# **Assaults, Collision Reported In City**

Two incidents of assaults causing injury to family members and one traffic accident with no injuries were among incidents investigated by Tahoka Police Dept. during the last

On Tuesday afternoon a 1998 Chevrolet Lumina driven by Carollyn Dyke Quisenberry, 46, was involved in a collision at Conway and Lockwood with a 1996 Ford Contour driven by Jerrica Suzanne Mote, 19. Both drivers are Tahoka residents.


Early last Thursday morning a 14-year-old Tahoka youth was arrested at his home for attacking his mother and causing her to fall, injuring her arm. The woman was treated and released at Lynn County Hospital emergency room, and the boy was taken in custody by juvenile authori-

On Saturday night a 19-year-old Tahoka woman told police she had been choked, knocked down and bruised by a man she had been living with, who then took her car without her permission and drove away. Police recovered the car and pre-

sented the case to county and district attorneys for further action. The victim was treated for bruises and then released at Lynn County Hospital emergency room.

Ten persons were jailed during the last week, mostly on liquor law violations. Charges against those arrested included bond surrender on failure to identify to a peace officer. application to revoke probation on conviction for driving while intoxicated (DWI) plus assault plus violation of open container law, criminal trespass plus public intoxication, DWI first offense, DWI third or more plus no drivers license plus no liability insurance, DWI second offense plus driving while license suspended, assault causing bodily injury to family member, DWI second, and warrants on charges of no liability plus no drivers license.

# **Hospital Considers Plans For Any Major Disaster**

The possibility of a terrorist attack of major disaster proportions directly affecting Tahoka and Lynn County is considered remote, but the Lynn County Hospital staff has been studying ways to deal with such an event, administrator Dan Powers told the board of directors last Thursday

"In the event of bacterial or chemical warfare attack, we at least want to have in place some kind of plan to implement certain procedures immediately." Powers said. "And we want you to know that the entire staff of the hospital and clinics is aware of the danger.'

Powers advised the board that a new lab technician from the Philippines, Julie Orzales, has begun work at the hospital, and that Fern Docekal, a physician's assistant, will begin duties as head of the Wellness Clinic on Oct. 15.

Powers also reported more delay in the completion of Lynnwood Assisted Living Center, and said the projected opening date now has been moved back to Nov. 1. Some deposits already have been paid by prospective residents, he noted. Paving, carpeting, and some painting and fin-

ish work still need to be completed. The board toured the facility after the

meeting. Powers also reported that a possible source of financing for a proposed new fitness center has rejected the hospital's application, but he is considering other sources and vowed that if at all possible, "we're going . to get this thing done some way.".

All board members were present. with Billy Tomlinson presiding. Other directors present were Joan Knox, Peggy Morton, Virginia Griffing, Mike Rivas, Dalton Wood and Jerry Ford.
