Rodriguez, Isbell, Clift **Lead Stats**

Ouarterback Ramiro Rodriguez with 129 yards rushing and 308 yards passing is the offensive leader for the Tahoka Bulldogs through five games, and Michael Isbell and Shannon Clift are leading the defense with 67 points on the defensive coaches' grading system.

Leading rusher so far this season for Tahoka is Charles Jurden, with 302 yards on 54 attempts, or an average of 5.6 per carry. Second among the rushers is Cory McCleskey, with 143 yards in just 13 carries, averaging 11 yards per carry. Clift has 94 yards rushing this season so far and Mike Ramirez


Thomas Glisson is the top pass receiver with 184 yards on 7 receptions. Michael Isbell has 86 yards on one catch from T.C. Spruiell last week, and Jurden has 53 yards on 5 catches.

A Texas Tech teaching and research assistant from Tahoka has received his third honor this year related to his work and interest in the problems of older persons and in creating a better environment for improved lifestyle of the elderly.



Our community volunteers all have the gift of serving their fellow man. As individuals, they seem to develop a specialty that becomes sort of a trademark of public service.


One such behind the scenes good of the cause helper provides transportation in time of need, usually refusing to accept money even for the fuel expended.

PROCLAMATION BY THE **GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS**

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

WHEREAS, a vacancy now exists in the Texas House of Representatives in the membership of District 78, which consists of Cottle, Fisher, Garza, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lynn, Nolan, Scurry, Stonewall Counties, and part of Taylor County; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Election Code, in sections 203.002 and 203.004, requires that a special election be ordered upon such vacancy, and, absent a finding of an emergency, provides that said special election shall be held on the first uniform election date occurring on or after the 36th day after the date the election is ordered; and


