Polls to open Saturday for city, school, hospital elections Voters to consider TISD Bond issue + five contested races

Polling locations in Lynn County will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday, May 7 for city, school and hospital board elections, with a school bond election and five contested races on the ballots. Tahoka ISD has a \$9 million bond issue for voters to consider, and there are contested races for Tahoka ISD Board of Trustees, City of Tahoka, Wilson ISD, City of O'Donnell, and Lynn County Hospital District.

Three entities have canceled elections due to uncontested candidates who will be declared elected, including City of New Home, O'Donnell ISD, and City of Wilson. The polling location for the Lynn County Hospital District election, City of Tahoka, and Tahoka ISD Bond Election and Trustee elections will be held at the Life Enrichment Center at 1717 Main Street in Tahoka. The City of O'Donnell election will be held at the O'Donnell Community Center, and the Wilson ISD election will be held at Wilson City Hall (Green Building). At all polling locations, voters are reminded to bring their voter registration cards and a photo ID in order to vote.

election, which has five candidates vying for two seats on the board, both 3-year terms. Candidates include incumbents Manuel Deleon and Nancy Guilliams, and candidates Mary Gayle Raindl, Della Swartz and Dolores Martinez. In this election, the cumulative voting method is used. This means, because there are two available seats, each voter gets two votes, and those two votes may both be given to one candidate, or one vote each for two separate candidates.

Every registered voter within the Tahoka Independent School District may vote in the TISD Bond Election, but also there are separate ballots for

each of the school trustee elections, representing different precincts.

TISD's \$9 million bond proposal is for funds for asbestos abatement and demolition of the existing three-story middle school building and auditorium, building a new auditorium and one-story middle school, and for improvements to the north elementary campus. If approved, the tax impact would add an additional 34.5-cents per \$100 of property valuation on the Tahoka ISD property taxes.

The Eagle has landed ... at a brand new school New construction progressing on schedule at O'Donnell ISD

by JUANELL JONES agle fans are going to be ruffling their feathers with pride, come next August. O'Donnell ISD will feature a brand new high school gymnasium, a new and renovated secondary campus for grades 6-12, a new career and technology center, new ag building, new tennis courts, and modernization of other areas. It's all progressing on schedule, as students and teachers make do with makeshift classrooms - some even off-campus - and detour around the many hard-hat construction crews on campus. Grand opening ceremonies are targeted for this summer, in time for the opening day of school in August.

It's a comprehensive project funded by a \$16 million bond approved by voters in May 2014. The project included tearing down the junior high school building and gym, which was built in the 1940s, and building a new high school with competition gym and weight room facilities in its place, as well as a career and technology center including an automotive bay and other facilities to offer welding, woodwork, culinary arts, and floral design classes.

The current high school building is being renovated to serve as the junior high school, with technology and electrical upgrades and classroom renovations for the 21st Century Learning, and restroom upgrades.

"Actually, we are not going to have separate junior high and high school campuses," explained Dr. Cathy Amonett, Superintendent Currently, there are 76 students in grades 9-12, and 70 students in grades 6-8, for a combined total of 146 students for the secondary campus.


The project also includes new tennis courts, new science labs, modernization of the ag building and HVAC upgrades, installation of a fire sprinkler system at the high school, and renovation and improvement of the elementary school kitchen and cafeteria.



New Home ISD students do well at state robotics competition

New Home ISD students paricipated last weekend at the State TCEA Robotics Competition held in Hutto, TX. Over 1400 students competed across the State of Texas this year for a chance at this compe-

New Home ISD had one team of seniors, Dimitri Correa, David Gomez, and Parker Smithson (unable to attend due to another state competition) competing in the Advanced Inventions competition with Walter 2.0 their sweeper bot. To compete in the inventions competition a team must create a robot that solves a real world problem. Walter 2.0 was originally designed to be a help to parents who are tired of stepping on Legos that are left on the floor, but Walter 2.0 can also be modified to be used in other locations like a garage or shop where he can sweep up lost screws, nails and other items that might end up on the floor. Walter 2.0 and NHS seniors Dimitri Correa and David Gomez

placed 18th out of 38 teams. TCEA robotics also has an Arena competition where students are given a mat and a set of challenges they must get their robot to complete in a 2-minute time period. This year New Home had two teams in the Advanced Arena Competition and one team in the

Intermediate Arena Competition. The junior high teams would normally participate in the intermediate competition for grades 4th-8th, but due to the number of students interested in robotics at , New Home ISD they chose to move up to the advanced arena competition and compete against 9th-12th grade students. Connor Cook and Trevor Lehman placed 2nd at regional competition and 38th out of 55 teams at the state competition.

The team of Hayden Ehlers and Whit Smithson placed 55th.

New Home had one of the youngest teams at the competition with their 4th grade team of Brazos Beck, Connor Smith, and Kole Lorton. Against mainly 8th grade teams they placed 2nd at the regional competition, 8th at the San Angelo Rodeo, and 16th at the State Competition.

Bulldogs set for playoff game against Lockney in Ralls Friday

The Tahoka Bulldogs finished regular season play with a 12-11 loss against Morton last week, forcing them into a seeding match against them Friday night in Andrews, to determine their playoff berth in UIL Baseball action. The Dogs lost 8-6, which put them as the fourth seed going into the bi-district playoffs that begin this Friday.

The Dogs will play against Lockney in Ralls on Friday, in a best-of-three series that starts Friday night. Game 1 starts Friday at 6 p.m., with Lockney as the home team. Game 2 will be held at noon Saturday, with Tahoka as the home team, and if Game 3 is necessary it will start 30 minutes after the completion of game 2.

"In the 12-11 loss to Morton, Brayden Castillion had an excellent day at the plate and was a huge reason we had a shot to win in the 7th. He had 5 RBI's and by committee as four guys took the mound. This was a game we had many chances to win, but we couldn't finish the deal in the latter innings," he added.

Farm vehicle taken without permission, man leaves note saying he "borrowed" it

A farm truck was stolen Sunday evening from 1940 County Road BB in Lynn County, but the man who took it left a note saying he was borrowing it, and left his own van there. Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. recovered the 2001 Chevy 2500 flatbed pickup in Brownfield the same day, taking an older Brownfield man into custody for unauthorized use of a vehicle. John Hawthorne was listed as owner of the vehicle. Apparently, the Brownfield man was a former farm hand of Hawthorne's.

Tahoka Police officers are investigating two thefts reported during the last week. A Tahoka woman reported that someone had taken a UPS package off her front porch in the 1200 block of N. 5th Street, sometime April 22, which she discovered after tracking the delivery date of the package. The package contained an electronic tablet. Investigation also continues in a report of suspected employee theft at a local convenience store, reported April 13.


