## Larkin Building Being Remodeled

The two-story Larkin building at the southwest corner of the public square is being remodeled and re-decorated this week, and when finished it will be a more attractive building than it was when first built, according to present appearances.

The re-modeling was decided upon when Frank Larkin, the owner, acquired the business of the locker plant which had been operating for several years in one compartment of the building, a business change which was mentioned in these columns at the time. Mr. Larkin will continue to operate the locker business, together with his other lines of business, but some of the partition walls have been removed and other changes are being made.

The most important change, possibly, will be the installation of a plate glass front for the entire width of the building, which is 50 feet. The door in the center of the front wall has been removed and the entry will be at the northeast corner of the building. All the woodwork will be re-painted and the interior also will be re-decorated.

The Larkin building, which was constructed by H. M. Larkin in 1916, is approximately 50 by 80 feet in size and is two stories high. The lower floor in recent years has been cut up and occupied by two or three different business concerns, but from now on it will all house one general business, except the compartment at the west end used as a laundry.

The second floor is cut up into nine separate living compartments, all of which are occupied practically all of the time, Mr. Larkin states. A number of substantial brick buildings in Tahoka, including the neighboring Wells building and the Lynn county courthouse, were constructed in that same year, 1916. The Larkin building was substantially built and has been well preserved, and it promises to do service for several generations yet.

## Father Of Mrs. B. Novian Dies

Mrs. B. Novian's father, J. R. Rhodes, 72, who lived near Anson, Jones county, died in the Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene on Thursday of last week. Mrs. Novian had been called down by his serious illness and was at his bedside at the time of his death.

Funeral services were conducted in the Bethel Baptist Church near Anson on Friday afternoon, with burial in the cemetery there. Mrs. Novian remained down there for several days following the funeral.

## County Entries Win At Fair

Lynn county has captured a fair share of awards in the annual Panhandle-South Plains Fair being held in Lubbock this week end.

Tahoka FFA boys, under sponsorship of V. P. Carter, won third place on their exhibit on uses of barnyard manure. Lamesa won first and Roosevelt second, there being twelve entries. The Tahoka boys received \$50 in cash.

County Judge Tom Garrard and wife Linnie Garrard won two first places and eleven other places on their registered Herefords, in the Livestock division. Claude Wells won one first place and several other places on his Herefords.

The Garrard winners were: Two year old bull class, HG Real Proud Mixer, first; yearling bull class, R Proud Mixer, first; junior bulls calved between Jan. 1 and March 31, 1949, second and third; three-bull entries, third; two-bull entries, fourth; junior yearling heifers, Proud Bell Mixer, first; junior heifer calves, Miss Onward Mixer, third, and Valentine Mixer, fourth; four animals all of one sire, third; two females entry, third; pair of yearlings entry; second; pair of calves, third and fourth.

Claude Wells won the following places: junior heifer calf, calved between Jan. 1 and March 31, 1949, Dottie Domino, first; senior bull Prince Domino 64th, sixth, and calf calved Sept. 1 to Dec. 31, 1948, Prince Domino 63rd, eighth; two bulls class fifth; and pair of calves, fifth.

In the Women's department, several Lynn county ladies won places, among them being the following: Mrs. J. H. Cobb, first in fancy glass bowls; Mrs. J. O. Allen, first on tea towels; Mrs. A. L. Dumanan, second on braided rugs; Mrs. Clifton Hamilton, first on coasters.

There were possibly other Lynn county winners which have not come to the attention of The News. County Agent Bill Griffin of Tahoka is superintendent of the livestock division this year.

## Cotton Harvesting Gets Under Way

At 9:00 o'clock Thursday morning, the six gins of Tahoka had turned out 638 bales of cotton from this year's crop. The weather for the past week has been ideal for maturing and opening the cotton but much of it is so rank and so densely covered with leaves that it continues to open slowly. The harvesting tempo is increasing daily, however, and is expected to be in full swing next week.

Quite a good many Mexicans and a few Negroes have already arrived and gone to work in the cotton fields but many more are expected within the next two weeks.

Seed is now bringing \$38.00 per ton.

## Driving Course Is Offered Here

Thirty-five Tahoka High School students are enrolled in the new course started this year in driver training, successful completion of which will give each student one-half unit credit toward graduation, according to Supt. Vernon Brewer.

Principal purpose of the course, however, is to train young people how to drive an automobile properly and safely.

Coach Jim Foust is the instructor. Last summer he attended a special school at the University of Texas in preparation for directing the course of training.

The students will study proper driving methods and the importance of safety.

Bill Strange Motors has donated the school a new 1949 Ford custom four-door sedan for use in the training program. The car will have dual drive controls installed soon. This is part of a state-wide and nation-wide public safety and learn to drive correctly program.

## Dwayne Driver Is Seriously Injured

Dwayne Driver, 16 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Driver of Idakou, formerly of Tahoka, sustained serious injuries to the neck last Friday night in a football game with the Cooper (Woodrow) Pirates.

It was first thought that the neck had been broken but later this was found to be erroneous. Attendants at a hospital where he is being treated report that he is doing very well. Mrs. C. L. Driver of Tahoka was told in a telephone conversation Tuesday night that it would probably be three months before Dwayne could regain the full use of his neck, however.

Dwayne and his parents have lived in this county most of his life and he was formerly a student in the Tahoka public schools.

Last Friday night, he attended the Tahoka-Mexico football game. He is thoroughly familiar with the English game of rugby, but this was the first game of American football he had seen.

## Blue Cross Plan Explanation Made

Due to possible misunderstandings in the operation of the Blue Cross and Blue Shield hospitalization insurance plans, Hubert Tankersley, president of the Lynn County Farm Bureau, has issued the following explanation on authority of the state director:

Blue Cross allowance for services rendered a Blue Cross patient in a non-Blue Cross member hospital which is registered with the American Medical Association is up to \$6.00 per patient day for members and up to \$5.00 per patient day for dependents and obstetrical patients not to exceed the charges for hospital services which would have been supplied as benefits had the care been received in a Blue Cross member hospital.

Anyone who has the Blue Shield membership also may use any physician or surgeon who is a member of his local county medical society or eligible for membership therein.

Mr. Tankersley also says that the Blue Cross will be available to new members of the Farm Bureau by October 15.

Sisters surviving are Mrs. Jack Hoskins of Post and Mrs. Marion Lewis of Phoenix, Arizona; brothers, Gene Brandon of Phoenix and Tilden Brandon of Van Alstyne, Texas.

Mr. Brandon was a native of Tennessee, having been born in that state on August 23, 1874. He was married at Woodbury, Tennessee, on October 29, 1900. Later, he and his family moved to Texas, coming from Fannin to Lynn county in 1924.

He was a highly respected citizen of O'Donnell and will be missed by many friends.

## Election Saturday On \$300,000 Water And Sewer Bonds

City of Tahoka qualified voters will go to the polls Saturday to vote on a proposed \$300,000 revenue bond issue for the purpose of improving the water and sewer systems, much of which are antiquated as well as inadequate.

Voting of the bonds, Mayor K. R. Durham explains, will not add any taxes. Bonds would be retired with revenues from the two systems, which revenues are now being used of inadequate extensions and repairs to worn out and too-small lines. If voted, the City Council does not expect to use all the bonds at this time but to hold about \$75,000 for future emergencies or unprecedented growth of the town.

In regard to the proposal, the engineers, Hasle & Green, have sent the following statement:

"You will note that the water distribution system is quite weak and overloaded, resulting in insurance penalties and weak pressure. The well supply, pipe and pumps have become loaded to capacity and need enlarging to handle a growing Tahoka. The elevated storage is deficient. It will be advantageous to install the water lines ahead of paving.

"There is an appreciable portion of Tahoka not presently served by sewer. Sufficient lines are proposed to serve about 125 houses and 350 adjacent lots which may develop. These lines will serve all parts of town. Having more homes serviced by sewer is advantageous to the whole community as well as the serviced home, because general community sanitation is improved.

"You will note that the immediate desirable improvements are estimated to cost \$177,000 for water and \$40,000 for sewerage. The revenues from the water and sewer systems will pay for the program without any tax funds."

## Cottonseed Loan Rates Announced

Settlement values for cottonseed loans not redeemed by producers prior to maturity will be based on grades delivered to Commodity Credit Corporation, the Lynn County Agricultural Conservation Committee said this week.

Clarence Church, committee chairman, pointed out that the loan rate of \$49.50 per ton is based on the average grade for the past 5 years, which is 97.7.

Since 100 is the "basic grade" and grades may range from 40 to 125, the settlement value of basic grade 100 will be \$50.65 per ton. The settlement value for cottonseed grading above or below grade 100 will be \$50.65 per ton plus or minus a percentage of such price equal to the percentage by which the grade is above or below 100.

"As an example, should a producer's cottonseed grade 60 at the time of delivery to CCC, the settlement value would be 60 percent of \$50.65 or \$30.39, per ton," Church explains.

Price-supporting loans on cottonseed from the 1949 crop will be available through December 31, 1949 and will mature April 30, 1950, or earlier on demand. Loans will be made on cottonseed with a moisture content of 11 percent or less placed in approved storage or near the farm.

Growers interested in the loan should contact the county ACA office in Tahoka.

### Boyd Tells Of Niagara Falls Trip

I want to begin my story this week by telling a few things that happened on the way to Niagara, that I failed to mention last week. We had not gone very far until we were hailed for a ride by some pretty feminine hiker hikers but we refused to give them a lift which is a very good policy to pursue, even in the U. S. A. Then, we stopped at St. Thomas for lunch and ate in a Chinese cafe. It was about 2 p. m. and we were the only ones eating at that time, so, we had plenty of time to kid the old Chinaman and make friends with him, which paid very good dividends when he brought us an extra good meal. I had all the good fish I could eat for 65c.

On arriving at Niagara, Tom and Leon got very interested in showing me a nice time, so, they began trying to make me a date because they did not want me to tell all that I knew about them. They had no trouble in securing the date but

I always said, I will see you later and it will be much later if it ever happens.

There are so many stories of romance and tragedy connected with Niagara Falls that no one could tell them all. The river that flows from Lake Erie to Lake Ontario makes a drop of a few hundred feet which cause it to become a swift turbulent stream of incalculable force as it reaches the narrows, which is about two miles long and a mile wide. For one reason or another, many people have fallen into these turbulent waters and have gone into eternity as they passed over the falls, while others have been more fortunate and by holding to the rocks were rescued by some brave soul that risked his own life to save theirs.

Niagara Falls freezes over in the Winter and builds an irresistible mountain of ice which causes untold damage when it thaws. I do not know whether it is still permissible or not but, at one time tourists were allowed to cross the river on the ice above the falls. The middle of the river was a bootleggers paradise, being neither American nor

Canadian territory. It is so cold that many people from the South had to have a little firewater to keep them warm which resulted in the loss of life, in many instances. Some innocent and unsuspecting people have lost their lives when the ice suddenly collapsed without warning. Young couples, married people and some alone have passed over these falls into eternity, where they will give an account unto God for the deeds done in the body. Some of them screamed frightfully while others knelt in prayer as they were carried over the precipice to sudden and certain death. "Where will you spend eternity?"

Below the falls there is a mighty whirlpool that can be viewed from close-up position from a small boat that carries you right up to the edge of it, if you care to make the trip. Needless to say, it is perfectly safe because no one has ever suffered injury on account of this small craft.

Many daredevil, death defying acrobats have put on exhibition stunts that have attracted a lot of attention at this place. They have rolled wheelbarrows or walked across the river with hobbles on their feet on a cable that is stretched high above the water.

In addition to this there is an aerial bus that runs upon a cable from which you may get a panoramic view of the entire falls, if you are not one of those timid souls that fear to make the trip. Of course, I wasn't afraid, but I didn't have time to take this heavenly ride.

About the best way to remember all of these sights is to buy a Master View Stereoscope and a lot of films. Looking at these pictures thru the machine is just like seeing them all over again. It is possible to buy pictures of all the interesting places in U. S. A., Mexico and some South American countries.

### Southwestern Head Died Monday

Dr. J. N. R. Score, 53, president of Southwestern University, Georgetown, died at his home there Monday shortly before 1:00 p. m. He had been president of the Southwestern since 1942, resigning the pastorate of the First Methodist Church of Fort Worth to take the University presidency.

He made a notable record both as a Minister and as an Educator. Southwestern is the oldest Methodist school in Texas and has wielded a mighty influence in the building of this state. Many of the statesmen who have been most prominent in political affairs and many of the Ministers who have been most eminent in religious circles in Texas were educated at Southwestern University.

Dr. Score was one of those who stood at the top in Southwestern University history.

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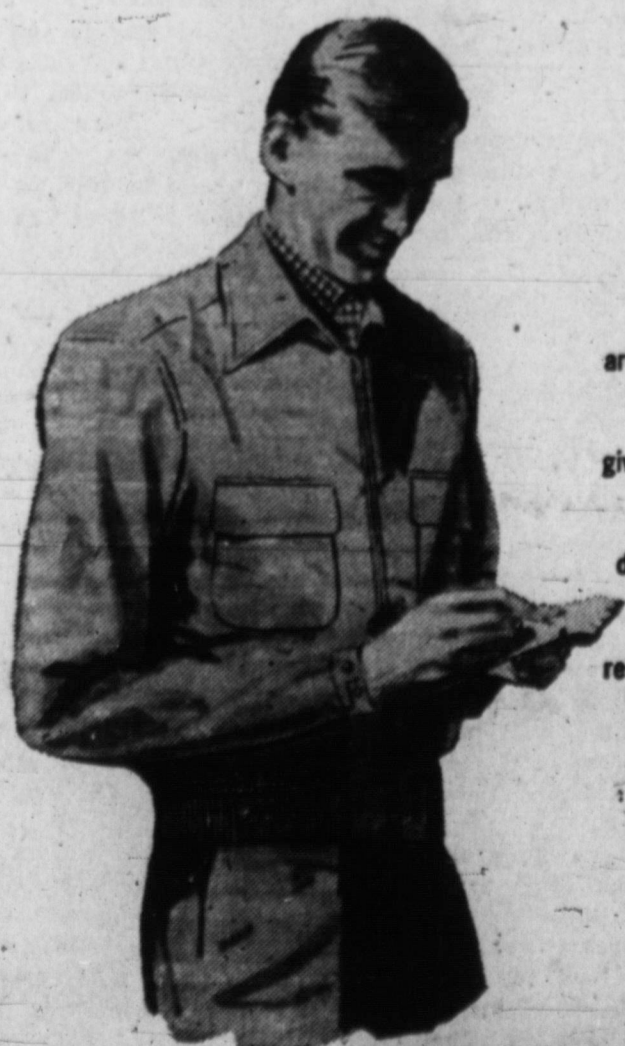
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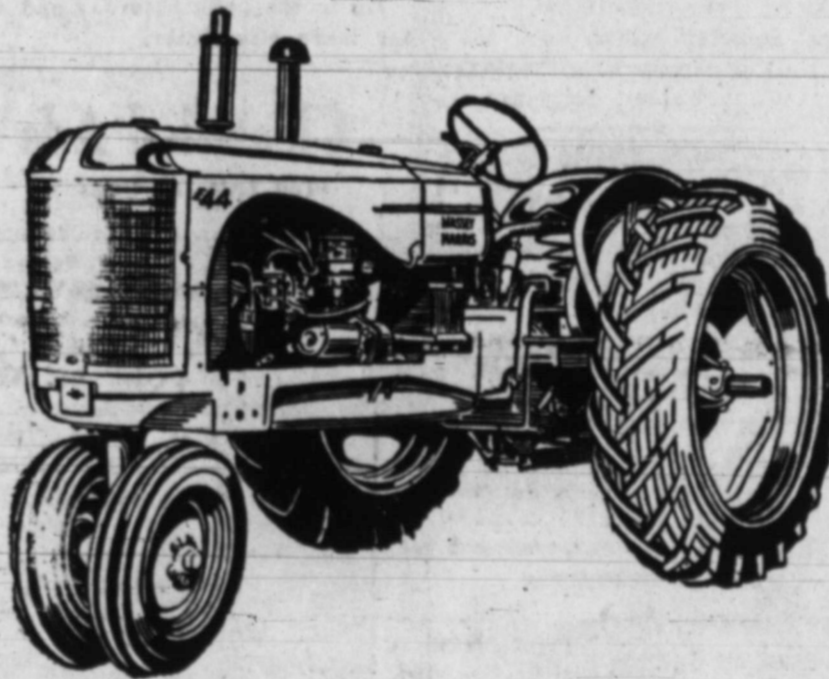
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**Baptist Notes . . .**

**Mare Exists for 45 Days in Cellar on Canned Fruit**

LANSFORD, N. D.—The story of a mare that lived 45 days in a cellar on canned fruit and vegetables, while her owners wintered in Oregon, has come to light.

The four-year-old mare fell into the farmhouse cellar through an outside door. She was imprisoned during most of the time when snowstorms and blizzards raged here, just 20 miles from the Canadian border.

Missing since mid-January, she was found by Albert Mattern, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. George Browers, the owners. He heard a commotion in the cellar when he visited the farm. He led her out via the stairway and door she had entered.

He estimated the animal caused \$500 damage.

She smashed all of about 500 quarts of canned fruits and vegetables. They were buried in straw, which provided roughage—and a bed.

She gnawed away at some poles with damaging effect.

And she lost about 200 pounds while she was on the semihuman diet.

**Tenants Find \$40,000 Cache While Re-Decorating House**

CHICAGO.—Mrs. Lucille Schader threw away a jar containing \$500 in Mexican gold coins found in her father's house in Duquoin, Ill.

Later she was dazed by news that tenants in the house had found an estimated \$40,000 worth of jewels, oil, and rail stocks and government bonds while redecorating.

Mrs. Schader said her father, Michael Bradley, 53, a coal miner, died March 28. She went to Duquoin to tidy up his house preparatory to renting it, found a jar containing "buttons," and threw it out.

Neighbors noticed the bottle and a bank identified the "buttons" as Mexican coins. They were placed in escrow.

**Pointers To Prevent Whooping Cough**

Austin, Tex., Sept. 24.—Now is the time to have your baby protected from whooping cough, says, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The Texas State Department of Health recommends that vaccination against this disease be administered at three months of age with a booster dose of vaccine when the baby is two years old. There is many a child whose life could have been saved if he had been immunized in infancy, said Dr. Cox.

"Whooping cough," said Dr. Cox, "first masquerades as an ordinary cold, with running nose and eyes, followed by a slight cough. These symptoms develop about 1 to 14 days after exposure. Then in about another week the cough develops into a series of continued attacks, in an effort to expel the troublesome mucus. An attempt to breathe during the choking spell produces the characteristic whooping sound. In mild cases it may be absent. The whooping stage lasts 4 to 6 weeks and may then take another two or three weeks to decline gradually.

"Here are some facts about whooping cough:

1. The disease starts like a common cold, 1 to 14 days after exposure. In about another week the cough develops and the whooping usually begins.

2. It is one of the communicable diseases children often catch at school. After a child has reached the age of five, fatalities occur less frequently. Children may carry this disease home to babies.

3. Most important of all is to see that infants are vaccinated against whooping cough, for most deaths occur among children less than one year of age.

4. Call your family physician at once if you suspect your child has whooping cough and follow his directions in detail."

Postmaster "Happy" Smith was recently the recipient of an orchid, recognition as a "good, good, neighbor" on the "Breakfast in Hollywood" program, all of which set many Lynn county people to reminiscing. Many other good deeds he has performed were recalled—also a few of the many pranks he has had a part in.

Ben Moore of O'Donnell, just for the fun of it, sent The News the above picture of Happy taken in 1912, along with pictures of Howard and Hans Tunnell. From there on we'll let Ben tell you about it:

If you wish to tickle the ribs of the old timers a bit, maybe fair "cuts" can be made of these boys. This one of Hap I believe I made in 1913 when I first put up my photo tent south of the square. . . . The boys were waiting for the tent to come in so that they could get their pictures made. . . .

These pictures were made on glass plates instead of film, which was just coming into use.

Some may not know that comes were not so universally read then, so this is it: There was a strip featuring Happy Hooligan, Hap, being always jolly, was dubbed Happy by the "bunch." There was a strip, Simple Simon, so Henry McDaniel got "Simon," though it has pretty well been forgotten. Hansford was dubbed "Hans" for Hans Christian Anderson, while Howard, being the biggest daredevil in their many pranks, was branded "Booger," being somewhat of a "Booger Red" type—tackle most anything.

Oscar Roberts "belonged," but never acquired a nickname.

Hans and Howard once batched in

a house which was near the old school in southwest Tahoka while attending school. And that place must have been the scene of many plots and counter-plots. In later years, confession was made that a neighbor lost one of his pigs. Its romping about in their attic was finally heard.

Jokes of every sort were pulled. Prof. White, superintendent, was very fond of these boys, but they could not refrain from pulling jokes on him, as well as others. He lived very near the school, and the boys knew that he never failed to go, just before retiring at night, for a bucket of water, which was drawn with rope from his well. The boys placed a man-size dummy at the side of his path and waited. The Professor spoke kindly, "Good evening." No answer. Again he spoke, and Wham! went the bucket into the dummy's "face."

One Hallowe'en night, they called upon a mighty fine old fellow—a good friend—and knocked at the front door. There had been an argument among them as to whether he had ever been baptized. A whole bucketful of water did the job. Oh, how they ran from that scene!

Several girls, including the Crie sisters, joined these boys one night in seizing the Santa Fe section car. Part of the "crew" got away with the car, leaving the others to mourn. The latter placed an obstruction on the tracks down in the vicinity of

In 1913, we were living in a little house at the south side of the square, our photo tent being located at the rear of the house. There was much excitement concerning a "mad dog," supposedly seen in Tahoka. Henry, Happy, Hansford, and Howard watched as I put out the kerosene light (no electricity was in town: I was sleeping soundly when the most demoralizing noise started. I did not have time to think—I knew that the mad dog had arrived and was "gnawing on my door. I found myself in the middle of the room, gripping my shotgun. Then, horror struck still harder when I realized that I did not have a cartridge in the house. The balance of the night was none too pleasant, but recovery was quick when daylight arrived and twine was seen leading from my porch. I followed it around to the rear of the late J. S. Wells' store building, winding it into quite a sizeable ball as I traveled. Where were those tick-tackers—innocent lambs!

**"Spare The Gas, Save A Child"**

Austin, Sept. 27. —Texans were urged to "Spare the gas and save the child" in a statewide September campaign launched by the Texas Safety Association against traffic accidents to school-age children.

"No matter how much safety education a child has had drilled into him," said George Clarke, Managing Director, "the fact remains that it's largely up to the motorist whether the child lives or dies."

The Association pointed out that home training and school safety lessons are extremely valuable in impressing youngsters with the dangers of playing in the streets and crossing intersections. But on the other hand, the Association warns, a child in the heat of play forgets quickly and easily the lessons that he has learned, so the bulk of the responsibility falls upon the driver.

Clarke told motorists they can save child life by following these rules:

1. Regard every child on the street as a flashing 'caution' sign.
2. In school zones, residential districts and near playgrounds, be

especially watchful for children and expect the unexpected at all times.

3. Give bicycles a wide berth. Inexperience, a poor sense of balance, holes in the road, or just sheer childish absent-mindedness can place the rider directly in your path without warning.

4. In residential districts, particularly, be on the alert at driveways and intersections for tricycle riders, skaters, scooter riders.

The Texas Safety Association is sponsoring the school safety campaign as part of a continuing traffic safety program in cooperation with the Texas Congress of Parent-Teachers and other groups.

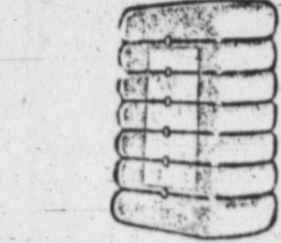

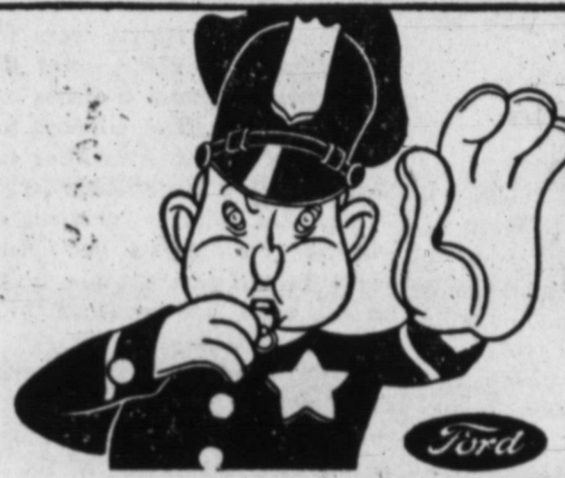

## Arrangments For Farm Hands Are Made For Area

Arrangements were made for two or three thousand farm hands Monday at a meeting of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce and Farm Bureau officials with the C. G. Miller Employment Agency. These hands are needed in the cotton crop harvest, which is expected to be in full swing in ten days or two weeks, if the weather is favorable.

Mr. Miller says the hands will be out of El Paso and San Antonio and are American Mexicans, not Mexican Nationals. The farmer will be required to pay the \$15.00 per hand, \$10.00 of which he will be reimbursed when the hand has picked that amount out. The other \$5.00 will go to Miller for his services. First load of hands is expected here in a week or ten days.

Plans will be worked out later as to how these hands will be handled or processed from truck to farmer. Mr. Miller would like to have some kind of building to locate them in while they are being distributed to farmers.

The Farm Bureau and the C. of C. think this plan can be of great service to the farmers of Lynn county if the labor situation gets acute.

## Meet The Bulldogs—

## Mayor Explains Bond Proposal

The City Council wants the people to be informed about the need for improving the water and sewer system and the need for the bond issue. If the bond issue fails to carry then the responsibility for Tahoka's water shortage will be on the people and not the City Council as it is now.

We want the City to authorize issuance of \$300,000 revenue bonds. The Council will issue and sell \$225,000 at this time to be used in extending, enlarging and improving the water and sewer systems. The extra \$75,000 authorized and not used will stand as a reserve in case of an emergency. This authorized reserve may never be issued but in case it is needed in some calamity, disaster, or unforeseen growth of the City, the Council could issue the bonds without the delay of calling another election.

Much of Tahoka is served by small wrought iron mains that corrode inside and retard the flow of water. The mains leading from the standpipe are so small and so long and have so many connections on them, that the customer along the end of the line have no pressure. Many sections of Tahoka have too few fire plugs, and some of the fire plugs are on small mains with little pressure. All of the water from the wells flows into an 8-inch main but before it reaches town it must flow thru a mile of 6-inch pipe. This constriction slows the supply down tremendously, and in order to get a maximum amount of water thru the 6-inch line the city operates a 500-gallon per minute booster pump. We want to take all of this up and put a 10-inch line from the wells to town. The City has 3 wells a mile north of our present water wells that we have had for over 2 years but the cost of a water line to these new wells has prevented us using that water. We want to run a line to these wells.

We have a capable firm of engineers working with the council and they tell us that Tahoka's water troubles can be solved. It will take some money to do it. This proposed bond issue will put our water and sewer systems in first class condition and modern.

These revenue bonds will have

printed on the face of each one that the holders of the bonds will never expect or demand that they be paid from taxes but will be wholly dependent on the earnings of the water and sewer system for payment of principal and interest. The bonds will extend over a period of 30 years and bear 3 and 3/4 percent interest and can be called in after 15 years if the need arises.

If all of these proposed improvements are carried out there will be a reduction of fire insurance rates in Tahoka.

Personally we know little about Ben Connolly, but if he inherited the splendid talents and the affable disposition of his distinguished father, he ought to make good on the bench. As for "Jimme" Allred, he declares that he enjoyed his work as Federal Judge a few years ago more than any other position he ever held. If so, here is hoping that he stays with the job and makes a notable record on the Bench.

Disclosure a week ago by President Truman that there is convincing evidence that Russia already has the atomic bomb started the world. It is doubtless true, however, that most well-informed people expected Russia to obtain the secret of its manufacture if she had not already done so and to be ready to use this weapon within the next few years if occasion should arise. Since the statement of this country and of the world are now convinced that she already has it, it is believed that efforts to reach some effective peace agreement will be stimulated by the reputed discovery. Even if Russia has obtained the secret of manufacturing the bombs, it must be remembered that America is at least four years ahead of Russia in its manufacture and will doubtless remain ahead for years to come, to say nothing of other powerful means of destruction in this and other countries. It is therefore not believed that Russia will be anxious to start another war any time soon.

We began to see results immediately and now we are pleased to report that the care-taker has made much improvement in the appearance and cleanliness of these places. The interior has been repainted a dark green, on which pencil marks are practically invisible. Carvings on the walls with knives seems to have been discontinued, and while the general cleanliness is not yet perfect it certainly has been improved. Mr. Tomlinson is to be commended for the marked improvement shown.

No appropriation for recreation or entertainment of any kind is made by the state of Texas for its prisoners. Houston Harte, editor and publisher of the San Angelo Standard-Times and part owner of several other newspapers, has compiled a book of Bible stories, taken from the King James version, copiously illustrated, which is just now about ready to be placed on the market, and which already promises to make the author famous.

The idea was born in Harte's fertile brain some four or five years ago when it dawned upon him that there were many thrilling stories almost hidden away in other Bible material which he thought made dull reading; and all the pictures of Bible characters which he had seen were painted for the most part centuries ago, looked unnatural, and did not truly depict the characters nor the customs of the times which they were intended to portray. Harte thought. It was Harte's idea at first to run these Bible stories properly illustrated on the Church page of the Sunday editions of his newspaper. But when he was unable to find satisfactory illustrations, he decided to get some master artist to paint them and to incorporate the illustrated Bible narratives in a book. He found the artist in the person of Guy Rowe, former Time Magazine cover illustrator.

The two collaborated together, as a result of which the work entitled "In Our Image" is to be issued in two volumes, one containing stories from the Old Testament and the other from the New Testament. The first of the volumes is now coming off the press and is to be offered for sale immediately.

The Oxford University Press of New York is printing the volume and presents it as a "modern masterpiece."

Mr. Harte enlisted the services of a number of scholarly ministers to advise and assist him in the selection of the stories, and Mr. Rowe made an intensive and long continued study of the stories selected and the customs of the times and countries involved before undertaking to paint the pictures. He became so engrossed in the work that he not only has become a real Bi-

ble scholar himself but intends to devote the remainder of his life to religious art.

The stories used begin with the Creation—"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth,"—and they include stories of Adam and Eve, Noah, Abraham, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Samson, Ruth, David, Solomon, Esther, Job, and most of the other outstanding characters of the Old Testament.

Many illustrated Bible stories have been printed in Book form heretofore, chiefly for the instruction and entertainment of children; but this is a book for full-grown men and women; for Ministers and teachers; for business men, business women, girls in the offices, men in the shops, people of all kinds and types who wish to know more about the Bible. We certainly hope that the illustrations shall prove to be true to the facts, for we have seen many Bible pictures that grossly misrepresented the facts.

Of course these volumes will not contain the whole text of the Bible—probably just a small portion of it in reality—but if it will stimulate interest in Bible reading and study it will accomplish much good. Most families in this country own a Bible but few of them know very much of its contents. Even habitual church-goers often miss the meaning, the thrill, and the drama, the pathos or the joy and the beauty that is wrapped up in some of the best-known incidents recorded in the Bible. We have

noticed that many people, in reading a Bible-thriller before a congregation or a class, will read it in a listless sort of way just about like they would read a treatise on cabbage or onions. The Bible is full of the best stories, the best literature, the best philosophy, and the best counsel to be found in all the world. It ought to be read studiously in private and meaning fully in public—maybe the Harte illustrations will help.

If the security of the American people is ever lost, it will probably be drowned in champagne, cocktails, whiskey and vodka, and the tragedy will, in all likelihood, occur in diplomatic conference.

The Next regular meeting will be October 3, and attention is called to the change of time. We will meet at 7:00 p. m. instead of 7:30.

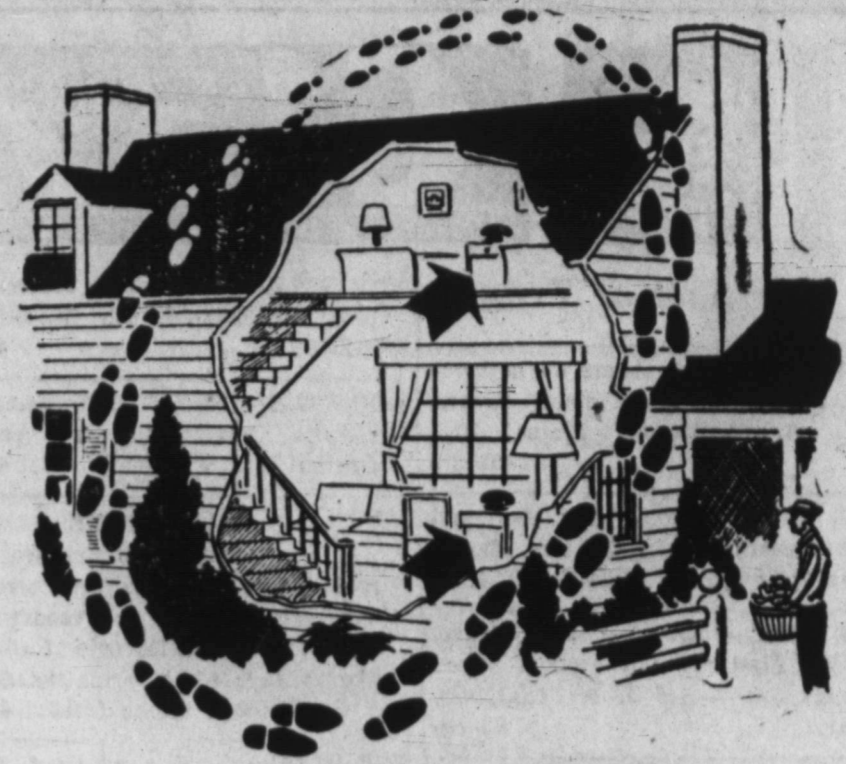
