## Rodriguez, Isbell, Clift Lead Stats

Quarterback Ramiro Rodriguez with 129 yards rushing and 308 yards passing is the offensive leader for the Tahoka Bulldogs through five games, and Michael Isbell and Shannon Clift are leading the defense with 67 points on the defensive coaches' grading system.

Leading rusher so far this season for Tahoka is Charles Jurden, with 302 yards on 54 attempts, or an average of 5.6 per carry. Second among the rushers is Cory McCleskey, with 143 yards in just 13 carries, averaging 11 yards per carry. Clift has 94 yards rushing this season so far and Mike Ramirez has 87.

Thomas Glisson is the top pass receiver with 184 yards on 7 receptions. Michael Isbell has 86 yards on one catch from T.C. Spruiell last week, and Jurden has 53 yards on 5 catches.

McCleskey with 65 defensive grading points is crowding the top two for the honor of leading defender. He's followed on the chart by Chris Jurden, Ronnie Dunn and Tim Young, who has the most solo tackles with 11.

## Last-Gasp Heroics Win For Bulldogs

The Tahoka Bulldogs stumbled at times at Morton last week, but thanks to a couple of dazzling long touchdown plays, came through to win the district contest 19-18.

The No. 1 hero of the contest has to be junior end Michael Isbell, who caught a pass from halfback T.C. Spruiell when the Bulldogs were backed up to their own 14-yard line and trailing 18-13 with less than a minute left.

Isbell caught the ball about 25

yards downfield and then raced all the way to the end zone, shaking off Indians who caught up with him inside the Morton 10, and going on in for a touchdown.

Tahoka scored first in the game as QB Ramiro Rodriguez ran a yard for a touchdown following a good drive which featured the running of Charles Jurden and Mike Ramirez. Rodriguez' point try hit the goal post and bounced back, so it was 6-0 with 7:37 left in the first.

## Five Injured In Three Wrecks; Hogs Stolen

Five persons were injured in three wrecks investigated by Dept. of Public Safety patrolmen in the last 10 days, and two other vehicle accidents were reported in the city of Tahoka.

Last Saturday afternoon a 1985 Lincoln driven by Frank Donald Baca, 60, of San Antonio, struck a median 3.5 miles north of O'Donnell on U.S. 87. The driver was treated for a gash on the head and released from Lynn County Hospital. His wife, Clara Baca, 53, was treated at the hospital and then transferred to Lubbock for further treatment of back and other injuries. Both were wearing seat belts.

On Sunday evening a 1984 International truck with a semi-trailer driven by Thomas Eugene Durfee, 58, of Meadow, struck a Hereford cow 1.6 miles west of

Tahoka on U.S. 380, then jackknifed in a cotton field next to the highway. The driver was treated at Lynn County Hospital for a cut on the head and released. The cow, owned by Jack Miller of Tahoka, was killed.

Early in the morning of Sept. 27 a 1985 Buick driven by Lori Tipton, 18, of Tahoka, struck an embankment on a county dirt road a half mile east of Tahoka. The driver and a passenger, Mark Layne Taylor, 21, of Lubbock, were treated for minor injuries at Lynn County Hospital and released, according to an investigating officer.

Police investigated an accident on Friday at North 1st and Ave. M that involved a 1987 GMC Suburban driven by Iris Powell Lankford of Tahoka and a 1987 Chevrolet van driven by Sylvia

Fuentes Rodriguez of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Police investigated an accident on Saturday at South 5th and Ave. K that involved a 1982 GMC pickup driven by Daniel Calvillo of Tahoka and a parked 1985 GMC Jimmy truck owned by Jackie Swinford of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Police served two outstanding traffic warrants during the past week; one on a 25-year-old Tahoka man that was escorted to Lynn County Sheriff's Office where he paid that fine and was released. Another warrant was served on a 28-year-old Tahoka man for expired MVI sticker. He also paid fines and was released.

Philip Hernandez of Wilson reported two incidents of theft of his hogs during the week. Four white pigs, about 40 pounds each, were stolen Thursday or Friday from pens six miles southeast of Wilson. On Monday he reported a crossbred black and white hog weighing more than 300 pounds apparently had been killed in the pen and stolen.

Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$300 reward in the thefts of the pigs.

Ten hogs stolen from the farm of H.D. Tucker, Rt. 2, Wilson, were recovered later and three black males were arrested in the case, sheriff's officers said. The animals were stolen Monday and later were discovered in the possession of a Lubbock man who said two suspects brought them to him and he agreed to buy them for more than \$800. However, they were to return to get a check later, as he said he suspects the hogs were stolen. Two Slaton young men, age 17 and 18, were arrested late Monday along with a third man who was released to Lubbock County.

In jail during the week were two persons for theft of swine, four for traffic offenses, two awaiting transfer to the Texas Dept. of Corrections, and one each for delivery of a controlled substance and driving while license suspended.

## Research On Problems Of Aging Brings Awards To Tahoka Man

A Texas Tech teaching and research assistant from Tahoka has received his third honor this year related to his work and interest in the problems of older persons and in creating a better environment for improved lifestyle of the elderly.

Zane D. Curry of Tahoka was

invited to Tulsa, Okla., in September to the annual conference of the Southwest Society on Aging. At the conference he was presented with the SWSA scholarship awarded annually to only one student in the five-state area covered by the society.

Considered a very high honor,

the scholarship is presented to one person each year based on academic record, research on aging and commitment to improving the lifestyle of the elderly.

Curry, who currently is working on a master's thesis on "Rural Housing Alternative Designs for Elderly Residents," has directed much of his energy toward research into the situation of older persons in the last two years. He also received the Booer-Wolf Scholarship for both 1987 and 1988 and this year also was named to receive the Jewell L. Taylor Family Trust Scholarship. An environmental design major, he has completed the required course work for a Master of Science degree and has begun course work for a doctorate.

He is graduate assistant on a special research project which began Sept. 1 and will be completed next Aug. 31. Principal investigator on the project is Dr. Marie Anderson of Tech, and much of the data will be collected in a skilled nursing facility at Levelland. Title of the project is "Luminous Conditions in Long Term Care Facilities: Behavioral Implications."

This semester Curry is teaching I.D. 1382, which is "Interiors I." The course introduces skills necessary to design, analyze and present professional interior design statements. Content includes creative problem solving and development of working drawings, floor plans and elevations.

Curry is a graduate of the University of North Texas with a degree in interior design. He also attended Cooke County Junior College in Gainesville and Howard College in Big Spring. He also has worked in farming and farm-related businesses, and operated a design business in Tahoka, plus work in architectural and construction businesses.

For most of the remaining time, Tahoka was stymied, and when they took over on the Dog 14 with less than a minute left, their changes looked pretty bleak. But then came the toss to Isbell, his first reception of the season, and the win for Tahoka, 19-18.

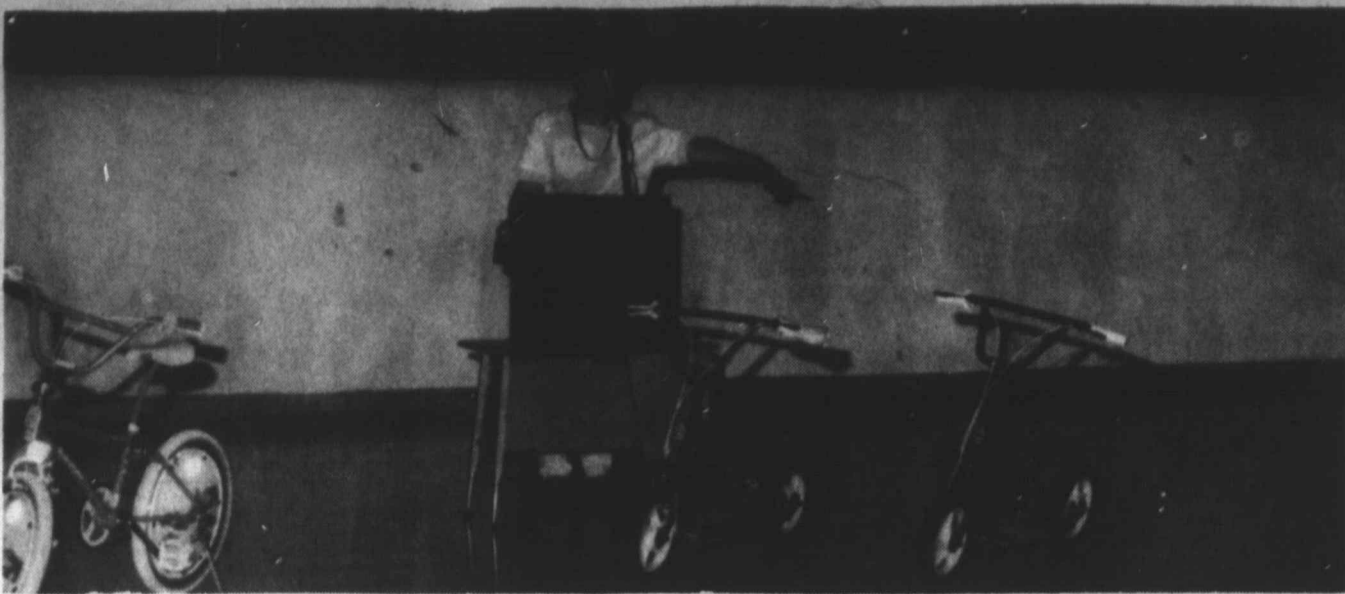
## County Students Involved In Drug-Awareness Contest

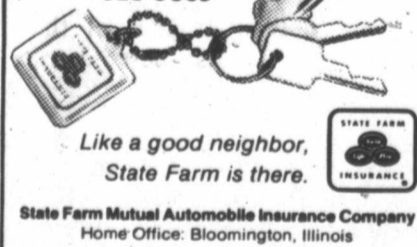

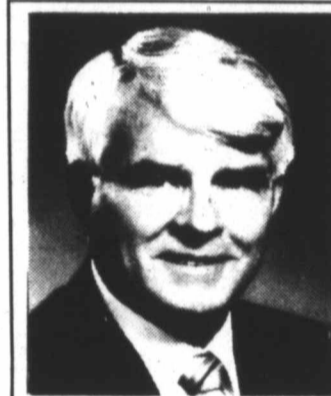
### Tahoka Recognized In 'Texas Bests' Book

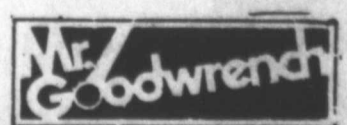

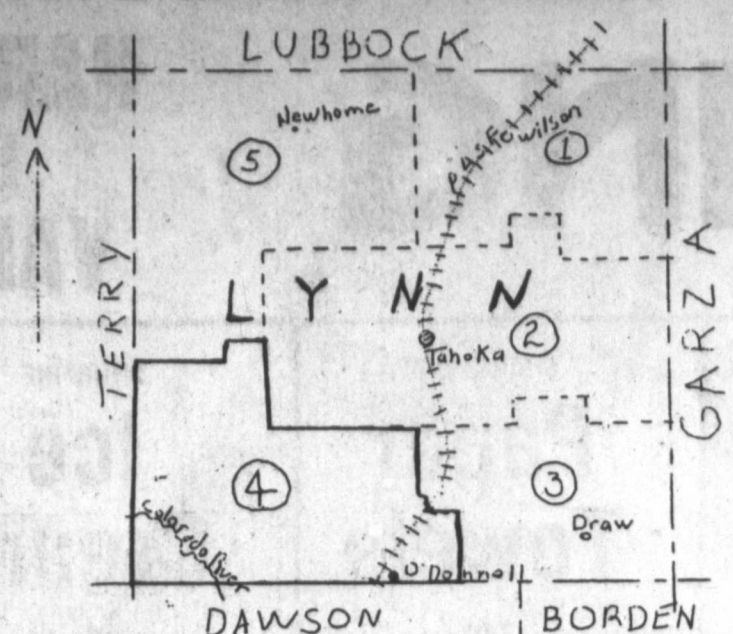

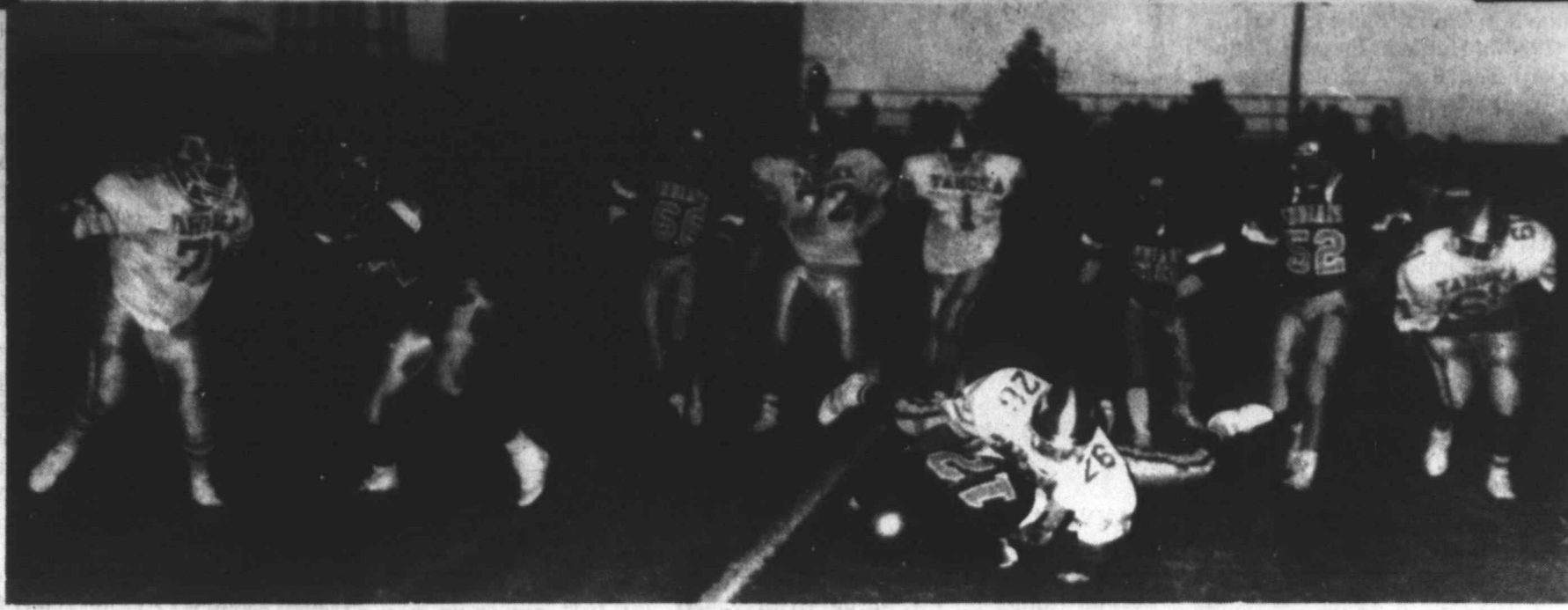

WHEREAS, a vacancy now exists in the Texas House of Representatives in the membership of District 78, which consists of Cottle, Fisher, Garza, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lynn, Nolan, Scurry, Stonewall Counties, and part of Taylor County; and WHEREAS, the Texas Election Code, in sections 203.002 and 203.004, requires that a special election be ordered upon such vacancy, and, absent a finding of an emergency, provides that said special election shall be held on the first uniform election date occurring on or after the 36th day after the date the election is ordered; and WHEREAS, November 8, 1988, is the next such uniform date; and WHEREAS, the Texas Election Code, in section 3.003, requires notice by proclamation of the Governor not later than the 36th day before such election;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, WILLIAM P. CLEMENTS, JR., GOVERNOR OF TEXAS, under the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Texas, do hereby order a special election to be held in District 78 on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, 1988, for the purpose of electing a State Representative for District 78 to serve out the unexpired term of the Honorable Steven A. Carriker.

Candidates who wish to have their names placed on the special election ballot must file their applications with the Secretary of State no later than 5:00 p.m. on Monday, the 10th day of October, 1988.

A copy of this order will be mailed immediately to the County Judges of Cottle, Fisher, Garza, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lynn, Nolan, Scurry, Stonewall, and Taylor Counties, and all appropriate writs will be issued and all proper proceedings will be followed to the end that said election may be held to fill the vacancy in District 78 and its result proclaimed in accordance with law.
