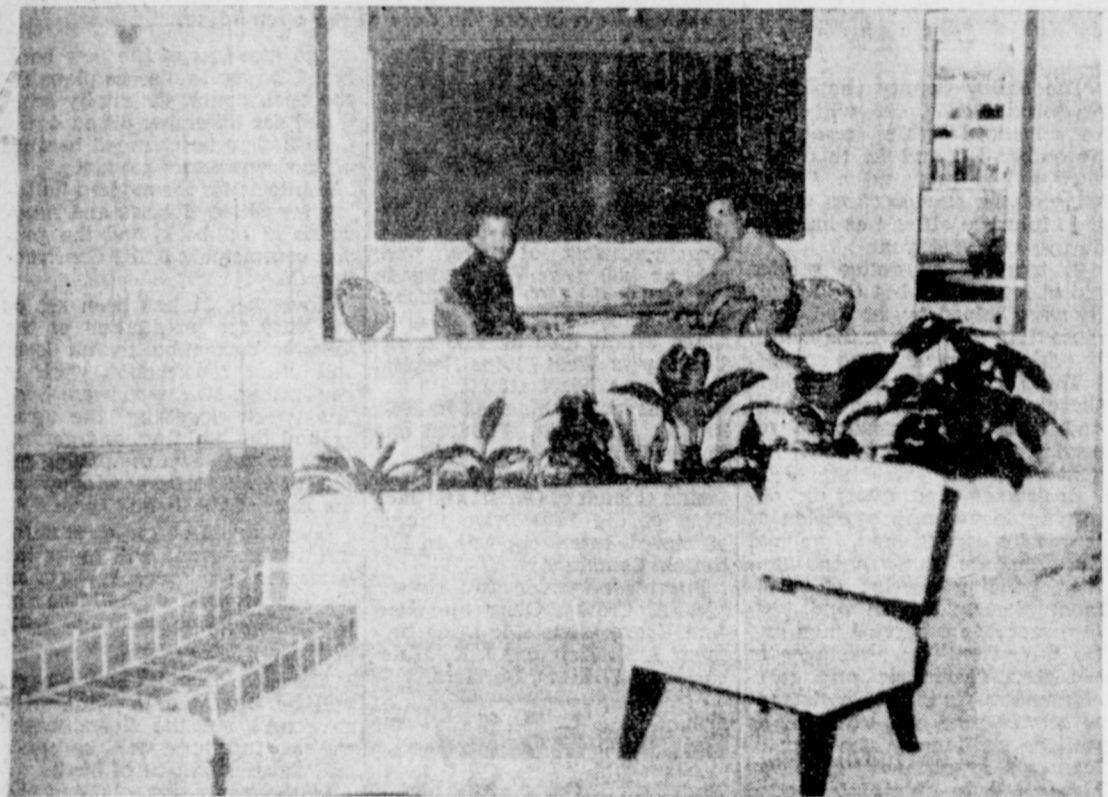


Barbour Home Reflects Good Planning In Modern Design



THE BARBOURS NEW HOME

on North Avenue F is designed in buff brick and natural finish redwood siding applied vertically. The white roof contrasts with the dark panelling effectively. An attached carport features storage space and a patio convenient to the kitchen.



UNUSUAL DINING AREA

in the Barbour home is this one. It features wrought iron furniture in turquoise to match the main color scheme of the whole house. A delightful planter separates the dining area from the lower level of the living room.

Nearly every couple dreams of a home of their own, and for many, these dream homes remain just dreams. But for Mr. and Mrs. H. L. "Babe" Barbour,

their dream came true November 11. That was the date they moved into their new home at 717 North Avenue F, in the Le-nau addition.

The house, which faces west is constructed of light brick waincoting and natural finish redwood panelling. It has a car port with storage space, and a patio

with a built-in barbecue convenient to the kitchen. As you enter the paneled front door, the visitor is immediately aware of the red brick paving of the entry way, and the step down into the gracious living room.

KITCHEN

To the immediate left is the dining area, also paved with red brick, where a graceful wrought iron dining table and chairs carry out the predominant color scheme of turquoise. This area opens into the kitchen which has a complete electric American Kitchen, in copper tones, to harmonize with the birch cabinets and cheerful yellow vinyl floor and cabinet tops. Outstanding in the kitchen is the built-in table top range and oven, and the refrigerator to match. A built-in breakfast bar is an-

other feature of the kitchen.

LIVING ROOM

A step down takes the visitor into the living room, where a massive Arizona sandstone fireplace wall dominates the scene. The room is 14x20, and is divided with an unusual planter box filled with greenery from Muleshoe Floral Co. The walls are paneled and a beam ceiling catches the eye of the visitor. A Mohawk wool carpet in the

"Mardi Gras" pattern carries out the tan and turquoise color scheme in the living room.

Modern lighting fixtures throughout are from Sanders Lbr.

Drapes in the living room are cocoa with a gold thread and are window length. In the bedrooms, small print drapes are used, and in the kitchen, cafe curtains in turquoise are hung.

BATH

The bath is in pink and turquoise, with tiled dressing table. A chrome divider is unique in the bathroom, and is repeated at the main entry.

BEDROOMS

The bedrooms feature walk-in closets. One is pink and the other is turquoise.

Babe and Rosemary are proud of their new home, and are especially proud of the Utility central heating unit, also from Sanders.

State Cotton Acreage Allotment Down 201,000 Acres From Allotment Of 1955

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced state acreage allotments for the 1956 crop of upland cotton. These are a breakdown of the national allotment of 17,391,304 acres announced October 14.

The Texas allotment for 1956 is 7,410,893 acres. This is a 201,886 acre reduction from the 1955 allotment of 7,612,779 acres. On July 1, 1955, 6,984,600 acres of up-

land cotton were being cultivated in the state.

The law provides that no state shall receive an allotment for upland cotton which is less than the smaller of 4,000 acres or the highest acreage planted to cotton in the state in any of the years 1953, 1954, and 1955. The remainder of the national acreage allotment is apportioned among other states on the basis of the

acreage planted to cotton in the years 1950 to 1954, with certain adjustments in such acreages as required by law.

The national acreage allotment of 17,391,304 acres is that which is required to produce an amount of cotton equal to the national marketing quota of 10 million bales. It is based on the national average yield of cotton per planted acre for the five years 1950-54.

On December 13, farmers who grow upland cotton in 1955 will vote in a national referendum to determine whether marketing quotas will be operative for the

Two Lubbock Avalanche-Journal staff members will participate: News Editor Bill Hams, and Society Editor Margaret Turner.

Students from Midland and Amarillo's Palo Duro High Schools will open the speech department program with a demonstration debate. 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The state allotments announced are to be apportioned among counties and the county allotments among farms according to provisions of the law and regulations issued by the Secretary. Individual farm acreage allotments will be mailed to operators prior to the referendum.

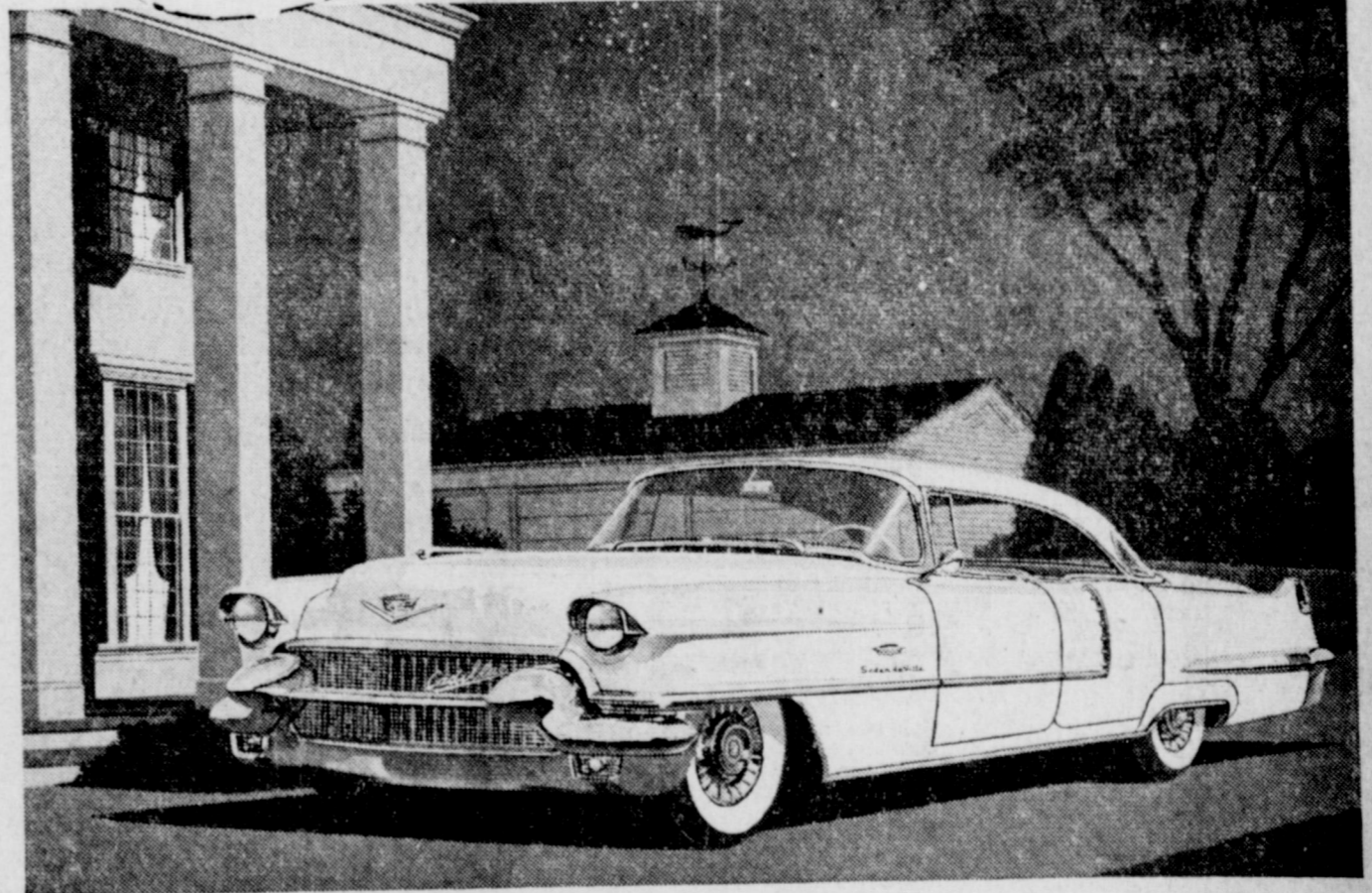

Joe Moore, Jackson County, Tenn., Star Farmer of America for 1955, recommends the following sound practices for success with livestock — especially in breeding: (1) take the money you might pay for two or three animals and put it in one outstanding cow, sow, or ewe; (2) use purchased sires; (3) for growing animals, provide constant care, good feed, including plenty of water, pasture, and proper breedings; (4) grow and process your own feed stuffs; (5) keep complete records.

Soil Conservation District News

Harvest is in full swing in the Blackwater Valley Soil Conservation District, and it appears to be a bountiful one. Many of the District's cooperators are reporting above average yields on sorghums and cotton. With a good year again on irrigated and a fair year on dry land, we can rightfully look back with a sense of satisfaction and forward with anticipation for the year ahead.

Our aim in the Blackwater Valley Soil Conservation District is to plan for the future years and insure a permanent type of agriculture. We believe this can be accomplished with farm operations based on conservation of the soil, water, and plants. This type of agriculture is nearly a must in our Great Plains because of climatic conditions and soil types. The Dust Bowl of the Great Plains testifies to this importance.

Conservation farming to control wind erosion is based on proper use and treatment of land within its capabilities and conserving all or most of all the rain that falls on it. This calls for contour farming on flat lands, and terraces on sloping land.

Appropriate measures include strip shelter belts of crops, tillage practices that leave crop litter or residue at the surface, and rotations suited to moisture supplies in the soil. These, with progressive improvements of soil management practices, will control wind erosion. A conservation farmer is one who sees the land within its capabilities, recognizes its needs, and works with understanding in meeting those needs.

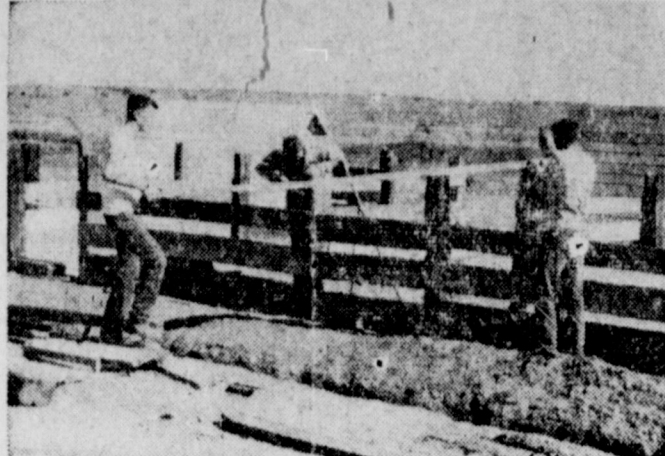

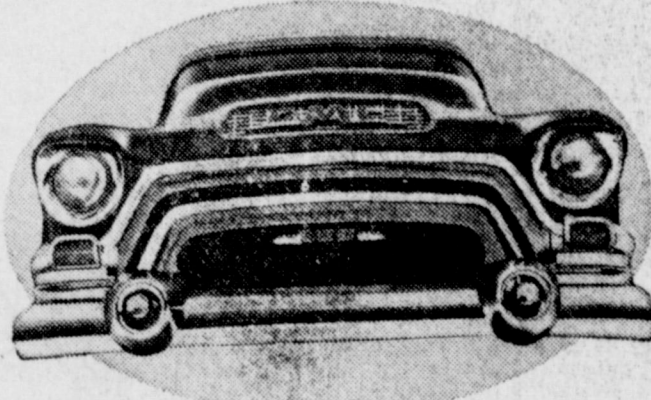
