Contests For School, City Elections Due

With several hours remaining Wednesday to the deadline for sign-ups in city and school elections, contests already were assured in school and city races in Wilson and Tahoka.

At Wilson, six persons had signed by Wednesday morning for three places to be filled on the city council, all two-year terms. Signing were incumbent Donald Klaus and new candidates Charlene Webb, Bertha Nettles, JoAnn Cook, Donald Williams and Oscar Ortega.

In the Wilson school district, where the terms of Lester Gickhorn

and Servando (Surpy) Benavides are scheduled to expire, six candidates had signed for the two seats, including Gickhorn. Others on the list by Wednesday morning were Dan Cook, Keith Wied, Doug Savell, Lowen Young and Kerry F. Piper.

With two places to fill on the Tahoka City Council, four persons had filed by Tuesday afternoon, including one of the incumbents, Carl Reynolds. The other incumbent, Milt Uzzle, had not filed at that time. New candidates for the city council are Michael Mensch, Keith Paschal and Joe Calvillo. The term of Mayor Jim Solomon also is to expire; Solomon was the only candidate to have filed for the position by late Tuesday.

Four candidates had filed for two available 3-year terms on the Tahoka School board, and two persons had filed for a one-year term available. Filing for the regular terms were Curtis Harvick, David Hale, Mike Rivas and Greg Henley. Filing for the one-year term were Robbie Autry and Juanell Jones. Terms of Nedra Young, Thalia Burks and Richard Lopez are scheduled to expire.

No contest had materialized as of Wednesday morning in the New Home city elections, as incumbent council member Leroy Nettles filed for re-election, and Leon Harmonson filed for the other available seat. Also Mayor Roy Blevins has filed for re-election.

Efforts to contact the New Home school for a listing of candidates were unsuccessful this week as school personnel were on spring break.

Two Persons Charged After Drug Raid Here

Area law enforcement officers including members of the Tahoka Police Dept., South Plains Regional Narcotics Task Force, Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. and Texas Highway Patrol were successful in completing a drug raid at a North First St. residence in Tahoka about 7:15 p.m. Saturday.

Charged with possession of cocaine with intent to deliver and possession of marijuana were Victor Charo Jr. and Flora Amador of 2229 N. 1st.

After a thorough search of the residence by officers and also by a German Shepherd drug-sniffing dog assisted by Lynn County Deputy Elton Childress, officers confiscated approximately 3.5 grams of cocaine (described by officers as worth approximately \$500 on street value) and a small amount of marijuana, along with drug paraphernalia.

Charo, 28, and Ms. Amador, 31, were booked into Lynn County jail and later posted bonds of \$21,000 each and were released Sunday.

Tahoka Police Chief Jerry Webster noted that the raid was effective due to several weeks of investigation and cooperation between the police

department and South Plains Regional Task Force and Webster also commented that "Drugs continue to be a problem in Tahoka, and we are working toward elimination of this problem."

Police also investigated two apparently related burglaries of motor vehicles that occurred during the night on Tuesday, March 12. Harry Short of 2509 N. 2nd and Edwin Pebsworth of 2422 N. 3rd reported that pistols had been stolen from the glove boxes of their pickups parked at the residences. Short reported a .380 caliber automatic pistol had been stolen from his Dodge pickup, and Pebsworth reported a .38 caliber Taurus pistol stolen from his 1988 Chevrolet pickup. Lynn County Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$200 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for either crime.

Lynn County sheriff's officers investigated two new burglaries during the week and a heavy influx of 18 new jail inmates were booked in during the week.

Offices of the City of Wilson were burglarized in the Green building on FM 400 in that city between

Thursday and Friday, after doors were forced open. Cabinets were forced open also, but nothing was listed as missing.

The home of Gail Fariés, Rt. 4, Tahoka, about 7 miles northwest of Tahoka, was burglarized between 9 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. last Saturday, the second time in recent months for the home to be burglarized. Missing were a 19-inch Magnavox TV and a Panasonic microwave oven. Total value of the stolen items was listed as \$500, plus \$200 damage to a door forced open.

In jail during the week were four persons for public intoxication, three for driving while intoxicated, first offense; two for minor in possession of alcoholic beverage; two for possession of controlled substance with intent to deliver; two for application to revoke probation on DWI charges; and one each on the following charges: possession of marijuana under two ounces and possession of drug paraphernalia, making alcoholic beverage available to a minor, resisting arrest, theft over \$20 but less than \$200, and no drivers license plus defective turn signal plus no liability insurance.

Local Group Now Full Owners Of Tahoka Bank

The First National Bank of Tahoka this week announced that full ownership of the bank is once again in local hands for the first time since 1964. In making the announcement, the bank president John Krey said, "This is a goal which a group of local businessmen and farmers have been working toward for several years. Although they all previously held minority interests, the new ownership group, led by Fred B. Hegi Jr., C.T. Louder, Bryan Wright and Natt Park, will now have 100 percent ownership of the bank."

Chartered as a state institution in 1906, the bank obtained its national charter in 1907 and became The First National Bank of Tahoka. During its 84 years of service to Tahoka and Lynn County, the bank has grown from less than \$100,000 in assets in 1907 to more than \$50 million today. Krey stated that the bank "is, and

always has been, one of the most financially secure banks in the United States as indicated by its capital ratio in excess of 10 percent at the most recent regulatory reporting of Dec. 31, 1990.

"It's a good feeling to have our hometown bank once again controlled by hometown folks," he said. "It can only lead to better service to our community."

Krey invited everyone to come by "and have a cup of coffee" and says, "you'll find your friends at the 'new' First National Bank of Tahoka."

NEARLY EVERYONE HAS heard of the Ides of March, because most of us have a hazy memory of somebody in Shakespeare's play *Julius Caesar* saying "Beware of the Ides of March", although most of us don't remember who said it, or why.

I tried to find out. Really. But I don't have a set of encyclopaedia books, except for one rather rare 1913 set which is packed away someplace. And I never need information at any of the times the public library is open. And I tried to call the school to talk with the teachers of literature, only to realize after several rings that it was spring break, and all the teachers were in Honolulu or Bangor, Maine, or Borden County, or some other inaccessible place so nobody would bother them about academic things. Many probably hid out all week in places like John Knox Village where there are no children.

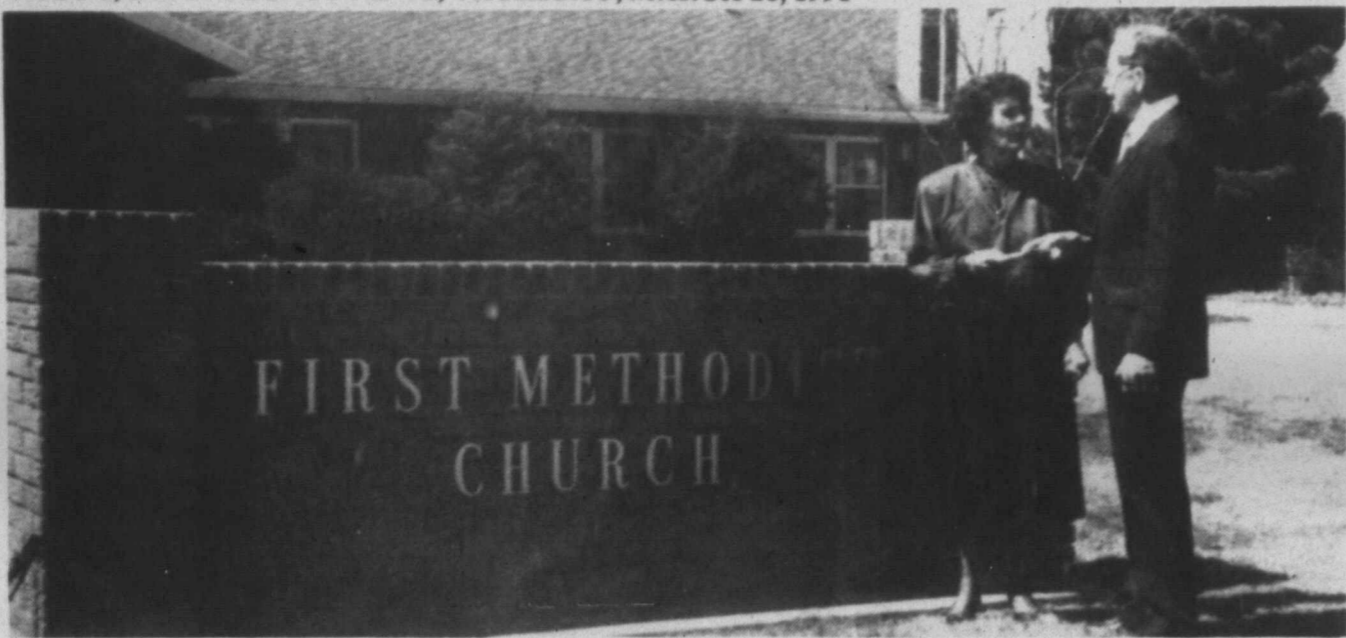
Perhaps it was somebody warning Caesar that Cassius (or Mohammed Ali, or someone) was planning to do him in on March 15. Anyway, that same "Beware of the Ides of March" phrase was used for years to warn people that something bad was about to happen, mainly, that income taxes were due at that time. For many years before the deadline was moved to April 15, March 15 was the day you had to have your income tax return mailed in. That's probably why most folks realize that the "ides of March" means March 15.

I did check with my Webster's Dictionary which said that the word "Ides" in the ancient Roman calendar simply meant the 15th, when referring to March, May, July or October. It was not explained why "ides" meant the 15th of only those months. Nor did it explain why the ides of any other month meant the 13th.

Anyway, I learned something. If anyone warns me to "beware the ides of April," I will know they mean April 13.

I will warn you now: Beware the ides of September. That's the next time the 13th comes on Friday.

Incidentally, the only other line I remember from *Julius Caesar* is the one that says "Yon Cassius has a lean and hungry look." I remember when we were in college, some of us literary types used to say that was because he took his meals at the school cafeteria.

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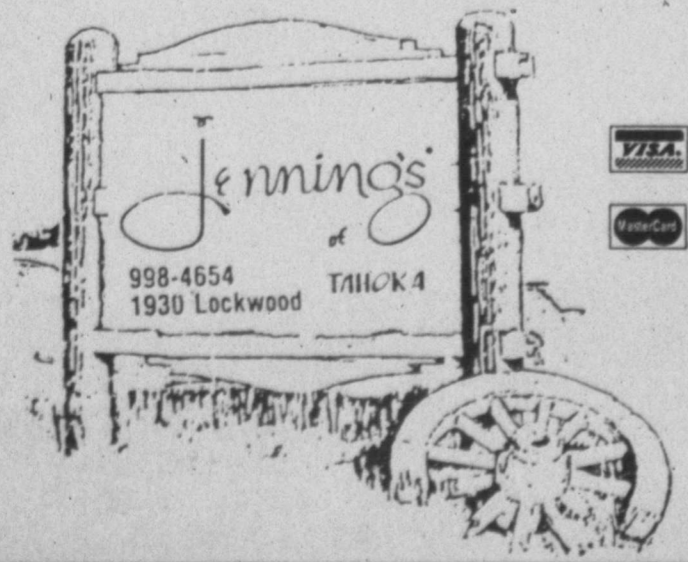

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GALL STONES

In clinical trials at 10 U.S. hospitals, 600 patients have had their gallstones removed without surgery by Lithotripsy (the disintegration of gallstones by shock waves). At Mayo Clinic, Dr. Johnson Thistle has another alternative to gallstone surgery, by injecting ether into the gall bladder to dissolve the stones. Changing from surgery to lithotripsy or ether-drip for removing gallstones will alleviate much pain and the risks of surgery and anesthesia for patients.

Shorts Receive Letter From Son-In-Law In Persian Gulf

(Editor's Note: E.L. and Dink Short of Tahoka received a letter recently from their son-in-law, Larry Bruns, who is stationed in the Persian Gulf area. He is married to the former Vivian Short. Mr. and Mrs. Short thought the people of Tahoka would be interested in reading the letter.)

Dear Dink and EL,
06 March 91

I want to say again how much I enjoy the letters and news clippings you send. This event in history is winding down. And history I guess will be the judge of whether it was right or wrong and whether it was over oil or freedom. Those of us here will always believe it was freedom. We must always believe that for those who have died must not have been sacrificed for anything less; theirs was a noble cause.

I received the Lynn County News that had Clay's picture at the Patriotic Program. I guess that reflects best what we are here for and the support we have received has been moving. The nation I guess is rejoicing and the re-election of George Bush would seem certain.

Oh! Thanks for the swim suit issue of Sports Illustrated. I use it as a means to get more work out of soldiers. A good effort is rewarded by a five minute review of that issue. There is lots of good efforts going here since that issue arrived. Seriously, issues of SI do make soldiers days better and I've handed out each one so folks can see what is going on. The Super Bowl issue is on everyone's lips to read. Viv sent old issues of Texas Highways and those were given to people from Texas, made everybody a little homesick.

I told Vivian but the last day of the fight was eerie. There are some 500 wells on fire in Kuwait. All that smoke and haze hung in the air at noon it was pitch black; you couldn't see 100 yds. A sister battalion lost two airplanes because they couldn't land and ran out of fuel. Pilots and observers ejected, all are OK but shaken. I told Vivian it was like a funeral and it was for the Iraqi Army.

All of my kids are safe, some had some close calls. I hope and pray that

we can get out of here with no major injuries or deaths. The roads we must travel are worse than I spoke of in previous letters. My driver and I were run off the road three separate occasions the other day.

I think I told you about the Iraqi prisoners that I saw. Near here is a British POW camp. They have a unique way of handling the POWs. People in these parts have a deathly fear of dog; most are shot on site. Dogs carry rabies and I am told most dogs have the disease. The POWs are ferried in by helicopter. They pack 100 in at a time and fly ten feet off the deck. The POWs are doubled timed off the helicopter while it is still running. The first thing the POWs see are five or six of the biggest German Shepherds on earth. A translator tells the POWs the rules of the camp and what is going to happen to them next (medical checks, showers, etc.). They are told that if they try to escape that they will not waste ammo, they just release the dogs to eat them alive. As if on cue the dogs begin barking, straining at leashes and foaming at the mouth. The POWs are told to move to the next station; they do so very quickly. They haven't had any problems at the camp which currently houses 5000-6000.

One thing I forgot to relay in an earlier letter was the price of fuel. We were out prior to the ground war and couldn't find any fuel with units so we stopped at a Saudi filling station. We filled the tank and it cost about 5.40 Riyal (Saudi Currency) for twenty gallons of diesel. The rough exchange is three Riyal to the dollar and that works out to .09 cents a gallon! The next time you fill the pick'em up you might think about that.

Must close, I've got helicopter flight into northern Kuwait to see some of my folks who supported the 2d ACR. They led the attack on the 24th and did an excellent job. Tell everyone hello and that I miss everyone. Tell the folks of Tahoka they have every right to be proud of their sons and daughters here; they have made history and reaffirmed the rights of man.

Agriculture Week Honors America's Providers

National Agriculture Week, March 17-23, honors America's providers — the farmers and ranchers who provide food and fiber for domestic and global needs.

Farmers are efficient producers. U.S. farmers today produce more than 80 percent more crop output on one acre of land than did their fathers. One hour of farm labor today also produces 16 times as much food and other crops as it did 70 years ago.

New technology has made these gains possible. The productivity of the land now depends on the skill and knowledge with which capital is applied. The larger the volume that farmers can raise and sell, the lower the product cost per item. Thus, consumers gain from the increase in farm production efficiency.

The productivity level of U.S. farmers and ranchers, when compared with those of other countries, also illustrates their high efficiency level.

For example, one American farmer provides food and fiber for 114 people. This compares with one farmer who provides food and fiber for 3.5 people in China, 3 people in Japan, 8 in Argentina, 4 in Brazil and 11 in the Soviet Union.

Consumers spent \$361 billion for foods produced on U.S. farms last year, about 4.5 percent more than in 1985. This amount includes purchases of farm foods in food stores, or roughly two-thirds of the total, and at away-from-home eating places.

About 25 percent of last year's food spending went back to farmers, who received about \$89 billion. The remaining \$272 billion, the marketing bill, went to the food industry for handling, processing and retailing foodstuffs after they left the farm. Direct labor costs for food marketing

represented 45 percent of the marketing bill, and all labor costs were about two-fifths larger than the farm value of food commodities.

For each dollar's worth of food bought in food stores, 31 cents was paid for processing. Retailing charges added 23 cents. Another 10 cents was spent for wholesaling and 6 cents for intercity transportation. The farm share was about 25 cents. These shares of the food dollar have been relatively constant over the years because costs of each function have risen at roughly similar rates.

In food-away-from-home purchases, 16 cents of each dollar covered the farm value. Processing costs accounted for 15 cents, transportation charges for 3 cents and wholesaling for 6 cents, or a total of 40 cents. Thus, 60 cents was paid for food service, or the preparation and serving of food eaten away from home.

The American consumer is more health conscious today than at any previous time in history. But convenience is still a top priority in the consumer's selection of food products.

Moisture Needed In Lynn County For Spring Planting Season

Lynn County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 need about four to eight inches of water to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before the start of 1991 spring planting, according to soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS).

"The annual soil moisture survey results are meant to inform irrigators about general soil moisture availability and deficit conditions across the Water District's 15-county service area," says Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist. "Using this information, irrigators can estimate the amount of water needed during the pre-plant irrigation to bring their soil to field capacity without over-irrigating or under-irrigating."

Soil moisture conditions within the Water District were tested from Nov. 12, 1990, through Jan. 15, 1991 at 249 soil moisture monitoring sites. Soil moisture readings are taken by

lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each site. These sites are chosen based upon the soil type, the crop produced, and the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer, which influences water well yield variations. Each soil moisture monitoring site represents typical field conditions near the location.

Pre-plant soil moisture conditions play an important role in determining crop yields. Historical data indicates that above-average crop yields are produced in the Texas High Plains area when the root zone of the soil is near field capacity at planting.

Any precipitation received and/or irrigation applied between now and planting season will improve soil moisture conditions and enhance crop yield prospects.

Copies of the regional or Lynn County soil moisture survey maps are available through your local USDA-SCS field office or the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock.

Texas Is Exempt From Cover Crop

The Texas State ASC Committee on March 13, exempted Texas from the 50 percent cover crop requirement on Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) acres according to Jerry Harris, chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee.

The Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 required that half of the acreage set-aside under the commodity programs be planted to a cover crop. The legislation also allowed for the exemption of those areas determined to be arid by USDA.

The determination to exclude Texas was based on meteorological data that shows the line between non-arid and arid regions running from North Dakota through Texas. All states east of the line are not considered arid and do not have to comply with the 50 percent cover requirement. Most states west of the line are considered arid and do not have to comply with the 50 percent cover requirement.

"Since this line runs through Texas, the Texas State ASC Committee determined to exclude all of the state from the 50 percent cover requirement," Harris said.

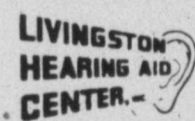
