The Baird Star was notified by the Texas Highway Department this week that funds for the roads to be built under Senate Bill 287 will become available in September of this year, the Highway Commission has taken immediate action to program roads in order to insure quick work as construction funds

In Callahan county, the following described roads are hereby designated as Farm-To-Market Roads subject to the availability of funds under the terms of Senate Bill No. 287 and subject to the condition that Callahan County will furnish all required right-of-way free of cost to the State:

From end F.M. 1079, 5.5 miles South of Putnam, South to road intersection, a distance of approximately 4.5 miles.

From end F. M. 1078, 5 miles South of Clyde, South to road intersection, a distance of approximately 4.0 miles.

Upon acceptance of the provisions of this Order by the proper officials of Callahan County the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for construction at an estimated cost of \$63,750 and when right-ofway and funds are available to son, both of Houston. proceed with construction and to assume the roads for maintenance upon completion of construction.



JGE TELESCOPE READY) START MAPPING HEAVENS A huge new telescope known as 48-inch Schmidt began apping the universe Tuesday


And therefrom hangs a tale and from the tale a moral. The story is that a scientist ho defied convention and esblished authority to bring the orlds beyond human vision ito closer focus. An obscure cident in the life of this ientist points the moral, hich has to do with the value an open mind.

Twenty years ago Bernard chmidt, a German optician, inented a new kind of telescope. had a corrective lens which ould bend light rays in such a ay as to yield clearer photoraphs of stars. European asonomers were skeptical, howver, and preferred to stick to d-style telescopes despite their

omicaly history.

During the next four years ne Schmidt will be busy photoraphing some three-fourths of he heavens, taking pistures of tars up to 300 million light ears away. By studying the esulting "sky atlas," astronoiers will be able to determine here they want to aim the chmidt's "working partner," he 200-inch Hale telescope hich has a range of one billion ght years.

This is a project that never as been undertaken before, ecause there never was until ow a telescope capable of dong the job. The Schmidt is xpected to discover new stars -perhaps even new systems f stars. But whether it does not, its monumental work a surveying the universe alone ill justify the open-mindedness f American scientists who had aith in the revolutionary ideas glamorous stars of the time in for Charlie's white tie and tails.

With the alarming total of 922 Texans having been attacked by the dread disease poliomyelitis, 1949 bids fair to be the th. worse polio year the State has ever experienced, and health officials in every section of the State are exerting every effort to bring the disease under control.

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, hes re-iterated ferred form the Abilene Soil his appeal for every citizen to cooperate in a continuous cleanup program, ridding their premises of all rubish and trash piles, and any such filth as will afford breeding places for flies and other disease-spreading insects. "This polio situation will never

be controlled without the observance of stringent basic sanitation measures", the State Health Officer declared. "The filth on your premises may cause the disease to attack your neighbor; and the same condition on his premises may cause polio in your home. This problem of controlling polio is one demanding the closest possible cooperation, and until a program of continuous cleaning up is instituted and stringently enforced we shall continue to face the menace of polio in all sections of the State."

Dr. Cox emphasized to parents whose children are suffering from poliomyelitis, the comforting knowledge that about 60 per cent of all cases of recognized polio recover completely, and at least 25 to 30 per cent of recognized cases recover with only minor disableing paralysis.

"Only about 8 per cent of polio victims develop the deadly bulbar type, which affects the nerves at the base, or 'bulb' of the brain," Dr. Cox said. "Most patients suffering from bulbar polio die within a very short time. But it is a comforting thought that 92 per cent of 2

polio patients never develope bulbar polio, and make a partial, or in many cases, complete recovery and are restored to heal-




