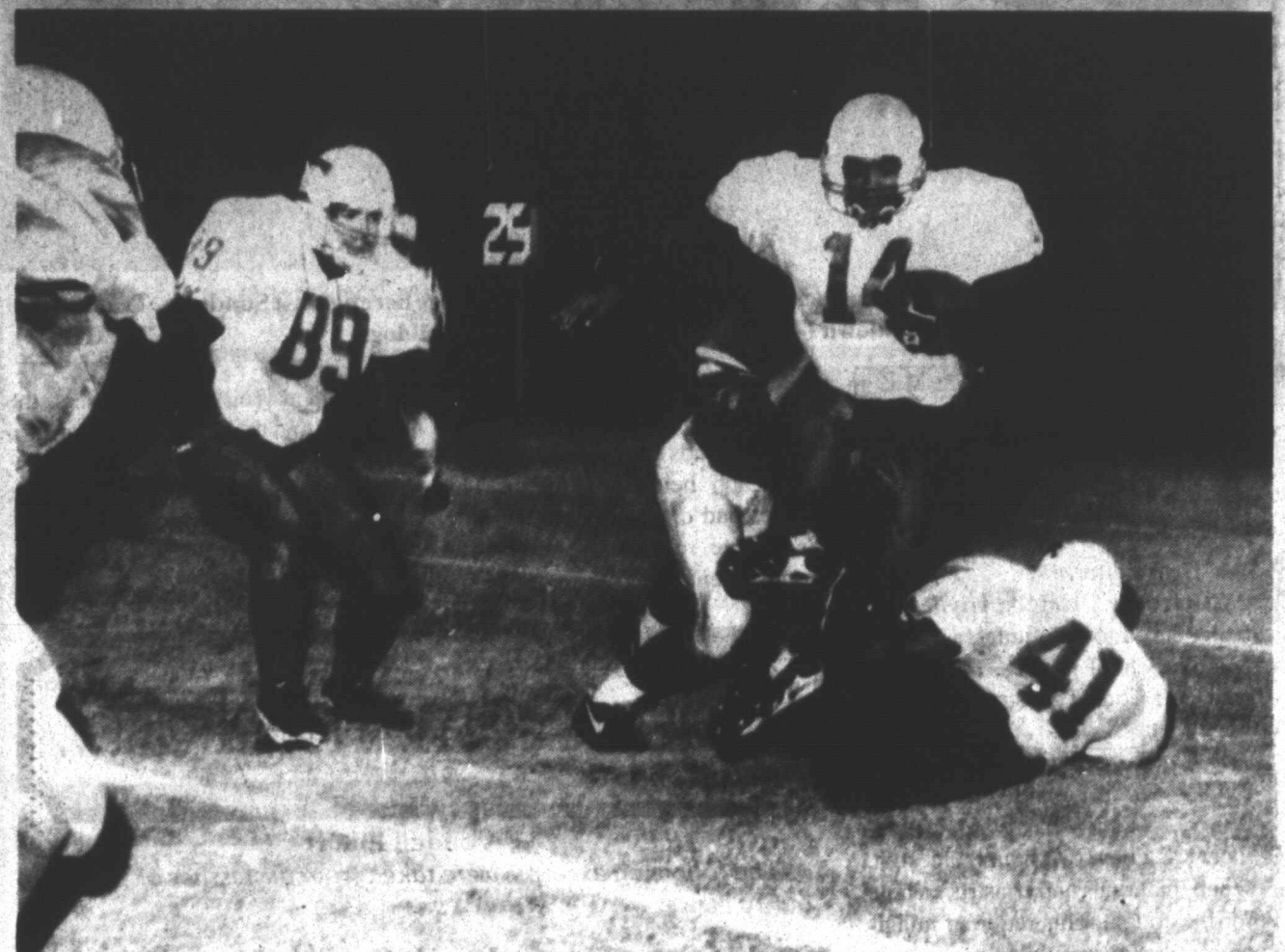

Democratic Commissioner Nominees Elected Here

Two Democratic nominees for seats on the Lynn County Commissioners Court to fill vacancies left by the deaths of commissioners T.A. Stone and Jacky Henry won over independent and write-in candidates in Tuesday's elections.

With 4,127 persons registered to vote in the county, a total of 2387 ballots were cast, considered a good turnout for this county, according to County Clerk Ima Robinson.

Mike Braddock won the Precinct 2 commissioner seat with 284 votes. Bill Sawyer was second in the race with 125, and Lena Williams was third with 77. Others on the ballot were Jay Womack, 35 votes, Gary McCord 29, and Cliff Laws 24.

Don Morton won the Precinct 1 commissioner spot with 388 votes to 117 for write-in candidate Manuel Zamora.

In the special election for State Senator, District 28, replacing John Montford, who resigned to take the Texas Tech chancellor's job, Lynn County gave the most votes to former Lubbock Mayor David Langston, 717 votes in this county. Second in the county was Republican Robert Duncan of Lubbock, a former state representative, with 542 votes. Throughout the district, Duncan had a lead over Langston, a Democrat, and the two should be in a runoff election in December. Of the other five candidates, Tim Lambert was third in the district, and in the county, where he had 246 votes.

Democratic incumbent David Counts won re-election to his Dist. 70 seat in the state House of Representatives, according to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, which said Counts had 51 per cent of votes to 49 per cent for Republican challenger Scott McLaughlin of Big Spring. McLaughlin carried Lynn County with 1056 votes to 974 for Counts.

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry, whose 13th district includes Lynn County, was an easy winner over Democrat Samuel Silverman. In Lynn, Thornberry had 1481 votes to 589 for Silverman.

Lynn County voted modest margins for most Republican candidates in national and state races, giving Bob Dole 1151 votes to 903 for Bill Clinton for president. Ross Perot got 136 votes in the county. Other county results:

Dogs Play Tough, But Sundown Wins 29-21

Tahoka played well against rugged Sundown Friday, but the Roughnecks scored a touchdown in the last period to win 29-21, the third straight loss by the Bulldogs to strong district teams after a 6-0 start this season.

The Bulldogs will close out their season at home Friday hosting Plains, which last week beat Morton 42-6.

Coach Troy Hinds said the Bulldogs "really played a good game against Sundown."

Sundown led 7-0 after a first quarter touchdown pass of 31 yards from QB Jason Holdman to Steve Ewerz and an extra point kick by Damon Edgett. Tahoka tied the score in the second when Reggie Moore ran a yard for a touchdown and Matt Garcia kicked the point.

Sundown regained the lead 16-7 at halftime after Holdman ran 48 yards to score, and Edgett kicked a field goal.

Tahoka's biggest gain of the first quarter was a 19-yard run by Randy Bureson. He also ran for 14 in the second quarter scoring drive, and Garcia had a 15-yard run.

Dustin Bureson had a 45-yard run in the second quarter, and ran 14 yards to score in the third, adding a 2-point run and bringing the score to 23-13 at that point. Later in the quarter, Reggie Moore scored from the 3 and a running try for points which would have tied it failed, leaving Tahoka behind by 23-21 going into the final quarter.

Sundown scored the clinching TD after a Tahoka punting effort went awry and the Roughnecks took over on the Bulldogs 7.

Dustin Bureson had 107 yards rushing, Reggie Moore gained 67 on the ground, and Randy Bureson gained 32.

Car Fire, Traffic Mishap Reported

Council Considers Bids For Vehicle

Tahoka City Council met Monday evening for a routine agenda, although the board did go into closed session for a half hour, citing personnel reasons. No action was taken regarding personnel in return to open session.

In other business, the council considered bid proposals for a new vehicle for the city administrator's use. After some discussion, councilmen authorized City Administrator Jerry Webster to seek more bids to present to the council.

Police Chief Randy Smith reported on the Tahoka Police Dept.'s activities during the month, and a fire department report was presented. During the past few weeks, city workers have checked the fire hydrants throughout the city, and it was reported that most were in good working order although some work is needed on some of the hydrants.

Monthly bills were also approved by the council.

All council members were present for the meeting, including Mike Mensch, Ray Box, Jay Dee House, John Chapa Jr. and Rudy Tejada Jr., as well as Mayor Jim Solomon.

Over \$2900 was raised for the Life Enrichment Center project in Tahoka this past Saturday, during the Gospel Fiesta held all day long at the Tahoka High School Gym. A drawing was conducted by Tahoka Girl Scouts during the evening for their raffle of artwork donated by Ricky Hall, and \$432 in proceeds from those ticket sales also benefitted the Life Enrichment Center.

Donations at the door amounted to just over \$2,000 for the day, and concession proceeds contributed another \$478. Total funds raised amounted to \$2,918.26, including the Girl Scout contribution.

The musical entertainment began at 11 a.m. and continued throughout the day, with closing ceremonies just after 9 o'clock that night. Many local and area musicians of all ages donated their time and talents for the event, which was well-attended by area residents.

During closing ceremonies, Retha Pittman, Project Director for the Life Enrichment Center, told Gospel Fiesta coordinator Myrtle White, "This is what it's all about—all of us coming together with one common goal. Thank you for making this possible."

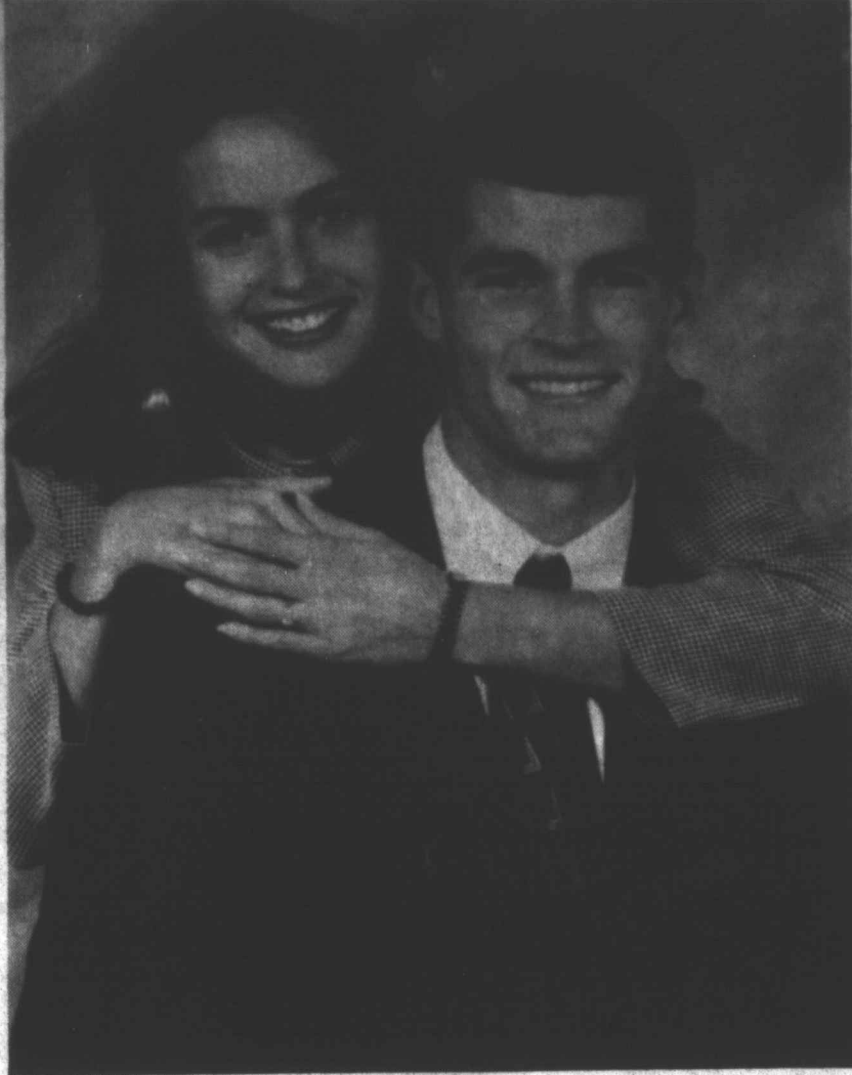

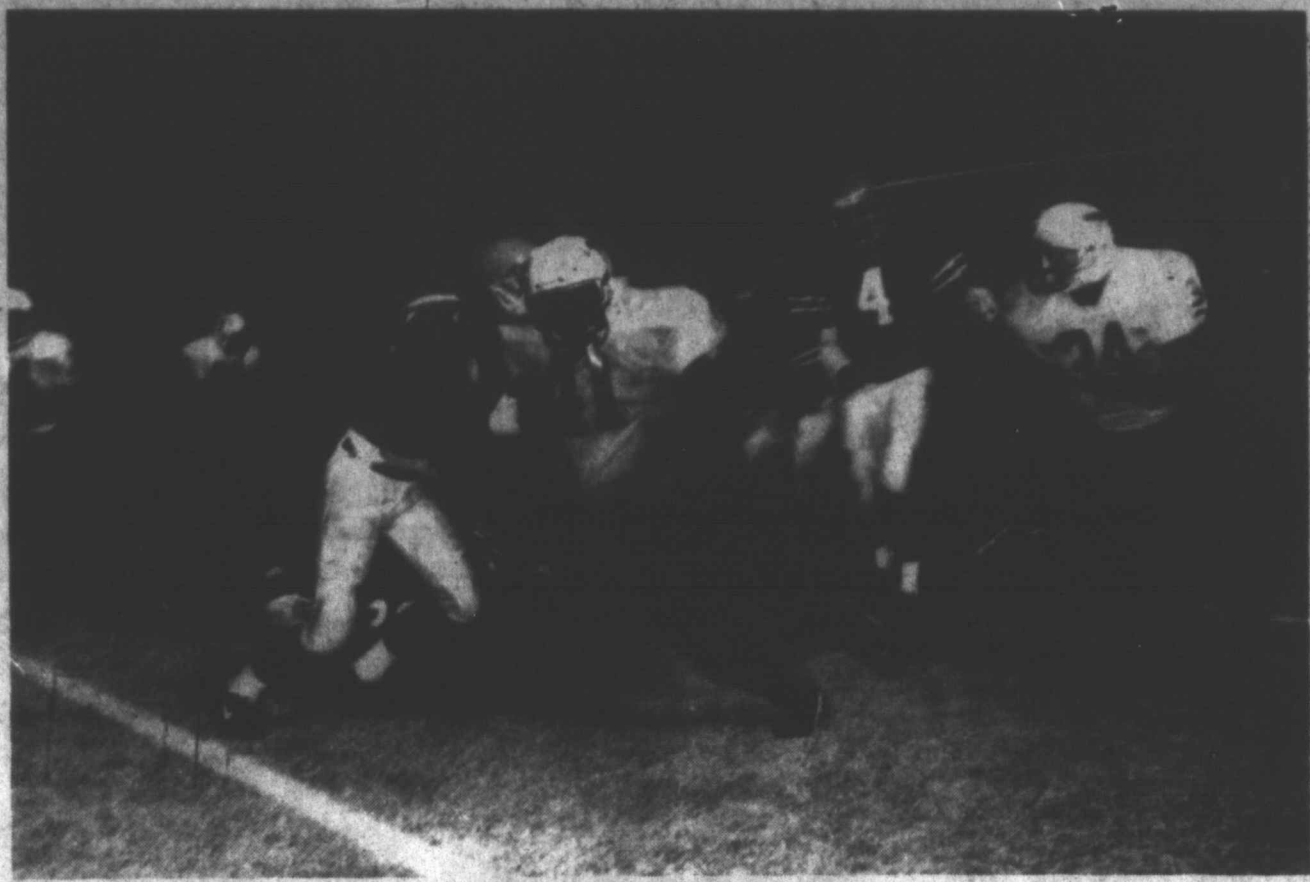
Miniature Helmets To Be Auctioned

Pages From The Past...

The following excerpts were taken from past issues of The Lynn County News.

Murder Case Draws Large Crowds Here Roberts Case On Trial Here Hotly Contested Case Being Argued By Attorneys In District Court This Week

The Adlee Roberts murder case has been on trial in the district court here since Monday morning. As we go to press Thursday morning, Judge McGuire is preparing his charge to the jury, which will be followed by argument of the counsel. The case will probably go to the jury soon after noon today (Thursday).

It has been a hotly contested case all of the way through. When the case was called for trial Monday morning, defendant's counsel filed a motion asking the court to quash the jury panel on the alleged grounds that the jurors had not been selected from the proper tax rolls of the county. After hearing evidence on this matter Judge McGuire over-ruled the motion and required the defendant to go to trial. Jurors were examined exhaustively as to their qualifications and a number of them were challenged for cause. The selection of a jury was not completed until shortly before noon Tuesday.

The taking of testimony began soon after noon Tuesday. Earl McNarlin was the first witness called by the State. He testified that he went with Calvin Petty, the deceased, from O'Donnell out to the residence of the defendant on the afternoon of the killing; that Petty went out to try to induce Roberts to withdraw a complaint which he had filed against Oscar Petty in the Justice Court at Tahoka; that upon arrival at the home of Roberts, Roberts came out and after a brief conversation Petty told him that he had come out to try to get him to dismiss that case, that they refused to withdraw it and told Petty that he didn't think that it was any of Roberts' business either. A few hot words followed and Roberts turned and started back into the house after his gun. At this juncture, witness, McNarlin, jumped out of the car trying to dissuade him from doing so, when Mrs. Roberts appeared on the porch and levelled a gun on him. He stopped and turned back to the car. In the meantime Petty was trying to start the car but could not get it started. While still trying to start it, Roberts emerged from his door with a double barrel shot-gun and immediately fired at Petty. The shot took effect in Petty's right arm. Petty got out of the car on the east side -- it was facing north -- and Roberts shot a second time. This shot took effect in Petty's side and he fell to the ground. Roberts then levelled the gun at him and he ran. Both witness and Petty were begging Roberts all of the time not to shoot and they had their hands up. He left on foot and Roberts followed him, telling him to stop and promising that he would not shoot. McNarlin left, however, and a few minutes later went to O'Donnell for a physician.

Dr. Campbell went out to the scene of the killing accompanied by Bert Bailey, a real estate dealer. They found Petty in a dying condition, and he lived only a short time after they arrived. He told the doctor and Bailey that he was going to die. Bailey testified that Petty said to him: "Go get my wife; I am going to die; and I want you to tell the world that I was shot down in cold blood." At the close of this testimony the State rested.

The defendant took the stand in his own behalf. He testified that he and his wife had gone to O'Donnell in a wagon on the morning of March 28th. While there Calvin Petty told him that if he didn't withdraw the complaint he would kill him before sundown. While on his way home in his wagon, Calvin Petty passed him twice in his car. Afternoon Calvin and McNarlin came to his house, and when he went out to the car they grabbed him and dragged him into the car. He had a scuffle with them. When he got loose Petty had a pistol trying to shoot him.

Mrs. Petty testified, corroborating her husband, as did their twelve year old daughter also.

While the defendant was on the stand Tuesday afternoon, he also testified about an alleged conversation that he had with Judge Lockhart, who is assisting in the prosecution, in which he sought to employ Lockhart to represent him. To one of the statements that defendant made as a witness, Lockhart called him a liar, which drew the assessment of a fine by the court. When court adjourned that afternoon, Judge Lockhart apologized to the court, but his apology was followed immediately by a colloquy with Judge Price representing the defendant, which resulted in a few blows being struck between them. Friends interfered, however, and the combatants were promptly separated.

Judge Lockhart and Tom Garrard of Lubbock are assisting district attorney A. Gibson in the prosecution. J.E. Vickers of Lubbock, T.T. Price of Post, and B.P. Maddox of Tahoka are defending.

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1997 Pre-Plant Soil Moisture Survey Begins November 11

Personnel from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service will begin collecting data for the 1997 pre-plant soil moisture survey on Nov. 11.

The survey is conducted annually to determine general pre-plant soil moisture availability and deficit trends within the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District service area. Using this information, area producers can conserve ground water by applying only what is needed to bring the soil profile to field capacity during pre-plant irrigation.

Three teams will begin collecting data for the 1997 pre-plant soil moisture survey in the northern portions of the District.

Gerald Crenwelge and Michael Forsythe will make readings in Armstrong, Randall, and Potter counties. Glenn Blackmon and Arnold Husky will begin their data

collection in Deaf Smith, Parmer, and Castro counties. Scott Libby will gather data in Floyd County.

"Soil moisture conditions are measured first in the northern counties of the District in order to avoid bad weather and to allow adequate time before producers begin irrigating winter crops," said Ken Carver, Water District Assistant Manager. Weather permitting, the entire data collection process should be completed by Dec. 23.

Precipitation information will also be gathered from rain gauges installed at each of the 300 permanent soil moisture monitoring sites.

Selection of these sites is based upon soil types, local saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates possible well yields, and local crop water requirements. Each site is representative of typical local dryland or irrigated farming practices.

Water District and USDA-NRCS personnel use neutron moisture meters to gather soil moisture data. Readings are taken at six-inch intervals throughout the five-foot root zone soil profile by lowering a neutron probe into a previously-installed aluminum access tube.

Data collected during the pre-plant soil moisture survey is used to construct maps illustrating the amount of soil moisture available for plant use within the root zone soil profile and the amount of water needed to bring the soil profile to field capacity.

These maps, as well as the results of the 1997 pre-plant soil moisture survey, will be distributed to area news media and will be published in the Water District's monthly newsletter, "The Cross Section," prior to the pre-plant irrigation season.

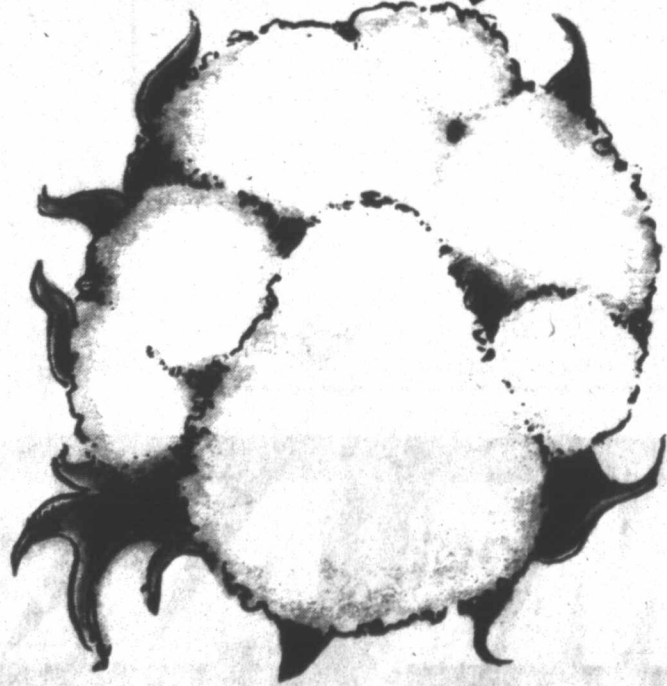

Great American Smokeout Celebrates 20 Years

On November 21, 1996 the American Cancer Society's Great American Smokeout will be 20 years old. For two decades, the staff and volunteers of the American Cancer Society have used the Great American Smokeout to help smokers quit cigarettes for at least one day.

In a new twist to an old problem, the American Cancer Society is focusing efforts on children and teenagers because most smokers start before they reach the age of 18. By helping young people resist starting to smoke in the first place, the American Cancer Society hopes that future generations will not have to struggle to break an addiction to nicotine.

Since the inception of the Great American Smokeout, the smoking rate of American adults has dropped from 36% to 25%. Unfortunately, an estimated 177,000 new cases of lung cancer are expected to be diagnosed by the end of 1996. Another estimated 158,700 Americans will have died from lung cancer during 1996.

The Great American Smokeout is a time for Americans to renew their commitment to a smoke-free environment for themselves and for the children.

For smokers who quit, the American Cancer Society has the following statistics, according to the length of time they don't smoke:

20 Minutes: Blood pressure drops, pulse rate drops to normal, body temperature of hands and feet increases to normal.

8 Hours: Carbon monoxide level in blood drops to normal, oxygen level in blood increases to normal.

24 Hours: Chance of heart attack decreases.

48 Hours: Nerve endings start regrowing, ability to smell and taste is enhanced.

2 Weeks to 3 Months: Circulation improves, walking becomes easier, lung function increases up to 30%.

1 to 9 Months: Coughing, sinus congestion, fatigue, shortness of breath decrease; cilia regrow in the lungs, increasing ability to handle mucus, clean lungs, and reduce infection; body's overall energy increases.

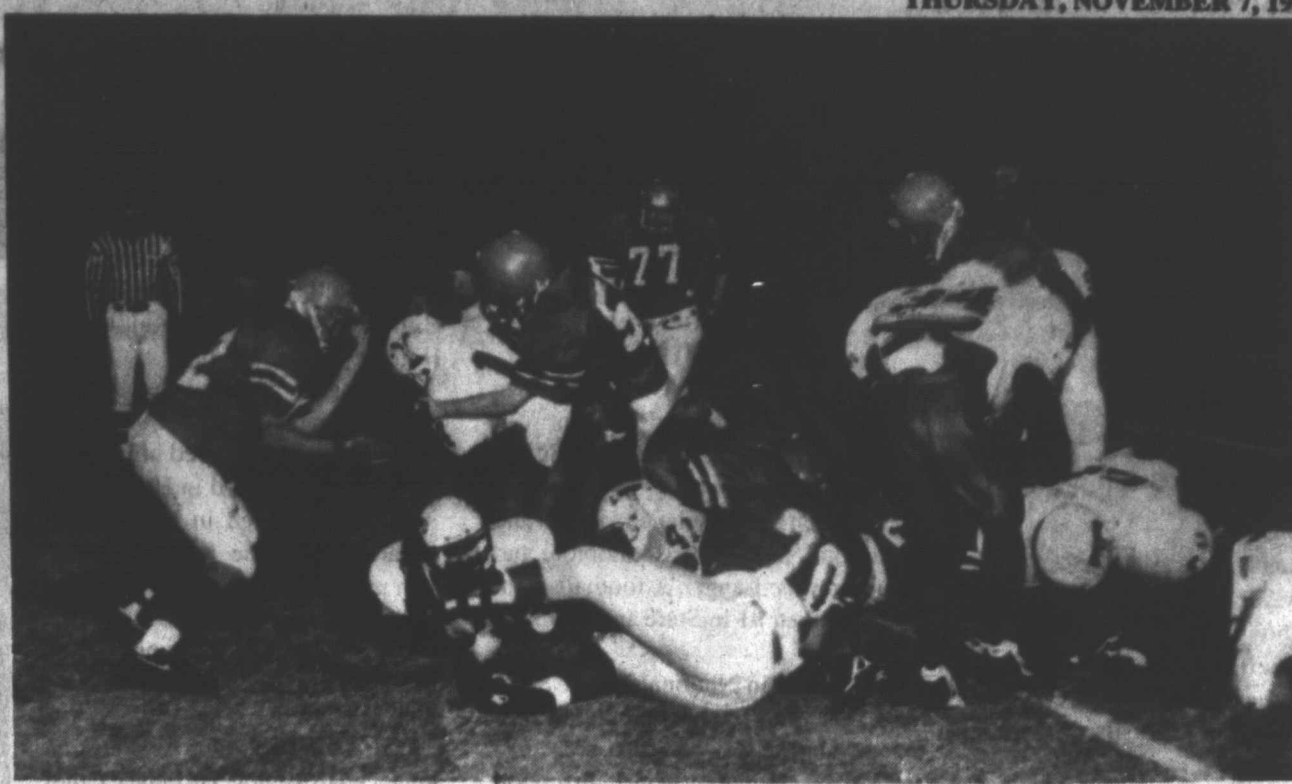
1 Year: Excess risk of coronary heart disease is half that of a smoker.

5 Years: Lung cancer death rate for average former smoker (one pack a day) decreases by almost half; stroke risk is reduced to that of a nonsmoker 5-15 years after quitting; risk of cancer of the mouth, throat and esophagus is half that of a smoker's.

10 Years: Lung cancer death rate similar to that of nonsmokers; precancerous cells are replaced; risk of cancer of the mouth, throat, bladder, kidney and pancreas decreases.

15 Years: Risk of coronary heart disease is that of a nonsmoker.

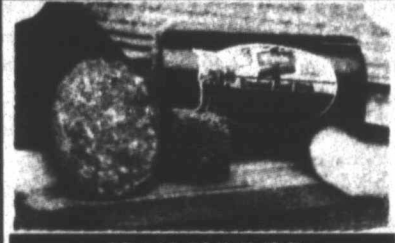

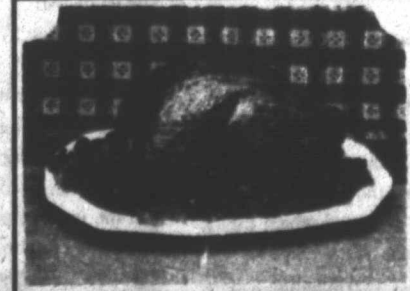

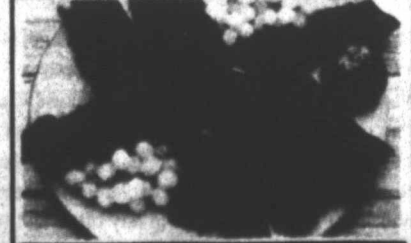

Box 274, New Home, Texas 79383 has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (Commission) for an amendment to Permit No. 10632-01 to authorize an increase in the effluent limitation from 30 mg/l to 100 mg/l. The permittee is also requesting a variance to the monitoring frequency for biological oxygen demand from once per week to once per month. The permit currently authorizes the disposal of treated domestic wastewater via evaporation and irrigation on agricultural land. The disposal volume is not to exceed a daily average flow of 50,000 gallons per day, which will remain the same. Application rates for the irrigation system are not to exceed 4.2 acre-ft/acre/year. No discharge of pollutants into the waters of the State is authorized by this permit.

The wastewater treatment facilities and the disposal site are located approximately 0.25 mile northwest of the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 1730 and State Highway 211 in Lynn County, Texas. This location is in the drainage area of the Double Mountain Fork Brazos River in Segment No. 1241 of the Brazos River Basin.

The Executive Director of the TNRCC has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, would establish the parameters and limitations within which the facility must operate.

The Executive Director will issue the permit unless a written hearing request is filed within 30 days after newspaper publication of this notice. To request a hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) the name of the applicant and the permit number; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing;" (4) a brief description of how you would be adversely affected by the granting of the application in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing.

If a hearing request is filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit and will forward the application and hearing request to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a hearing is held, it will be a legal proceeding similar to civil trials in state district court.

Requests for hearing on this application must be submitted in writing during the 30-day notice period to the Chief Clerk's Office, MC 105, TNRCC, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, TX 78711-3087, telephone (512) 239-3307. Written public comments may also be submitted to the Chief Clerk's Office during the notice period. 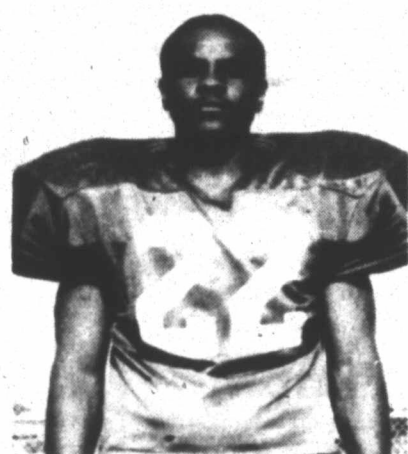
