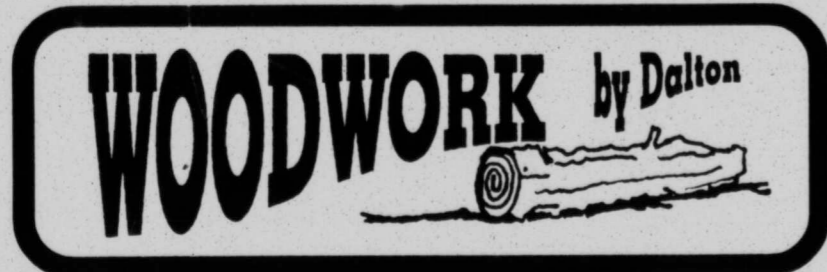

SINCE A FEW years ago when it seemed like airplanes were crashing with more regularity than most travelers are comfortable with, we have been taking most of our longer trips by car. Although traffic on the Interstates is murder, we feel we have some degree of control when we're at the wheel...and we know we keep our car in good mechanical shape. Nor should any wings fall off my vehicle.

And no idiot whose main goal in life is to kill Americans is likely to be riding with you.

Having said all that, it's still pretty dangerous out there on the road, but being careful usually will get you there and back safely.

A few months ago, we took a month-long trip to Florida without any close calls, although driving on I-30 and I-20 through Dallas-Fort Worth was pretty scary.

I felt safer every additional mile we drove away from Lubbock. I figured every mile we drove east that our chances of survival were increasing, because most of the maniacs behind the wheels of cars and pickups were still in Lubbock, trying their best to run over every Lynn County vehicle they could find in town.

Proof that other folks feel the same way came last week in an e-mail called "Lubbock Traffic Laws", and here are a few of the things included:

## Three City Traffic Accidents Listed

Three traffic accidents were reported during the last week in Tahoka, with no injuries listed in any of them.

Last Wednesday on S. 4<sup>th</sup> St. a 2000 Ford Explorer driven by Jackie Lee Swinford, 44, and a 2001 Chevrolet Lumina driven by Mildred Hall, 65, both of Tahoka, collided.

In the 2400-block of N. 5<sup>th</sup> St. Friday a collision involved a 2000 Mitsubishi Galant driven by Maurio Ray Gutierrez, 15, and a 2000 Ford Escort driven by Jayson Allen Gonzales, 16. Both were listed as Tahoka students.

Last Saturday at the intersection of Lockwood and Main Sts. vehicles involved in a collision were a 2002 GMC Yukon driven by Jason Scott Pebsworth, 31, and a 1981 Chevrolet pickup driven by Jesus Carmona Ramirez, 70. Both drivers are Tahoka residents.

One person charged with public intoxication and one charged with DWI first offense were jailed during the week.

Total jail population as of Sept. 25 was 30 prisoners.

Temperatures soared into the 90's, but the crowd remained for the afternoon's events, including the Harvest Festival Princess and Queen contests, and enjoying a wide variety of food booths, games and entertainment from Bangora, who performed on stage throughout the day as well as for the evening's street dance.

Tahoka High School junior Victoria Charo, daughter of Julia Charo and Victor Charo, was named Harvest Festival Queen from a slate of six candidates. THS senior Misty Adams was first runnerup, and THS junior Heather Parsons was second runnerup. Miss Charo will receive a \$500 scholarship from the Harvest Festival Committee.

## Bulldogs Roar Back Over Slaton 38-14

When a team has lost 24 games in a row, it's hard to get a good team inspired to play against them. But after sputtering badly in the first period against the visiting Slaton Tigers, Tahoka finally got serious and rolled to its third victory in four games, 38-14.

Slaton, better than most Bulldog fans anticipated, took an early 6-0 lead, and still owned it at the end of the first quarter, but Tahoka came back with a couple of second-period touchdowns, and in the last half built up a 32-6 lead before Slaton scored again.

As it has been in most of Tahoka's games so far, the passing of QB Brandon McCord and receiving of Adrian Moore—with Michael Nance also coming on strong—were keys to the victory. McCord passed

for four touchdowns, three of them to Nance, and also scored once himself on a 1-yard plunge.

Nance's 51-yard reception for Tahoka's last touchdown was caught at full speed as he raced past all defenders and caught the ball thrown perfectly by McCord. Nance had a total of 135 yards on seven receptions.

In just four games this season, McCord already has more than 1,000 yards passing. He has passed for 1,101 yards and 12 touchdowns. More than half of his passes have been completed, 71 of 124, and just once has he been intercepted.

This Thursday, the Bulldogs will take their "Wes Cope Offense" to Dick Bivens Stadium in Amarillo, where they will play Stratford. Stratford is a far north team which usually gets into the playoffs. They did lose last week to Stinnett West Texas, 46-20. Prior to last week, they were ranked in the top 10 in the state, Class A.

On Tahoka's first possession of the homecoming game, an errant pitchout was recovered by Slaton on the Bulldogs' 17. Then Isaac Escobedo ran 11 yards for a Tiger TD, with the extra point kick failing. Toward the end of the quarter, Tahoka cranked up a long drive which resulted in a touchdown less than two minutes deep into the second quarter, when McCord hit Nance in the end zone from 10 yards away. Biggest play of the drive was a 37-yard completion to Warren Baker. Trey Price kicked the point which put Tahoka ahead 7-6 with 10:27 left in the second.

With just 1:27 left in the half, Moore took a pass just past the line of scrimmage, made several tacklers miss, and juke'd his way 43 yards to score. Price kicked again, and Tahoka led 14-6 at halftime.

McCord, who did more running than usual, drove in from the 1 with 8:14 left in the third, and when the kick failed, it was 20-6. Longest play of that scoring drive was a 31-yard pass to Moore down to the Tigers' 11. Late in the quarter, Tahoka had Slaton backed up to the 4-yard line, but the Tigers came out of it with a 30-yard pass to end Kraig Kern.

In the fourth period, Moore intercepted a Slaton pass and ran it back to the Tigers' 35. McCord promptly

hit Nance with a 35-yard strike for a TD. This extra point kick was missed, as were all the Bulldogs' point tries after the first two scores. That brought the score to 26-9 with 9:37 left in the game.

The next Tahoka score came when running back Matt Wells ran 3 yards, making it 32-6 with 5:49 left. Highlights of that drive were passes of 22 and 11 yards to Josh Pridmore, 17 to Moore and 15 to Nance.

The next score was Slaton's, and it came 12 seconds later when A.J. Samuels, moving more like A.J. Foyt, took the kickoff and raced 75 yards for the touchdown. Escobedo ran for two points to make it 32-14.

Tahoka came right back with its own spectacular play, the 51-yard pass to Nance, to end scoring with 3:27 left.

Moore, top receiver on the South Plains last year, caught six passes for 123 yards, one for a touchdown. McCord also was the top rusher for this game, gaining 60 yards in 10 carries. Wells gained 50 with 16 efforts.

On defense, linebacker Ben Stroope and Wells again led tackling, although the most spectacular hit was by Zach Gutierrez, who came up fast from a defensive back position to smack down Tiger running back Curtis Clinton with a blow that had to hurt in the third quarter.

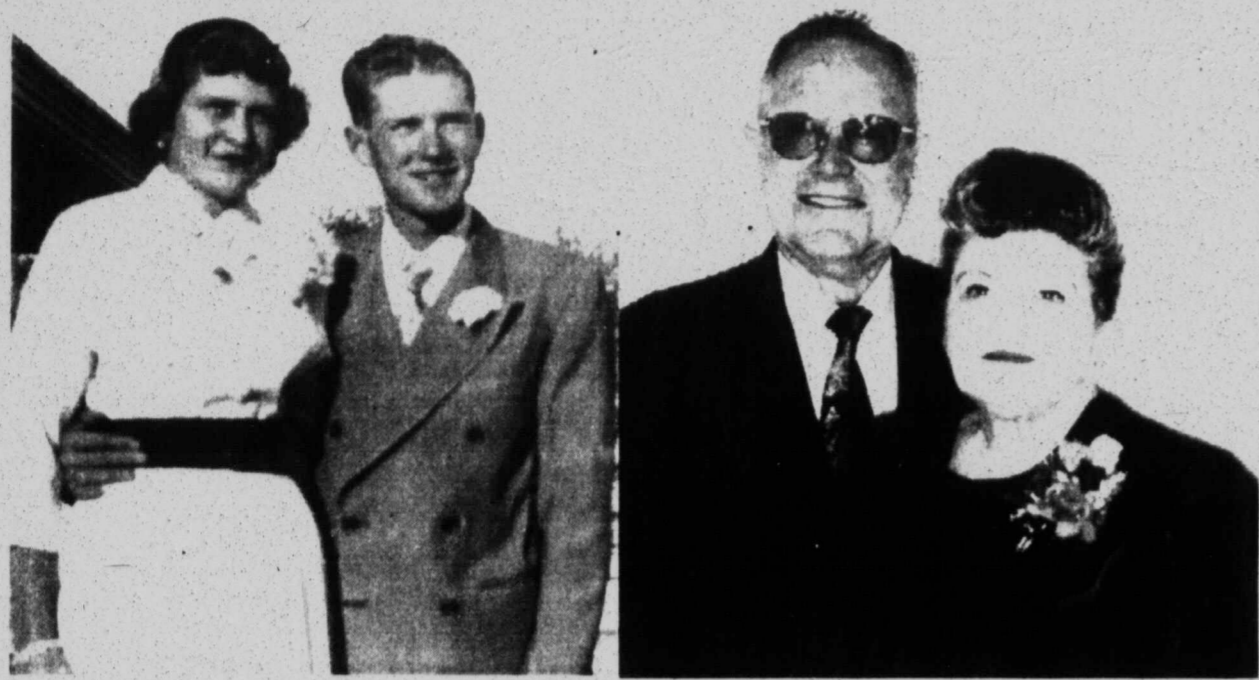

### Judge Schildknecht Attends Conference

Judge Carter Schildknecht, judge of the 106th Judicial District which includes Lynn County, joined more than 600 other Texas judges in an advanced judicial training program in San Antonio Aug. 25-28.

The four-day conference was developed by the Texas Center for the Judiciary, an Austin-based non-profit judicial education group. It was billed as "an advanced judicial training program to provide fresh perspectives and tools for the role of administering justice fairly."

General sessions were conducted on Judicial Independence, Bioethics, Genetics and Law, and Texas Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals case updates. Included were issues of competency and insanity, relationship between judges and county auditors, family group decision-making, court's charges, water litigation, interpreters in the courtroom and other matters of criminal and civil law.

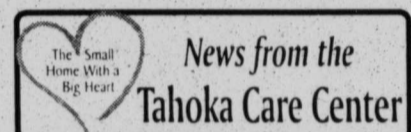
### New Home Nabs Victory Over Patton Springs

### Hospital Sees Problems With New Legislation

New legislation designed primarily to assure patients of privacy regarding medical records and information poses a major problem for all hospitals and particularly those in rural areas, including Lynn County Hospital, the hospital's directors were advised Tuesday night.

A computerized presentation listing all the things hospitals will have to do to comply with the new legislation, called HIPAA, was given to board members, who appeared stunned and angry over the new rules, some of which will go into effect next month.

Jim Morris, recently appointed as privacy officer, a position mandated by the new law, presented the 45-minute CD account of what hospitals are facing.

Co-sponsored by Sen. Edward Kennedy about three years ago, the legislation has federal and state governments ready to pounce on any hospital, doctor or other medical service which allows patient information to be accessed by any unauthorized person, even including hospital staff. Civil and criminal penalties are specified.

Computers are to be upgraded and programmed so that there can be no casual viewing of patient information, and all personnel are to be retrained in the ways they do things, according to hospital administrator Dan Powers.

"This looks to me like legislation with a seemingly good motive which could, in effect, put a lot of hospitals out of business," said board member Dalton Wood.

Powers also advised the board

that he is seeking bids on a new insurance carrier for medical insurance which the hospital carries on all full-time employees. The company which has been carrying the policy has failed to pay many claims on time.

Six new recliners for patient rooms have been purchased by the Hospital Auxiliary, he said, and board members again expressed appreciation for the auxiliary and its help.

The board approved two consulting radiologists from Lubbock, Dr. Gary Simmons and Dr. David Donaldson.

Board president Billy Tomlinson presided. Present other than Powers and Morris were board members Jerry Ford, Wood, Virginia Griffing and Joan Knox. Absent were John Hawthorne and Mike Rivas.

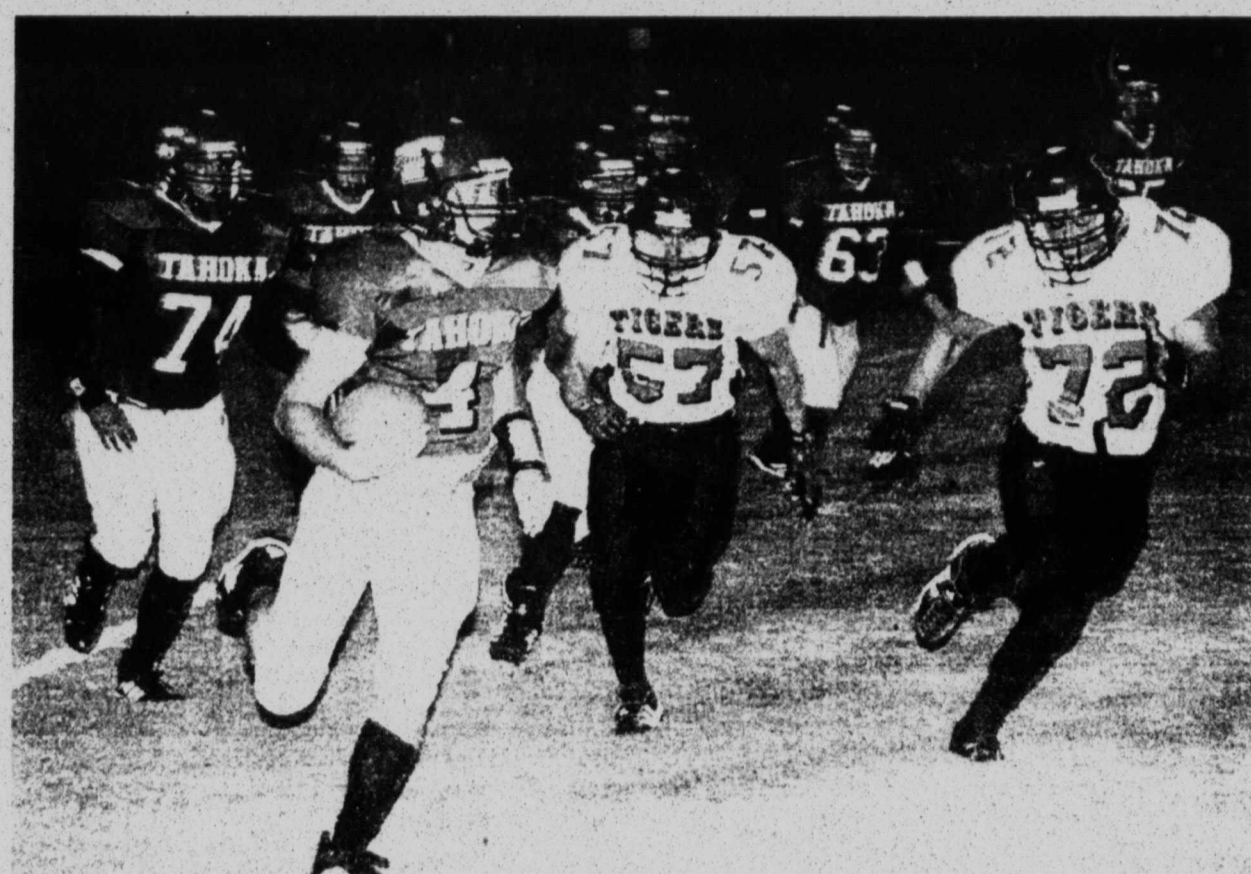

**Cost Savings For County Noted For Indigent Defense**

The cost for providing legal counsel for indigents in district court in Lynn County has decreased. Lynn County Commissioners learned in their meeting Monday when 106th District Judge Carter T. Schildknecht presented information to the court.

Instead of appointing defense attorneys for indigent counsel on a case by case basis, the 106th Judicial District contracted with attorney Artie Aguilar to handle all the indigent cases, contracting with Aguilar for \$50,000 for the 2002 year after receiving several bids for the contract. Judge Schildknecht recommended to commissioners that Lynn, Dawson, Garza and Gaines counties, which comprise the 106th judicial district, continue the practice of contracting annually for indigent defense.

"I have been pleased with the representation that we have had, and was curious to see if it had saved the county money — it looks like it has done so," Judge Schildknecht told commissioners. She presented cost comparisons to the group for February through August, showing that the cost to Lynn County under the contract was \$11,675, compared to an estimated cost without the contract of \$13,302, which is a savings of \$1,627. District-wide, the cost of \$50,000 compared to an estimated cost of \$84,500 for the four-county area, with Dawson County having the highest cost-share with an estimated 45 percent of the total number of defendants.

Judge Schildknecht said Aguilar would contract with the 106th district for the 2003 year for \$60,000, and recommended Lynn County continue contracting for indigent defense.

"He [Aguilar] represents the people well, and works well with the DA's office, and we have been very pleased with his work," Schildknecht told commissioners. "I know it is a

savings in money and also good representation for indigents. With the same person [serving as legal counsel] we are giving the same quality of defense to each indigent," she added.

She also informed the court that Lynn County could apply for state funding to reimburse a portion of county funds spent on indigent defense, and commissioners voted unanimously to apply for such funding. Commissioners will consider the indigent attorney contract at their Oct. 15 meeting.

In other business, Nancy Guilliams was appointed to serve as election judge for Voting Box 9 (West Tahoka, voting usually held at Tahoka High School).

Lynn County Tax Assessor/Collector Sherry Pearce met with the court seeking permission to allow the Texas Department of Transportation to collect funds through internet renewal of vehicle registrations. Beginning in January 2003, she said, the state will implement a new program allowing people to renew their vehicle registration online, paying by credit card. The state will then transfer funds to the respective counties. Since the process will allow state agencies to collect county money, Mrs. Pearce needed permission from the commissioners, which they voted to allow. People may still, however, pay for vehicle registration renewals at the courthouse as usual.

It was noted that Lubbock, Hockley and Dawson counties have approved contracts to jail prisoners at Lynn County Jail. Commissioners approved the South Plains Hazard Mitigation Action Plan, and monthly bills were okayed.

All four commissioners and Judge J.F. Brandon were present at the meeting.

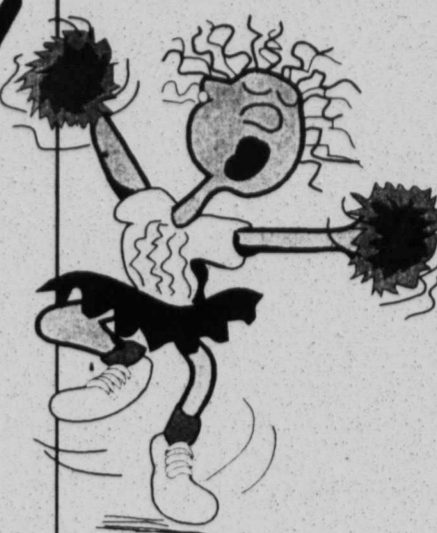

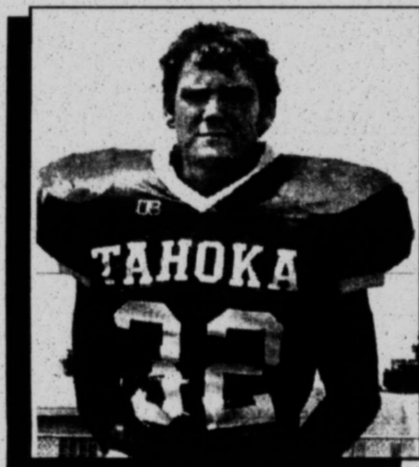

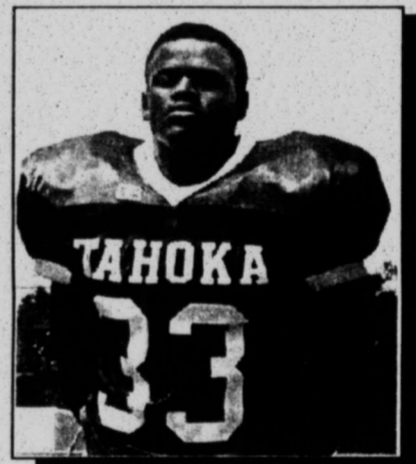
