Parmer County Farm Bureau News

Dr. Frederick Fowler, speaking at the American Farm Bureau Vesper Service in Chicago December 13, said that the Progress of Man is based on a foundation of three parts: (1) man's right relation with God, (2) man putting his trust in God, and (3) man's walking with God. We concur fully.

Also, at the National Convention, delegates revealed that less than 10% were in favor of a complete Government control of production. Also, Texas was among 17 states exceeding their 1959 AFBB membership quota. The Texas FB membership qualified us for six voting delegates to the convention.

Only three states had more delegates than Texas—Iowa, Illinois, and Indiana. Texas' strength is reflected in resolutions adopted in the National Convention on the following subjects, as well as others: State's Rights; Opposing Government operation of commercial businesses; Acreage allotments; Increase of exemptions for Federal Estate taxes; Opposing increase benefits and costs for Social Security; Insisting on applications of antitrust laws to labor unions; Opposing compulsory unionism; Opposing unionization of farmers;

Opposing bid voting of cooperatives by a board of directors when the membership has not been consulted on the particular issue at hand.

There are many other resolutions in complete agreement with Texas Farm Bureau that will be presented before Congress by American Farm Bureau Representatives. You should be a member of this organization, if you are not already, says Donald Christian, Vice-President and Membership Chairman. President Herman Gerles agrees.

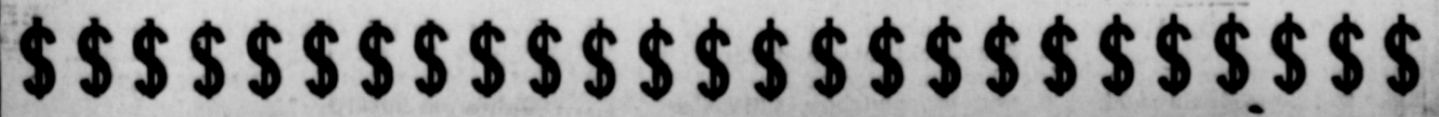

Muleshoe Wins 3 At Farwell

Muleshoe won three basketball games at Farwell last Tuesday night from host Farwell teams, taking the boys B game 34-31, the girls game 43-35, and the boys battle, 51-49.

Mary Gross was Muleshoe's top scorer with 15 points, but game honors went to June Ritchey of Farwell, who garnered 18 markers.

In the boys' game, Farwell held a 14-12 first period lead and 26-22 halftime margin, but Muleshoe skyrocketed to a 46-38 margin as the final quarter started.

Farwell outscored the Mules in the final period, 11-5, but couldn't overcome the wide margin. The Mules stalled out the waning moments of the game to insure the win.

Darrell Oliver was high for Muleshoe with 14 points, while Tom Williams led the Steers with 13.

To Boost Consumption

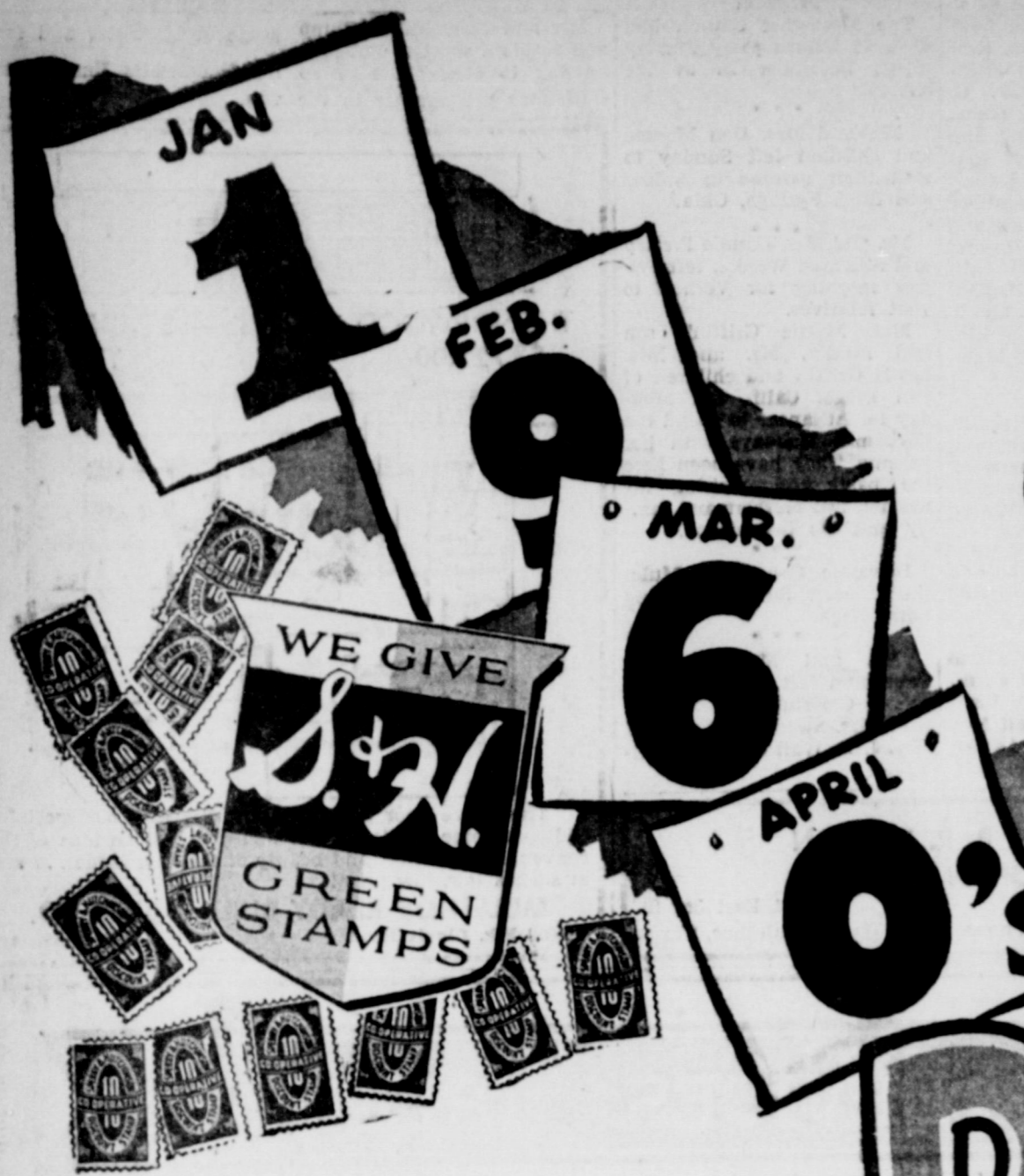
