Five Sentenced On Guilty Pleas

Two Big Spring men involved in an escape from a state trooper near Tahoka on Sept. 11 were sentenced to prison terms last Friday after pleading guilty of charges before 106th District Judge George Hansard here.

Eugene Sullivan White, 22, was sentenced to a 20-year term in the penitentiary on a charge of escape by use of a deadly weapon. Lester Fred Lang, 24, drew a five-year term for escape. Neither sentence was probated.

Three men were given five-year probated sentences on charges of burglary of the home of Sharon Barnes near O'Donnell Sept. 8, with the provision they would make restitution for losses in that burglary and in thefts at O'Donnell and Tahoka field houses. They are Wilmer Eugene Byrd, Joe Dell Gilbert and Artis Ray Boyd.

John Henderson, Rt. 2, Wilson, reported Saturday that someone had stolen a quantity of diesel from an overhead storage tank three miles northeast of New Lynn Gin.

Ricky Rice, Rt. 1, Wilson, Sunday reported burglary of his home about 10 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87. A TV set, guitar, guns and a lamp were found stacked up at the back door of the house, apparently ready for loading, but were not taken. Missing were a knife and a Ruger .41 caliber Blackhawk revolver.

A bicycle stolen from the Victor Ruiz residence 2.5 miles west of O'Donnell on FM 2053 was found in a field nearby by deputies responding to a prowler call Sunday.

Crime Line has increased the reward for information in the burglary of Woods Jewelry in Tahoka Aug. 16 to \$750. Sheriff Stanley Krause said calls to Crime

Line, 998-5145, are increasing, and several crimes have been cleared by calls.

Tahoka police answered several calls over the past week including complaints of kids making noise late at night and calls about cars driving around with loud mufflers all over town.

On Friday night, a Tahoka woman called in at 11:47 p.m. to report that some young persons were parked in the 1500 block of N. 7th and were making a lot of noise and talking vulgar.

Also on Friday, Lynn Cook of Tahoka reported to police that four windows had been broken out of the Howell building by someone on the previous night.

Police answered a prowler call at 10:30 p.m. on last Thursday night from a resident in the 2200 block of Lockwood.

On last Wednesday at 9 p.m., police were notified that a woman who had stopped at the Texaco station was drunk and was headed north on FM 400.

Police investigated a two-car accident on Tuesday at 3:35 p.m. at the intersection of N. 5th and Ave. L involving a 1975 Pontiac driven by Shannon Wayne Pierce of Tahoka and a 1976 Oldsmobile driven by Martha Botkin, also of Tahoka. There were no injuries reported.

Police also answered a couple of family disturbance calls over the week and issued one ticket for failure to yield right of way to a vehicle.

In jail during the week were one person each for disorderly conduct, public intoxication and unlawful carrying of a weapon.

Ray Named Pastor For First Baptist

Ray was licensed to preach by First Baptist Church of Dismitt on Aug. 17, 1955, and was ordained to the ministry by Calvary Baptist Church, Fort Morgan, Colo., on Aug. 9, 1959. He has been pastor of churches at Wrightstown, N.J. (1961-63), Cresson, Tx. (1964-67), Trinity Baptist Church in Gunnison, Colo. (1967-69); Bookcliff Baptist Church, Grand Junction, Colo. (1969-71) and Monument Baptist Church in Grand Junction (1971-74). He has been pastor of the First Baptist Church in Justin since 1974.

Appraisal Office Will Collect County Tax

Lynn County commissioners Monday voted to turn over collections of county taxes to the new Tax Appraisal District office set up after a state law was passed requiring uniform appraisals of all property in a county for all taxes jurisdictions.

The action means that the appraisal office at Ave. J and Harper in Tahoka will begin collecting taxes next month for the county as well as for Tahoka Independent School District, the only other taxing entity in the county so far to turn the collections over to the appraisal office.

Collections of all taxes in the county (school districts, cities, county, hospital district and water districts) at a single location was one

of the goals of the law passed by the legislature.

The Lynn County Hospital District taxes always are collected by the county, so they also will be handled at the appraisal office.

By voting to turn the collections of taxes over to the appraisal office, commissioners said they anticipated an estimated savings of several thousand dollars to taxpayers through elimination of some salary for part time help in the county tax assessor's office, and through savings of an amount now paid for tax roll preparation.

Judge Melvin Burks and all four commissioners were present Monday as the group also voted to allow an extra 10 days a year of additional outside help to be hired for the district clerk's office. District Clerk Joy Laws appeared to explain the need for more help.

The court voted to have a special public hearing at 10 a.m. Oct. 18 to determine the views of farmers and other residents in the county on whether they want regulation on the use of "hormone-type chemicals" (herbicides) in the county. Several representatives of a chemical company were present to discuss the question.

Bulldogs To Contest Unbeaten Post

As if losing four games in a row without scoring a point weren't bad enough, the Tahoka Bulldogs will travel to Post this week to take on what has been rated the No. 1 and No. 2 team in the state at various times, the talented and unbeaten Post Antelopes.

Post has lost to Tahoka for the last three years, and this is their chance to get even. With a team which last week handed Littlefield its first defeat of the season, the Antelopes are expected to win without any trouble over the young Bulldogs, who so far haven't been able to get their act together.

Last week the Bulldogs were dazzled by the running of Martin Huerta, who scored three times and averaged better than 20 yards per carry as the Cowboys ruined Tahoka's homecoming 41-0.

Huerta scored on runs

of 73 and 37 yards in the first quarter, and had another 49-yard scoring run called back. In the second quarter, he ran 21 yards for a TD and QB Kyle Andrews threw a 27-yard scoring pass to end Julian Romero in the Tahoka end zone to make it 28-0 at halftime.

In the second quarter, Tahoka running back Leonard Flores got away on an apparent 30-yard touchdown run, but an off-side penalty rubbed it out. Flores had done the same thing a week earlier against Coahoma, only to see it called back.

In the third, Tahoka showed some good defense for a time, holding on downs once at the home team's 32 as first Flores and then Eric Knight made good tackles, as did freshman Johnny Morin. But Andrews then hit back Brent Stephens on a 26-yard scoring pass

and again found Stephens on a 40-yarder in the fourth quarter.

Arts And Crafts Bazaar Set Dec. 3-4

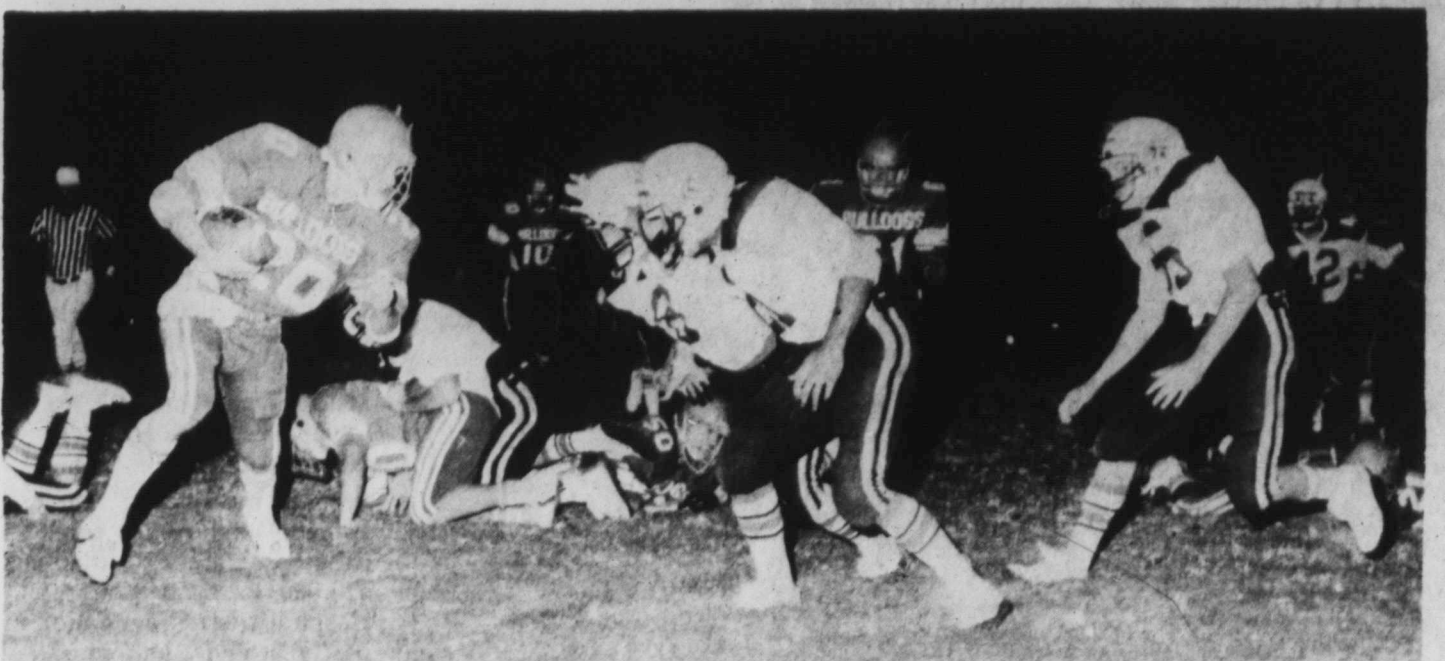

Fire Safety Rules Cited

Oct. 3-9, 1982 is Fire Prevention Week in Lynn County and across the nation, with the theme - "Learn Not To Burn Wherever You Are."

According to Jimmy Bragg, President of the Lynn County Farm Bureau, fire prevention has special significance to farm and ranch families for the following reasons: Fires on farms and ranches pose a special threat, unlike any urban or city property that has immediate access to a well organized fire department and an abundance of water.

Most farm and ranches are relatively isolated from fire fighting equipment and may lack adequate water for fighting a fire.

Many farms and ranches have the added fire risk brought on by traversing of railroads and roads. Trains cause grass fires as the result of a "hot box". The careless smoking motorist uses the roadway instead of his ash tray to discard his used smoking materials - thus turning valuable farm property into ashes. Vehicles traveling along the roadway on a bare rim create or produce sparks that result in grass fires spreading over many acres of crop and rangeland; many times destroying valuable

structures and equipment.

U.S. fire losses amount to approximately \$5 billion annually, and more than 6,000 people die and many more are injured in more than a million fires each year.

Farm fire property losses (dwellings, buildings, animals, cotton, hay, grain, supplies, timber, machinery and vehicles) approach an estimated \$300 million annually.

Frequent causes of building fires include electrical faults, smoking and matches, heating and

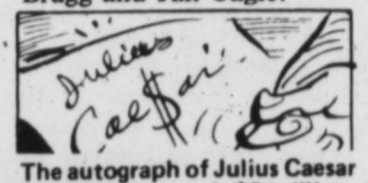
zo, Delbert, of Daingerfield and Weldon (Bud) of Lubbock; eight grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

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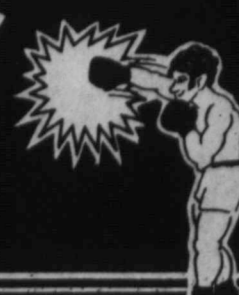

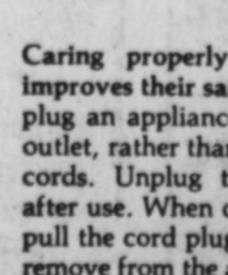

Caring properly for portable appliances improves their safety and efficiency. Always plug an appliance cord directly into a wall outlet, rather than into lightweight extension cords. Unplug the appliance immediately after use. When disconnecting an appliance, pull the cord plug from the outlet first, then remove from the appliance. Always grasp the plug itself; do not pull on the cord. When cleaning portable appliances, first check the instruction book to see if the appliance is immersible. Then wash it with hot sudsy water and rinse and dry thoroughly. And always read the instruction book before using an appliance for the first time.

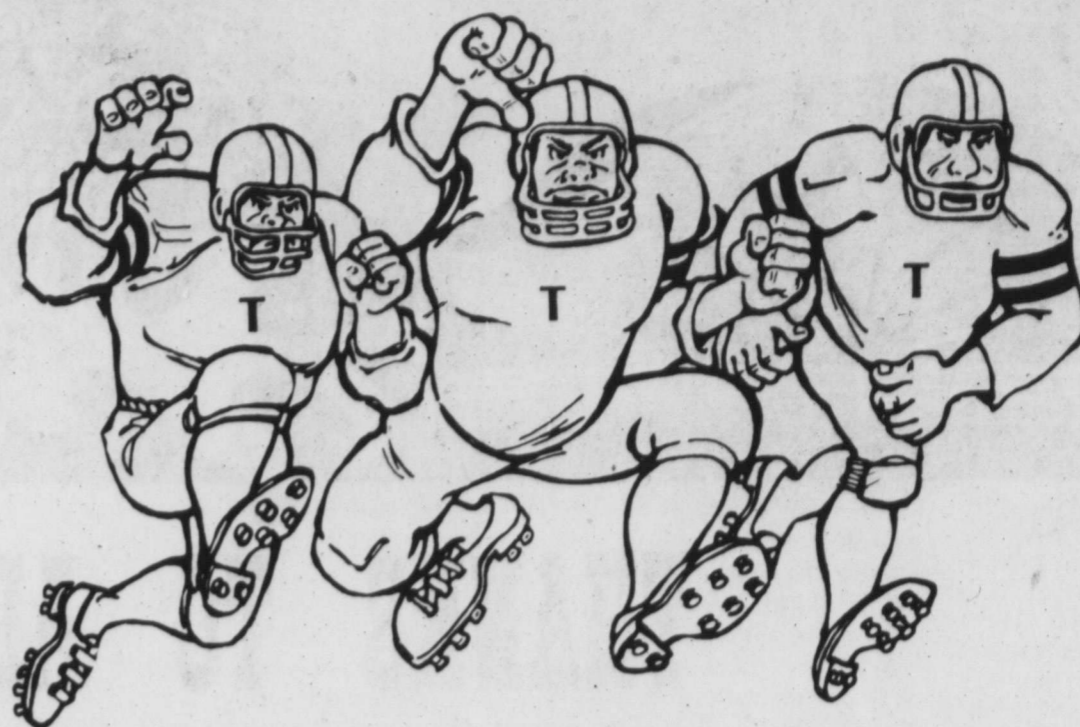

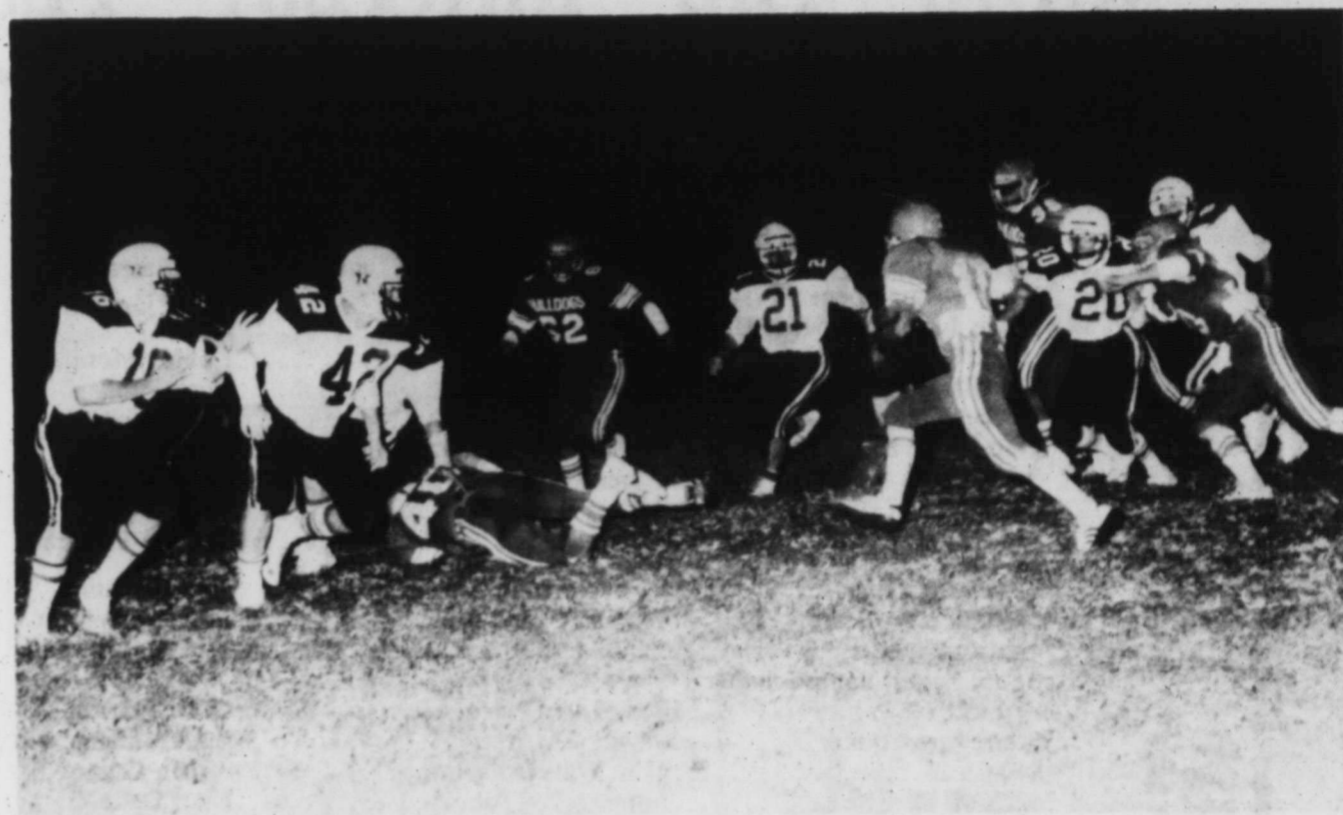

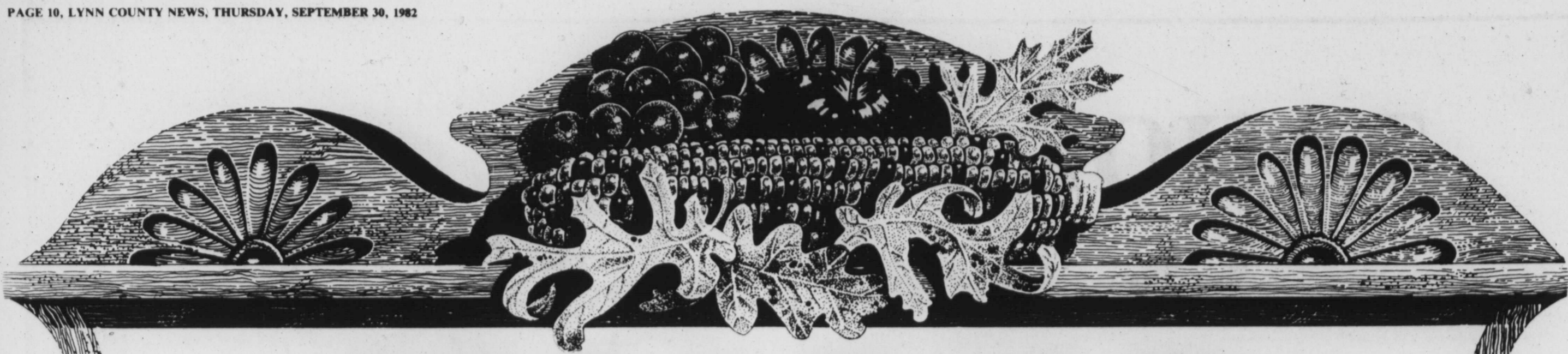

Hightower Proposes Farm Recovery Plan

Jim Hightower, Democratic nominee for Texas Agriculture Commissioner, has proposed a "six-step initiative to help put the Texas farm economy on the road to recovery."

Hightower visited with supporters in Tahoka Tuesday afternoon, stopping off for an hour or so at Farmers Co-Op Assn. He told the group: "You wouldn't know it from the outrageously high prices being charged at the supermarket, but the Texas economy is in the midst of 'The Crash of '82 and our next Agriculture Commissioner is going to have to take aggressive action if we are to salvage our family farm system."

"During the last five years, about 10,000 Texas farmers and ranchers went out of business, but now things are such a mess that farm leaders estimate we will lose at least 10,000 good producers this year alone. Of nearly 25,000 Texas farmers operating this year on loans from the Farmers Home Administration-- the lender of last resort for farmers--nearly half are so bad off they are delinquent on their payments," Hightower said, "and several counties report a delinquency rate as high as 85 percent." (Farmers Home Administration officials pointed out last week that the delinquency rate is the highest in the history of the program and that Texas now has more delinquent borrowers than any other state.)

"Commodity prices have fallen so low that farmers generally can't make enough money to cover expenses, which keep going up, Hightower said. "This combination of low prices and high

costs is putting an unbearable squeeze on our farmers."

"The number one job of the next Texas Agriculture Commissioner is to help reverse that decline," Hightower said, "and the number one issue of this campaign is what the candidates propose to do to get the job done."

He said he plans to take the initiative in six major areas where farmers and consumers can work together for mutual benefit: marketing, governmental advocacy, production costs, economic development, agricultural support systems and public education.

Sales Tax Rebates Told

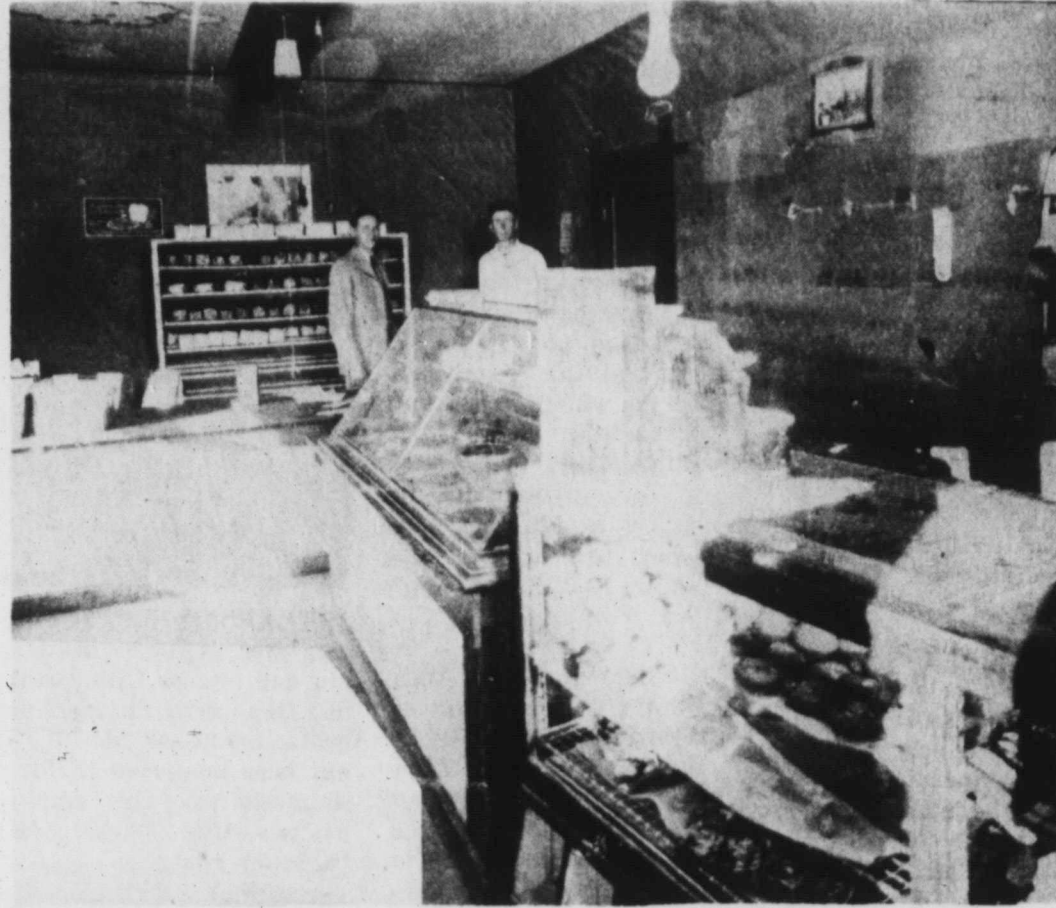
State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent the biggest check ever for a single month's tax collections -- \$49.2 million--to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for September.

The statewide total is up 20 percent over last September's payment of \$41 million. The payment reflects taxable sales made in July and reported to the state by the end of August.

The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

O'Donnell's net payment this period-- \$1,611.21, comparable payment prior year-- \$0.

Tahoka's net payment this period-- \$3,575.58; comparable payment prior year-- \$2,127.68.

Ambulance Personnel Needed

Lynn County Ambulance Service is in need of additional trained personnel, hospital administrator John Brooks said this week. Brooks noted proposed legislation to be submitted to the next Legislature to give Texas Department of health powers to govern licensing of ambulances, certification of personnel, staffing emergency vehicles and set penalties for violations of these laws.

If this bill is passed Lynn County Ambulance Service will be short of trained, licensed personnel. "We need to get personnel trained now as it will be too late if the new laws are passed," Brooks said.

He said there will be an

Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) course starting in Slaton Oct. 5 for personnel to be qualified to furnish emergency care as ambulance attendants. The course is from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday nights and requires 112 hours of clinic rotation in hospitals plus five ambulance runs prior to date of final examination.

Tuition for the course is \$90, plus \$15.75 for books. The hospital will pay for the tuition fee and each person will be responsible for purchasing the books. The county's new ambulance is in operation now and additional trained personnel is needed to keep it in operation or the county may lose the ambulance service.

hospital administrator at 998-4533 by Monday.

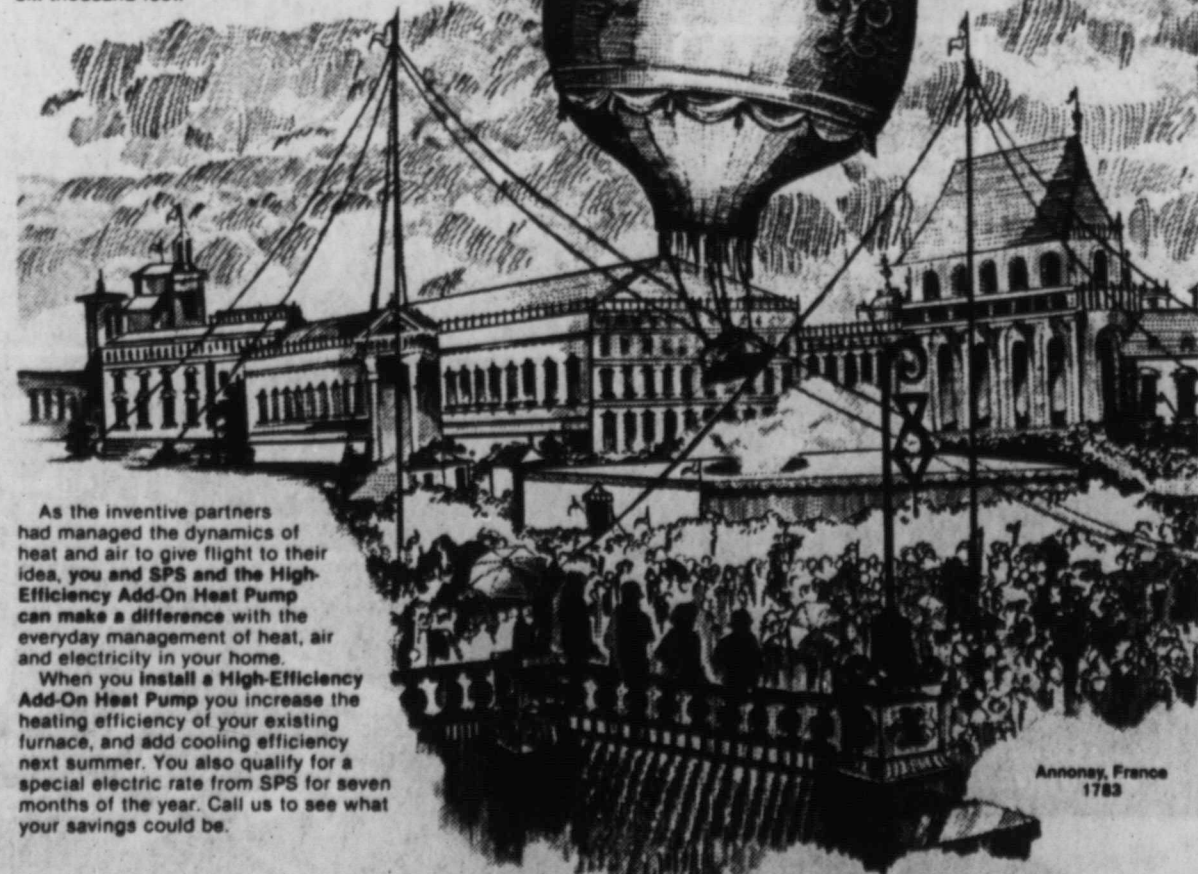

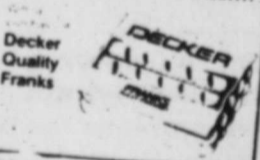

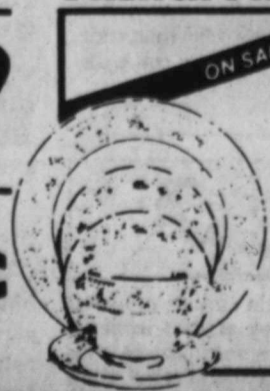
