
Area gins begin processing cott

Area cotton gins have begun processing cotton during late September and the early days of October, with Weaver Farms (Billy and Sue Weaver) reportedly bringing in the first bale on Sept. 17 at Texas Star Gin, which has operations in both Wilson and Union. As of Monday, the bale count was reported at 1,379 for Texas Star.

New Home Coop-Lakeview Gin processed their first bale on Sept. 26; from producer Mark Clem, reporting a bale count of 38 on Monday, and Wells Coop Gin reported their count at 41 with the first bale on Sept. 27, from producer Ronnie Gardenhire.

Grassland Coop Gin began processing cotton this week, reporting that producer Ty Stark had brought in cotton for processing on Monday, Oct.

Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell officials said they expect to begin processing this week, and Farmers Coop Gin in Tahoka said they would



Lynn County Appraisal District mailed out Tax Statements on Oct. 1. Taxes may be paid through Jan. 31 without penalty or interest. Beginning Feb. 1, penalties and interest will be added monthly for late payment of property taxes.

NOTE regarding optional QUARTERLY INSTALLMENT PAYMENTS: Homeowners who are qualified for the age 65 or older or disabled homestead exemptions, may pay their current taxes on their home in four installments. Please call 806-561-5477 or come by the Appraisal Office to sign up for the installment option. At least one-fourth of the current taxes must be paid before the Feb. 1 delinquency date. The remaining payments are due before April 1, June 1, Aug. 1, without any penalty or interest. If you miss an installment payment, you will face a penalty and also pay interest at 1 percent for each month of delinquency. You must indicate on your first payment that you are paying your home taxes in installments. Installment payments apply to all taxing units on the tax bill





Remodel Old City Hall for Boy Scouts, Library Tahoka Scout organizations and the Lynn County Library will soon have a new home as a result of efforts by the Tahoka Rotary Club, the Tahoka City Council, and contributions of funds by busi-

> nessmen and other citizens. Recently the Council voted to donate the old City Hall building 40 by 50 feet in size to the Scouts.

Since the Rotary Club is the sponsoring agent of the Boy Scout troop, President Winston C. Wharton named a committee composed of H.W. Carter, Calloway Huffaker, Fred McGinty, A.M. Bray, Ronald Sherrill, Herman Heck and Otis Spears to consider moving the building to the new City Park.

However, an agreement was reached with the City Council to leave the building in its present position if modernized.

The committee, Herb Carter principally, raised \$760 in contributions and work of refinishing the building has already been started.

Rotarians also voted to give a portion of the building to the Lynn County Library Association, which now maintains the library in the basement of the courthouse.

A new roof was put on the building last week. Both the outside and inside will be improved and modernized.

More funds will be needed for completion of the project in a creditable manner, and Carter invites any individual or organization interested to help out financially on the project.

Ke'Shawn Hood ran for 184 yards in only 16 carries and scored two touchdowns as the Tahoka Bulldogs dominated Plains 29-14 here for their second win of the season.

This Friday night Coach John Cornelius will take his Bulldogs, now 2-3 for the year, to Anson, who downed Coleman 26-9 last week. It will be the final non-district game for Tahoka.

Hood opened scoring Friday with a 31-yard run in the first quarter, and an extra point attempt failed. Tahoka went ahead 12-0 early in the second when Preston Hammonds passed 4 yards to end Smith McLelland for a touchdown.

Plains came right back to score on a 32-yard pass from Zack Wilkins to Omar Calderon, and it was 12-7 after Wilkins kicked the extra point.

Tahoka's lead went to 20-7 before halftime when Dillon Trevino ran in from 5 yards out, and two more points were added on a pass from Trystan Hilger to McLelland.

Plains cut the lead to 20-14 near the end of the third quarter on a 28-yard run by Wilkins, whose kick added another point. Early in the fourth period,





Hunter education course offered at Post for youth, adults in area

A hunter education class has been scheduled for October 20 and 21, beginning at 8:00 a.m. at the Post High School cafeteria, according to Drew Spencer, Garza and Lynn County Game Warden and Hunter Education Instructor. Spencer adds that the class on Saturday will run until 5 p.m., with students allowed an hour and a half lunch break. Sunday's class will be from 1:00-5:00 p.m. Students will be required to attend class both days.

According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, if you were born on or after September 2, 1971, and you are: • under 9 years of age, you

must be accompanied, or

• age 9 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course, or you must be accompanied, or

• age 17 and over, you must successfully complete a hunter education course; or purchase a "Hunter Education Deferral," and you must be accompanied.

Spencer points out that "accompanied" means: by a person who is at least 17, who is licensed to hunt in Texas, who has passed hunter education, or

is exempt (born before September 2, 1971), and who is within normal voice control. Proof of certification or deferral is required to be on your person while hunting.

However, any individual may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements, according to Spencer.

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instruction in modern firearms and primitive sporting arms handling and safety, outdoor responsibility and ethics, laws and regulations, wildlife conservation and management, hunting traditions, field care of game and wilderness first aid and survival," Spencer added. "I'm hoping better attendance than my two classes last year. With youth deer and turkey season opening the following week, there should be higher demand."

The minimum age for certification is 9 years and cost is \$15. Students 9 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a "Temporary Student Card" at the end of the course. Students will then receive an original "Hunter Education Certificate" from Texas parks and Wildlife after processing the paperwork. Those less than 9 years of age will receive a "Certificate of Attendance," but must take the course again after turning 9 for proper certification.



Farm Service Agency Administrator Juan Garcia announced the sign-up period for the 2011 crop year Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) program will open Oct. 22. The SURE program is part of the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (Farm Bill). Under the 2008 Farm Bill, SURE authorizes assistance to farmers and ranchers who suffered crop losses caused by natural disasters occurring through Sept. 30, 2011.

"Any eligible producer who suffered losses during the 2011 crop year is encouraged to visit a local FSA office to learn more

about the SURE program and how to apply," said Garcia. As of Sept. 30, 2011, the

Department's authority to operate the SURE program expired along with four other, important disaster assistance programs: the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP); the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees, and Farm-Raised Fish (ELAP); the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP); and the Tree Assistance Program (TAP). Production losses due to disasters occurring after Sept. 30, 2011, are not eligible for di-

saster program coverage. To be eligible for SURE, a farm or ranch must have: At least a 10-percent production loss on a crop of economic significance; A policy or plan of insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Act or the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for all economically significant crops; Been physically located in a county that was declared a primary disaster county or contiguous county by the Secretary of Agriculture under a Secretarial Disaster Designation. Without a Secretarial Disaster Designation, individual producers may be eligible if the actual production on the farm is less than 50 percent of the normal production on the farm due to a natural disaster. A "farm" for SURE purposes means the entirety of all crop acreage in all counties that a producer planted or intended to be planted for harvest for normal commercial sale or on-farm livestock feeding, including native and improved grassland intended for haying. Producers considered so-

cially disadvantaged, a begin-

ning farmer or rancher, or a limited resource farmer may be eligible for SURE without a policy or plan of insurance or NAP coverage.

Farmers and ranchers interested in signing up must do so before the June 7, 2013 deadline.


