it shall remain until the end of time.



### Halts Fire Hazards You wouldn't build a fire on the

living room floor, but an improperly decorated Christmas tree amounts to the same thing. Don't invite Santa to come to your house on a fire engine; follow these precautions in Christmas tree lighting and decorating: Choose a small tree, rather than

large one. Store the tree outdoors until a day or two before Christmas.

When the tree is brought into the house, stand it in water and set it in a cool part of the house, away from radiators, heaters and fireplaces. Don't allow it to block an exit.

#### Check Carefully

Be sure every lighting set and electric cord you use is in good condition - no worn or frayed vires, no loose sockets. When you buy new sets or cords,

look for the approved Underwriters' Label. The ones that bear it have passed tests for fire and shock hazards. Provide a switch some distance

from the tree for turning tree lights on and off. Ornaments should be made of fireproof materials, metal or glass. Never set up electrie trains under the tree.

Don't let gift wrappings pfle up under the tree. Don't leave tree lights burning

when no one is home. From time to time, check needles near the lights to see if they have started to turn brown. When needles start to fall, take the tree down and discard it outdoors

**Needs Special Care** The poinsettia, with its bright

red flowers and green foliage, will survive if cared for properly. If you have recently purchased a poinsettia, chances are it was greenhouse grown, so try to provide conditions as nearly as possible like those in the greenhouse. A uniform temperature of 60-75 degrees F. is best. Place the plant in bright light near a sunny window but remove it at night to prevent chilling. Water it enough to keep the soil moderately moist but not water-logged.

#### Cool and Dry

If you intend to keep the poinsettia for another year, gradually withhold water and store it in a cool, dry place after it has stopped blooming. In April or May, prune it down to six inches, and repot it in a good potting mixture with proper drainage. Return it to bright light to renew

its growth. You can put it out in the garden when the temperature remains above 60 degrees F. An area partly shaded from the midday sun is most desirable.

You can keep the poinsettia short by pinching it in summer, but do not prune the same shoot more than once because small flowers will result.

As cool weather approaches, move the plant indoors to an airy and sunny location, preferably near a south window. The poinset. tia is a short-day plant and must not be exposed to artificial light because it will delay or prevent flowering.





If we could do these things, we could build a better world; a world of peace and brotherhood and we would be keeping the spirit of Christmas-forever-in our hearts.

Fire hazards are about us ev. erywhere during the holiday season. The majority of us overload our home electrical systems dur. ing the season and practically everyone brings a Christmas tree into the house without first spraying it with a fireproof substance. Holiday fires are needless, Don't use more lights than you need to make your tree look bright and cheerful and have your electrical system carefully checked even before you install any lights at all. Buy Fresh Tree

Don't let a tinder-dry Christmas tree spoil your holiday. Be certain your tree is fresh when you buy it. Keep it in water at all times and do not bring it into the house until a day or so before Christmas. Do not place the tree near a fireplace or heating unit. Dispose of the tree when it begins to shed its needles a lot.

Be sure that all decorations used in the home are fireproof. Do not use lighted candles as a part of your Christmas decorations. They are much more dangerous than decorative.

#### Check Wiring

If your string of lights are not new, check the insulation on the wiring carefully as it tends to become brittle with age and use. Use only approved lights and wiring for outdoor decorations. Indoor wiring tends to short when used outside.

If you burn a Yule log in your fireplace to observe the holiday. be sure to use a screen and keep household items and other articles a safe distance from the fireplace.







In Greece, decorated trees, greeting cards and the exchanging of gifts mark the observance of the holiday. New Year's Eve is the time for a really big celebration with dances and parties for both young and old.

In Mexico, during the nine days before Christmas, candlelight processions are formed nightly. Called Posadas, which literally means 'lodging." this ritual reenacts the Holy Family's journey to Bethlehem and its difficulty in finding a place to stay. At a prearranged household, the marchers are barred at first, then admitted with rejoicing.



Turkey is a favorite holiday treat, so be sure your bird is tailormade to fit your family's holiday appetites and plans. Birds are plentiful at this time of year and most stores are stock-

ed with birds ranging from 6-pound hens to 27-pound toms. A young turkey weighing between 4 and 6 pounds is ideal for a small family. For a slightly larger number, a young hen or tom weighing from 10 to 25 pounds will provide ample servings.

Allow at least one pound of uncooked bird per serving. If you plan two dinner parties, it's wise to buy a larger bird, cut it in half and store half in a locker or home freezer. Select your bird carefully.



The Nativity theme is by far the most popular of all Christmas card illustrations. Many are reproductions from the old masters, but each year others are created especially for the Christmas card industry.



Home owners can often get the Yule greens the y need by wisely pruning their conifer trees and evergreen shrubs. There are five simple rules to follow when trimming branches and twigs for holiday decorations.

(1) Thin the trees and shrubs for shape, always maintaining the natural contour of the plant. (2) Do not cut more than 6 to 7 inches from a branch. (3) If the tree has not been pruned for some time, take off every other branch. (4) Do not cut beyond the green needles; otherwise this will not fill in with new growth. (5) Keep the cut branches in a cool moist place until ready for use.


#### **Ideal Greens**


Spruce, pine, hemlock, yew and aborvitae make ideal Christmas greens. Yew seems to hold up best. Broadleaf evergreens such as laurel, andromeda, boxwood and Japanese holly should be kept in water when used indoors, otherwise their leaves shrivel.

Roping used to frame a doorway can be made of pine, balsam, laurel, and hemlock. Any of the broadleaf evergreens, co-mingled with holly, balsam or yew, are ideal for wreaths. Good for indoor arrangements are barberry, firethorn, viburnium with its bright red fruit, bayberry and drooping leucothoe.



Within recent years some of our religious and educational leaders have expressed the belief that Santa the Saint has been lost in Santa the Sugar Daddy, inferring that the whole idea of the Santa Claus myth is bad psychology or just not good horse sense.

The modern concept of Santa. of course, is 99 per cent fiction and strictly American. In Europe, Saint Nick was a tall, angular man who rode a bony gray mare. He acquired his whiskers, his pipe and his paunch in America and traded his hay burner for a speedier means of transportation.

While there is no doubt that the Santa Claus idea has been abused and somewhat over - commercialized at times, down under it all Santa still typifies a spirit of generosity and thoughtfulness. It is no reflection on Santa himself that many children who eagerly await his arrival each Christmas Eve have never heard the story of the Holy Child from their parents. So let us not blame Santa, nor

the children, if the central idea of Christmas, the birth of Jesus, suffers from neglect. The fault lies with those of us whose duty it is to lead and guide and teach and show the way.

### **Attractive Package Brightens Your Gift**

Half of the gift is the wrapping, so make the outside covering of your gift as gay and attractive as the gift inside.

For the girl who knows how to sew, material for a dress in a fabric-wrapped box, rick-rack for the ribbon and spools of thread with big buttons for the decoration create an unusual package.

Dr. John Henry Hopkins, Jr. Episcopal rector from Williamsport, Pa., composed the words and music for "We Three Kings of Orient Are." Author of "O Little Town of Bethlehem" was Phillip Brooks, a young Episcopal minister who later became bishop of Massachusetts. He was inspired to write the poem after a trip to the Holy Land.

Although non-religious, the rollicking "Jingle Bells" also came from the pen of a churchman, John Pierpoint, almost a century ago.

### Tree Should Be Safe As Well as Pretty

Make sure your Christmas tree, this year is as safe as it is a trat-tive. The way to do it is to keep the butt of the tree in water while it's in the bound it's in the house.

Keeping the tree in water will help to prevent dryness that may mean a fire hazard. It will also keep the needles from dropping


so rapidly. When you select your tree, try to find out how long it has been cut. It will last longer if it bas



### **Greeting Cards Came** To Us From England

The thoughtful custom of sending cards to friends and relatives at Christmas comes down to us from England.

It is generally suggested by historians that the idea began with schoolboys away from home who wrote their Christmas letters on fancy paper and in fancy writing. There has been controversy

through the years as to who sent the first lithographed cards. In 1941 a copy of an old Christmas card was found in the British museum and credit for the card was given to William Maw Egley, a 16-year old apprentice, in the year 1842.

**Cole Gets Credit** 

Later evidence, however, gave credit for the first card to Sir Henry Cole and lithographer John C. Horsley, in the year 1843. Cards credited to Egley and Cole

are quite similar. Each was etched in black and white and each shows drinking, dancing and holiday merriment scenes, and both carry holiday greetings.

Evidence that Egley was not the originator comes from a framed copy of the Egley card which reportedly carries a note on the back in the apprentice's handwriting. The note says the card was finished December 3, 1848 and is the 'second ever published."

Cole began sending out cards to all his friends in 1846, each card bearing the message, "A Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. Although the cards brought fame and popularity to Cole, it was some twenty years before Christmas cards became very popular in England.

The trimmed Christmas tree, as we know it today, is little more than a century and a half old, yet legends trace the origin of the tree back to earliest times.

One legend concerns an early Christmas missionary, St. Wilfred, who once came upon a band of Druids preparing to make a human sacrifice under a large oak.

According to the story. St. Wilfred had the tree cut down and almost immediately, a young fir tree sprang up in its place. The missionary seized the evidence and made the fir tree a symbol of new faith and thereafter the Druide set this thereafter the Druids set this symbol of immortality in the halls of their lodges at Christmastime, surrounding it with feasting and laughter and love.

There is also the story of the Faithful Pine which sheltered the Holy Family during the flight to Egypt. With Herod's soldiers in pursuit, it was still necessary that Mary rest awhile so they sought shelter in the low trunk of a huge fir tree. As the soldiers approached, the tree bent its branches to conceal the huddled little group. When the danger had passed, the baby Jesus blessed the old tree. Today, if you cut a, pine cone lengthwise at Christmastime, you can still see the imprint of His little hand.

Another legend holds that the first Christmas tree was really an apple tree. And, although the fir tree has long since replaced its predecessor for Christmas use, the tinsel baubles we use on the tree are said representative of the fruit which for the early Christians symbolized the fall of man in the Garden of Eden and his reclamation by the birth of the Saviour



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

Festive desserts play a big part in the celebration of the Christmas holiday and no other treats are more associated with this holiday than plum pudding and mince meat pie.

The origin of the plum pudding is lost in history, but popular legend explains it this way:

Once upon a time, an English king went hunting on Christmas Eve. A sudden blizzard blocked the paths of the forest and the hunters became lost. One member of the various spices. party, the cook, was charged with



whatever food he could find. In lesperation, he literally threw "everything" into the pot-the remains of a stag chopped into fine bits, flour, birds' eggs, dried plums, ale, brandy, sugar and meat from some wild game. Soon. to his surprise and delight, he had delicious, hot "pudding" and to this day, true plum puddings have all of these ingredients which our quick-witted hunter put into his cooking pot.

#### Mince Meat Pie

The tasty mince meat pie was originally devised by the Puritans as a religious offering and was served with a tiny figure of the UP SHE GOES Christ child in its center. The earliest known recipe dates from the reign of James I in the early 17th century. At that time the pie was filled with beef tongue, chopped chicken, eggs, raisins, orange and lemon peelings, sugar and

#### **Annual Tree Harvest Helpful to Forests**

Don't feel disturbed or guilty about using evergreens for Christmas trees - there's more than enough to go around. Besides, today most Christmas trees are "harvested" as a crop to insure more living room for regular plantings. Also, many Christmas trees

come from poorer forest soils and vet bog areas devoted exclusively the growing of trees for the Christmas market. In such areas everygreens grow far too slowly to produce a lumber of pulpwood crop-thus Christmas trees are the only profitable harvest to come off that land.

Another Christmas tree source s thinnings." Mother Nature seeds from 5,000 to 10,000 trees per acre. In today's growing-trees-asa-crop operation, frequent thinning is essential to allow trees room to live and grow. The thinnings can be sold as Christmas treesand fill a trio of needs: first, as a bringer-of-joy into the home: second, as an income source to the forester; third, as "life insurance" for upcoming timber crops.



### **Choose Wisely When Buying Toys for Tots**

Safety is an important factor in the selection of Christmas toys for the pre-school set and here are some good suggestions: Be sure paint on toys is lead free

and that toys have no sharp or jagged edges. Never give a small child a toy that is small enough to swallow.

The white-berried plant actually is a parasite, often killing off trees that play it host. In recent years Australian foresters resorted to flame throwers to kill off the plant in some wooded areas. The popular promoter of Yuletide romance has a bad habit of sapping the water and mineral salts from the trees, starving them to death. The mistletoe does serve one useful function in the outdoors, however, as it provides a winter food supply for mockingbirds, robins and waxwings. These small birds are responsible for the spread of the tree-damaging parasite. After eating the berries, the birds clean their beaks on the trees, firmly planting the mistletoe seeds they do not eat. The tap root of the seedling pierces the tenderest portions of the treeyoung branches or buds-and the tree sap is drawn into the thick leaves of the guest plant.

Thus the mistletoe plays dual characters and at least according to one superstition, can change from one character to another in the twinkling of an eye. For instance, if the Yuletide mistletoe bough isn't removed from a house by Candlemass Eve (February 1), each leaf will produce a goblin to plague the careless occupants during the year.



Carefully selected toys will give children many happy hours of safer, constructive play. Poorly chosen toys, on the other hand, will collect dust on the shelf or need repairing a few days after Christmas.


Many winding and friction-drive toys are limited in their use and are not recommended for children. On the other hand, blocks, logs and other such toys will help develop a child's creativity.

If you choose a doll as a gift, be sure it is durable. Check the arms to see that they will bend easily. Also see that the fingers are not spread out so that it is difficult to dress the doll.

Make Clothes Simple Doll clothes should be attractive, yet made so the child can manage them herself. They should open down either the front or the back and fasten with snaps, large buttons or ties.


The construction and material used in toys is also important. Since hard plastics break easily. soft plastics, metal and wood are better for toys. Inspect metal toys carefully to be sure there are no sharp edges.

Attractive holiday adornments for the front door, mantels and dining room can do much to bring the warm, friendly spirit of the Christmas season into the home. A triangle or crescent formed of two or three types of greens will brighten the front door. Pine, hemlock, spruce, fir, laurel, holly and scotch broom all work well here. Tie the stems together with string or wire to form the triangle or crescent. Use branches of varying length, with the larger foliage near the base of stem end. Add a bow of waterproof Christmas ribbon and some pine cones, berries, balls or bells for color at the stem end of the spray.

#### Front Door Piece

Turn a few greens upside down and insert them at the basal ends to cover the bare stems. The entire spray should then be turned upside down and hung on the outside of the front door.

A simple, but attractive dinner table arrangement involves using a glass salad bowl with a needle or pin holder in the center. The holder can be made fast with modeling clay. Place a few evergreens around the edge of the bowl, inserting the stems in the holder. A dozen red and white roses or carnations facing in different directions completes a beautiful but simple centerpiece for the table An excellent mantle piece can be made from a piece of plain white Styrofoam. Insert candles in a row down the center, then decorate foreground and background sparingly with small pieces of




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
