Dudley Reunion Attracts 500

Dudley, Callahan County -- About 500 persons swapped remembrances and sang old-time hymns at a picnic and barbecue at the 14th annual Dudley Homecoming Sunday.

The Baptist Church was packed throughout the day as people sang and listened to quartets and accordion music. On the outside of the building a loud speaker furnished by Luther Marr of Abilene carried inside singing to every part of the shaded church grounds.

Oscar Zimmerman, of Lawn prepared 212 pounds of beef and 15 pounds of pinto beans on the ground. This supplemented supplies of home-cooked foods brought by attendants. All were spread on long tables under tents.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Teel and two daughters, Scarlett and Alice, probably came the longest distance to attend. They live in Calipatria, Calif., where Teel is a city commissioner. He was reared here and left for the West Coast in 1928.

The oldest man on the ground was Jess H. Carpenter, Eula. He came to this area 46 years ago. He served as Callahan County judge from 1931 to 1938, and was sheriff of Yoakum County in 1911. The former judge is dim of sight but alert of mind.

Another oldtimer who came early was Mrs. Emma Floyd, 80, of Abilene. She came to Tecumseh, neighboring community, when 10. Her daughter, Mrs. Mary Floyd Miller born at Clyde, accompanied her. Mrs. Floyd remembers when Santa Claus' beard and clothing caught fire at a Christmas tree affair in Dudley when she was 11. Santa Claus was her late Uncle Joe Slaughter. No one was hurt.

Edgar Deagan who attended school in Dudley in 1892, related early day experiences as a railroad "snipe" and coal-heaving fireman of the T&P Railroad years ago. Blake Cox, Potosi, was born in this area 70 years ago. His father was a pioneer who held the record of shearing by hand 100 sheep a day.

Another native, J. A. Loper Goldsmith, mingled with former cronies. He lived here 50 years before moving in 1947, to Goldsmith. Another veteran, Will Burleson, 81, Tuscola, who lived here 16 years, says in 1904 he saw 15 wild deer browsing near the present reunion grounds. Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Chastain, Sweetwater, mingled and swapped reminiscences. Mrs. Chastain lived here 50 or 60 years. From Hereford was Rufus Weathers, a native who left here in 1935.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Russell talked fondly of old days. They came to the community in 1900. Mrs. Russell's father, the late Rev. C. B. White, preached here. He walked 2 1/2 miles to minister to the congregation, often receiving little or nothing for his services. From Knott old timers, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Motley, enjoyed the singing.

Jim Coffman, Dudley, veteran minister and early-day singing-master, sang some of the old songs once popular in this community but now forgotten. Will Nesmith, veteran goodfellow and leading citizen of Potosi and Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Rogers, and Warnie May, community leaders at Rogers and "real" oldtimers, attended the reunion.

The Dudley Reunion officers are Frank Carpenter, president; Ott Neal, vice president; and L. H. Hayhurst, secretary-treasurer. They all reside in the community. Neal announced the 1960 reunion will be held August 14. A free will collection to help defray expenses was taken during the afternoon.

Reunion attendants appreciated the new paved highway that spurs off State Highway 36 and runs in front of the church and reunion grounds.

Boat Registration Date Delayed

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said today that registration of boats would go into effect in October. The new boating act requiring registration was recently passed by the Legislature.

Greer assured boat owners that no penalties or convictions will be involved for this delayed registration date, particularly in view of the fact that the final boat-registration date is March 1, 1960. Other features of the act go into effect Aug. 11.

Greer explained that boat registration was a little foreign to the ordinary function of the Texas Highway Department, but that the Department was already well experienced in handling this type of operation.

"We have been registering motor vehicles for more than forty years. Nearly four and a half million motor vehicles were registered by the Department this year. The Texas Legislature, cognizant of the experience of the Highway Department, gave us the job in order to take advantage of existing operations and to cut cost. The Texas Highway Department deals solely with registration in this boating bill; we have nothing to do with the safety aspect," Greer said.

The appropriation bill passed last week provides funds after September 1. These funds enable the Texas Highway Department to print the necessary forms and place into operation the procedures invested in the Highway Department by the act.

Greer estimated that the registration forms and blanks would be printed and in the hands of boat dealers, county offices, Highway Department offices, and other public offices in October. Ample public notice will be given when these forms are available.

Eula School Tax Vote Scheduled

Patrons of the Eula School District will vote Saturday, August 15th on whether to raise the tax rate from \$1.25 on the

\$100.00 assessed valuation to \$1.50.

One teacher is being paid out of local maintenance funds now and another will need to be added in 1960 - 1961.

Physics will be offered for the first time this year and the Elementary science program is being strengthened. Additional science equipment will need to be purchased. The School plant must be repaired and maintained.

The rising cost of education has caused Eula's share of the Minimum Foundation Program to increase and the district evaluation is decreasing.

Eula is the only school district in Callahan County and one of the very few in this area with a present \$1.25 tax rate.

The continued operation and accreditation of Eula School will require added expenditures to maintain a high standard educational program.

The tax hike will apply if passed, on the 1960 tax renditions.

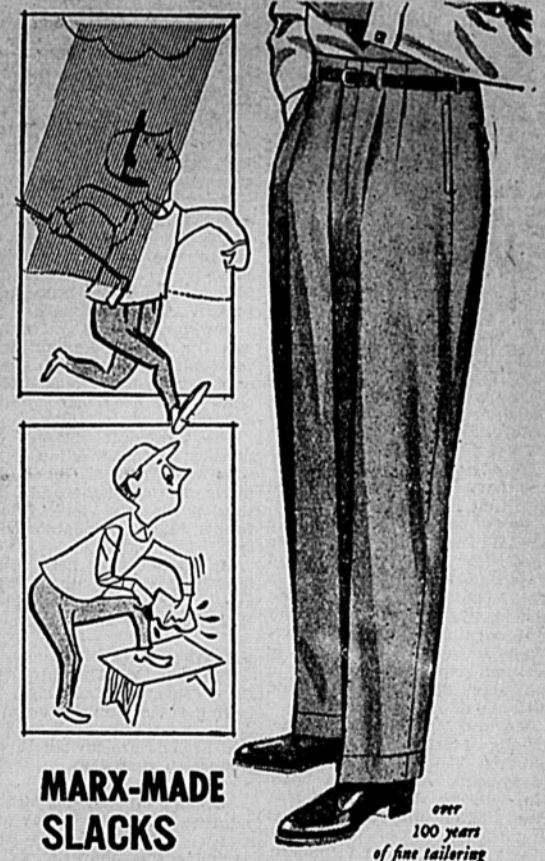

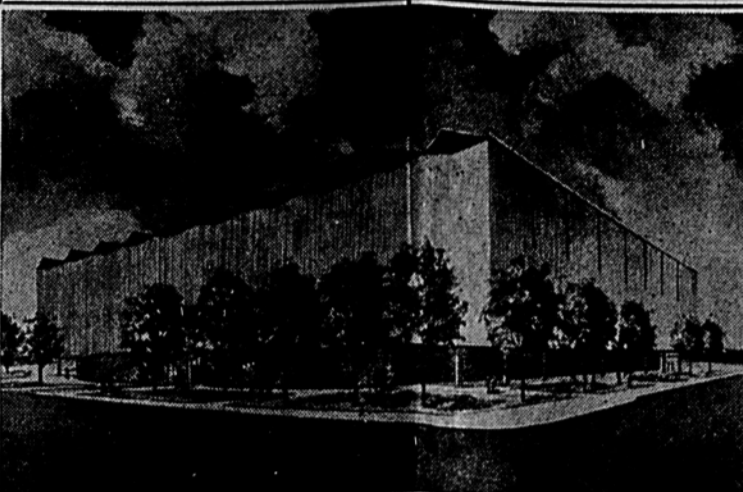

Cancer of The Colon and Rectum . . .

Cancer of the colon and rectum is a common type of cancer in the United States today. In 1958, some 58,000 new cases were diagnosed, 30,500 among women and 27,00 among men. Less than one third will be saved. Many more might have been saved by earlier diagnosis and treatment. Cancer of this site is potentially highly curable, yet it currently accounts for a disproportionate number of cancer deaths. Fatalities could be sharply reduced by elimination of delay between onset of symptoms and medical treatment, and by widespread yearly examinations to uncover the disease in its pre-symptomatic and most curable stage.

The colon and rectum are a continuous, mucous-lined tubular structure, about five feet in length, which collects and evacuates solid waste material from the body. This waste material is emptied from the small bowel into the colon. The colon is often referred to as the large intestine, or large bowel. The rectum is a continuation of the colon, and has a close-off muscle that controls evacuation.

Most of the men and women who develop cancers of this site - some 90 per cent - are over 45 years of age. However, many cases occur in younger people. Five-year survival currently is less than one-third. The rate goes up the earlier the disease is treated; 75 per cent of those diagnosed when the disease is still localized and treated by the best methods can be saved.

Surgery is the standard treatment for colon-rectum cancer. Radiation therapy may be used to relieve pain and extend life. Refinements in both surgery and radiation are mitigating post-operative difficulties formerly associated with cancers of this site.

Abdominal pains, changes in bowel habits, blood in the stool may be early warning signals of cancer of the colon or rectum.

The prognosis is best for the patient whose cancer is discovered before symptoms appear. In a study of 32,177 symptom-free individuals at Yates Memorial Clinic in Detroit, three out of every 1,000 persons examined were found to have cancers of the colon or rectum.

Many deaths due to colon-rectum cancer are preventable and can be traced to delayed diagnosis.

Yearly examination could eliminate a large number of fatalities. Sixty per cent of cancers of this site can be discovered by digital examination, and 70 per cent can be discovered by use of the sigmoidoscope. This is a ten-inch tube which permits the physician to see the inside of the rectum and lower part of the colon.

Special x-ray study with barium enemas is the only diagnostic aid for the "blind area" beyond reach of the sigmoidoscope, but a method of cell examination for diagnosis in that area is now being developed. It is based on the same principles as the Papanicolaou cell test for uterine cancer and consists of studying cast-off cells in colonic washings. When this method is perfected it will make screening of a large part of the population practical and result in finding cancer of the colon early enough for cure.

An improved technique in colonic cytology reported by Dr. Howard F. Raskin, of the University of Chicago School of Medicine, has proved 96 per cent accurate as against 76 per cent accuracy by conventional x-ray in diagnosis of cancer of the colon.

Concerning this, Dr. Harold S. Diehl, Senior Vice President of Research and Medical Affairs states: "The potentialities of saving lives of persons with cancers of the colon and rectum are so great that special efforts should be made to keep the public informed about the frequency and the seriousness of these cancers, and to influence men and women, particularly over 45 years of age, to have the examinations which will lead to diagnosis of the disease at a state in which it is still curable in the vast majority of cases. The

American Cancer Society has prepared this background paper to aid in this objective."

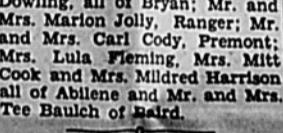
