
Annie Belle Stice



Lynn County, Texas: A fascinating country

"A man places a great premium on whiskey, unless he is out of water" -- Hoskilonians: 962

I remember the drought of the nineteen fifties in Lynn County. My father also remembered the dust bowl of the thirties in the same county. Those dry spells were bad but nothing like what Lynn County and all of Texas is experiencing today.

According to Haney Wells, rainfall historian of Tahoka, the average rainfall of Tahoka, Texas since 1913 is just short of 18 inches. More recently, the last twenty years, the average rainfall for the county has been about 21 inches. In the past 11 months, September 2010 through August 2011, rainfall has measured just 2.4 inches. This is the driest 11-month period in Lynn County's recorded history. 2010 was the second wettest year ever with 36 inches recorded in just the first 9 months of that year. (The wettest year was in 2004

This erratic pattern in rainfall has given farmers fits since the county was settled. I remember my time at New Moore as feast or famine. It seemed like the rain we did receive came at the wrong time. A third of a bale to the acre was considered a respectable cotton crop for us in the 1950's and 60's. Last year my farmer Jaybo Webb produced a bale and a half per acre on that same dry land, a record high production. This year, not a single stalk of cotton can be seen there. Go figure. A fascinating country - a frustrating country. You never know what you are going to get. That's the history of Lynn County.

I recently had wild hogs and mule deer come to my old boyhood home north of New Moore looking for water. Their water tanks have dried up. So my sisters and brothers and I installed a 1000 gallon water tank, horse trough as we used to called it, in my yard there to water the starving critters looking for water. Jaybo says the tank is getting a good workout. Who would have ever thought that wild deer and hogs would make a comeback on that lonely prairie?

It was some 49 years ago when I picked up and left that country. I couldn't wait to get away. Now I can't wait to come back for my visits. It is indeed a fascinating country. ***





Ralls failed to convert, and led 6-0 until Tahoka scored with just 5 seconds left in the half, on a 23-yard pass play from QB Zach Garcia to Preston Hammonds. Cristian Ramirez kicked the extra point to give Tahoka a 7-6 halftime lead.

Tahoka went up 14-6 when running back Ke'Shawn Hood scored from a yard out early in the third period, and Ramirez again kicked.





Tahoka Lake, a privately owned property in Lynn County, was featured in the June/July 2011 issue of the Lubbock Lake National Historic Landmark newsletter, reporting research results as part of a survey of longterm research efforts to understand how different peoples used this unique landscape. Mrs. Clyde May and the J.C. Calm Foundation oversee the Tahoka Lake site, and invite researchers to conduct surveys of historic significance at the site for which Tahoka was named.

The article in the newsletter, written by Research Aide Justin Moe, noted that Tahoka is one of 40 salinas (brackish water lakes) on the Southern High Plains. Mammoth Creek feeds into the north end of the lake, supplying fresh water along with other springs around the lake.

ecosystem in which both fresh able. The lake serves as an important nesting ground for many migrating bird species.

survey (in March 2011) reconfirmed that earlier peoples had utilized the entirety of the lake property. A lithic procurement and reduction area on the south end of the lake, opposite of where Mammoth Creek feeds into the lake, was a particularly important find. The area was approximately 492 ft by 164 ft and is situated between a high bluff overlooking the lake and the lake shoe. Numerous Ogallala gravels eroding out of the bluff had been worked to a more manageable size in order to be transported to other sites in a more efficient and cost-effective manner. At these other sites (such as Lubbock Lake), they then were finished and used as tools. The predominant raw material type found in these




