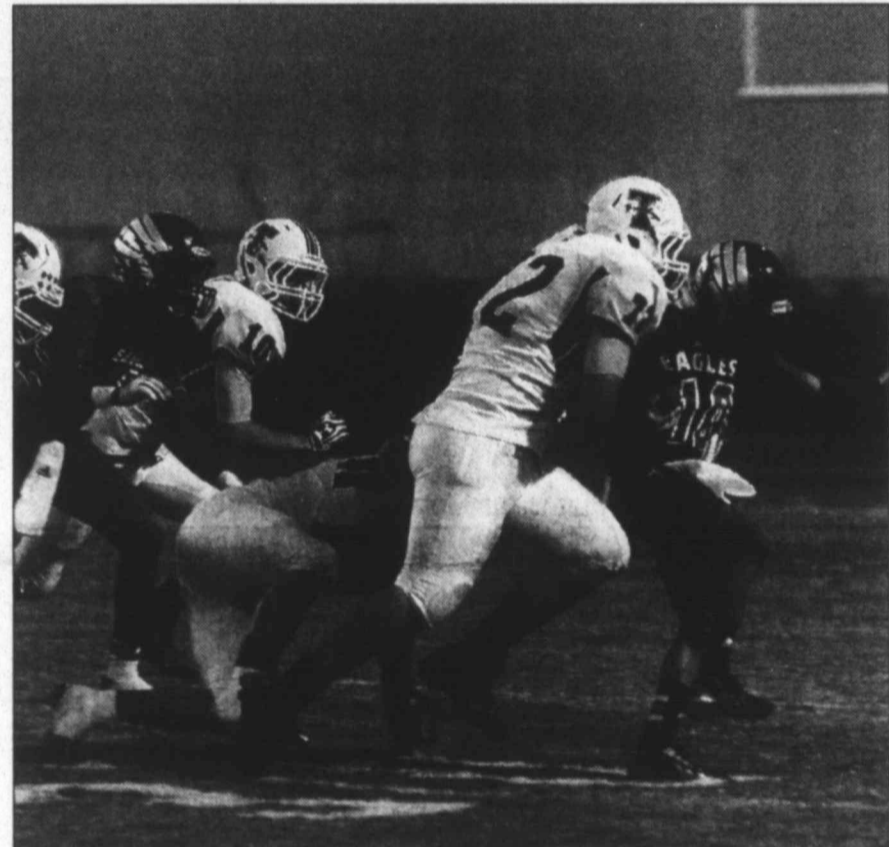
## Tools stolen from irrigation company near Tahoka during last weekend

Some hand tools, pumps and possibly other items were stolen from Mesa Irrigation about 11 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 over the weekend. Sheriff's deputies were advised that the thieves apparently cut a hole in a fence to gain access to items left on the yard. Company officials were continuing inventory early this week, so the value of the stolen articles had not yet been determined.

A small tractor owned by the Texas Hwy. Dept. was damaged when someone attempted to tow it from a location near the intersection of FM 211 and U.S. 87, leaving it after it was hung up on some cross-ties. Sheriff's deputies said wiring on the tractor also was

damaged. A motorcyclist was wounded Saturday night when he was shot by an O'Donnell police officer, but no other details were available. Calls by the News to O'Donnell Police and to a Texas Ranger in Brownfield who reportedly is investigating the incident were not answered.

Only two persons were taken to jail here in the last week, leaving a total of 17 in jail early this week. One of the two new inmates was charged with no seatbelt; the other was held on an application to revoke his probation on conviction of injury to a child, elderly or disabled person with intent to inflict bodily injury.

## City approves budget, tax rate stays same

Tahoka City Council met in regular session Tuesday night, approving the 2013-2014 budget and levying the 2013 property tax rate by unanimous decision of three of five council members voting on the matter. Only two council members, Rudy Fuentes and Ronny Jolly, were present at the meeting, but a conference call to councilman Jeff Martin, who was away from the city, allowed a

quorum to vote. The two other council members, Amy Preston and Ray Box, were unable to attend.

The city's property tax will remain the same, at the current rate of \$0.747030 cents per \$100 of property value, as no increase was proposed for consideration.

Other issues scheduled for consideration at Tuesday's meeting were tabled until the next meeting.

All entries will be displayed during the Oct. 5 Harvest Festival on the square in Tahoka.

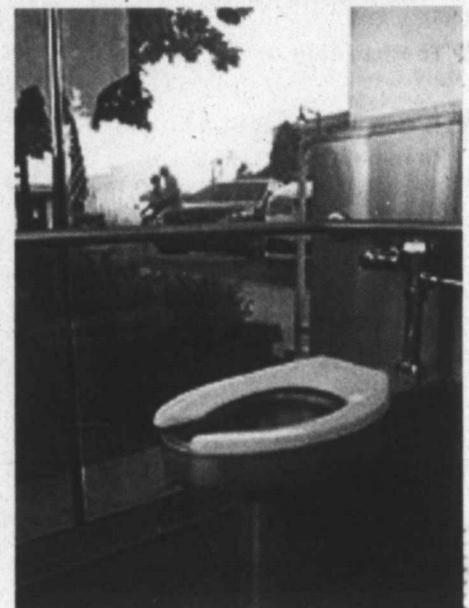

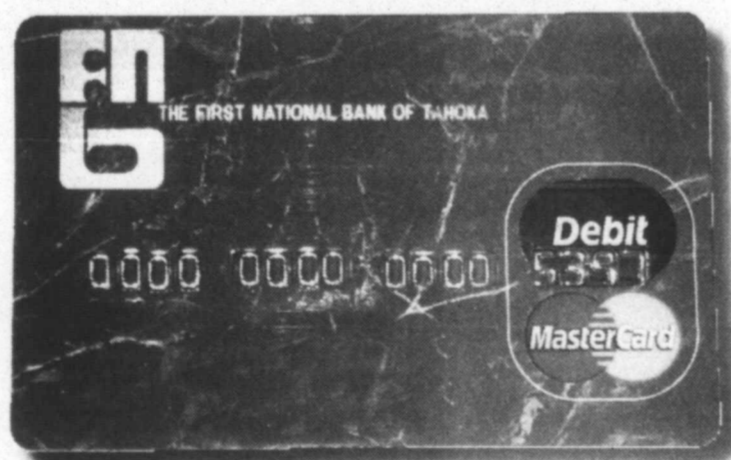

FEMA awards nearly \$48 million to Texas for firefighting costs

More than \$47.9 million was recently awarded to the state of Texas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for reimbursement of expenses to fight the wildfires that burned in 168 counties and destroyed more than 1.3 million acres of land in 2011.

The FEMA funding covers the costs of fire suppression activities, which were carried out by the Texas A & M Forest Service, the U.S. Forest Service, the Bureau of Land Management, the U.S. National Park Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

"A record number of wildfires damaged communities all across Texas in 2011," said FEMA Region 6 Administrator Tony Robinson. "We are proud to continue the successful collaboration with our local and state partners as those communities rebuild and move forward with the recovery process."

FEMA's contribution, made possible by a Public Assistance grant, represents a 75 percent federal cost share. FEMA awards funding for projects directly to the state of Texas; the state then forwards the grant to the eligible applicant.

\$1,059,868.92 in child support payments on cases with Lynn County court orders. Without you and the assistance of the Lynn County courts this would not have been possible," stated the letter.

Mrs. Laws said that Lynn County has collected over \$1-million in child support payments annually for the past several years.

### Class of 1983 plans reunion

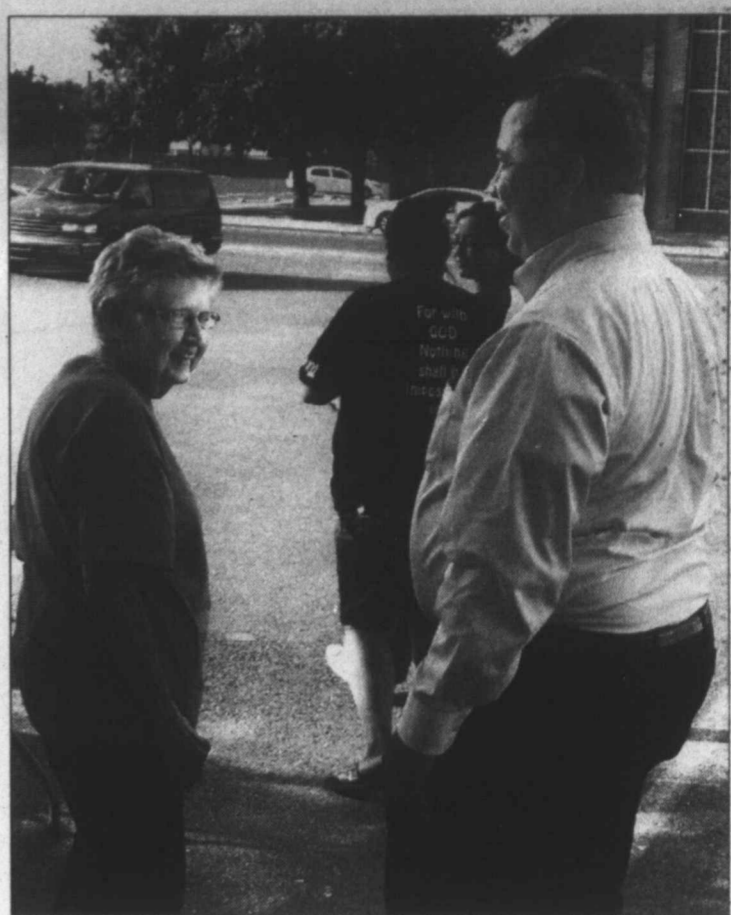

### FALL LAWN TIPS:

Use excess leaves as a soil mulch. Shred leaves with a mower and spread a layer over the soil to conserve moisture and insulate the roots of perennials. Fall mulching gives you a jump on next spring's landscape chores.

Improve your lawn's health by fertilizing this fall with a low nitrogen slow release fertilizer. You'll reduce the risk of disease problems and with slower weed growth in fall, your lawn, not the weeds, will benefit from the nutrients. Fall fertilization also helps lawns recover from the stresses of summer by encouraging deep roots and denser growth that can better compete with weeds and tolerate disease and insects.



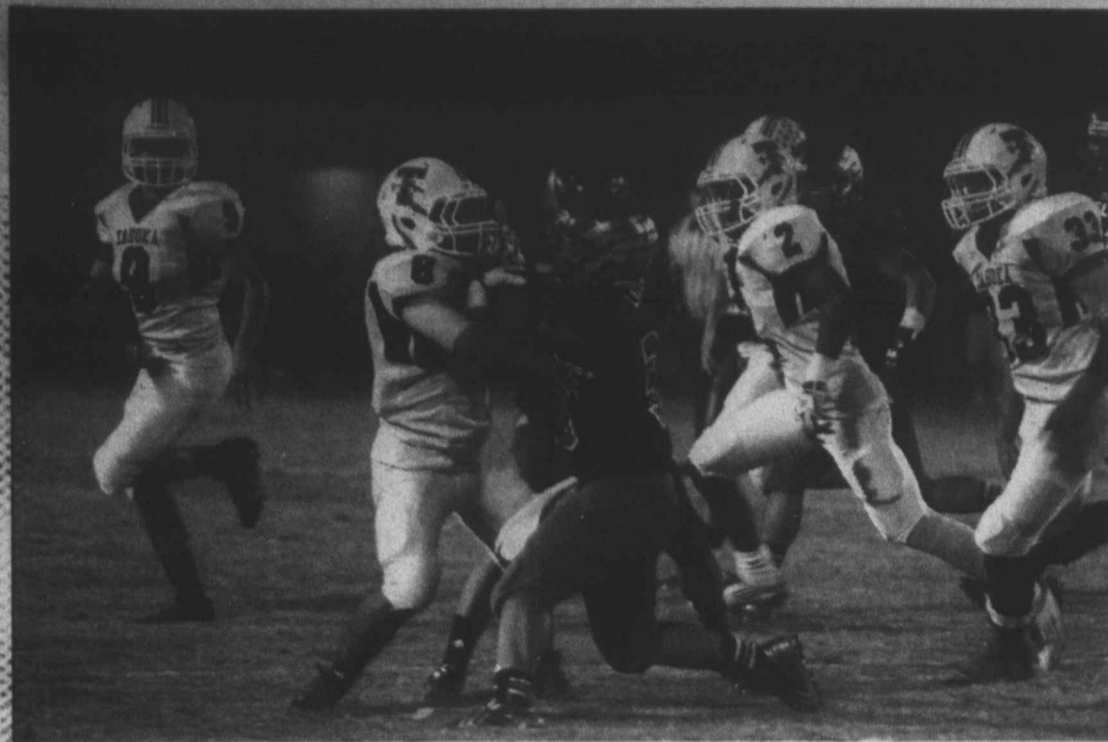

## Eagles fly by Bulldogs 56-12

The Roosevelt Eagles took to the air Friday night with a devastating passing attack to bomb the visiting Tahoka Bulldogs 56-12 and leave both teams with a 2-1 record for the season so far.

Roosevelt QB Derek Coppedge passed for six touchdowns, completing 28 of 43 for 408 yards and no interceptions, and although Tahoka had a respectable ground game, it was no match for the Eagles' aerial antics.

This week the Bulldogs will host unbeaten Post, which last Friday topped Slaton 34-27.

Tahoka running back

Ke'Shawn Hood raced 19 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter to bring the Bulldogs within 8 points after Roosevelt scored twice on short runs by Kevin Lamae. But Coppedge threw three TD passes to Brendon Wright in the second quarter and Roosevelt led 35-6 at halftime.

Coppedge hit Wright for a fourth touchdown and passed to Tray Bass for two more in the second half before Dillon Trevino ran a yard for Tahoka's only other score with 4:19 left in the game.

Tahoka had 226 yards on the ground, with QB Trystan

Hilger gaining 103 on 12 carries. Hood had 62 yards in 13 rushes, Kordell Baker gained 37 in just 3 carries, and Preston Hammonds gained 24.

Ray Parmer with 12 tackles and Santiago Martinez with 11 led the Tahoka defense. Also doing well on defense were Mikkel Garza, Trevino and Isaiah Vega.

## Constitutional Amendment election set for Nov. 5th

Nine constitutional amendments will be on the ballot for the Nov. 5 Special Election for voters to consider. The exact wording of how the proposed amendments will appear on the ballot is printed in a Public Notice in this issue of *The News*,

along with brief explanations provided by the Texas Secretary of State's office.

Briefly, the nine propositions are as follows:

Proposition 1 pertains to property tax exemptions for the surviving spouse of a U.S.

military member who is killed in action; Prop. 2 pertains to the creation of a State Medical Education Board and State Medical Education Fund; Prop. 3 pertains to taxation of airplane parts in the state; Prop. 4 pertains to property tax exemptions for partially disabled veterans or their surviving spouse in certain circumstances; Prop. 5 would amend the definition of reverse mortgages; Prop. 6 would create a State Water Implementation Fund; Prop. 7 would allow home-rule municipalities to fill short-term vacancies by appointments; Prop. 8 pertains to maximum tax rates for a Hidalgo County hospital district; and Prop. 9 pertains to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge.

## Health insurance agents warn consumers to be cautious to avoid scams during rollout of ACA

With major parts of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) taking effect in the coming months, the Texas Association of Health Underwriters is warning consumers to be wary about releasing personal information in the process of purchasing health coverage to comply with the new law. Attempts to defraud consumers have already been reported as scam artists attempt to exploit confusion about the law and illegally gain access to social security numbers, credit cards, bank accounts and other personal information.

While the federal government has provided millions of dollars for navigator and other consumer assistance programs to assist with the rollout of the ACA, the lack of screening, training and accountability of those efforts has raised additional concerns about the privacy and security of sensitive information.

Beginning in October, consumers and small employers will have the option to purchase health insurance through Health Insurance Marketplaces, referred to as Exchanges. Many consumers will find themselves facing decisions regarding coverage, co-pays and co-insurance that they have not previously considered. As part of the enrollment in a health plan, consumers will be providing sensitive personal data on applications, putting their information at risk for potential misuse.

Mark Bellman, president of the Texas Association of Health Underwriters, stated, "If some-

one purchasing coverage suspects fraud, then it should be reported immediately to law enforcement officials or the Texas attorney general's Consumer Protection Division."

Scams involving phone calls and letters fraudulently claiming that all Americans will need a government-issued health card have already been reported. Elderly, low-income and uninsured consumers are primary targets for fraudulent activity.

"The scams can be phone calls, letters, emails, even someone at your door," said Bellman. "Scammers are representing themselves as part of the government-required health insurance plan. Because consumers do not understand the law, they are vulnerable to having their financial records and medical information illegally accessed." The Federal Trade Commission (FTC), the nation's consumer protection agency, is warning consumers about giving out personal or financial information in response to the Affordable Care Act.

Bellman added, "Many of the organizations participating in the government's navigator program are recognized and respected groups that make significant contributions to our society. While their efforts are well-intentioned, we may be placing an unrealistic burden on them given their lack of insight and experience in providing counsel on coverage options and in managing sensitive personal data."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments  
Special Election November 5, 2013

### Proposition Number 1 (HJR 62)

HJR 62 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead could be authorized by statute to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying homestead during the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action."

### Proposition Number 2 (HJR 79)

HJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operational."

### Proposition Number 3 (HJR 133)

HJR 133 would authorize local political subdivisions to extend the length of time that aircraft

parts could remain temporarily in this state before being subject to ad valorem taxation. Under current law, merchandise, wares, and goods (including aircraft parts) may remain in this state temporarily for up to 175 days before being subject to ad valorem taxation; the proposed amendment would permit taxing entities to extend the exemption up to 730 days after the date that a person acquired or imported aircraft parts in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption."

### Proposition Number 4 (HJR 24)

HJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran at no cost to the veteran by a charitable organization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

### Proposition Number 5 (SJR 18)

SJR 18 would amend the definition of "reverse mortgage" to authorize the making of reverse mortgage loans for the purchase of homestead property in addition to the current

legal uses of those loans, and would give lenders recourse against borrowers who fail to timely occupy the homestead properties purchased with such loans. SJR 18 would also add to the definition of "reverse mortgage" an extension of credit that is not closed before the 12th day after the lender provides to the prospective borrower a written notice summarizing risks and conditions of a reverse mortgage. The language of the required notice is prescribed in the resolution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan."

### Proposition Number 6 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 would create the State Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and would be used to implement the state water plan, as adopted by general law, by TWDB.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources."

### Proposition Number 7 (HJR 87)

HJR 87 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow home-rule municipalities to adopt charter provisions authorizing the filling of vacancies in the governing body by appointment, but only when the remainder of the vacant term is less than 12 months. Under current law, municipal voters may adopt terms of office for municipal officers longer than two years, but upon approving longer terms of office, any resulting vacancies in office must be filled by special election. The proposed amendment would provide an option

for home-rule municipalities to fill short-term vacancies through appointment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less."

### Proposition Number 8 (HJR 147 and SJR 54)

HJR 147 would repeal the Texas Constitution's maximum tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district; the maximum rate is currently set at 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This rate is lower than the maximum tax rate allowable for hospital districts in all other counties in the State (75 cents per \$100 valuation). The repeal of the constitutional cap would authorize hospital district tax rates in Hidalgo County equal to the hospital district tax rate laws applicable to all other Texas counties.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County."

### Proposition Number 9 (SJR 42)

SJR 42 would expand the potential sanctions that the State Commission on Judicial Conduct can issue following a formal proceeding. This constitutional amendment would allow the Commission to issue an order of public admonition, warning, reprimand, or a requirement to obtain additional training or education in addition to the Commission's current authority to issue a public censure or recommend removal or retirement of a judge.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

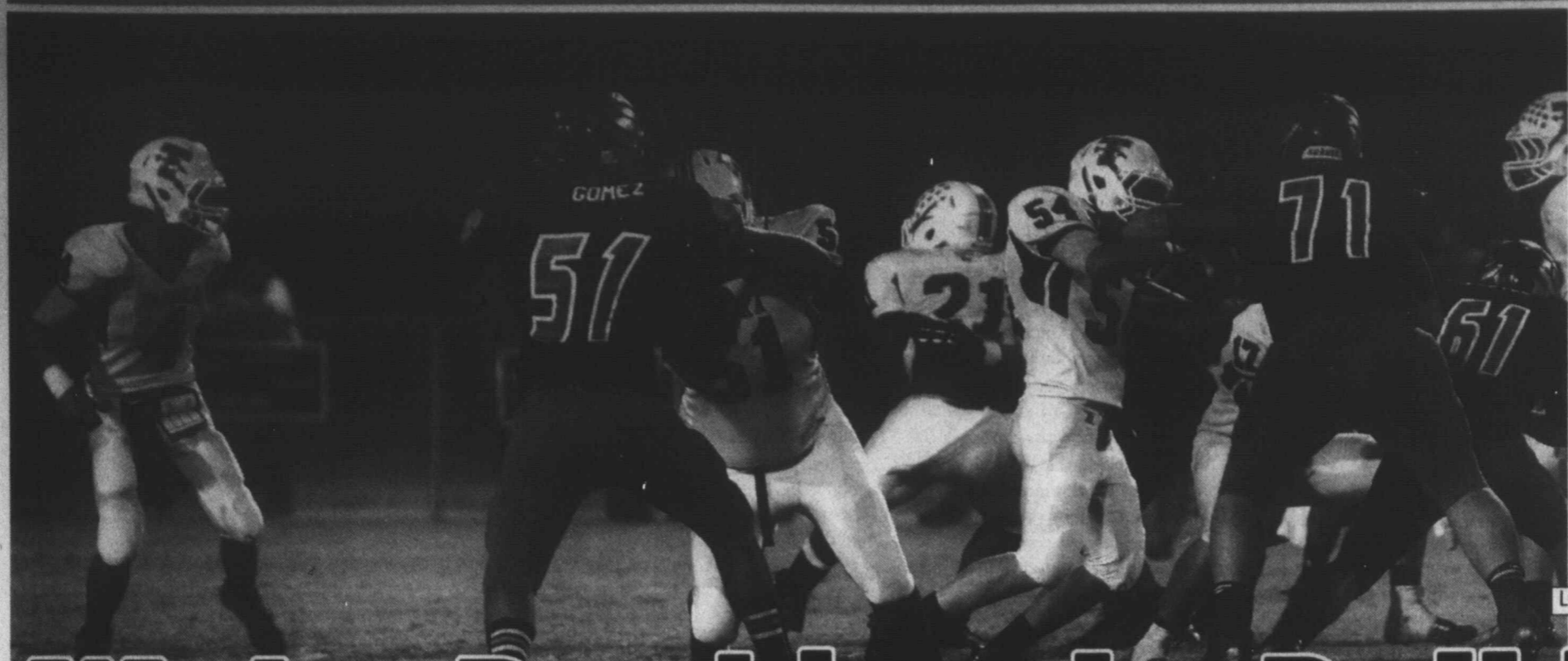

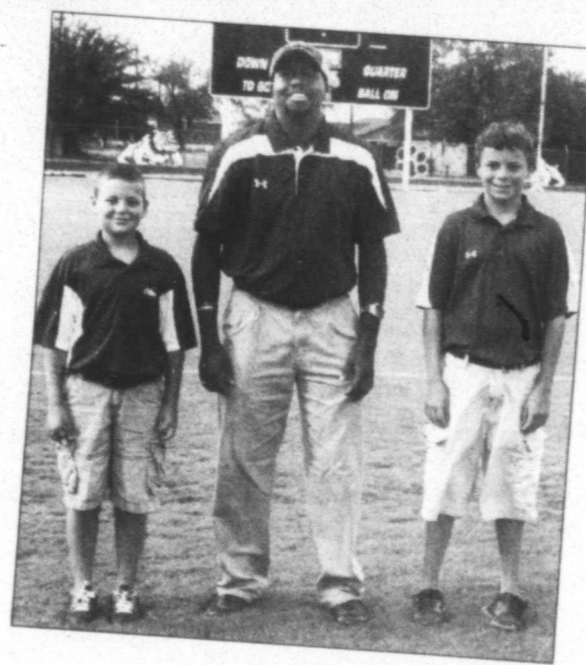

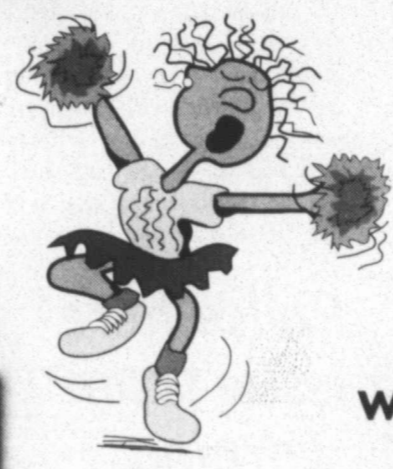
