Vehicle Accidents Investigated In City, County During Week

Three burglaries in the Wilson area last Tuesday night, April 30, or early Wednesday apparently were committed by the same persons, sheriff's deputies said this week. In each instance, locks were cut on farm buildings, apparently with a bolt cutter.

Kathryn Raymon of Hale Center is owner of two farm buildings three miles west of Wilson on FM 211 which were burglarized, with nothing missing. Two other burglaries east of Wilson were reported, and in one of these, Bill Strickland lost about \$200 worth of tools from a Wheeler Oil Co. warehouse.

Dept. of Public Safety officers investigated a wreck early Sunday about six miles west of U.S. 87, a one-vehicle accident on FM 1317. A 1989 Ford Escort driven by David Flores, 21, of Slaton, headed east, overturned just after midnight Saturday, rolling one and a half times, according to the DPS officer. Flores, who was wearing a seat belt, was not injured.

DPS also investigated an unusual accident last Thursday in which a county dump truck driven by Alejandro Renteria, Rt. 5, Tahoka, owned by Pct. 2, rolled over on its side on a county dirt road north of FM 2053. The truck rolled over after the edge of

the roadway gave way following a rain. The driver was treated at Lynn County Hospital.

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated a disturbance Sunday at a N. 5th residence in which two women had an altercation, with one hitting the other in the face. No charges were filed.

Juanita Renteria reported to police Tuesday that someone had stolen \$65 worth of food stamps from her purse.

Police investigated two accidents Saturday. One at Lockwood and Ave. G involved a 1989 GMC pickup driven by William Alva Caventess of Tahoka and a 1983 Chevrolet van driven by Laverne Corder Grider of Tahoka. No injuries were reported. The other accident Saturday was at Lockwood and Ave. D, involving a 1981 Ford driven by Cruz Castaneda Castillo and a 1981 Chevrolet pickup driven by Eufemio Rodriguez of New Home. No injuries were listed.

In jail during the week were two persons for driving while intoxicated, two for public intoxication, and one each for minor in possession of alcoholic beverage, no drivers license and application to revoke probation on charges of theft over \$750 and under \$20,000.

Tahoka Chamber Sets Barbecue, Picnic June 1

The Tahoka Chamber of Commerce has decided to have an outdoor picnic and barbecue with entertainment at the Tahoka Mini-Park this year, replacing the traditional annual indoor banquet.

"We believe that the people of Tahoka will enjoy this picnic and musical entertainment more than they would a banquet, and with volunteers cooking the barbecue and with the informal setting of the park, we hope that more people will take part," said Chamber President Dustie Cook.

The event will be on Saturday evening, June 1, and tickets are available from any chamber officer or director and from Balloons and Flowers in downtown Tahoka. Tickets are priced at \$7 for adults and \$4

for children.

Tahoka's Man of the Year and Woman of the Year will be announced at the event.

Featured entertainment at the event will be by The Heart Beats, two fiddlers, ages 8 and 15, who are from Lubbock, and who not only perform lively fiddle music but also perform novelty numbers such as fiddling behind their backs.

Also on the program will be the Clover Kids, a group of 4-H members age 4-8 who will sing and participate in a patriotic program.

The Man and Woman of the Year awards will be made to winners selected from nominations made by civic and other organizations in Tahoka. Each organization will be asked to nominate one person.

Voters Make Choices In Contested Elections

Voters in Lynn County's four communities made their choices last Saturday in elections for school, city and hospital district board positions, with a tie developing in a Tahoka school board race which will necessitate a runoff for one seat on the board. And in Wilson, a recount of ballots this Friday will be necessary before results of a school board election will be official.

The Tahoka School board was to elect two persons to regular 3-year terms and one to a 1-year term. Of the five persons running for the two regular seats, Mike Huffaker was elected with 175 votes, but the race for the other seat was a tie between Mike Rivas and Greg Henley with 157 votes each. A runoff election between these two will be on Saturday, June 1, with voting to be at the school business office, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Election officials asked that all voters bring their voter registration cards with them on that day. Absentee ballots may be picked up at Tahoka city hall starting Friday, with absentee voting to end on May 28.

Others in the race were David Hale with 40 votes and Curtis Harvick with 44. Juanell Jones won the 1-year unexpired term with 134 votes to 101 for Doug Taylor and 40 for Robbie Autry.

Carl Reynolds with 188 votes and Mike Mensch with 168 votes were elected to the Tahoka City Council. Reynolds is an incumbent. Also in the race for the two seats were Joe Calvillo, 141 votes, and Keith Paschal, 52 votes. Mayor Jim Solomon, running unopposed, was re-elected with 235 votes.

There was some close voting in the 7-person race for two seats on the Wilson school board, and the apparent winners were Keith Wied, 111

votes; and Dan Cook with 70. Close behind were Lowen Young, who apparently missed election by just a couple of votes, with 68, and Kerry Piper with 60. Incumbent Lester Gickhorn had 55 votes; Dbug Savell 27 and Melissa Hernandez 12. Young has filed a petition for a recount of the ballots, and this will take place at 4 p.m. Friday.

The Wilson city election also was close, with three persons elected to the council from eight candidates. Elected were Donald Klaus with 64 votes, Victor Steinhauser with 55 and Oscar Ortega with 47. Others were Bertha Nettles 39, Charlene Webb 36, Jo Ann Cook 33, David Williams 31 and Linda Clary 26.

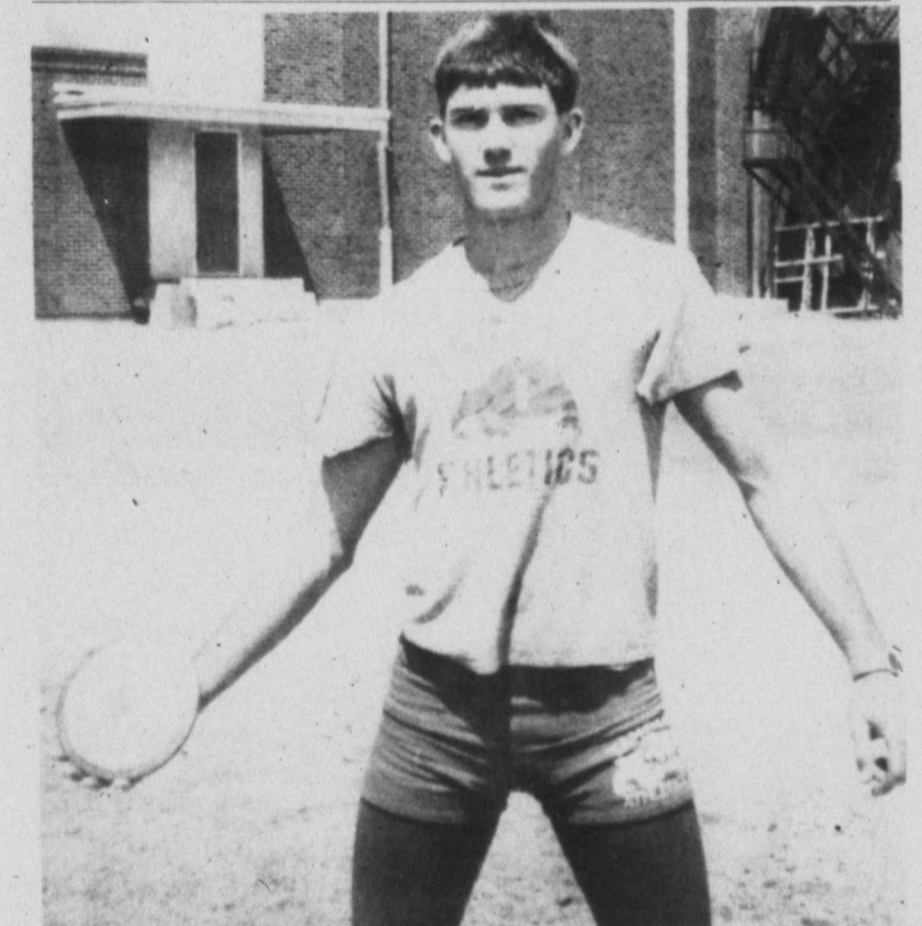
Incumbents Stacy Gill and David Foerster were re-elected to New Home School board for three-year terms, with 72 and 65 votes respectively. G.G. Fillingim had 34 votes. Larry Durham won a 1-year term by getting 62 votes to Rick Clem's 27.

There were no contests in New Home's city election. Mayor Roy Blevins was re-elected with 21 votes, and Leon Harmonson with 24 and Leroy Nettles with 23 votes were elected to the council.

There also were no contests for the four available seats on the Lynn County Hospital District board. Elected were Ann Wyatt, 223 votes; Joy Brookshire with 272; Leland White with 229 and Jackie Stidham with 216.

Three incumbents were re-elected to the O'Donnell city council without opposition. They were Tommy Woolam, Rex Little and Billy Edwards.

Renn Dorman and Sharon Gass were elected to the O'Donnell school board, getting 45 and 46 votes, with no opposition.

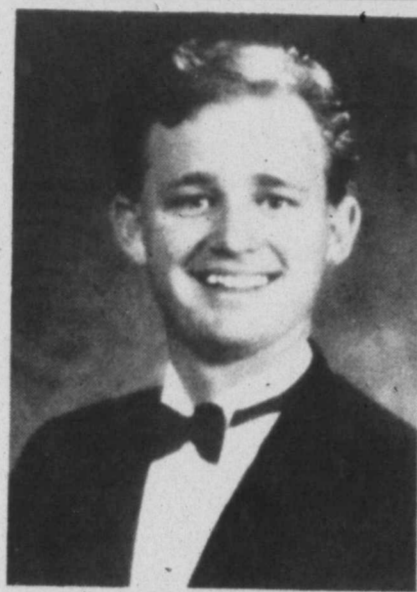

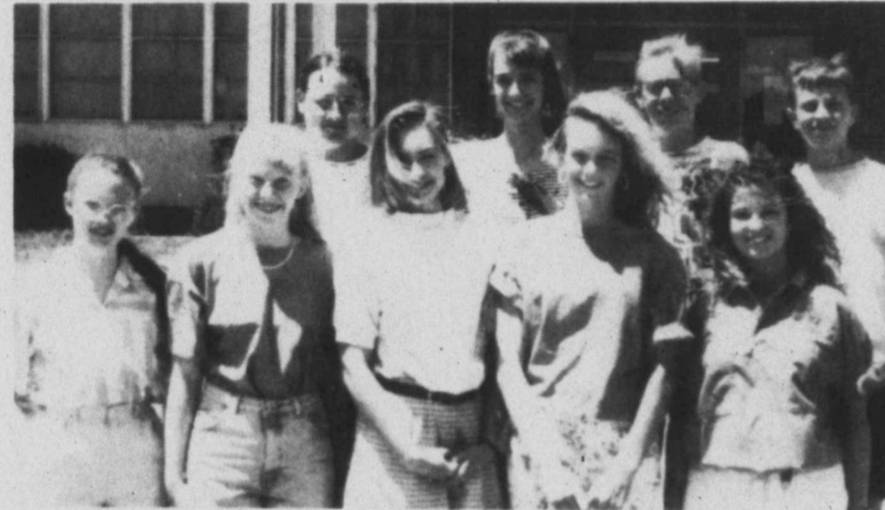
