## Over \$10,000 Raised At Fun-Food Festival

Lynn County Hospital Administrator Louise Landers praised county citizens for their efforts in this year's Fun/Food Festival sponsored by the Hospital Auxiliary, raising over \$10,000 to contribute to the county hospital.

"We had a really great turnout," said Mrs. Landers. "I was really pleased with the response," she added. Funds raised this year will go towards updating the hospital's anesthesia machine, according to Mrs. Landers, who said that in order to pass inspection about \$13,000 worth of updating facilities must be added. "A new anesthesia machine costs about \$38,000, so it is well worth updating the one we have," she said.

Last year's festival raised \$11,482.31, compared to this year's total of \$10,179.66. A painting by

Diana Hawthorne drew the largest amount at the auction, bringing in over \$1,000. The event was held from 4-9 p.m. Saturday at the International Harvester building on Hwy. 380. Billy Miller was auctioneer, and Cal Huffaker and Clint Walker were emcees. Spotters for the auction were Math Bartley, Greg Henley, Brett Cypert, all of Tahoka, and Stanley Young, a former Lynn County Extension Agent who returns each year to help with the Fun/Food Festival.

There was homemade ice cream, brownies and rice krispie treats, along with the fried fish dinner for everyone to enjoy, and a children's game room where youngsters could go to play. United Blood Services conducted a blood drive in conjunction with the festival, and health tests were offered to anyone interested.

## School, City Elections Saturday Draw Interest

Interest is high in school and city elections in Wilson, Tahoka and New Home coming up Saturday, when polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The Lynn County Hospital District also will elect four directors, but there are only four candidates on the ballot, so there will be no contest, although voters throughout the county will get their chance to vote.

In Tahoka, all voting will be at the Tahoka School business office for the city, Tahoka School District and hospital directors elections.

Three persons are running for a single one-year term on the Tahoka School board, and five others are running for two available full 3-year terms. Seeking the one-year term are Robbie Autry, Douglas Taylor and Juanell Jones. Seeking two available 3-year terms on the board are Mike Huffaker, Curtis Harvick, Greg Henley, Mike Rivas and David Hale.

In the Tahoka city election, Mayor Jim Solomon is unopposed for re-election. Four persons seeking two available two-year terms on the council are Mike Mensch, Keith Paschal, Joe Calvillo and incumbent Carl Reynolds.

Eight persons are in a battle for

three seats on the Wilson City Council, including incumbents Donald Klaus and Victor Steinhauer. Others running are Oscar Ortega, Jo Ann Cook, David Williams, Bertha Nettles, Charline Webb and Linda Clary.

Wilson School District patrons also will have lots of choices, as seven candidates are seeking two seats available. They are incumbent Lester Gickhorn and Keith Wied, Dan Cook, Melissa Hernandez, Doug Savell, Lowen Young and Kerry Piper.

At New Home, three persons are running for two 3-year terms on the school board, and two others are running for one 1-year term. Stacy Gill, David Foerster and G.G. Fillingim are seeking the regular terms, and Rick Clem and Larry Durham are in a contest for the 1-year term.

There is no contest on the ballot for the New Home city election, as incumbent Mayor Roy Blevins, and council candidates Leon Harmonson and Leroy Nettles are unopposed.

Unopposed are four candidates for the hospital board, Ann Wyatt, Joy Brookshire, Leland White and Jackie Stidham.

## Radios Stolen From Tractors Near O'Donnell

Radios were stolen from two John Deere tractors in the O'Donnell area Saturday, and a pickup was damaged by vandals, also at O'Donnell, on Sunday, April 21.

The 1989 Chevrolet pickup owned by Magdalena Guajardo had the grill smashed in and parking lights broken while it was parked at a service station.

Danny Brewer, Rt. 5, reported loss totaling \$573 as a radio was stolen and damage done in a break-in of his tractor cab, while it was located east of O'Donnell Saturday. The other radio, valued at \$189, was stolen from a tractor owned by Jerry Gass, 1.5 miles west of O'Donnell.

Thirteen new offenders were booked into Lynn County jail during the last week, and with a dozen or so federal prisoners being held here, the jail population was high. Most of those jailed last week were brought in on charges related to drinking. In jail were two persons for DWI first offense, one for DWI first plus no seat belt, two for application to revoke probation (one on charges of theft, one on charges of DWI), and one person each on the following charges: driving while license suspended plus DWI bond surrender and theft by check, theft by taking, minor in possession of alcoholic beverage and narcotics paraphernalia, DWI and possession of narcotics paraphernalia, public intoxication, DWI and theft by check, DWI judgement and sentence.

## Names Of Lynn County Soldiers In Operation Desert Storm Needed

The names of servicemen and women from Lynn County who served in Operation Desert Storm are needed as soon as possible to be included in a commemorative publication for a welcome home party for Texas soldiers, according to Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon.

Governor Ann Richards has appointed a committee to work on a welcome home party for Texas soldiers returning from Operation Desert Storm. The committee is planning a big celebration beginning Saturday, June 29, and going through July 3rd. This event will be held in Austin and will include a military parade, display of vintage military aircraft provided by the Confederate Air Force, display of equipment used in Operation Desert Storm, headline

entertainers and much more.

A commemorative publication is in the planning stages for this event, to include a list of all the citizen soldiers from each Texas county. Texas provided between 6,000 and 7,000 citizen soldiers for Desert Storm and it is very important that each name be included in this publication.

Anyone knowing the names of any servicemen and women who served in Operation Desert Storm from Lynn County is asked to call the office of Judge Brandon, at 998-4222, and give him that information. The deadline for Judge Brandon to send in the list of names for the publication is May 15, 1991, so everyone is encouraged to contact his office as soon as possible.

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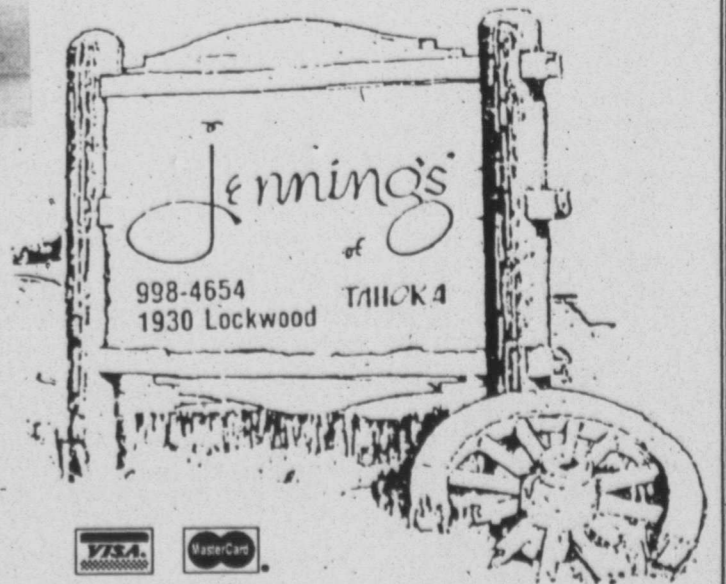

## Crop Residue Use Reduces Erosion, Increases Water Quality, Quantity

Crop residue use (CRU) is an important tool farmers can use not only for reducing erosion, but for increasing water quality and quantity. In these days of growing environmental concern, agriculture producers are becoming more aware of the importance of water quality.

Pollutants, such as sediment, pesticide and fertilizer residues are transported by run off water. Crop residues left on, or incorporated near the surface of the soil, protect and roughen the soil surface, reducing runoff of rain and irrigation water. This reduces the amount of sediment and chemical residues carried from the field into surface water supplies. Crop residues also increase microbial activity in the soil. This action may help tie-up and break down some surface applied pesticides, resulting in reduced amounts that can be washed off the field or leach down

to ground water supplies.

Crop residue use increases water quantity. When the soil surface is protected by residues, runoff is reduced and more water infiltrates into the soil. Therefore more water is available in the root zone. Evaporation is reduced also, allowing more water to be utilized by your primary crop.

Crop residues are very effective in reducing water and wind erosion, if properly managed. Crop residues may be left undisturbed or may be shredded and left on the surface. Residues may also be incorporated into the soil, near the surface, using disk-type implements or stubble mulchers. At least 30 percent residue cover should be left on the soil surface until final seedbed preparation. For most effective wind erosion control, residue should be managed on the soil surface until about April 1.

## Lynn County Groundwater Levels Decline

Lynn County groundwater levels declined an average 1.06 feet in 1990 in 40 privately-owned wells measured by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 154,100 acre service area within the county. This decline indicates a reduction of 24,501 acre-feet of water from storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Lynn County within the Water District boundaries.

Groundwater levels within the Water District's Lynn County service area increased 1.10 feet during the 10 year period from 1981 to 1991. An average increase of 1.22 feet was recorded during the five year period from 1986 to 1991.

Groundwater depletion can be

compared to the credits and debits in a checking account. For example, recently-updated computer models operated by the Texas Water Development Board in Austin show a "balance" of about 3.62 million acre-feet of water storage within Lynn County as of Jan. 1, 1990. "Withdrawals", or the groundwater depletion during 1990 in the portion of Lynn County served by the Water District, totaled 24,501 acre-feet. This depletion gives producers an idea of the "ending balance" in the Lynn County groundwater "account".

With this information, producers can better understand the rate of water depletion within their county and can work toward implementing more efficient irrigation practices.

## Mid-Year Crop, Livestock Reports Are Important

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas office will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1991 planted acreage estimates and mid-year livestock inventories.

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their plans for the coming year," state statistician Dennis Findley reported.

"The surveys will be very important this year because they will be the first accurate measure of the impact of participation in the 1990 government farm bill," he added.

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1991 acreage estimates will be released June 27, while the mid-year cattle inventory will be released July 29.

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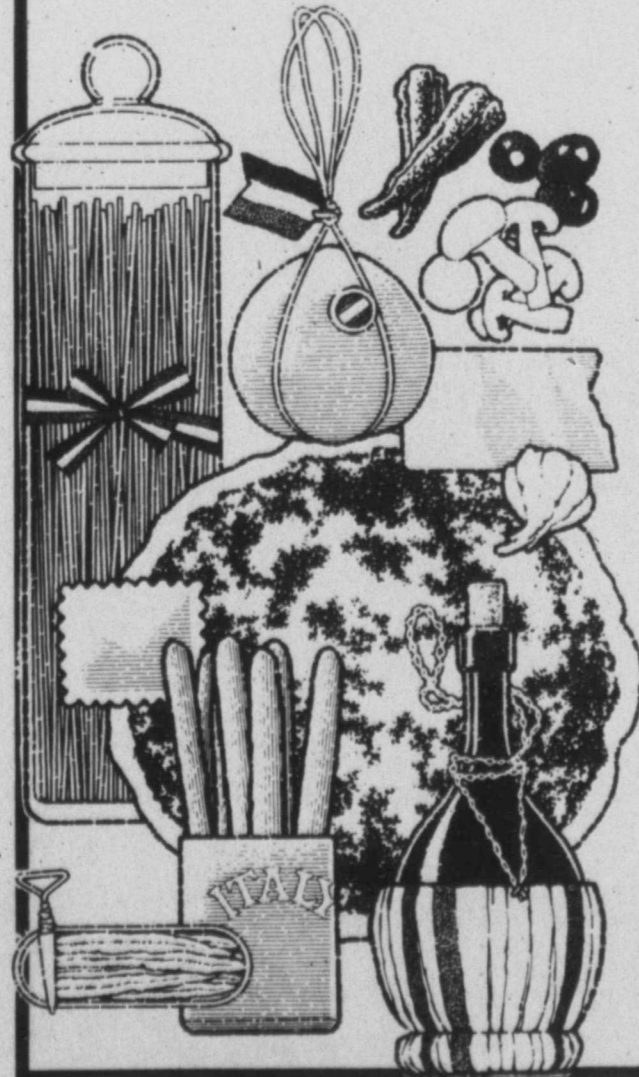

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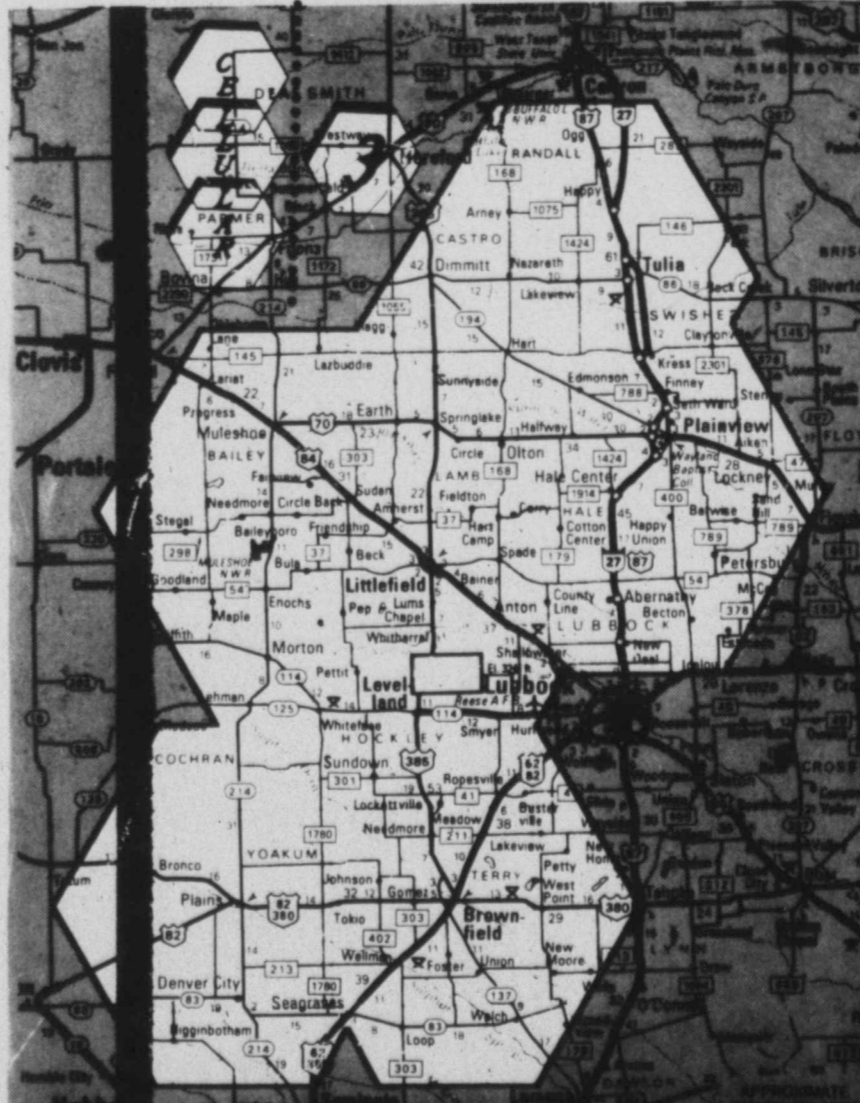

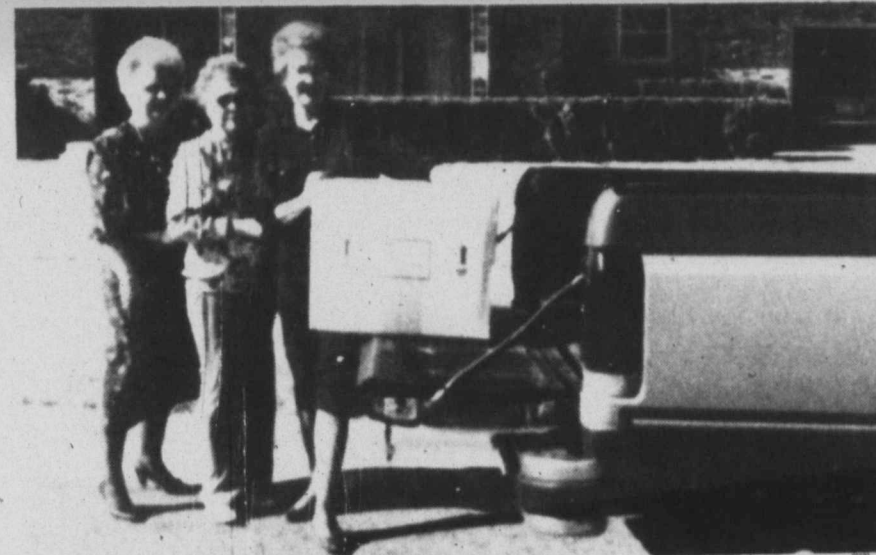
