**THAT CAPACITY CROWD** in the Bears Den last Friday night -- and another one looms likely this week -- points up the pressing need for more seats in the stadium.

Fortunately, the solution is fairly easy. All that is needed is some volunteer work from residents of the community. Especially needed right away is assistance from men with experience in welding.

The material is already on hand for constructing new bleachers. And students in the welding class are working each school day, piecing together steel pipe forms for the stands.

But the problem is time. Because of limited class time which must be partially curtailed because the boys must set up their equipment, then clean it up at the end of the period, an average of one riser per day can be welded.

With more than 25 needed for the proposed stands, the season will be well along before the boys can finish.

The school has some welding equipment, but the work would go faster if some of the volunteers were to also bring welders machines.

After the welding is completed, additional volunteer help will be needed to move and erect the stands.

School officials ask that anyone with welding experience willing to donate an evening or so toward new stands for the Bears Den, contact Dick Vestal at the school immediately.

# Unbeaten Bears Host Roscoe Friday

## Seeking Third Straight Win

The Baird Bears, whose defensive tactics have made their offense look good in their first two games, will go against the Roscoe Plowboys at 8 p. m. Friday in the Bears Den.

Baird wrapped up touted Merkel, 45 to 6, last Friday night while Roscoe was parlaying two fumbles, an intercepted pass, and three touchdown passes into a 33-0 win over Class B Loraine.

Another full house is expected for the game.

Roscoe's passing attack, which clicked for 162 yards against Loraine, may provide the toughest test yet for Baird's rugged defense. Although the Bears have scored 90 points in two games, the defensive unit has been heavily responsible for both victories through alert, aggressive action.

Expected to get starting line assignments for Baird Friday

night are Thomas Robbins and Kelton Jones at end, Ronnie Price and Bobby Black at tackle, Bruce Bell and Jimmy Collins at guard, and Stanley McGowan at center.

Backfield starters will be Tommy Barton, Wally Harris, Eddie Childers and Richard Windham.

Due for heavy duty, especially on defense, are Steve Stanley and Maxie Gordon. Both can also be counted to get in plenty of offensive licks during the night.

As it was in their opener against Santa Anna, it was crisp defensive play which put the Bears on top of Merkel. Recovered fumbles and pass interceptions made the difference in what otherwise might have been a tight match.

Fullback Windham paced the Baird scoring attack -- which rolled up 32 points in the wild third quarter -- with three touchdowns. His first put Baird out front when he gouged out two yards in the second quarter for the first half's only TD.

Richie Crow booted the first

of his three conversions for the evening to give Baird a 7-0 bulge which lasted until halftime.

And it was the bruising Windham who paced Baird's surge in the third quarter. He scored twice in that period, once on a 30-yard jaunt after he intercepted a Merkel pass, and again on a 37-yard sprint from scrimmage.

It was the second week in a row for Windham to return an intercepted pass for a touchdown.

Quarterback Barton passed to Jones for six yards and Baird's first touchdown of the third period, while Childers and Harris joined in putting points on the scoreboard in that quarter.

Childers' touchdown came on a 55-yard masterpiece on a sweep around left end, while Harris legged his touchdown from 21 yards out.

Crow capped off the big night for Baird with a 35-yard sprint after picking up a loose ball.

Weldon Tittle, Merkel's best offensive hand for the night, scored the lone Badger marker with a three-yard blast following a long dash by tackle Robert Shouse, who scooped up a fumble.

Childers' long run helped him become the game's leading rusher with 74 yards in nine plays, while Windham raced 72 in 16 carries and Harris added 70 in 11 tries.

Barton completed two of four passes against Merkel for 45 yards and one TD.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Allyn of Trent spent Tuesday with their daughter, Louise and Weldon Isenhower.

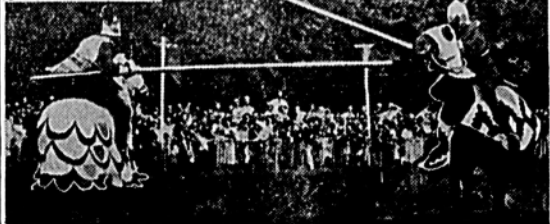

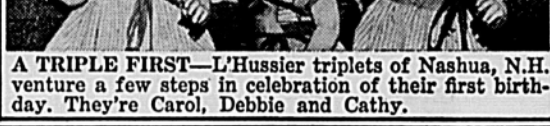

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Hunter McLean, chairman of the State Board of Insurance, will head the Johnson-Humphrey campaign in Texas, Gov. John Connally announced at a news conference.

At the same time, Connally said he himself may have "no precise role" in the presidential campaign, although there is a possibility he will make some out-of-state speeches for the ticket.

Selection of McLean ended some speculation over whether a Democrat of the moderate-

conservative group which backs Connally or the liberal faction would run the Texas Johnson-Humphrey show.

McLean is a close friend of the governor and one of his first major political appointees. He is also a longtime supporter of the president.

Connally acknowledged he contacted McLean about the campaign director's job after talking the matter over with Johnson.

"The choice was completely satisfactory to the President and to me," Connally told reporters. "The President was delighted."

McLean, former Fort Worth insurance executive, is taking a leave of absence from the board of insurance, and will open a campaign office here, Connally said.

Goldwater for President headquarters under direction of Tad Smith of El Paso, working with State Republican Chairman Peter O'Donnell of Dallas, already is operating full blast a few blocks from the state capitol.

SPENDING REQUESTS UP — State financial outlook is rosier than ever, but state agency

spending plans are breaking all records too.

Gov. Connally gave reporters a briefing on fiscal matters in a photo-slide illustrated press conference.

State agencies, he reported, are asking a whopping \$689,472,181 increase in spending for the 1966-67 fiscal period. He emphasized, however, they aren't likely to get it.

Connally pointed to possibility of a \$82,500,000 surplus at close of the 1964-65 period next August 31. He also estimated there will be \$623,800,000 available for appropriation by the Legislature next year. This is some \$153,400,000 more than the present level.

State agencies, however, have proposed spending of more than \$813,000,000 from the general fund, \$3,800,000,000 from all funds.

Connally said he wanted to make "abundantly clear" that review of the requests did not represent his approval.

"The money is going to be a little harder going out than it was coming in. My own recommendations (to the Legislature) will probably differ to a marked degree (from these figures)."

This is the way the requests break down:

Judiciary -- asking an increase of \$962,808; hospitals and special schools, up \$51,600,000; departments and agencies, up \$229,100,000; public and higher education, up \$331,700,000 (not including a \$78,000,000 figure for pay raises being sought by school teachers.)

STATE BAR COMMITTEE MEETS — A State Bar Committee, representing grievance groups from over the state, met here to discuss proposed changes in procedures for disciplining lawyers.

Proposed revisions will be submitted to attorneys in a statewide referendum next year. Supreme Court Justice Robert W. Calvert addressed a luncheon meeting of the group.

PAROLE SUPERVISION HELPS — Fewer boys are being sent back to the State Training School due to better parole supervision, Youth Council Director James Turman reports.

Rate of return has dropped to 26 per cent, lowest in history, Turman told the Council. He calculated the dollar saving for the last year at \$217,000.

BUSES ARGUE FOR RATE BOOST — National Bus Traffic Association, representing some 31 Texas bus lines told a State Railroad Commission examiner that operating costs justify a 10 per cent rate increase for most types of in-state service.

Rates requested would apply to passenger, charter and express service.

POLLUTION BOARD CHALLENGED — State attorneys claim district court has no jurisdiction over the Texas Water Pollution Control Board in an oil company's suit challenging the agency's authority to regulate disposal of oil field brines and waste.

Superior Oil Company sued the board in 53rd district court here, claiming the Railroad Commission is the proper agency to regulate oil field brines and waste disposals. District Judge Herman Jones agreed to consider the suit questioning board jurisdiction.

The state moved for dismissal, claiming such an action could be brought only with legislative permission.

TRAFFIC FATALITIES INCREASING — A steadily increasing highway death rate is bringing demands for corrective action.

The death rate is up 14 per cent from last year. Total number of fatal accidents is up 13 per cent.

There have been 1,860 fatalities this year, compared with 1,631 in 1963.

PARKS PROGRAM — J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department, says improvements at Lake Whitney, Falcon and Dam B State Parks have reached the point where he foresees completion of the \$1,200,000 parks improvement program before next summer.

Parks people said the first days of dove season proved a definite success as hunters "generally" obeyed the law, and most hunters apparently got

their limits since birds were plentiful.

EMPLOYMENT — The advent of cotton-picking time in Texas offset the decline in the number of workers employed in vegetable, fruit and nut activities from mid-June, and the Texas Employment Commission reported that farm employment ran 346,300 workers by mid-July and total employment in the state rose for the seventh consecutive month to a total of 3,622,600 -- an increase of 2,100 from June and up 60,800 from July, 1963.

The Commission also stated that only 4.2 per cent of the total labor force was unemployed in mid-July, compared to 4.8 per cent in July 1963, and 4.4 per cent in June 1964.

WATER PROPOSALS — Another bid to capture flood waters of the Colorado River above the Highland Lakes has been submitted to the Texas Water Commission by the Menard County Water and Improvement District No. 1.

Menard County WC&ID No. 1 wants to study the possibility of a dam site on the San Saba River four miles above Menard. This is the same dam site which the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers is expected to propose a \$27,000,000 dam and reservoir when it completes its comprehensive report on the Colorado basin.

MENTAL HEALTH PLANNING — A year from the date when Gov. Connally asked interested citizens to develop a moderate, comprehensive program of mental health services for the State, a 112-member committee, headed by Judge C. L. Abernathy of Hale County, was ready to review its steering committee's hefty volume of "a nearly complete working draft" of a new Texas plan.

State psychopathic hospitals still would be needed for many thousands of patients each year but the community plan is designed to provide an emergency care formula for some patients who would not need to be institutionalized with early treatment, and for those discharged from mental hospital who need a "half-way" house to help them back to normal living.

Central theme of the 298 page document is that of treating mentally ill persons in or near their home communities, rather than sending them off to a mental hospital far from home and isolating them from society.

Committee's completed set of recommendations will go to Connally and to the 1965 Legislature for implementation and legislative action.

INDEPENDENT OILMEN SEEK RELIEF — Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association (TIPRO) says independent producers are in "deep trouble" and the organization's executive vice president has recommended a program of state and federal action to help them.

W. Earl Turner says the oil industry is suffering from a "grave monopoly trend." He believes the trend is partially due to imports, sharp competition in marketing, and failure of prorating states (including Texas) to get their share of U. S. production.

SHORT SNORTS — Personal incomes of Texans gained 5.2 per cent to a total of \$11 billion during the first half of 1964. . . A total of 326 new lawyers will be sworn in September 21 here. . . Allan Shivers will be master of ceremonies at a banquet October 16, where Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson will be honored as a distinguished graduate of the University of Texas. . . A defendant can be assessed only one jury fee, though his case is retried, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr told Navarro County Atty. Jimmy Morris in an opinion. . . Texas Water Commission is engaged in budget discussions aimed at stretching available funds to cover work on a state water plan. . . Liquor Control Board reports collections totaling \$41,115 resulting from 809 convictions and 22 jail terms for liquor law violations during July. . . Commissioner John C. White is visiting trade fairs in Turkey and Yugoslavia as a representative of President Lyndon B. Johnson.

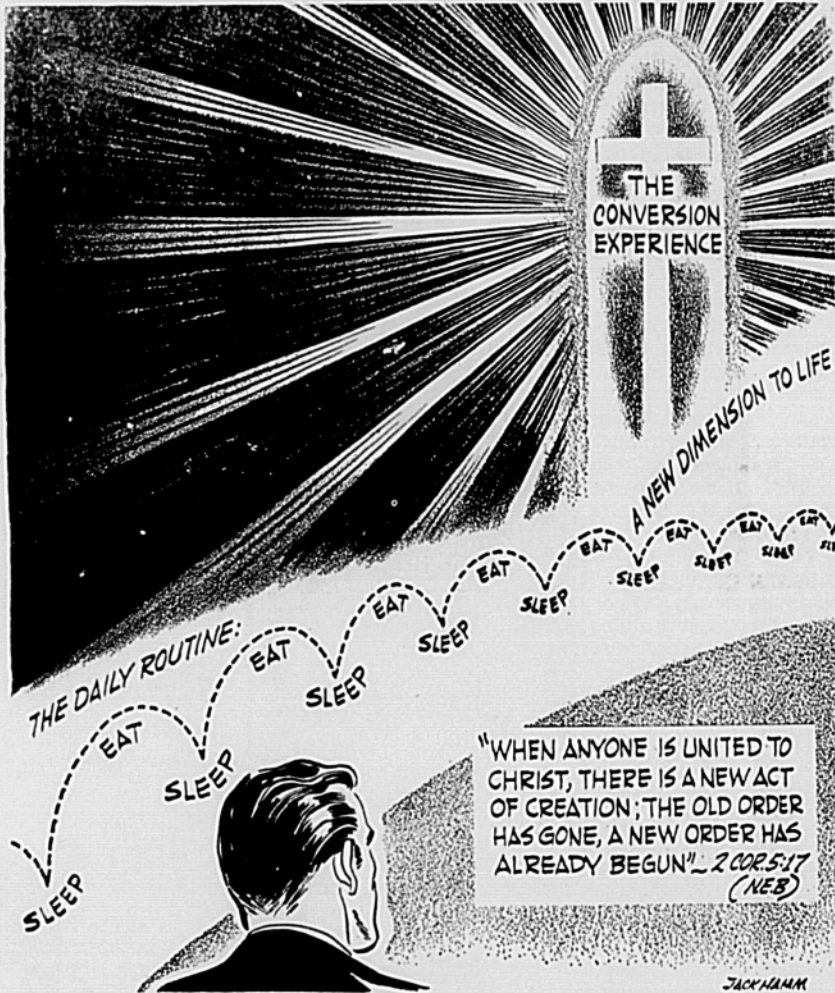

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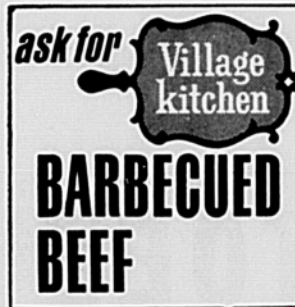
