Burglars Strike Three Downtown Locations

Two downtown Tahoka buildings were burglarized last Wednesday night, and an apparent attempt to burglarize Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co. was made Thursday night.

A window was broken to gain entry to Tahoka City Hall, where nothing was reported missing, but more than \$350 cash was reported stolen after a safe was forced open at Al Griggs Autocenter on Lockwood. A door was forced to gain entry to the auto dealership. Jacky Paul Stice,

manager of the lumber company, said an effort had been made to gain entry there and a deadbolt lock was damaged.

No burglaries or thefts were reported as investigated by the sheriff's department during the last week, but 11 more persons were jailed, mostly on charges related to drugs, drinking or traffic violations.

Reportedly there were four traffic accidents, two investigated in the county by the Dept. of Public Safety and two by the Tahoka Police Dept. No information was available from the DPS, but police investigated an accident Friday in the 1900-block of Main St. where a 1996 Pontiac Grand Am driven by Jeremy John Brandon, 18, of Tahoka, and a 1987 Buick Century driven by Adrian Dewell Graves, 17, also of Tahoka, collided. Shawn Brewer, 18, a passenger in the Brandon vehicle, was listed as having a possible injury. Both drivers and two teenage passengers in the Buick were listed as not injured.

Police also were called to a collision at Ave. Q and N. 1st St. Tuesday. Involved were a 1995 Chevrolet Suburban driven by Alecia Reid Hancock, 30, and a 1981 Chrysler driven by Ramona Castillo, 21. Both drivers are Tahoka residents; neither was listed as injured. A 9-year-old boy in the Chevrolet and a 17-year-old youth in the Chrysler were listed as having possible injuries. Joel Castillo, 17, was taken by Lynn County EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital for treatment.

Two persons were arrested for public intoxication, two more for possession of a controlled substance, and one person each was jailed on the following charges: Driving while intoxicated (DWI) subsequent offense plus driving while license suspended; no drivers license plus ride not secured by safety belt; surrender on possession with intent to deliver controlled substance, plus driving while license suspended; disorderly conduct plus possession of marijuana under two ounces; DWI first offense; DWI second offense; driving while license suspended.

Grand Jury Returns Murder Indictments

A Lynn County grand jury last week returned four murder indictments in the June 29 beating death of Jimmy Ramos Jr. of Wilson. The 106th District Court grand jury also returned new indictments in the case of the shooting of a Texas Tech student Jan. 8, and indicted nine other persons on charges mostly related to driving while intoxicated or drug use or possession.

Paxton Kubica and Seth Peace, both 20, from Lubbock, were indicted on one count each of attempted capital murder, aggravated kidnapping and aggravated robbery. The two previously had been indicted in Lynn County on charges of attempted capital murder, but the new indictments were made to include the events in Lubbock County, so those charges will be handled in Lynn County.

Victim of the kidnapping and shooting was Corey Sloan, 20, a Tech student who said he was taken from his apartment in Lubbock and then taken to an abandoned house about 13 miles northwest of Tahoka, where he was shot in the head, but survived the attack.

Another suspect in the case, Jean Looney, 20, of Lubbock, remains free on \$200,000 bond, charged with criminal conspiracy for coordinating the abduction. Officers believe she was retaliating for unwelcome advances from Sloan on a Texas Tech band trip.

In the beating death of Ramos, Domingo Rios Jr., 29, of Wilson was indicted for murder and was in Lynn County jail in lieu of \$100,000 bond. Three others were indicted by the grand jury in the case, all listed as

Lubbock residents. They are Ray Carrizales, 18, Ruben Martinez, 18, and Linda Medellin Villela, 38. Officers believe the four lured Ramos to a park near Wilson school and beat him.

Other indictments and the charges included:

Stephen Scott Conner, 29, of Lubbock, possession of LSD and methamphetamine.

Randale Young Hambricht, 27, of Midland, felony driving while intoxicated.

Eddy Ray Cook, 33, of Tahoka, DWI.

James Lynn Roper, 24, of Lubbock, DWI.

Raul Rodriguez Quintero, 32, of Tahoka, DWI.

Jose Louis Garcia Jr., 35, of Wilson, possession of a prohibited weapon.

Vincente Rodriguez Valdez, 60, of Amarillo, and Esteban Alvarez, 61, of O'Donnell, each charged with delivery of marijuana over 5 pounds and less than 50 pounds.

Gregory Michael Brooks, 41, of Lubbock, DWI. Brooks on the same day entered a plea of guilty before Judge George Hansard and was sentenced to five years in prison.

Judge Hansard also heard a plea of guilty from Jeffery Kent McLaurin, who was given a 10-year probated sentence for using a prohibited substance in a correctional facility.

Judge Hansard also revoked probation for Audrey Medill, 29, of Tahoka, on a forgery conviction, and she was assessed a two-year term in prison.



Don Morton Announces For Commissioner

Don Morton of Wilson is announcing his candidacy for Precinct 1 Commissioner, Lynn County, the term for which the late Jacky Henry of Tahoka had won nomination. Morton was named by the county Democratic committee as candidate for the job.

Morton has been a lifetime resident of Wilson, where he has operated a welding shop for 30 years. He served three terms on the Wilson City Council, and two terms as mayor. "I also am familiar with the operation of road maintenance equipment," he said.

Morton married Peggy Polk in 1961 and they have two grown children. Don and Peggy are members of Wilson Baptist Church.

"If elected to serve as precinct one commissioner, I will do my very best to meet all the obligations and needs of the office," Morton said.

The election will be on the general election ballot on Nov. 5.

Awards, Contests Highlight Festival

A large crowd gathered at the Tahoka downtown square Saturday for the annual Lynn County Harvest Festival, under gray skies which threatened rain and, in fact, sprinkled intermittently on a sea of umbrellas during the afternoon and forced the street dance to the Lynn County Showbarn that evening.

Highlighting the day's events were the Harvest Festival Queen and Princess contests and an awards presentation for the Tahoka Man and Woman of the Year presented by the City of Tahoka.

Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon presented Amy Preston, a lifelong resident of Tahoka involved in many civic and church organizations, as the 1996 Woman of the Year, expressing appreciation for her "distinguished and dedicated community service" and presenting her with an engraved plaque. Man of the Year was awarded to Keith Paschal, a local plumber, for his involvement in various community events and organizations, many of which involve the youth of the community.

Robin Martin, a senior at Tahoka High School and daughter of Bobby and Sherry Martin and Suetta and Pat Green, was named 1996 Harvest Festival Queen from among 11 contestants. She will receive a \$200 scholarship from the Harvest Festival Committee and a \$100 scholarship from

Tahoka Chamberettes upon her graduation from high school.

Micah Smith, also a senior, was first runnerup in the Queen contest, and freshman Kassidi Andrews was second runnerup. Contestant Crystal McAllister, a junior, had high ticket sales and received \$200 from the Harvest Festival Committee. She sold 743 tickets for the Mexico trip. In all, Queen contestants raised \$2,837 for the Harvest Festival in ticket sales.

The 17 Princess contestants sold 6,382 tickets for the Harvest Festival. Meghan Saldana, a third grader and daughter of Pam Ashcraft, was named Harvest Festival Princess with the most ticket sales. She received a \$100 savings bond donated by First National Bank of Tahoka. Third grader Samantha Andrews received a \$75 savings bond as first runnerup, and sixth grader Ashley Wilson received a \$50 savings bond as second runnerup.

Many area citizens received prizes through the hourly merchant drawings donated by area businesses, and several raffle drawings were held during the day, including a trip for two to Mexico won by Darrell Franks of Lubbock from the Queen's ticket raffle.

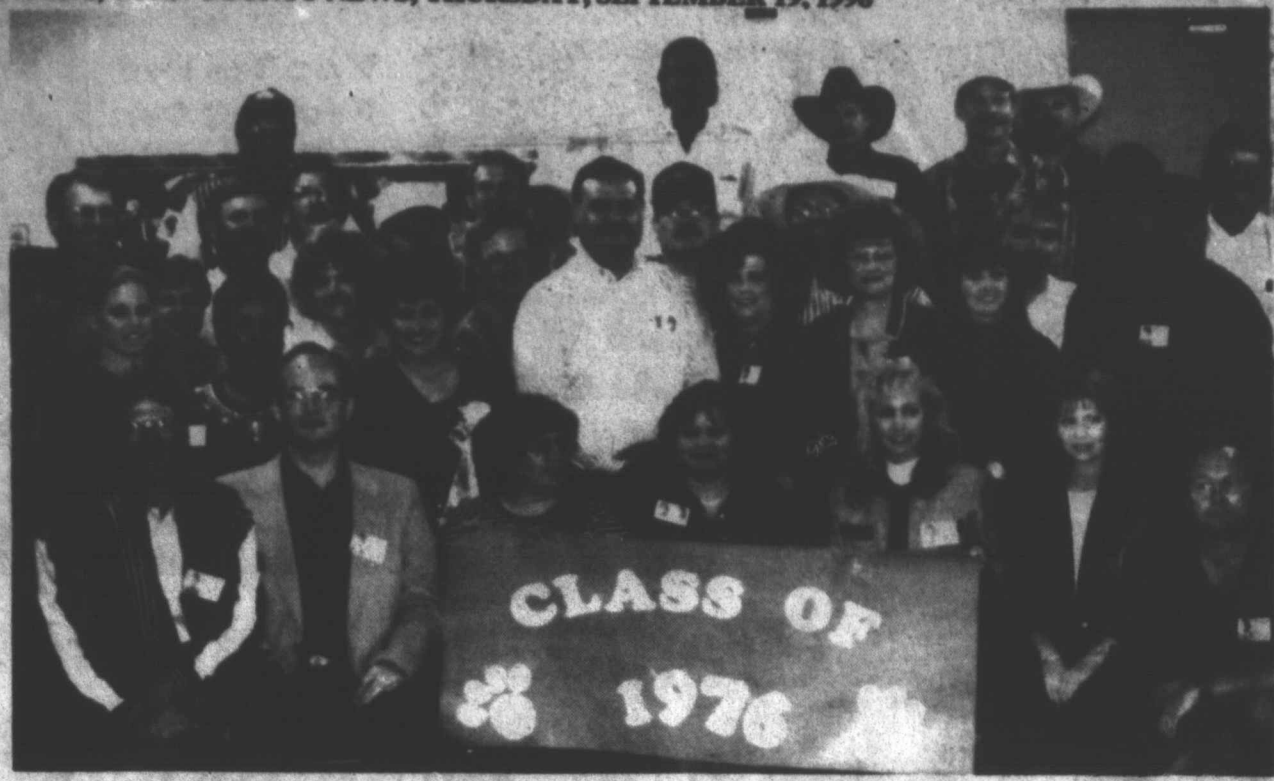

School Officials Request Doctor's Note For Students

Students who miss school to attend a doctor's appointment or other health-care professionals are now required to bring a note from that doctor's office to school, according to information from Tahoka Independent School District officials this week.

Due to a change in state law and new regulations by the Texas Education Agency, these notes will be required in order to provide documentation for counting students present for funding issues, according to school officials.

"We apologize for the inconvenience, however, most doctor's offices are familiar with having to provide notes for school children," said Tahoka High School Principal Jimmy Parker.

Beginning Monday, Sept. 23, a student of Tahoka I.S.D. should bring a note if he/she misses school because of an appointment with one of the following health-care facilities: medical doctor, eye doctor, dentist/orthodontist, health clinic, psychologist, sports rehabilitation clinic, immunization clinic, or chiropractor.

Bulldogs Down Lorenzo 20-14

Dustin Burleson gained 173 yards in 24 carries and scored two touchdowns as the Tahoka Bulldogs outlasted a tough Lorenzo team 20-14 at homecoming here last Friday.

Burleson scored on two 9-yard runs and Reggie Moore scored on an 8-yard run, all in the second half as Tahoka came from behind a 6-0 halftime score. Moore gained 71 yards in 9 carries, so both he and Burleson averaged more than 7 yards per carry.

Lorenzo did not lay down and roll over for the Dogs, however. Led by the hard running of Juan Hernandez and the pass-catching and defensive work of Lupe Salinas, the Hornets put a lot of pressure on the Bulldogs, especially in the first half. Hernandez gained most of his 113 yards rushing in the first half.

Lorenzo took a 3-0 lead in the first quarter as Everett Green kicked a 21-yard field goal, and made it 6-0 in the second period when Green kicked a 37-yarder.

Trailing at halftime, Tahoka came back midway of the third quarter with a drive which mainly featured hard running by Reggie Moore. Burleson scored the touchdown and Matt Garcia kicked the point to make it 7-6, Tahoka. With less than a minute left in the quarter, Burleson went 9 for his second touchdown and Garcia again kicked the point.

Early in the fourth, Lorenzo

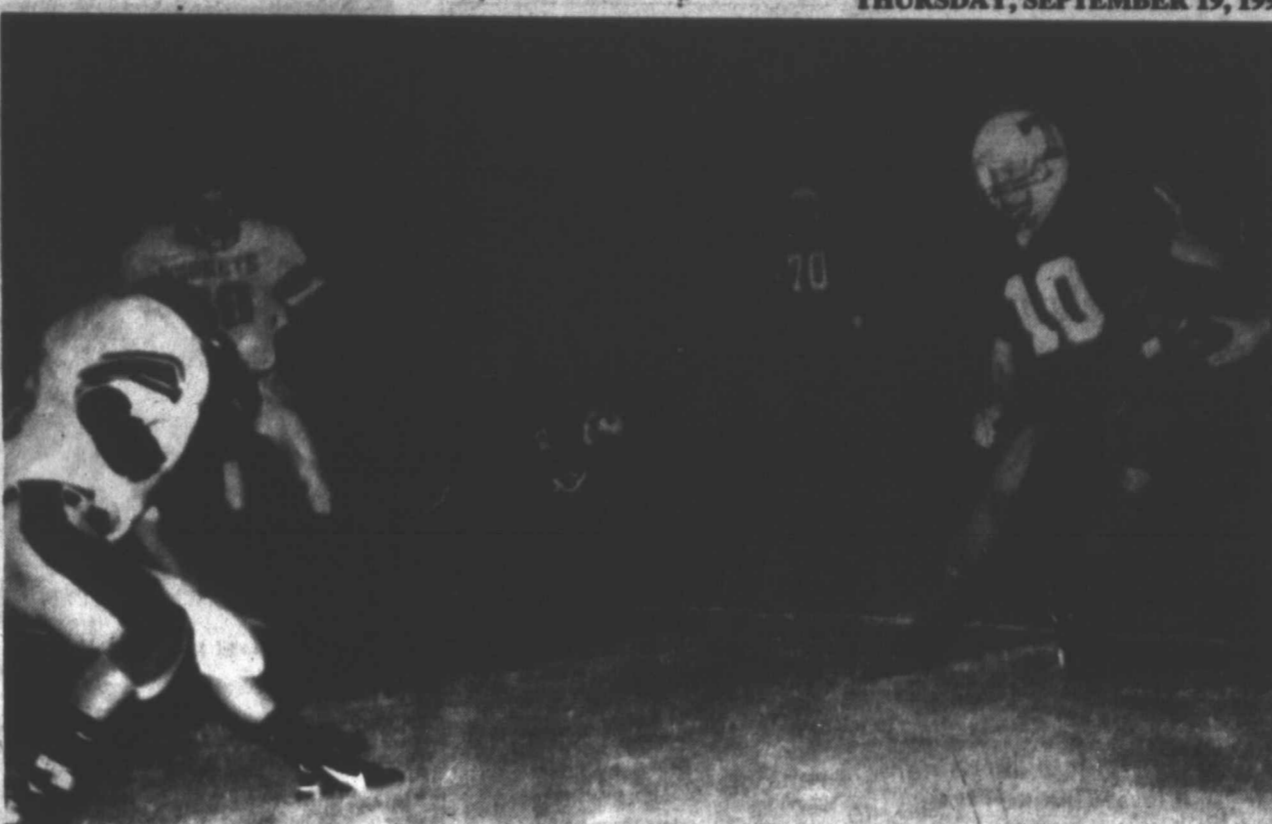

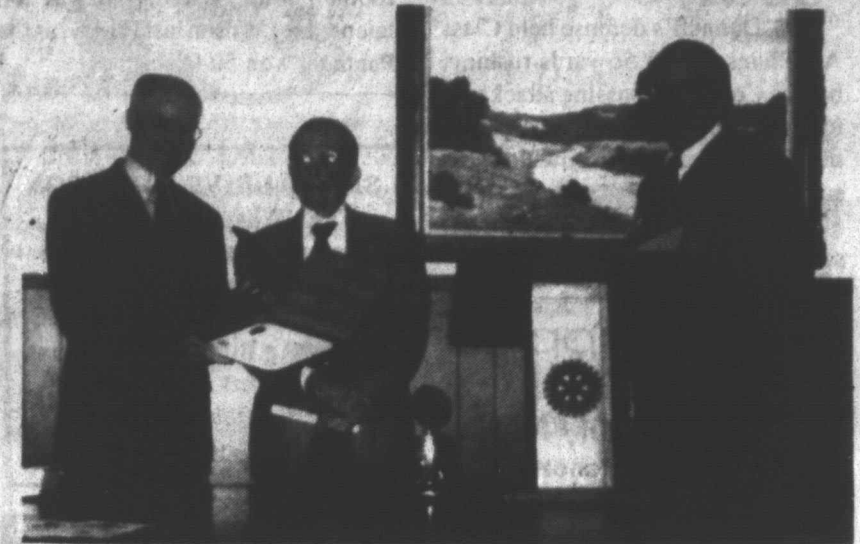
