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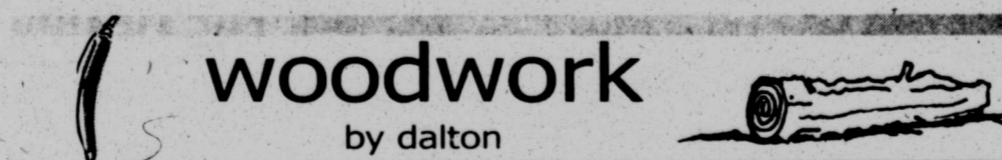

Texas Star Gin Reports First Bale

Texas Star Coop Gin in Wilson reported their first bale of the season this week, ginned at 2:11 p.m. Friday, Sept. 24. Weighing in at 437 pounds, the cotton bale came from Roy Lee Heinrich of Slaton

from his field just outside the Lynn County line, near FM 2192.

Texas Star's Wilson plant reported a bale count of 134 bales as of Monday, Sept. 27.

Harvest Festival Saturday To Offer Fun, Food, Cash

Area residents are invited to participate in the 29th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival this Saturday, at the courthouse square in Tahoka. The all-day event offers food, crafts and games as well as live entertainment, a queen and princess contest, and cash giveaways. Festival goers are invited to bring lawn chairs for seating on the courthouse lawn.

The festival begins at 10 a.m. when the booths are scheduled to open. There will be 45 booths at this year's festival, featuring food, crafts, and games and activities for youth and adults. A complete schedule and list of booths can be found inside this edition, along with pictures of all queen and princess candidates.

Children may bring their frogs and turtles for the races at 10 a.m. on the street just north of the courthouse lawn, sponsored by Lynn County 4-H.

The City/County Library's Silent Auction also begins at 10 o'clock with auction items donated by patrons of the library. The Library has received several items for the auction, but items will be accepted up until Saturday morning for anyone wanting to donate. The Library Silent Auction closes at approximately 3:30 p.m., at which time bidders should pick up their auction items.

Bandgora will perform on stage during the day, as well as for the Street Dance from 8 p.m. until midnight. The dance is a family event, free and open to all ages. Tahoka Rotary Club, who contributes annually to the cost of hiring the band, will continue to sell their popular sausage on a stick during the street dance, but other booths will close at 5 p.m.

Several lucky people will come away from the festival with some very good prizes, including a computer, and a \$1,000 vacation package. Raffle tickets are being sold for \$1 by Harvest Festival Queen candidates for the vacation getaway package with a destination and date of the winner's choice. Princess candidates are selling \$1 tickets to win a new computer.

Cash giveaways from donations made by area merchants will be conducted by emcee Cal Huffaker throughout the day from the stage, with those providing answers to trivia questions and/or having on-person items winning the cash.

Lynn County Child Welfare Board is selling \$1 tickets for a chance to win \$500 cash, and Lynn County Senior Citizens have \$1 tickets available for a chance to win a quilt. Tahoka Lions Club is selling \$20 tickets for a chance to win a trailer (only 200 tickets are being sold), and Phebe K. Warner Club is offering \$1 chances to win a water fountain.

The Tahoka High School Junior Class is sponsoring the popular Cow Patty Bingo

event, with chances to win \$250 and \$100 cash. Tickets are \$5 for that event.

Drawings for all ticket raffles will be held sometime Saturday afternoon, with the winners announced from the stage. Winners need not be present to win from any paid ticket raffle event.

The Princess Contest will begin at 1:30 p.m. with ten elementary girls vying for the honor. The girl selling the most raffle tickets will be named Princess and will win a \$500 savings bond. Second place will receive \$325 in savings bonds, and third place gets a \$175 savings bond.

The Queen contest will begin at approximately 2:30 p.m., with seven Tahoka High School girls as candidates. The Queen will receive a \$1500 college scholarship, and the first place runnerup will win a \$300 scholarship, with the second place runnerup receiving a \$200 scholarship.

Judges for the 2004 Harvest Festival Queen contest are Tania Leah Hand, Anthony Dalton and Andrea Lacy-Wilson, all of Lubbock.

Tania Leah Hand is a 2001 graduate of Friona High School. She currently resides in Lubbock and is a senior at Lubbock Christian University. She will receive a Bachelor of Arts degree in Family Studies this December. While at LCU, Tania served as captain of the Chaparral cheerleading squad. She was a founding member of the dance team for the Lone Star Lariettes, Lubbock's arena football team, and she will be cheerleading coordinator for the Lubbock Lady Hawks basketball franchise. Tania is completing an internship at the Children's Home of Lubbock, where she works with children in therapeutic care, foster and adoption placement, and in the Home's assessment center.

Anthony Dalton is a graduate of the University of Washington where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He comes to the South Plains after growing up in Seattle, WA. Dalton plays defensive back for the Lubbock Lone Stars and was named to the first ever IFL All-Star team as a kick-off return specialist. He played one year in the NFL-Europe before coming to Lubbock. Currently, Dalton is pursuing an alternate degree from Texas Tech University.

Andrea Lacy-Wilson is a 1998 graduate of Seagraves High School. She attended Texas Tech University and received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Public Relations in 2001. Boydston worked for AgTexas for 30 years in Tahoka and 2-1/2 years in the Lubbock field office, and for a short time with FHA. He and his wife, Carolyn, have two sons, Jayson of Brady, and Justin of Lubbock, and two grandchildren.

Well known for his sense of humor and gregarious manner, Boydston says his hobbies include "critiquing" issues in general, such as letters, hairdos, shoes, etc. He also enjoys tennis, walking or biking with his dogs, and riding motorcycles.

He says the biggest changes he has seen during his 32 years with AgTexas are the amount of paper work and documentation practices, and the merger bringing about the name change from PCA. Having to explain all the changes that affected his customers has been the most difficult part of his job, he says, adding that the highlights of his career are the years all the loans paid out and building the new office in January of 1979.

Boydston was born and raised in Ralls, graduating from Ralls High School in 1966. He graduated from Texas Tech in 1971 with a degree in Ag Economics.

Courthouse Renovation Grant Application Being Finalized

The grant application for the Lynn County Courthouse restoration/renovation project is being finalized. John Baker reported to Lynn County Commissioners at Monday morning's session, and will be submitted to the Texas Historical Commission (THC) ahead of schedule for the next round of grant awards. Baker said the project is at the printer's, and has grown from a half-inch thick notebook to well over three-inches thick, and incorporates changes suggested by the THC review committee.

The project is a comprehensive one, aiming to restore the courthouse back to its original design while incorporating modern electrical and heating/air needs for offices housed inside the courthouse. The courthouse was built in 1916 and retains much of its original design, including marble staircases and much of the original flooring.

"We are submitting this application way early for the next round of grant awards," Baker told commissioners, "but this will allow Lyman Labry, our contact at the Texas Historical Commission who has been working closely with us throughout the project, to review the application and to suggest any changes that could be made."

Applications must be submitted by March 2005 and grant awards are made in April. If approved, the funding is awarded in two stages, the planning stage and the construction phase.

"I am still excited about this project," Baker told the commission-

ers. "Every time I talk to Lyman he is real positive about our prospects and he wants to see this happen for Lynn County."

Commissioners and Lynn County Judge H.G. Franklin said they would write a letter to accompany the grant application, and said they were excited about the project.

In other business, commissioners discussed several issues, including maintenance problems with the old boiler in the courthouse basement (it's the original boiler and still used for heating the building) and some windows on the north side of the courthouse leaking water during the recent rains. Commissioner Mike Braddock suggested looking at the boiler in the old jail building, which is only a few years old, to see if it could be moved to replace the boiler in the courthouse basement, and Judge Franklin asked Baker to have an engineer look at the boilers for a recommendation. Commissioners also decided to replace the windows that were leaking in order to prevent further water leakage.

Some discussion was held on requests by employees to consider allowing an employee to donate sick days/vacation days to another employee, but commissioners tabled any decision until further consideration.

Commissioners voted unanimously to change out-of-county jail inmate reimbursement to the county from 3% to 5% to the general fund, to reimburse costs of meals for inmates. The remainder of the funds are channeled into an account fund-

ing the bond payments for building of the new jail.

It was decided to seek available grant funding for election equipment, for a possible \$52,000 to help pay for new voting machines for the county, as mandated by the state. The new equipment is anticipated to cost upwards of \$100,000 for Lynn County.

"There are a lot of counties fighting this mandate because it is not fully funded and we need more time to install equipment, but I don't know where this is going to go," Judge Franklin told commissioners. "In the meantime, let's go ahead and apply for what grant funding we can get," he added.

Franklin said he had received a letter from Garza County giving notice of withdrawal by Oct. 1 from the jail inmate housing contract with Lynn County. Garza County had contracted with Lynn County for eight beds daily in the Lynn County Jail, but is withdrawing the contract to sign on with Dickens County. The Lynn contract had been for \$30 per day per inmate.

Commissioners signed a proclamation designating November as Home Care and Hospice Month in recognition of the dedication of workers who deal with the terminally ill and their families. "If you've ever had to deal with this, you know these are super people," said commissioner J.T. Miller.

Three of four commissioners were present at the meeting, including Miller, Mike Braddock and Don Blair, with commissioner Don Morton absent.

Questions and Answers of the Day

Romans 1:18-32; Acts 4: 34-35; Acts 10:28; Acts 11:9; Acts 12:1-5; Acts 8:51-60; Romans 2:17-19; Acts 15:19-29

Question: What is pure and undefiled religion? What is pure worship?

Answer: It is absolute 1000% God's truth -- not man's truth. In the early church, people worshipped for a time in the purest sense. It didn't matter what man thought. God was their concern. In Acts 19:17-20 they burned the books concerning witchcraft, magic and sorcery. In the King James version it says:

19 Many of them also which used curious arts brought their books together, and burned them before all men: and they counted the price of them, and found it fifty thousand pieces of silver.

20 So mightily grew the word of God and prevailed."

To these people these books and practices had been a part of their norm and culture. They had to be willing to ditch everything God did not approve of. They did it and got blessed. Acts 15:19-21 says God expected the Gentiles to abstain from pollutions, idols, fornication, and from things strangled, and from blood. In verse 29 He asks that they abstain from meats offered to idols and from blood. God expects His people to live by His word as He demonstrates in Romans 1:18-32. God is incapable of lying. Royce Armes, 62, of Tahoka, died Tuesday, September 21, 2004. Services were held at 3 p.m. Saturday at O'Donnell Cemetery in O'Donnell.

Thomas J. "T.J." Tipton

A memorial service for Thomas J. "T.J." Tipton, 81, of Texico, N.M., was held Tuesday, September 28, 2004, at the Clovis Livestock Auction in Clovis, N.M. He died Saturday, September 25, 2004.

Tipton was born April 15, 1923 in Plainview to O'Connell "Charlie" Tipton and Esther Moore Tipton. He was raised in New Mexico and married Marcine Pardue, January 18, 1947. He joined the Conservation Corps in his youth and worked all over New Mexico. He was a member of the U.S. Army from 1943 through 1945 and served in WWII in the South Pacific Theater with the Infantry. He was awarded two Purple Hearts. He was a longtime cowboy in Arizona and New Mexico and was the foreman for Castors, Baxters, and Feed and Ranch Supply. He retired in 1973.

He was preceded in death by his parents and three sisters.

Survivors include his wife, Marcine of Texico, N.M.; two daughters, Sandy Cox and Dee Hall, both of Belen; four sons, Skip "Tipton" Moss, of Clovis, N.M., Charles "Chuck" Tipton, of Tahoka, Ronny Tipton, of Portales, N.M., and Frank Tipton of Clovis, N.M.; 19 grandchildren; and 18 great-grandchildren.

J.D. Donaldson, Jr., M.D.

Memorial services for J.D. Donaldson, Jr., M.D., 90 of Lubbock, were held Saturday, Sept. 18 at 11 a.m. at St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Lubbock. He died Tuesday, Sept. 14, 2004.

Dr. Donaldson was born Oct. 5, 1913 in Tahoka. He graduated from Tahoka High School and graduated from Texas Tech in 1936. He graduated from the University of Texas Medical School in 1940.

After serving an internship and working as the Texas Tech doctor for a few months, he volunteered for the U.S. Navy following the Pearl Harbor attack. He spent three years in the Pacific and was discharged after 51 months of service.

He served two years of pediatric residency at Children's Hospital in St. Louis, Mo. He married Jennie Walker in St. Louis on Aug. 16, 1946. In October 1948 he returned to Lubbock to practice pediatrics. He retired from Children's Clinic in 1984, and then worked four years as a volunteer at Well Baby Clinic and Sick Children's Clinic. He association with the Well Baby Clinic extended over 40 years.

He was a member of St. Luke's Methodist Church and the Homebuilders Sunday School class. He served on a number of community boards, and received numerous awards.

Dr. Donaldson is survived by his wife; a son, David W. Donaldson; and a granddaughter.

Lynn County Is Awarded Federal Funds

The U.S. Department of Justice this week announced the award of \$1,747 to Lynn County, to reimburse some of the costs of incarcerating criminals who have committed serious crimes in the United States. Lynn County was one of only 741 (out of 3,140) eligible local entities across the United States that successfully applied for these funds, according to information released this week from the Lynn County Sheriff's Department.

The award originates from federally mandated programs that the county is providing at local cost. There is some federal funding opportunities available, if the proper request is made. Identifying these opportunities and then properly applying for them are not simple tasks, and county officials engaged Vertex Targeted Opportunities for assistance.

Vertex is a public sector consulting firm located in Dallas that specializes in locating and accessing hard-to-find federal reimbursements for local and state entities. Vertex does the research, gathers and analyzes the data, and completes all necessary information to be included in the application. The information is then returned to the county for federal submission via the internet.
