YOU COULDA FOOLED ME: While looking up All Fools Day (today, Thursday, is April Fools Day) on the internet, I ran across a list of what one service rated as the top 100 April Fools Day hoaxes in history. I read only the first dozen or so, and some were pretty good. For example:

In 1957 the respected BBC news show *Panorama* announced that thanks to a very mild winter and the virtual elimination of the dreaded spaghetti weevil, Swiss farmers were enjoying a bumper spaghetti crop. It accompanied this announcement with footage of Swiss peasants pulling strands of spaghetti down from trees.

Huge numbers of viewers were taken in, and many called up wanting to know how they could grow their own spaghetti trees. To this question, the BBC diplomatically replied that they should "place a sprig of spaghetti in a can of tomato sauce and hope for the best."

Another one mentioned was the "Left-Handed Whopper" in 1998. I should remember this one, but it missed me somehow. That year, around April 1, Burger King published a full page advertisement in USA Today announcing the introduction of a new item to their menu: a "Left-Handed Whopper" specially designed for the 32 million left-handed Americans.

According to the advertisement, the new whopper included the same ingredients as the original Whopper (lettuce, tomato, hamburger patty, etc.), but all the condiments were rotated 180 degrees for the benefit of their left-handed customers. The following day Burger King issued a follow-up release revealing that although the Left-Handed Whopper was a hoax, thousands of customers had gone into restaurants to request the new sandwich. Simultaneously, according to the press release, "many others requested their own 'right handed' version."

Years ago when I published the weekly Sudar Beacon-News, I talked most of my regular local advertisers into running different things in a April Fools edition. Unfortunately, I no longer have any copies of that issue of the Sudan newspaper. I worked out all the strange things and then talked my customers in paying for them. The grocery store, for example, had its regular specials, plus one box which read "Cracked Eggs, 10 cents a glass" and another which said "T-Bones, 20 cents a pound" with small print below that reading "With meat, slightly higher."

An ad from the welding firm of Provence and Son showed a cow with the head of a chicken, with the caption, Provence and Son Welders. When we put something together, we do it right!" Owner Bud Provence told me that ad generated more comment than anything he had ever advertised.

This was around 1960 or so, and a dry cleaning business owner, the late Hugh Vincent, ran an advertisement showing a television set, and the announcement of a "Free TV Set for Anyone Who Brings in a Suit of Clothes To Be Cleaned!" Beneath the picture, in smaller print was "Offer expires promptly at midnight yesterday."

Anyway, I had a lot fun with that issue. I have never tried to do that since then. I no longer have that much energy.

Howard Drops Out Of City Election

Jimmy Howard, a candidate for Tahoka City Council in District 2, has officially dropped out of the election, according to information released this week by the City of Tahoka. He was running against incumbent Clara Calvillo and another candidate, Jeanie Stone, both of whom remain in the race.

Five Express Views At Public Forum; Wilson To Continue As County Sheriff

Public controversy over the Lynn County Sheriff's Department continued this week as Lynn County Commissioners Don Morton, Mike Braddock, Don Blair and J.T. Miller, as well as Lynn County Judge H.G. Franklin and County Attorney Jay Napper convened in a special session to hear from citizens wishing to express their opinions on the matter.

Following the public forum the four commissioners met in closed session before returning to a brief open session and issuing a statement that noted that complaints against the department had been considered but that commissioners were unable to conclusively prove or disprove the complaints.

No official action was considered during open session, and Wilson is expected to continue serving as Sheriff until January 2005, when Jerry D. Franklin will take office. Franklin, an 11-year employee of the department, five of which he served as Chief Deputy, is no longer serving in the Lynn County Sheriff's Department.

The controversy initially arose when Sheriff Wilson fired Deputy Franklin three days after the Democratic Primary Election, in which voters elected Franklin over the incumbent sheriff for the next four-year term. Wilson had already demoted Franklin from Chief Deputy to Patrol Deputy when Franklin filed as a candidate in the race. Both actions caused controversy in the public eye, and some remarks were also made at the meeting Monday regarding Wilson's language with employees and alleged racial slurs.

Approximately 25 residents gathered in the District Courtroom at 11 a.m. Monday for the public forum, but only five signed their names to a sheet indicating they wished to speak to the court. These included Lois Sherrill, Leland White, Bertha Brewer, Gary Stennett and Bruce Vaughn. All spoke as concerned citizens of the county, with Stennett praising Wilson's character and the other four raising concerns about the department, including fear of the O'Donnell community not receiving their fair coverage by the Sheriff's Department, the splitting of the com-

munity over the controversy, treatment of employees and alleged racial slurs. Neither Wilson nor Franklin was present at the proceed-

"I don't understand why Jerry
D. Franklin was not appointed Sheriff, but I am simply speaking to you
as a concerned citizen," said Lois
Sherrill. "This county is not big
enough to be split apart – I appreciate the commissioners court trying to
settle this controversy in a fair settlement, and then I think we should get
behind you and go on," she added:

Leland White addressed concerns about the sheriff using vulgar language with his employees and allegedly making racial slurs. "I became concerned when I read the article in the Lynn County paper of March 18," he told commissioners. "I started asking people questions. The more I heard, the more concerned I became - not about the election, but the situation the Sheriff has put our County in: the minority citizens against the Anglo citizens, and citizens against citizens as a whole. I had personal conversations with several employees, and all of the employees I spoke with said Sheriff Wilson has the most vulgar mouth they have ever heard," White said, going on to use several phrases that he said Wilson used when referring to employees.

trol Deputy when Franklin filed as a candidate in the race. Both actions caused controversy in the public eye, and some remarks were also made at the meeting Monday regarding Wilson's language with employees and alleged racial slurs.

"After the election, Bob stated to several employees that Joe Calvillo brought in van loads of Mexicans who couldn't read or write to vote for Jerry D. Franklin. I did not know that Mexicans, or anyone else for that matter, had to read or write to vote. That is not a requirement to vote in our country," he said.

White went on to add, "The situation has set up disaster regarding race relations, as well as an opportunity for a lawsuit against the County. I think each of us should be concerned about that. We can't afford the cost it may bring upon us as taxpayers or as a society of communities,

both geographically or racially."

Bruce Vaughn, an O'Donnell resident, told commissioners he had heard "a lot of comments that all the O'Donnell illiterate people voted in Jerry D. Franklin... and that we could just police ourselves. A community

should not be penalized because we didn't carry the sheriff in the election," he said. Bertha Brewer also expressed concerns regarding the O'Donnell community's relationship with the county law enforcement department.

Gary Stennett spoke on behalf of Wilson, stating, "I probably know Bob better than anyone else here and I know the character of this man – his word is as good as gold," he said.

Commissioners closed the public forum after asking if any others desired to speak, and then recessed the meeting until 1:30 p.m.

The four commissioners and their attorneys reconvened at 1:30 p.m. in closed session for about 2-1/2 hours, inviting Sheriff Wilson to join them for the last 40 minutes. No action was taken upon returning to open session at 4:10 p.m., but a brief statement was issued by Lynn County Attorney Jay Napper, who said, "The Commissioner's Court investigated the complaints raised in the public comment period and were unable to conclusively prove or disprove the complaints against Sheriff Wilson. However, Sheriff Wilson and the Commissioner's Court agree that ethnic and racial slurs or abusive language will not be tolerated by Lynn County towards employees or the public. The Court hopes that this matter can now be put behind us."

Napper told The News that county law is written in such a way that essentially one elected body has no authority over another elected official, other than in budget issues. He also said that Franklin could not have been appointed Sheriff of Lynn County if the position opened before January 2005, because of the nepotism rule. Jerry D. Franklin is a half brother to Lynn County Judge H.G. Franklin, which makes him ineligible to any official appointment by the Commissioners court. The nepotism rule, however, does not prevent relatives from being elected by the voters to serve in office.

The county attorney also said that he was unaware of any lawsuits that were rumored to have been filed against the county in conjunction with this issue.



Forty-two persons were in jail as of Wednesday.



The annual audit of Lynn County Hospital finances for the fiscal year ending in October 2003 showed that the hospital lost about \$320,000 during that year. But Accountant Brandon Durbin, who presented the report for Durbin and Co. of Lubbock, said the hospital should do better in the current year.

"The new designation of the hospital as a critical access facility should bring in more revenue, and with Lynnwood now filled to capacity, that also should help," Durbin

The hospital board voted to accept the report. Durbin was accompanied by another representative of the accounting firm, Katy Thomas.

Administrator Dan Powers reported on plans to have a physician or physician's assistant available each weekday morning at the





Neugebauer Announces USDA Disaster Declaration For Lynn Co.

Congressman Neugebauer announced Wednesday that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated Lynn County as a primary agricultural disaster ara due to last year's drought.

Neugebauer said that the designation makes Lynn County farmers eligible for emergency loans. Late last year the USDA declared a number of Texas counties as disaster areas due to hail damage.

"I've heard from several farmers who have been waiting for this declaration in order to obtain a loan to finance this year's crop," said Neugebauer. "I encourage farmers who need these emergency loans to Insurance and the Noninsured Crop apply at their FSA office as soon as

FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. FSA has a variety of programs available, in addition to the emergency loan program, to help eligible farmers'recover from adversity.

USDA has also made other programs available to assist farmers and ranchers, including the Emergency Conservation Program, Federal Crop Disaster Assistance Program.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) has notified the City of Wilson water system that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for FLUORIDE. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL for Fluoride at 4mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a level of 3.8 MG/L. This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing FLUORIDE

in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in the developing teeth before they erupt from the gums You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns

you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you The City of Wilson has inquired about getting an Reverse Osmosis plant to deal with this problem and without the help from grants this system has been too costly to put in at this time
