Bulldogs Play At Seagraves Today

Tahoka Bulldogs meet the favored Seagraves Eagles tonight at 7:30 o'clock on the Seagraves field as the feature event of that school's homecoming and also the feature event of District 5-A football championship.

The battling Bulldogs are undefeated in seven games this year, won their first conference game here last week over Coahoma 18 to 7, but now face another rugged team in Seagraves that is seeking revenge for the 30-22 defeat Tahoka handed them last year.

Seagraves nosed-out Plains Cowboys last week 22 to 21 at Plains, and the week before had taken O'Donnell 36-6. The Eagles opened the non-conference season with a 32-12 win over Eunice, took Friendship 35-14, and Stanton 30-0, dropped a game to Sudan 8-12, and then defeated Farwell 30-24.

Tahoka has won successively over Lorenzo 45-0, Crosbyton 26-13, Idalou 27-0, Slaton 20-14, Post 6-3, Kress 8-6, and Coahoma 18-7. (See story on front page of Section Two.)

The Bulldogs lost the services of Halfback Cliff Thomas, one of the better boys on the Plains this year, early in the Kress game, but still maintained the poise and are a definite threat because of a fast running game, a dangerous passing attack, and a very tough defense.

Coach Don Smith says, "You can't give up on these kids. When the going gets tough, they get right in there." The coach was happy with the showing of Tim Walker, freshman, on offense last week. Mitchell Williams showed great poise at quarterback, Doyle Schneider will be at his halfback position. Otherwise, there probably will be a lot of alternating in the backfield by Mike Chandler, John Tyler, Jerry Jolly, Larry Arnold, and Charlie Brown. Jolly and Willie Ewings became eligible again this week.

Tahoka must depend on its rugged defensive line and secondary to stop the Seagraves power attack, led by Gary Brooks, Tommy Kidwell, Milton Edwards, Wayne Thurman, Richard and Randy White, Jodie Edwards, Chris Roberts, Joel Inkleberger, David Rogers, and Billy Curry and others.

Seagraves has a strong running attack with most of its plays going outside tackle, throws few passes, some short or screen passes and a few long bombers.

Top boys in the backfield include Clarence Law, 155, junior quarterback; Terry Cummings, 155, senior halfback who also runs some at quarterback and is the team's top scorer; Dennis McKenzie, 170, senior halfback; and Mike Bagley, 185, junior fullback, who carries the ball a lot and is a top boy. Also seeing action will be Jerry Hoover and Melvin Frances as linebackers and also as backfield men.

Coach A. D. Shaver depends on these linemen: David Wilson, 185, junior center; Edwards Hernandez, 150, junior, and Dalton Taylor, 160, senior, at guards; Gary Burnett 205, and Bernard Gibson, 200, both seniors at tackle; and Tim Blair 185, and Harley Bradley, 182, both juniors at end. Blair caught four passes for 107 yards against O'Donnell, and Bradley is also considered a top receiver.

As usual, a host of Tahoka fans, the band and pep squad will follow the team, and a capacity crowd is expected at Seagraves.

Tax Collections Show Increase

Tax collections through Wednesday this week totaled \$106,707.23, according to George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector.

In 1965 at this time in October taxes amounting to \$108,739.16 had been collected.

McCracken states that only 173 citizens have registered for voting purposes, which compares to 186 poll tax payments at this time last year. Local residents are being reminded to register as a qualification for voting under the new laws.

Monday, Oct. 31, is the deadline to pay State and county taxes and save 3 percent discount.

Final pageant on Saturday night, Nov. 5, will be telecast in color over CBS nationally from 9:00 to 10:30 p. m.

Absentee Voting Through Nov. 4

Absentee voting, which began last week end after a delay in arrival of the huge ballots, will continue through Nov. 4. The general election is on November 8.

Applications for ballots to be voted absentee must be made by contacting the office of County Clerk C. W. Roberts in the court house.

The "saddle-blanket-size" ballot is 15 by 24 inches in size, unusually large by reason of the 16 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution to be voted upon.

Research Center Funds Needed

Directors of High Plains Research Center, located at Halfway, are instituting a drive in an attempt to raise \$70,000 from farmers and all other people interested in the welfare of farming, according to Joe D. Unfred, Lynn county director.

The Center is asking \$1,000 of Lynn county to promote research on such things as new crops, new farming methods, skip-row plant farming, lake modification, and in many other fields.

The Center, a non-profit organization, has never solicited help from this county. But, Mr. Unfred explains that last year a hailstorm wiped out crops on one of the Center's farms, cutting the income by \$70,000, and in order to keep from curtailing its long range program is appealing to the farm country for help.

Those who have visited the Center's experiment farms are convinced a great work is being done in agricultural progress by its experiments.

Rev. Shepherd Is Buried Monday

Rev. B. N. Shepherd, 79, pastor of First Baptist Church of Tahoka in the 1920's, died Saturday morning in a Stephenville hospital of a heart ailment.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2:00 p. m. in First Baptist Church there and burial followed in West End Cemetery.

Born in Arkansas, he came to Texas as a child, was married to Miss Kittle V. Howard at Cranfill's Gap in 1906, later became a minister, graduated from old Simmons University. Immediately before coming to Tahoka in September, 1924, he was pastor at Crosbyton and Matador.

He was pastor here until 1929, during which time the church enjoyed its greatest growth and built the present basement to the main building. He went from Tahoka to Clarendon, then Hereford, Abilene, and Hobbs, N. M. He retired a few years ago because of ill health.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Gertrude Holtzclaw of Notrees, near Odessa; one brother, Early Shepherd of Hico; three sisters, Mrs. Pearl Byrum of Laguna Park, Mrs. Bearlie Gore of Victoria, and Mrs. Myrtle Johnson of Cisco; and three grandsons.

Methodist Ladies Observing Prayer, Self-Denial Week

The Call is sponsored by the Woman's Division of the Methodist Board of Missions. The division, one of the four major units of the Board of Missions, is the national body under which all local Woman's Societies and Guilds function.

Theme of the 1966 Call to Prayer and Self-Denial is "These My Brethren," taken from Matthew 25:40 and emphasizing brotherhood in missions work.

The program is scheduled for Monday, Oct. 21, beginning at 10:30 a. m. in the sanctuary of Tahoka Methodist Church. During the morning session, mission projects will be outlined and a special offering will be given.

Following a sack lunch at noon in Fellowship Hall, the afternoon session will convene at 1:30 p. m. and will feature an inspirational message by Mrs. C. C. Coffee of Lubbock, president of the South Central Jurisdiction of the Woman's Society.

Mrs. Roy LeMond, secretary of Christian Social Relations of the Northwest Texas Conference W.S. C.S., will preside at both morning and afternoon sessions. A nursery will be provided.

Each year certain projects in the United States and overseas are designated by the Woman's Division as beneficiaries of an offering which is given as part of the Call. This year the projects, selected because of special and urgent needs, are:

Home Missions—The Deaconess Pension Fund. More than 650 women in the U. S. today have served or are serving in churches, community centers, hospitals, and homes of deaconesses of the Methodist Church. They serve as teachers, nurses, Christian education directors, technicians, agricultural and home economics extension workers, etc. The Deaconess Pension Fund is one way the Church shows its gratitude and appreciation for the mission work of the deaconess. The pension fund, underwritten mostly by the Woman's Division, annually supplies the deaconess with from \$35 to \$40 for each service year.

Overseas Missions—Community Centers around the World. The offering receipts of a Call to Prayer and Self-Denial will help furnish new and improved facilities and programs at some of the 118 community centers in 24 countries supported by the church. The community centers are focal points for the fellowship of Christians and for the interaction of Christians and non-Christians. Through educational, religious, social, and recreational programs and projects, the centers play vital roles in the welfare and well-being of whole communities.

"This is the time of the year when crop residues, if handled properly, can do much in controlling blowing," says Donald Reed of the Soil Conservation Service.

Many tons of soil are lost each year in the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District due to improper utilization of crop residues. By using the residues properly farmers can conserve moisture, increase water infiltration, reduce losses to erosion, and improve soil tilth.

The pounds of residue required on the soil surface to control blowing ranges from 2500 lbs. per acre on the sandy soils to 1000 lbs. on the heavier irrigated soils.

Tillage operations, such as chiseling should be used to leave the residue on the soil surface during the critical blowing season. This will normally be until the land is prepared for pre-irrigation on the irrigated land and until the land is prepared for planting on the dryland.

Where insufficient residue is on the soil surface such as on cotton land supplemental surface roughing such as listing or chiseling should be performed to control blowing, says Reed.

"Remember when we cranked the old Model 'T' and put up side curtains for the rain and cold?" asks Arvel Woosley, Soil Conservation Service Technician. "Remember when we farmed the ridge type terrace with point rows? That has changed also," Woosley says.

"Parallel terraces with few point rows are what meets the need of the farmer of today. Farmers are convinced of their value. They have proven themselves to farmers. Ask your neighbor. He will tell you how the extra moisture made a cotton or feed crop and saved the soil from washing. He will also say they are faster and easier farmed than the old type terrace system.

"With all of the good features of parallel terraces, they are not

Civil Defense Is Explained Here

The Civil Defense program and its practical adaptation to the local communities was discussed by Bill Payne of the Lubbock Fire Department at the Rotary Club last Thursday.

In explaining the set-up, he said our government has placed the Army responsible for civil limits to the continental limits, but the job of protecting the individual is of concern to we people in the communities.

The training and guidance program, therefore, has been set up on a national, then a state organization, then county, and next the municipality.

Of most importance to us, he said, is that there be a definite paper plan to take care of the community, a plan to use in case of any major disaster which people as individuals can not cope with.

To make this plan work, there has to be advance thinking and people to direct the implementation of the plan, people trained to fit the many different situations according to local facilities.

Tahoka has a Civil Defense organization set up for emergencies, and special training has been given the workers, the Police Department, an Auxiliary Police organization set up, and the Fire Department.

Possibility of nuclear war is now considered remote, the speaker said, but just the same the set-up is needed as protection in such event but also for other disasters.

Clifton Clark, who introduced the speaker, said Mr. Payne taught a course in civil defense procedures in Tahoka last summer. Leighton Knox was in charge of the program for the day.

Dr. Emil Prohl presented information on Jack Rogers of Odessa, nominee for Rotary District Governor, and the club voted to cast its vote for him.

"Glandless" Cotton Program Launched

A new effort titled "Operation Glandless Cotton" has been launched on the South Plains to bring together an estimated 5,000 tons of gossypol-free seed for research, reports Bill Griffin, County Agent.

Gland-free seed would increase the market for cottonseed products for three reasons, according to the agent.

First, gossypol is detrimental to swine and poultry when fed in unrestricted amounts so it limits the use of cottonseed meal in rations not fed to ruminants unless gossypol is inactivated in processing.

Second, gossypol appears as dark red pigment in the oil and is frequently difficult to bleach to acceptable whiteness.

Third, a new drive is underway to develop vegetable protein foods from cotton and soybeans for human foods.

"Operation Glandless Cotton" is an effort by oil mills, ginners and producers to bring together all of the seed from Gregg 25V, which was released in 1966 primarily as a verticillium wilt tolerant variety.

The variety is also free of glands and Griffin said national and area cotton groups recently decided this characteristic offered a tremendous opportunity for research.

Plans are underway to gin and crush the seed separately and producers growing the variety are urged to contact their ginners for information about the program.

All of the gland free seed will be made into flour and used for research in development and marketing of cottonseed for human consumption.

Tahoka's fighting Bulldogs kept their slate clean with seven victories, no defeats, by winning the first 5-A Conference game here Friday night over the Coahoma Bulldogs 18 to 7 before Homecoming crowd that almost filled the stadium.

Again, it was the passing of Quarterback Mitchell Williams to HB Doyle Schneider, HB John Tyler, and End Chris Roberts, the latter snagging eight aeriels for 124 yards, plus the rugged defensive play of the line when the chips were down, that paid off in victory.

Play Is Questioned
After Coahoma was forced to punt again—35 yards—Tahoka drew a 15-yard penalty then Williams lost 8 trying to pass, back to the Tahoka 13.

Joel Inklebarger, standing near the goal line, went back to punt, the ball was partially blocked but went upfield to about the 20, rolled back to the 15 and was covered by Tahoka's center, Gary Brooks.

When the officials gave Tahoka the ball and a first down on its own 15, Coahoma coaches rushed

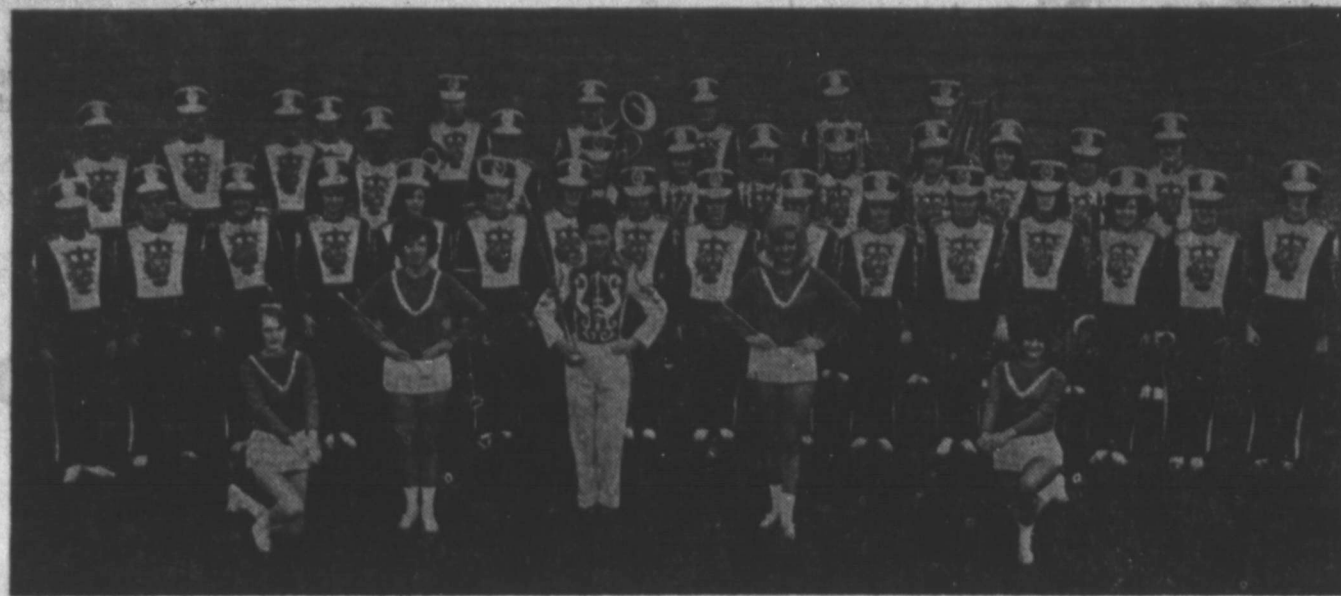

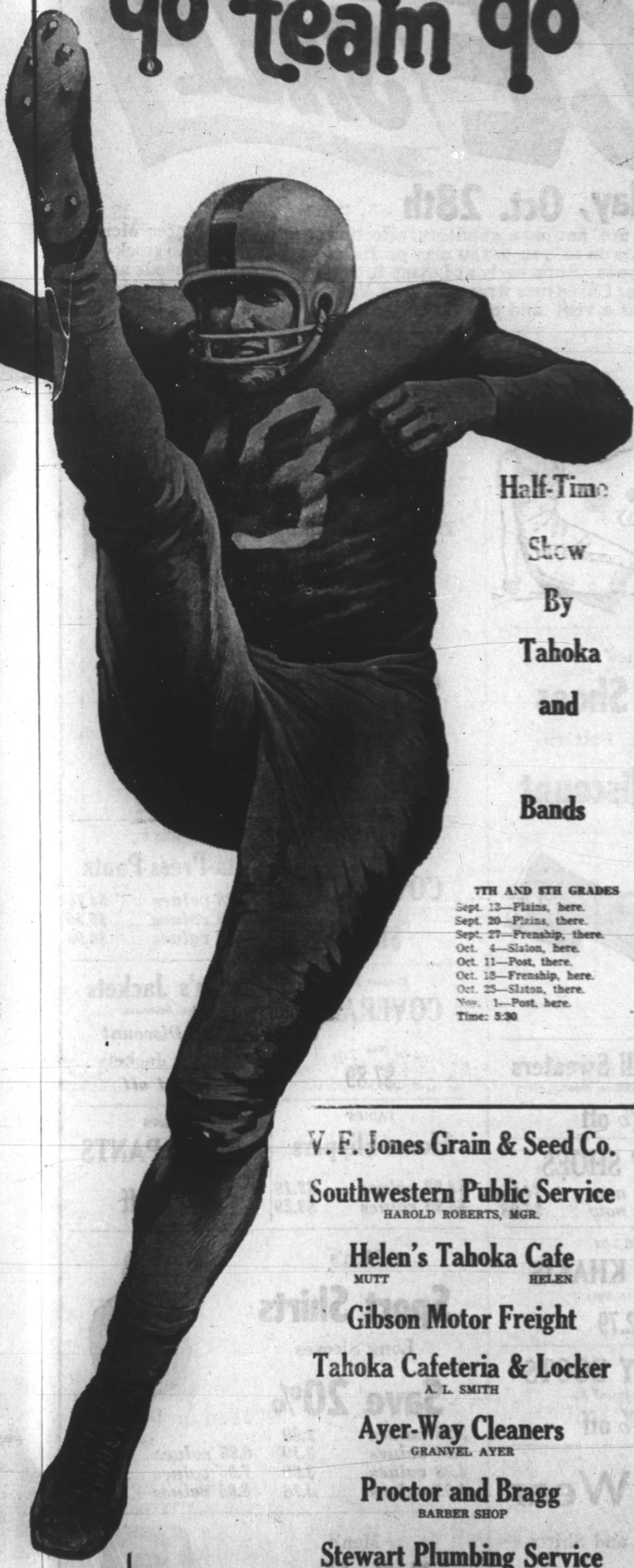

visitors' only TD. Fraser's place-kick was perfect. Score, 12-7, and 1:55 left in the quarter.
Shortly after the kickoff, Tahoka was on its 38. Williams shot an 8-yard pass to Roberts, but when hit hard Chris lost the ball and Coahoma recovered on the Tahoka 40.

Fourth Quarter Hectic

Two plays, Coahoma lost to the 43, but then Cochran got away on a 39 yard run at left end to the Tahoka 6.

Here Tahoka made another successful goal-line stand. Fierigo bulled 4 yards to the Tahoka 2, but the battling Bulldog line rose up to throw Cochran for a 4-yard loss, then another 6-yard loss when Cochran juggled a pitch-back, a fourth down pass was incomplete.

Tahoka took over on its 12. Walker and Williams made 8, then Chandler got away to the 30 but the ball was called back by a Tahoka offside. On the next play Coahoma was charged with roughing the passer, and Tahoka had new life on its 30, bogged down on the 31, and Inklebarger punted 28 yards to the Coahoma 41.

Two plays got only 4 yards, then Coahoma drew a 15-yard clipping penalty, but Fraser punted 50 yards and the ball died on the Tahoka 11.

Bulldogs Sew It Up

Williams ran twice to the 23. Chandler made 2, two passes were incomplete as the Bulldogs tried desperately to get out of the hole. Then Inklebarger got off a beautiful 37-yard punt.

Now Coahoma completed a 14-yard pass to the Tahoka 44, but the next was picked off by John Tyler on the Tahoka 33 and he ran all the way to the Coahoma 40, but Tahoka was guilty of clipping and the ball set back on its own 36.

It didn't matter now, though. With two minutes left, Chandler ran 21 yards to the Coahoma 43. Tim Walker went for 7, Schneider for 10, and Chandler for 5 to the Coahoma 21. Then Chandler went 14 yards up the middle, and with 9 seconds left, Schneider hit left guard and kept plowing and squirming to the goal line. Chandler failed to run the conversion.

The early freeze got a lot of late cotton, we're sure, but some farmers tell us it helped them as most of the late bolls were not going to mature anyway. Some gain men declare there will be little, if any, overall loss on total mile production.

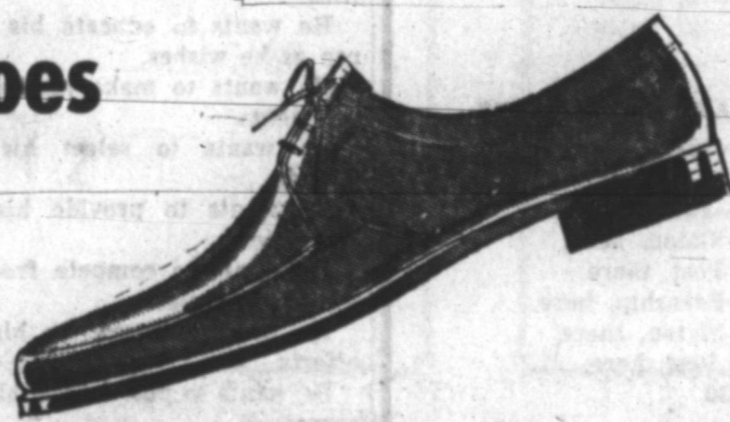
